Goliad delayed 1 more week

A four-block stretch of Goliad Street under construction for the last three months and promised to be opened to traffic yesterday will remain closed until the latter part of next week because the contractor failed to meet city specifications in laying a drainage grade.

City Public Works director Tom Decell said Friday Price Construction Co. decided Thursday to tear up about 70 feet of a concrete invert drain near the intersection of Goliad and 11th because the grade of construction "created what we call a birdbath. The grades are not correct through this area and it wouldn't drain properly."

He said Price officials consulted with the project's engineers, Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Lubbock, and decided to tear out the section of concrete and lay a new grade.

Decell refused to characterize the improper grading as an error on the part of the contractor. He said the rest of the road under construction met city specifications.

Season's choice toys picked by ADA group

WASHINGTON AP) — A consumer group recently praised the Cabbage Patch dolls and the Lights Alive game as the most creative toys of the 1983 holiday season, but said some others shouldn't be found under anybody's Christmas tree.

The consumer affairs committee of the liberal Americans for Democratic Action, issuing its 12th annual pre-Christmas toy survey, said shortages of many toys are the worst in years.

Military toys are still highly popular, the panel said, and licensing of toy characters such as G.I. Joe has grown tremendously, accounting for \$20.6 billion in toy sales last year.

The ADA panel gave its "trash box" award to several toys judged as unsafe, overly complicated, messy, poorly made or lacking in play value.

In the trash box category was a doll that soils its diaper, a doll with an irritating laugh and a game with four, single-spaced pages of hard-to-understand instructions.

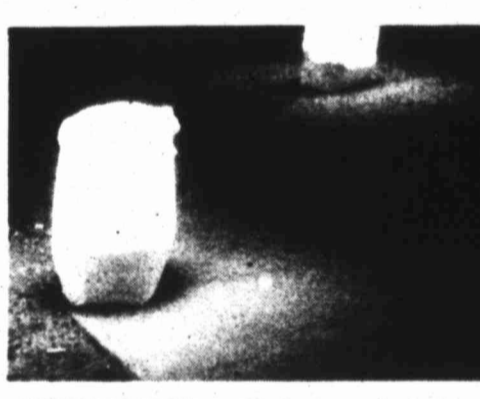
The panel gave high marks to the scarce Cabbage Patch dolls, a soft cloth doll that has become the fad toy of the 1983 holiday season.

While praising the dolls for their message that "you don't have to be beautiful to be loved," Ann Brown, the committee chairwoman, faulted the manufacturer, Coleco, for not anticipating the heavy public demand for them.

Also a big winner in the ADA survey was Lights Alive by Tomy, a battery-operated toy that allows children to design patterns of colored lights.

The group also warned that some small, party favor rattles and plastic, toy-like cake decorations on the market might choke small

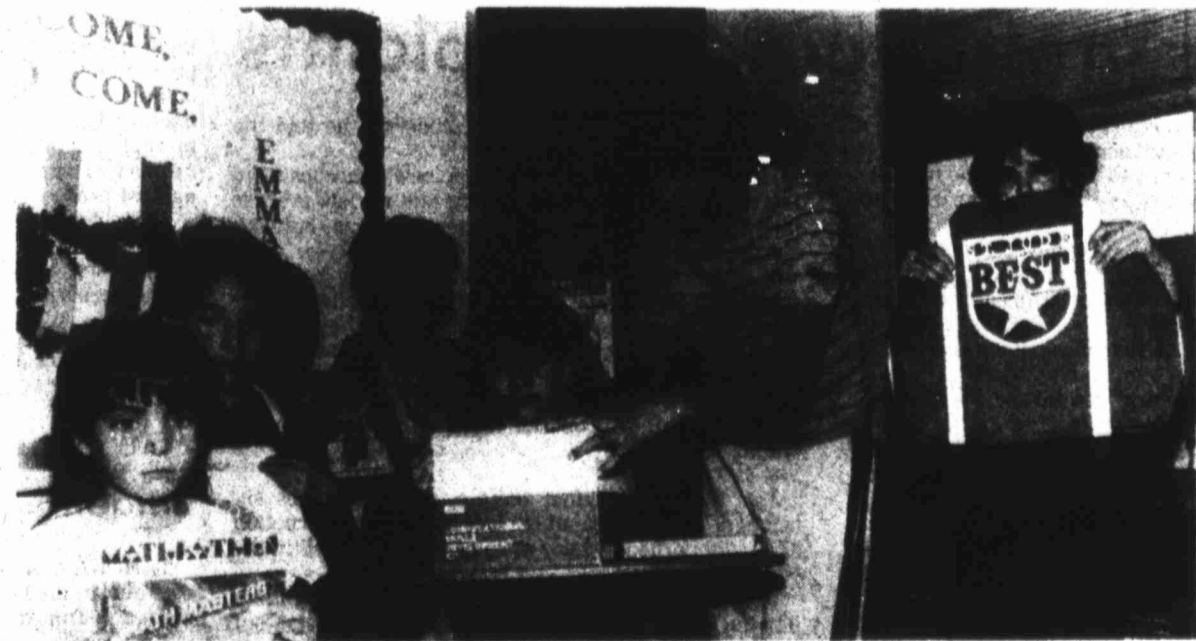
Sister Kevin Keating, principal of Immaculate Heart, said "I'm primarily interested in math, so I tuned in right away" when information about the event arrived.

Cranston has near miss

MASON CITY, Iowa — Presidential hopeful Sen. Alan Cranston and five others escaped injury when an engine failed in a chartered campaign plane shortly after takeoff from the Mason City airport.



"Apparently one of the engines just popped and then went out," said Bonnie Nath, a staffer in Cranston's Des Moines office. "They had another engine, thank God, to get back on."

Ms. Nath said Cranston, D-Calif., had completed a campaign appearance in Mason City on Thursday and was headed for Sioux City, about 175 miles away. She said the twin-engine plane had reached about 1,000 feet when the engine failed, and the pilots returned to the Mason City airport and landed without incident.

"Cranston just sat there and read a magazine," Ms. Nath said. In addition to Cranston and the two pilots, the plane carried two of his staffers and Jane Blotzer, a reporter for the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, she said.

Cranston canceled his Sioux City appearance, but resumed his schedule Friday, Ms. Nath said.

King Juan Carlos plans trip

MADRID — King Juan Carlos will go to New York next Tuesday on a private visit to receive an honorary doctorate from the law faculty of New York University, official sources said Thursday.

On Thursday, the king and Queen Sofia will go to Washington for a private lunch with President Reagan and his wife, Nancy, at the White House.

Anderson declines to run

OMAHA, Neb. — John Anderson, the former Illinois congressman who staged an independent bid for president in 1980, says he isn't running for anything now.

"At this point in time, I am not," Anderson said Thursday at a meeting of the Nebraska Association of County Officials. "I don't think the country at this point suffers from a lack of political candidates."

However, he pushed his recently formed National Unity Party and his concept of "a system of world law," which he said should include some kind of international peacekeeping force.

The new party would offer "genuine competition and alternatives" to what he called a lack of "critical conversation" and debate between Republicans and Democrats.

Anderson at first sought the Republican nomination for president in 1980, but split with the party later and ran on an independent ticket with Patrick Lucey, a former Democratic governor of Wisconsin and ambassador to Mexico.

Patient's wish comes true

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Generosity from Kansas couples and businesses is making a wish come true for a young cancer patient who wants to see singer Neil Diamond in concert.

"It's unbelievable," said Jacquelyn Manzi, 17, of Webster, Mass. "I can't wait. It's something I've been waiting for. I'm so happy."

Peggy and Clark Mayers of Gardner, Kan., read about her Sunday in a newspaper story about a Massachusetts organization called A Wish Come True Inc., which tries to grant wishes to seriously ill children.

The organization was looking for free tickets to a Neil Diamond concert for Jacquelyn, who was diagnosed as having leukemia in March.

The Mayers offered two extra tickets they had purchased for a Dec. 13 concert here. A Wish Come True will provide the airplane tickets.

Another couple offered to pick up Jacquelyn and her mother, Anne, at the airport and drive them wherever they need to go.

Ten hotels in the city have offered them free lodging, and a restaurant chain will give them two free meals.

Foat starts legal service

SACRAMENTO — Feminist Ginny Foat says she'll start a group to offer legal services to women victims of discrimination or violence, arguing that NOW has "lost sight" of such victims.

Ms. Foat, former president of the California chapter of the National Organization for Women, is starting a fund-raising tour to pay for her successful defense against charges that she murdered a businessman near New Orleans in 1965. She was acquitted Nov. 16.

Pleas made for Baby Jane

NEW YORK — The Justice Department argued Friday that a severely handicapped infant might be a victim of discrimination because she has been denied life-prolonging surgery. But her parents' lawyer said federal intervention is causing an "Orwellian tragedy."

The arguments were made before a three-judge federal appeals court panel in the case of an infant known publicly only as Baby Jane Doe, now critically ill.

The baby was born Oct. 11 with spina bifida, in which the spinal cord is exposed. She also had excess fluid accumulating within an abnormally small skull. After consulting doctors and clergy, her parents decided against corrective surgery.

Deputy Assistant Attorney General Charles J. Cooper asked the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel to overturn a lower-court decision denying the Justice Department access to records of University Hospital in Stony Brook, where the infant is being treated.

The case moved into the federal courts after New York's highest state court refused to order corrective surgery on the infant.

The judges at the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals did not indicate when a ruling will be made. They had allowed an accelerated hearing schedule after the baby's condition worsened earlier this week.

Cooper stressed that the Department of Health and Human Services has not made a decision about whether the hospital discriminated against the baby by denying surgery because of her handicaps, but needs the records to find out.

"If the government can't get these records, enforcement comes to a halt," he said. "It's just that simple."

James Reynolds, attorney for the girl's parents, who are not defendants in the suit, said "Congress in its wildest dreams" never intended federal discrimination laws to apply in this case.

Pickens' motives questioned

MIDLAND — T. Boone Pickens' attempt to create a royalty trust during a reorganization vote for Gulf Oil Corp. is not in the nation's best interest, says the retired chairman of Standard Oil Co. (Indiana).

John E. Swearingin, who retired from Standard of Indiana in September after 44 years in the industry, said Thursday that Pickens' desired moves "would stop production" and would reap only short-term benefits rather than long-term rewards.

Swearingin never referred to Pickens, president of Amarillo-based Mesa Petroleum Co., or his Gulf Investors Group by name, but on several occasions in his lecture left little doubt whom he was talking about. "Companies are going out of business, and speculators are encouraging their departure through proposals which would spin off oil and gas properties to stockholders," Swearingin said on the eve of Gulf's shareholder meeting in Pittsburgh.

"Many have concluded that it is cheaper to find oil and gas on the stock market than to dig holes in the ground," Swearingin said.

"A royalty trust distributed to shareholders of an oil company conveys income from liquidation of oil and gas properties directly to shareholders and curtails reinvestment to maintain reserves," he said.

He said the result of wholesale creation of royalty trusts "would be substantially to diminish efforts to find new oil and gas supplies."

"Much of the same result could be achieved by a simple decision to stop exploring, pay out income to stockholders and ultimately go out of business," he said.

Swearingin spoke to 300 people Thursday night at the first H.B. Fuqua Distinguished Lecture series at the Permian Basin Petroleum Museum.

Swearingin's lecture was titled, "Is the Oil Business Dying?"

"Not a chance," he concluded.

Funeral held for Druse leader

BEIRUT — Ambushers hurled grenades at an Israeli patrol in the crowded marketplace of the southern Lebanese town of Nabatiyeh Friday, killing one soldier and wounding four, Beirut radio said.

It said the surviving Israel troops opened fire on the attackers and that in the ensuing shootout four Lebanese inhabitants of Nabatiyeh were wounded.

No group claimed responsibility, and the Tel Aviv command had no comment.

Beirut radio reporters in Nabatiyeh, seven miles north of the Israeli border, said the battle broke out at 2:15 p.m. when an Israeli army patrol in jeeps and armored personnel carriers was ambushed in the marketplace.

One grenade hit a jeep. The blasts panicked pedestrians and shopkeepers, who ran for cover as Israeli troops opened up with small arms fire, according to the radio.

Israeli reinforcements ringed the ambush scene and raided several houses in the town, searching for the assailants. An undetermined number of arrests was made, the radio said.

Helicopters hovered for hours over the town while the search operation was under way. The Israeli victims were evacuated by helicopter to Israel and the wounded Lebanese were treated in Nabatiyeh clinics, the report said.

In Beirut, funeral services were held for Sheik Halim Takieddine, the top religious judge of Lebanon's Druse community who was assassinated Thursday.

The Progressive Socialist Party, standard bearer of Lebanon's 200,000 Druse renewed its charges that the rightist Christian Phalange Party was responsible for Takieddine's killing.

"They (Phalangists) are trying to take us one by one," said the party's deputy leader, Fuad Salman. "But I warn that our arm is long, strong and capable of striking everywhere."

Salman made his threat in a speech he delivered on behalf of top party leader Walid Jumblatt to thousands thronging around Takieddine's coffin at the walled courtyard of the Druse main temple in west Beirut.

The Moslem sector of Beirut as well as Lebanon's major cities in the north and south were largely shut down by a day-long general strike declared for Takieddine.

Most schools, shops, businesses, cafes and restaurants were closed. The American University of Beirut suspended classes for the day and the state radio broadcast verses from the Koran, Islam's holy book.

Chinese artifacts found in El Paso

EL PASO (AP) — Archaeologists digging under a downtown El Paso parking lot have unearthed what they believe could be the largest collection of turn-of-the-century Chinese artifacts ever discovered in the United States.

"We don't have it all in hand, but from what we've seen in the ground, it appears this will be the largest collection of Chinese-American material ever available for study," said David Batcho, assistant chief archaeologist at New Mexico State University's cultural resources management division.

The school's archaeologists have been hired by the city of El Paso to search for

relics under downtown sites currently undergoing renovation.

The team of six NMSU archaeologists already have been able to determine that many of the artifacts were made in China and brought to the area by Chinese who came to this West Texas city in the late 1800s to work on railroad projects.

He said other objects that have been dug up include ceramic bowls and soup spoons, wine jars and pottery.

Most of the material was discovered between two feet and eight feet under a paved parking lot near the historic Cortez Hotel in downtown El Paso, Batcho said.

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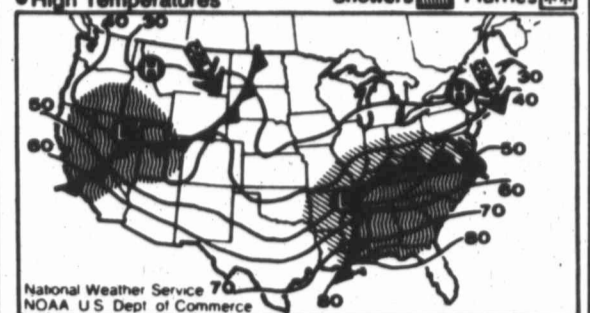

Snow storms keep coming

Snowstorms that have dumped a record 12 feet of snow in parts of the the Rockies over the past month kept coming Friday, spreading ice and snow into the urban Northeast, and forecasters warned "another big one" is on the way.

"We've already got a snow cover that looks like January across northern New England, the Great Lakes and the upper Midwest into Kansas, Colorado and Nevada," said Nolan Duke of the government's Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Mo. "That's quite a snow cover, and it's not going to be melting away anytime soon."

Nationwide, the death toll in a series of four snowstorms since Nov. 21 climbed to 83 — 42 this week — including traffic fatalities, people who froze to death in their cars and those who collapsed of heart attacks while shoveling snow.

A lingering deep freeze in the West pushed temperatures as low as 16 degrees below zero Friday in Minnesota as the most recent storm dumped up to 15 inches of new snow in Utah and Colorado and spread into the heartland, icing highways across Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio into western Pennsylvania with up to 3 inches of snow or sleet and freezing rain.

It was a bracing 16 degrees below zero at Hibbing, Minn., 15 below at St. Cloud, S.D., and 10 degrees below at Broadus, Mont. The 9 degrees at Boise, Idaho, was a record for the date.

Noontime temperatures were barely above zero in Montana, the Dakotas and Minnesota.

It was 8 degrees in Denver, which was also under an air pollution alert for its poorest air quality in two years.

A winter storm watch was issued for the Texas Panhandle where forecasters warned of a potentially destructive ice storm.

Meteorologists in the meantime were keeping their eye on a storm out in the Pacific that could rank with a blizzard that socked the Rockies and the Midwest earlier this week. The storm was expected to move into the Sierra Nevada range "with considerable snow accumulations" on Saturday and into the Rockies on Saturday night and Sunday.

"It's another big one," Duke said. By contrast, only 2.1 inches of snow fell during November at Anchorage, Alaska, which was 8 inches below normal.

Cattle rancher doubles as sheriff

BONHAM, Texas (AP) — Le Roy Price is feeding his "babies," 41 head of cattle. Off deep in the woods, the autumn leaves are aglow in all their glory.

"When I want to meditate I go back into the woods where the squirrels come out, and the hoot owls hold a convention. I just grin from ear to ear, and think, 'Oh, how good the Lord has been to me. I don't deserve it but I sure enjoy it.'"

Price has the grubbier, meanest job in Fannin County of North Texas. He is the deputy sheriff that serves all the civil and criminal complaint papers for the courts.

He works a good 14 hours a day, day and night. It makes no difference what his hours are, those are the ones he works.

So many people, he explains, work out of the county and he can't find them to serve until dark falls.

About half of the papers he serves in the daytime. He is wiry, weighs 125 pounds.

"When I want to meditate I go back into the woods where the squirrels come out, and the hoot owls hold a convention. I just grin from ear to ear, and think, 'Oh, how good the Lord has been to me. I don't deserve it but I sure enjoy it.'" — Le Roy Price

He was the salutatorian of his class recently at the Texoma Regional Police Academy. At 62, he was the oldest officer to ever go through the school, and he got beat out of having the highest grades in the class by three-tenths of 1 percent.

He owns 144 acres of land in various plots of FM 898. He planned always to return to Fannin County and farm and ranch some, open a real estate office and just stay busy. He returned six years ago when he retired from the post office at Hereford after 35 years.

He bought his land, made his plans for years. He bought the land for \$150 an acre. It's worth \$1,000 an acre now.

He bought his cattle. He admits he real-

ly doesn't know how many he owns, and they are all pets. Punjab, a monster of a Brahman bull, will lie down to be petted. There there is Black Mama, an Angus cow he nursed back to life after a veterinarian said she would die.

There's Matilda. Patches. Big Red and Little Red — Middle Red died. Bully Boy comes when called.

One is named Yankee, another Doodle. Dandy he sold off recently. The hardest thing he has to do each year is sell off stock. "I don't make any money off them," Price says, as he grips his pipe in his teeth. "But all this is just so much enjoyment to me. I love it."

"As long as a man keeps himself busy, he has a lot of hobbies, he never grows old," he says.

Price was born in Bonham, the son of a jeweler. "Everybody was about to starve to death here in the late '20s," Price says.

"My grandpappy gathered up his clan and we moved to Black. That's about 15 miles from Hereford."

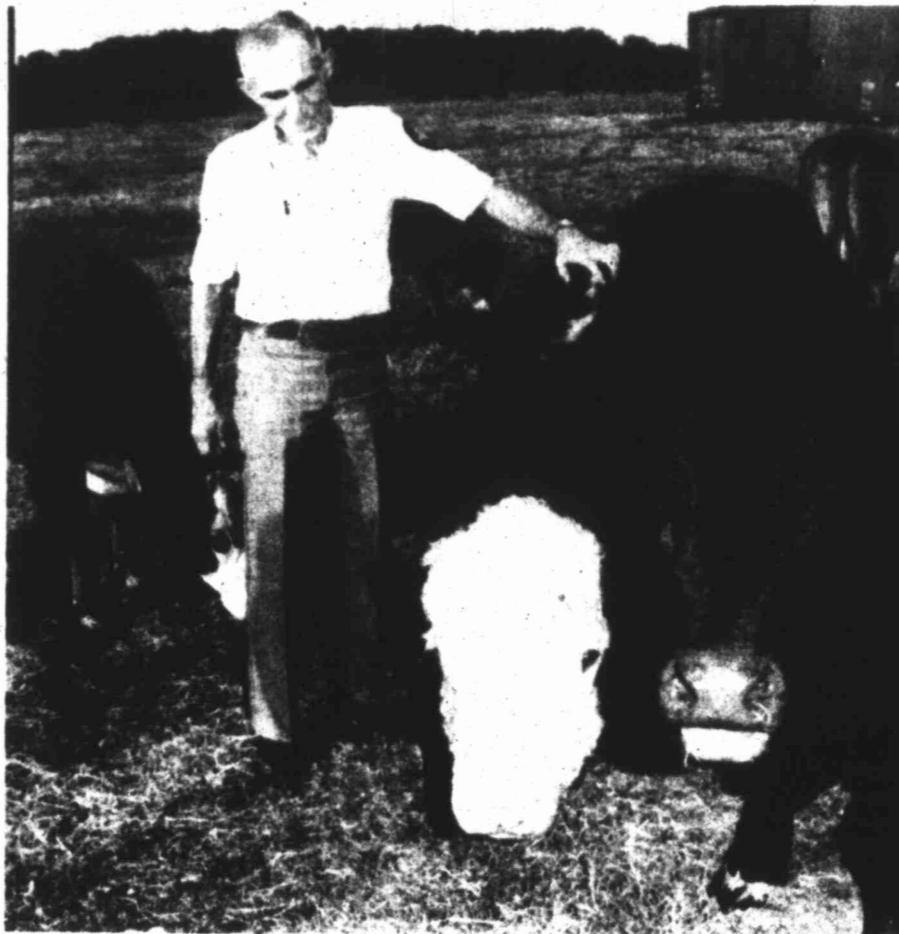
He remembers the 40 acres his family bought had bleached out buffalo bones on the land. It was raw, still untamed after all those years. Over the years Price gathered hundreds of arrowheads, ending up selling off most of them to the museum at Canyon. But he kept a case for his home. He had collected six clocks, all 7-feet tall. He has one of those left. He owned 65 wall clocks at one time.

So much of what he collected he had to dispose of when he left Hereford. But all those years working for the post office at Hereford he was making plans. He always meant to come back to Fannin County. His roots are here. Out at the Caney Creek Ranch in the Johnson cemetery is the grave of his grandfather, a veteran of the Texas-Mexican War. He was buried there in 1843.

After 25 years of planning Price finally returned. People at Hereford thought he was crazy. But Price knew real estate. He had operated a real estate agency for years at Hereford. He knew that drawing the water from underground sources meant some day the land would be of little value, and he was right.

He packed up his belongings and his wife, Maxine, and moved back to the land he had been buying. Maxine is a native of Hereford. She came "against my will," she calls out from the kitchen.

He meant to farm a bit, do some ranching, raise channel catfish. He failed to follow through completely on the catfish project, he admits. He stayed busy with the cattle, and raised some milo and wheat on about 65 acres, he says.

Farming stopped paying off. It was costing him to raise the cattle, costing more than he received, but he enjoyed being busy.

In 1980, Sheriff Sam Patton was elected and organized a crew of reserve deputies. Le Roy joined.

"I like Sam. I wasn't doing anything really much," he recalls. He went to school to get his reserve status in March 1981. The more he worked at "sheriffing," the more he liked it.

"If someone had told me three years ago I would end up a full-time deputy sheriff I would have told him he was crazy," he says with his typical grin.

"Sam never orders anybody to do anything. The more I worked at the job the better I liked it," Price says.

"When I was farming I was missing being with people. Working for the post office I was always around people.

"Now, when I go out to see a man and I have to serve him with a paper I try to make him understand that it's not the

sheriff's department doing anything to him. I know people have problems, and I try to understand them, and make them understand that their business is with the court.

"When I present things to people that way it seems to work out pretty good. I respect people, and in turn I believe they respect me. I have never made an enemy, and I've had to serve some pretty nasty papers," Price says.

Going to school for eight weeks was hard work, he admits. "I learned how much I didn't know," he says. "Now, those young fellows complained more than I did. There were 21 in the class, and a lot of them had college degrees. Me, I only had a high school education."

Price at 62 is spry. He walks at a fast clip, smiles his way through life, and goes about his unwanted job, making his way around the back roads of the county.

And he doesn't have the time to think about getting old.

Democratic hopefuls descend on Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Four candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination are slated to be in Houston next Tuesday in hopes of raising \$400,000 for the party's national committee.

Houston is one of five stops on the two-day swing, which also includes Washington, Chicago, Atlanta and Albuquerque.

Reubin Askew, John Glenn, Gary Hart and Jesse Jackson were to appear at a \$500-a-plate lunch chaired by Texas Gov. Mark White. Also slated to attend were Oklahoma Gov. George Nigh and Louisiana Gov.-elect Edwin Edwards.

The \$400,000 hoped for in Houston is part of a \$1.9 million goal of the trip, which includes \$1,000-a-plate fundraisers in Washington and Albuquerque, the Democratic National Committee said in a release.

Young, Flutie just glad to be in Rozier's company

NEW YORK (AP) — The Downtown Athletic Club will name the 1983 Heisman Trophy winner tonight, and it won't come as any surprise to the other two top candidates if Mike Rozier of Nebraska wins the award.

Rozier, a senior running back, was one of three Heisman candidates reportedly invited to attend the awards ceremony and news conference, which begins at 5 p.m. EST. The actual announcement is scheduled for 7:50 p.m.

The other two were quarterbacks Steve Young of Brigham Young and Doug Flutie of Boston College.

"I don't know if I'm the best guy in my own locker room, and you're talking about the nation," Young said recently when asked about

his chances of winning the award as the nation's best college football player.

"I just approach it as, 'Hey, that'd be great.' It's flattering to be considered, just to be in the same breath as some of the guys around the nation that are being considered," Young said.

Flutie, a junior, said he really didn't expect to be in the top three. "I thought I might be in the top 10," Flutie said, "have my name mentioned here or there, but that's about it."

Most consider Rozier, a senior, the frontrunner for the Heisman, which has been awarded by the Downtown Athletic Club every year since 1935. This season, Rozier ran for 2,148 yards, becoming only the second player in NCAA history to surpass the

2,000-yard mark in a single season. Marcus Allen of Southern Cal rushed for 2,342 yards in 1981.

Rozier's 4,780 career rushing yards is a Big Eight Conference record, and his 29 rushing touchdowns set an NCAA mark previously held by Lydell Mitchell of Penn State, who ran for 26 TD's in 1971.

"There are other players out there with talent, but none that make use of it like Mike has," says Nebraska backfield coach Frank Solich.

This year, Rozier led the Cornhuskers to a 12-0 regular-season record and a No. 1 national ranking. Nebraska will be going for the national championship in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 2 against Miami, Fla.

Young was the top-rated passer in the NCAA this year, throwing for 3,902 yards and 33 touchdowns. He led Brigham Young to a 10-1 mark, a No. 9 national ranking and a berth in the Holiday Bowl on Dec. 23 against Missouri.

Flutie passed for 2,724 yards and 17 touchdowns, helping Boston College to a 9-2 record and No. 13 national rating. The Eagles will play Notre Dame in the Liberty Bowl on Dec. 29.

Last year's winner was running back Herschel Walker of Georgia. If Rozier wins, he'll become the 33rd running back to do so. The last non-running back to win the award was Nebraska flankerback Johnny Rodgers in 1972. Rodgers also was the last 'Husker to win.

Hayes-led Rockets blast Supersonics

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Coach Bill Fitch "had a gut feeling" about substituting Elvin Hayes into the lineup Friday night.

Maybe he should listen to his feelings more often. Hayes came off the bench to replace foul-plagued center Ralph Sampson to score 16 points, move into the elite National Basketball Association 27,000-point club and help lead the Rockets to a 125-102 victory over the Seattle Supersonics.

Rookie Rodney McCray got his first career start after reporting to training camp three weeks late in a contract dispute. He responded with 22 points and nine rebounds.

"I feel physically ready to play and I think I was ready," said McCray, who has lost 15 pounds since reporting to camp. "I never weighed myself. I just go by how I feel."

The Sonics were never in contention in the second half.

Sampson, Houston's top scorer and rebounder, drew three fouls in the first six minutes as Seattle took a 32-31 first-quarter lead.

Hayes took Sampson's place and keyed a Rockets surge with 10 second-period points.

Along the way, the 38-year-old Hayes joined Wilt Chamberlain and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar as the NBA's only 27,000-point scorers. Hayes reached the milestone with a layup off an Allen Leavell feed with 3:40 remaining in the first half, and hit an 18-foot bank shot with 2:55 remaining to give Houston a 19-point bulge, 65-46.

After leading 67-52 at halftime, the Rockets raised their lead to 20 points, 82-62, on Hayes' layup off a James Bailey pass with 5:37 remaining in the third period.

The 7-10 Rockets posted their fifth home win in seven starts. Houston did not win its seventh game until its 42nd outing a year ago.

Jack Sikma scored 23 points to pace the 9-9 Sonics, who lost their third straight road game. Tom Chambers added 20 points.

Leavell ended with 18 points for Houston and Hayes scored 16 points.

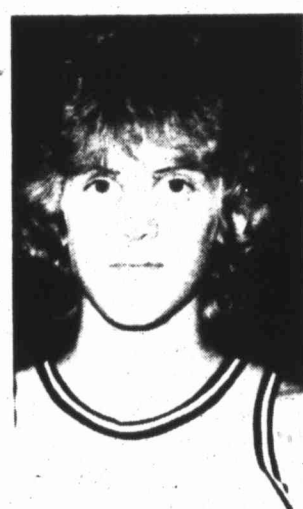

Again the 'Beast of the East'

Georgetown rules St. John's, Villanova

The towering presence of Patrick Ewing and four returning starters makes Georgetown the leading contender for the Big East Conference basketball championship this season.

Georgetown also was the top preseason pick of the conference's coaches last season, but St. John's, Villanova and Boston College finished in a three-way tie for the title, and St. John's won the postseason tournament.

Big East Commissioner Dave Gavitt says the conference "is the most competitive ever from top to bottom." But, the conference has lost many of the key players who helped the Big East gain stature and it may level off as far as producing teams of national prominence.

The league is only five years old, but it has made a pronounced mark on the national scene. Georgetown finished second to North Carolina for the 1982 NCAA championship, and the Hoyas, along with St. John's, Villanova, Boston College and Syracuse, all made the NCAA playoffs last season. Those five teams in the nine-team conference also were ranked in The Associated Press Top 20 much of last season.

Boston College, whose only key loss was leading scorer and No. 2 rebounder John Garriss, is a strong contender for the title. St. John's, Villanova and Syracuse are not as strong as last season.

St. John's lost starters David Russell, Billy Goodwin and Bob Kelly and supersub Kevin

Williams. Villanova is minus John Pinone and Stewart Granger, while Syracuse is without Leo Rautins, Earl Santifer and Tony Bruin.

In addition to Ewing, a 7-foot junior who averaged 17.7 points, 10.2 rebounds and blocked 105 shots last season, Georgetown Coach John Thompson has four other starters back. Sophomores David Wingate, Michael Jackson and Horace Broadnax and junior Billy Martin gained experience under fire last season. Seniors Fred Brown, injured most of last season, and Gene Smith also should help.

East Preview

Boston College is counting on guard Michael Adams (16.2 points) and 6-9 Jay Murphy (17.7) for much of its offense.

The Redmen would be in better shape if the NCAA hadn't ruled against the academic eligibility of 6-8 recruit Walter Berry, who was penciled in as a starter. He's at San Jacinto (Texas) Junior College.

St. John's top player is 6-6 guard Chris Mullin, the Redmen's top scorer with a 19.1 average on 58 percent shooting last season. He broke a bone in his foot in a summer practice session for the Pan American Games, but is nearly 100 percent fit.

Bill Wennington, 7-0, and Jeff

Allen, 6-10, will share the center spot. Newcomers Willie Glass, a 6-5 forward, and Mike Moses, a guard, could be factors.

At Villanova, which also lost reserve forward Mike Mulquin, the offensive and rebounding lead falls on slender 6-10 Ed Pinckney (12.5 points, 9.7 rebounds). Dwayne McClain is the main backcourt returnee.

Big things are expected from 6-2 freshman Dwayne "Pearl" Washington, a dazzling schoolboy performer who is expected to run the show at Syracuse. Sophomores Rafael Addison and Wendell Alexis, key reserves last season, move into starting roles.

Pittsburgh, with high-scoring Clyde Vaughan, is considered the conference's darkhorse and appears capable of overtaking the three schools hit hard by graduation.

Connecticut, Providence and Seton Hall don't figure as contenders in the Big East.

Iona, led by guard Steve Burt, is expected to rule the Metro Atlantic Conference. LaSalle and Holy Cross have joined the conference this year. Major losses include Fairfield's Steve DeBlisschop and Fordham's David Maxwell.

In the Atlantic 10, last season's tournament winner, West Virginia, lost Greg Jones. St. Bonaventure graduated Mark Jones while Mike Sheehy recently was suspended indefinitely. Temple, St. Joseph's and George Washington should move to the top.

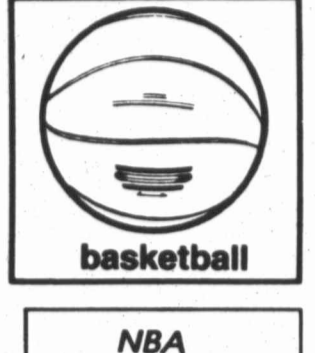

NBA Eastern Conference Atlantic Division table with columns for team, W, L, Pct., GB

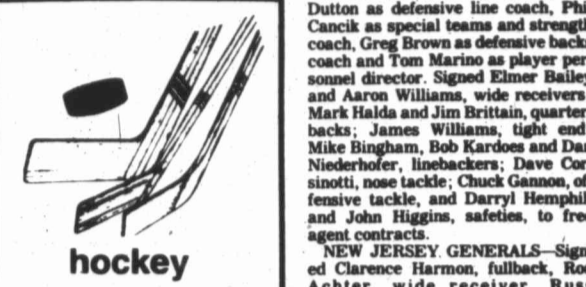

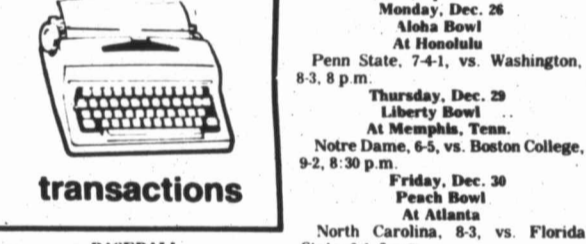

Iowa downs Bears

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Center Greg Stokes tossed in 23 points and guard Steve Carfino added 14 as fifth-ranked Iowa methodically wore down Baylor for a 67-44 victory Friday night in the opening round of the Amana-Hawkeye Classic Basketball Tournament.

Stokes' strong inside play — which included 10-for-13 shooting from the field and 12 rebounds — and Carfino's outside shooting propelled the Hawkeyes' (2-0) into the tournament championship game Saturday night against No. 10 Oregon State.

Oregon State, led by Rick Berry and Charlie Sitton, used a tight zone defense to offset a sluggish offensive performance in a 49-40 victory over Arkansas State in the other first-round game Friday.

Iowa, employing a full-court press

that rattled Baylor, scored the first eight points of the game and held the Bears scoreless for nearly four minutes.

Baylor came back to trail only 18-14 with 8:44 left in the half, but Stokes contributed two baskets to a 10-2 spurt that put Iowa ahead 28-16 and the Hawkeyes went on to forge a 40-26 halftime lead.

Consecutive baskets developed by Paul Kuiper, who led Baylor with 14 points, cut Iowa's lead to 43-32 with 16:26 left in the game, but the Bears never got any closer.

Carfino sank four free throws and Stokes hit two to put Iowa back in control at 49-32 with 13:20 to go. Later, reserve Bryan Boyle hit a layup and a free throw to cap a run of 10 straight points that gave Iowa its biggest lead 67-40 with 3:14 remaining.

Mike Heller, who formerly played at Iowa, added 10 points for Baylor. Boyle finished with nine for the Hawkeyes.

Twins ink Davis Friday

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Relief pitcher Ron Davis has signed a four-year, \$2.7 million contract with the Minnesota Twins, making him the highest-paid player in the American League club's history.

Davis, a former New York Yankee traded to Minnesota in April 1982, recorded 30 saves as a Twin last season — the third-highest number in the major leagues.

"We're very delighted to have Ron's services available to us in future seasons," Howard Fox, the Twins' executive director, said at a news conference Thursday. "He's one of the top relievers in the game today, and we believe his best days are still ahead."

Davis' contract contains an unusual clause that prohibits the Twins from trading him before Jan. 15, 1984, when the team owners hold their winter meetings in Nashville. If Davis is traded after that

Hill' Street show raises questions

LOS ANGELES (AP) — In a plot twist reminiscent of "Who Shot J.R.?" the producers of "Hill Street Blues" left viewers asking the question: Did Lt. Howard Hunter, the show's militaristic SWAT-team cop, commit suicide after aiming a gun at his head?

But a question perhaps more important for NBC is: Will the cliffhanger provide a happy outcome to the ratings battle between "Hill Street" and CBS' "Knots Landing?"

NBC won't talk about the plot and a network executive denied Friday it was a ratings play for the Emmy-winning police drama, which has trailed CBS' "Dallas" spinoff all season.

During Thursday night's episode, it was revealed that Hunter, played by actor James Sikking, acted as an unwitting go-between in a police bribery incident years ago. Other characters on the show assured Hunter it was only a minor incident, but the ramrod-straight Vietnam veteran felt he had compromised his family's honor.

At the end of the program, Hunter penned a farewell note, put a gun to his head and said: "Come on, be a man about it. I love you, mom." The screen went black and a shot was heard.

"I can't say anything," Steven Bochco, co-creator and executive producer, said Friday. "The material speaks for itself."

Asked whether he had ratings in mind, he answered, "We have a real loyal core audience and we feel we are still making a first-rate television series. We try to design our stories to accommodate our needs as writers."

"Not to mention the fact that the stories on 'Hill Street' were conceived some time ago, certainly before the ratings were out indicating we were ahead or behind," Bochco said.

Will the solution be revealed next week? Bochco said, "You gotta watch."

"If it was a ratings play we would have publicized it," Gene Walsh, NBC's vice president of press for the West Coast, said Friday.

"For instance, when Joyce Davenport (Veronica Hamel) and Capt. Frank Furillo (Daniel J. Travanti) got married last year there was no publicity. It was just part of the unpredictability of the show."

"Part of the viewer's enjoyment of the show is that unpredictability," Walsh said.

"Hill Street" consistently beat CBS' "Knots Landing" last season. But so far this season, "Knots" is leading with a rating of 20.1 to "Hill Street's" 18.6.

A rating of 20.1 means that 20.1 percent of all homes with television sets were watching.

The out-of-towners

The BIG swim meet — one of them, anyway — for YMCA swimmers is being hosted next year by Big Spring. The strange thing is the event won't be held in Big Spring.

The Texas State YMCA Swim Championships are scheduled for the City of Midland pool, located 45 miles to our immediate on Interstate 20. That's not exactly two streets over, you know. But Bob Morton, physical director at the local Y, is glad to be part of the state meet.

Wherever it may be held.

YMCA's around the state gather twice a year, once in the spring and again in the summer, for their championship swim meets. West Texas swimmers usually pile into a van or station wagon and drive hundreds of miles to Dallas or Houston to swim against the state's best.

Finally, the meet has come to our home turf, er, water. Abilene was also interested in getting the meet but like Big Spring, the Key City is also minus adequate facilities to host such a large congregation of swimmers.

And so the two cities have combined to host the meet. In Midland. You've seen all the tall buildings over there? And the pump-jacks and oil storage tanks surrounding the tall buildings? Midland, you see, has the cash to build a facility with eight 25-yard swim lanes, Colorado Timing System, non-turbulent lane lines and a teaching pool all under one roof.

Morton doesn't mind the inconvenience. He's looking forward to the day — four or five years from now — when the Big Spring Y can get a new pool. The main concern right now is stopping the roof from leaking. And maybe putting in some new light bulbs so swimmers can see from one to the other.

It would be great if the meet was in Big Spring. "We're expecting over 600 swimmers," Morton said, "and that's not including all the parents and other adults. There will be 200 there from the Houston Dad's Club alone."

Big Spring merchants, I'm sure, would love to have visions of youngsters swimming in their heads.

The income instead is going to Midland, a city which really needs it.

Remember, Morton isn't complaining. He's had great cooperation from the Midland Chamber of Commerce in finding motel rooms for everyone, finding a computer system to keep track of results and providing transportation from the motels to the pool.

They're expecting \$10,000 to enter the community from the Houston swimmers alone.

Really, Big Spring would have no use of that type of cash at all. Right, Bob? He just smiles.

There is hope. Morton is pushing to have the YMCA summer meet right here in Big Spring. Since it's warmer in the summer, the meet can be held outdoors at the city pool in Comanche Trails Park. It's long enough and big enough. Too bad it can't be used in March.

A new pool at the Y would be great. Big Spring High swimmers are at a disadvantage when they compete elsewhere in Olympic size pools. And not too many visitors to the local Y have been heard to comment, "My what a nice facility."

"Very realistically," Morton says, "we could get a new pool in four to five years. Of course I'd like to see one much sooner. But I don't think so."

For right now, then, a state meet in the West Texas region will have to be held somewhere else besides Big Spring. It's not just a matter of pride but of things like economy. At least Big Spring Y personnel will get a taste of running a big meet and be prepared for the day they can host one in our neighborhood.

Until then, we'll just have to jump in the car and drive to somewhere else to swim.

Surprise...Heisman goes to Rozier

NEW YORK (AP) — Mike Rozier of the University of Nebraska, only the second man in NCAA history to rush for more than 2,000 yards in a season, won the Heisman Trophy Saturday night.

Rozier, a senior, became the 33rd running back to win the Heisman, which has been awarded annually since 1935 by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York to "the outstanding college football player in the United States."

Rozier rushed for 2,148 yards last season in leading Nebraska to a No. 1 ranking, a berth in the Orange Bowl Jan. 2 against Miami, Fla., and a possible national championship.

The only other player to rush for more than 2,000 yards in a season was Southern Cal's Marcus Allen, who ran for 2,342 yards in 1981, the year he won the Heisman. Rozier ended his career with 4,780 yards rushing for a Big Eight Conference record, and he set an NCAA record with 29 rushing touchdowns this season.

In becoming the only Nebraska player to win the Heisman besides Johnny Rodgers in 1972, Rozier, who received 1,801 points, outpolled quarterbacks Steve Young of Brigham Young, who had 1,172, and Doug Flutie of Boston College, who finished with 253 points from the 1,050 voters in the six regions comprising the Heisman Memorial Trophy Committee.

Rodgers, a flanker, also was the last non-running back to win the award. The last quarterback to win the award was Pat Sullivan of Auburn in 1971.

Rozier will receive the award on Thursday at a formal dinner at the New York Hilton.

Rounding out the list of top 10 finishers were Rozier's teammate, quarterback Turner Gill, defensive back Terry Hoage of Georgia, running back Napoleon McCallum of Navy, quarterback Jeff Hostetler of West Virginia, offensive tackle Bill Fraich of Pittsburgh, quarterback Walter Lewis of Alabama and quarterback Norman "Boomer" Esiason of Maryland.

Rozier, a 5-foot-10 210-pounder from Camden, N.J., actually was recruited by Nebraska by accident.

Former freshman Coach Frank Solich, now the Cornhuskers' varsity backfield coach, went to a game in New

Jersey five years ago to recruit a tight end, whose name he doesn't even remember.

But, during the game, he saw Rozier and was impressed — impressed enough to inquire about the player.

"I asked the coach where the back's school was, went over there and started recruiting Mike," Solich says.

Rozier spent his first college year at Coffeyville, Kan., Junior College to improve his grades, then moved to

Nebraska. The rest is history.

During his sophomore season, Rozier teamed with Roger Craig in Nebraska's I-back formation to gain 949 yards. Last year, he rushed for 1,721 yards and was named Big Eight Offensive Player of the Year.

With 4.54 speed in the 40-yard dash, Rozier competed on Nebraska's indoor track team in 1982. It was that speed, along with his ability to bench press 325 pounds, that made Rozier the premier runner in college this year.

In the second game of the season, Rozier surpassed I.M. Hipp's school rushing record of 2,814 yards. The previous Big Eight rushing record was held by Oklahoma State's Terry Miller, who ran for 4,582 yards from 1974-77. And Rozier's 29 rushing touchdowns broke the single-season mark of Penn State's Lydell Mitchell, who ran for 26 touchdowns in 1971.

Rozier also set an NCAA record with an average of 7.156 yards on 668 carries. He tied NCAA marks for touchdowns scored in a season with 29 and for consecutive 100-yard games with 11.

Rozier had four straight 200-yard games last season, including a school single-game record of 285 yards on 31 carries against Kansas. He failed to gain 100 yards in only one game, the season opener when he rushed for 71 yards on 16 carries against Penn State.

Young, a direct descendant of his school's founder, Brigham Young, led the nation in passing this year with 306 completions in 429 attempts for a .713 percentage. The senior quarterback threw for 3,902 yards and 33 touchdowns as the ninth-ranked Cougars, 10-1, earned a berth in the Holiday Bowl on Dec. 23 against Missouri.

Flutie, a junior, completed 177 of 345 passes for a completion ratio of .513. He threw for 17 touchdowns and led Boston College, 9-2, into the Liberty Bowl on Dec. 29 against Notre Dame.

Last year's Heisman winner was junior running back Herschel Walker of Georgia. Walker signed with the New Jersey Generals of the United States Football League.

Mitchell played his second team

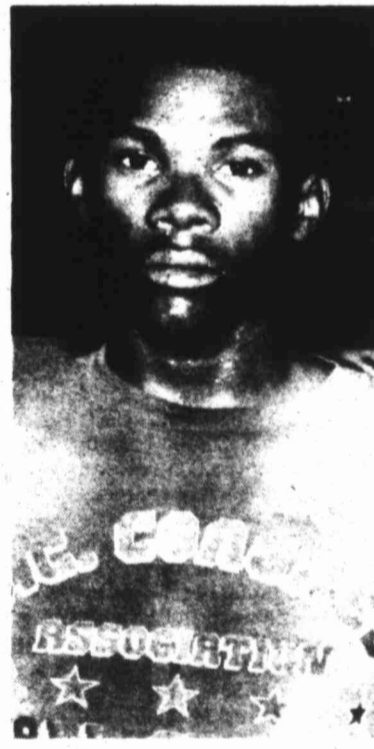
the final 11 minutes in the game. Nicholas Jones and Mike Fulkerson came off the bench to score six points each.

Rugged Lee defense smothers Permian, 20-0

LUBBOCK — "No Mo Mojo," the sign painted on the Rebel car window read. When all was said and done Saturday afternoon in Jones Stadium, Odessa Permian was indeed no more in the state high school football playoffs.

A swarming Rebel defense forced three Permian turnovers and the offense cashed in all three for points as Midland Lee shocked the Panthers 20-0 in a Class 5-A quarterfinals game.

The win sends the Rebels into a semifinals contest next weekend against Plano. Plano tripped Houston Klein 21-0 in another semifinal game played Saturday.

The defeat marked the first time ever Permian has fallen in quarterfinals play and the first time the Panthers had lost twice to the same team in a single season. Lee downed Mojo 20-7 in October when the teams met in a District 4-5A game in Odessa.

Saturday's result wasn't much different. If anything, it was worse.

The hard-hitting Rebels held Permian to 15 yards rushing and limited quarterback Rex Lamberti to 86 yards passing. Five times the Panther senior was buried by Lee linemen while trying to pass. His interception and fumble in the second half set up two Midland scores.

"I thought our defense was the difference in the game," Lee coach Spike Dykes understated. "That's as good a defense as we've played. I thought we did a good job putting pressure on him (Lamberti). I thought that was the key to the game."

While Lee's defense was consistently excellent throughout the game, the Rebels' offensive showing in the third quarter against a brisk southerly wind proved fatal to Permian.

Taking the wind after halftime, the Panthers kicked off hoping to stop Lee on defense and use Lamberti's arm to erase the Rebels' 7-0 lead. The strategy

backfired, however, as Midland kept the ball on the ground and used nearly eight minutes of the quarter on its first drive.

Fullback Issac Garnett, held to just 22 yards on eight first half carries, was the workhorse in the drive, carrying 11 times for 60 yards.

Permian's defense, pinned inside its own 10, stiffened and forced a 22-yard field goal by Craig Kamradt. Although the Rebels didn't get a touchdown, they added another penetration and kept the ball away from the multi-dangerous Lamberti.

"That was a turning point in the game," Dykes said. "We were able to take eight minutes off the clock and that really juiced us up."

"They just took the ball and drove it on us," said Permian head coach John Wilkins. "They only got a field goal but they ran eight minutes off the clock."

When the Panthers finally lined up on offense, Lee's defense dealt its hardest blow of the day. Lamberti dropped back to pass on third down from his 47 but Rebels Pat Stevens and Billy Cornelius sandwiched him in the pocket. The football popped free and Cornelius recovered at Mojo's 36 yard line.

Walter Jones burst for 24 yards on Lee's first play and three plays later, Tyrone Thurman scored his second touchdown of the afternoon from three yards out. Kamradt added the PAT and with six seconds to go in the quarter, Lee had an insurmountable 17-0 lead.

Lee added its final points with 3:32 left when Kamradt connected on a 28-yard field goal. Moments

before, Eddie Kittle made a one-handed interception of a Lamberti swing pass at the Lee 15.

The Rebels rushed for 226 yards with Jones getting 88 and Garnett 87. Both of quarterback Jeff Motley's passes went incomplete.

Gary Homsey rushed only four times for 21 yards but ended the game as the Panther's top rusher. Lamberti hit nine of 16 passes for 72 yards but had to keep his throws short because of constant Lee defensive pressure.

"We were as prepared as we've ever been," Wilkins said. "They dominated the line of scrimmage against us. We kept thinking something was going to happen for us but they played near-perfect football."

Few good things happened to Permian. Lamberti, linebacker Britt Hager and receiver Kirk Strahan each were escorted from the field after being shaken up during the game. While Permian had three turnovers, the Rebels made no mistakes.

A bad thing for Permian and a good thing for Lee set up the only touchdown of the first half. The Panthers stopped Lee cold on its first possession of the game but punt returner Keith Metcalfe dropped the ball and Lee's Tracy Sherman fell on the loose ball at the PHS 32.

On third down and two, Thurman dropped a pitchout from Motley. While the Panther defense converged towards the spot of the bobble, Thurman caught the ball on the bounce and scooted around his left end for the touchdown. The score came only 3:43 into the game but Lee already had all the points it would need to win.

Permian, unbeaten in eight state quarterfinals games, closes its season at 12-2.

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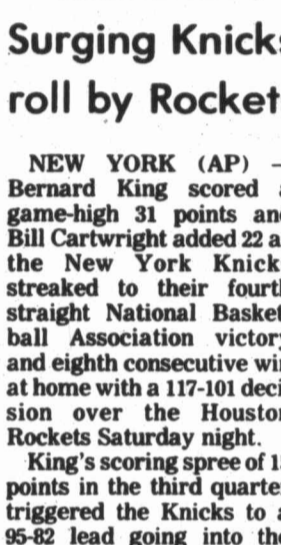

Tigers, Gators win pre-bowl games

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Bo Jackson made the last strike in the third quarter before heavy rain arrived and that was all third-ranked Auburn needed to wrap up an outright championship in the Southeastern Conference football race Saturday.

Jackson rushed for 256 yards, including scoring sprints of 69 and 71 yards, as the Tigers trimmed No. 19 Alabama 23-20.

It was an offensive shootout for three quarters, but the fourth quarter belonged to the inclement weather, with Auburn netting 62 yards and Alabama 18 in the final 15 minutes.

"I think that Bo (Jackson) tonight put his name in the record book at Auburn and established himself as a genuine candidate for the Heisman Trophy for the next two years," Auburn Coach Pat Dye said.

"I don't consider myself a candidate," Jackson said. "I think you should be talking to the offensive line, because if I do become a candidate, it will be because of them."

"There was an awful lot at stake," Dye said. "I think the conditions of the weather made me look stupid out there at times. The wind was swirling and it was hard to make a decision on the field goals."

"For whatever consolation it is, I was proud of the way our players fought and battled even though we came up short and lost," Alabama Coach Ray Perkins said. "They played their hearts out."

"Both Pat (Dye) and I were aware the weather could change," Perkins said. "I felt it was important to get something on the board before it hit."

Alabama did that. Ricky Moore raced 57 yards to give the Crimson Tide a 20-16 lead with 2:20 left in the third quarter, but it was only 17 seconds later that Jackson got the final score of the day, his 71-yard burst down the left sideline.

"I wouldn't say I had a good day," Jackson said. "I would say Auburn football had a great day."

No. 12 Florida 56, Florida St. 14

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Florida quarterback Wayne Peace set a Southeastern Conference career record of 610 pass completions and ran for two first-half touchdowns Saturday in leading the 12th-ranked Gators to a 53-14 rout of Florida State.

Peace sneaked 1 yard for the game's first score at 6:56 of the opening period and darted 5 yards on what appeared to be a busted play with 5:35 left in the second quarter for a 20-6 lead.

The 6-foot-2, 213-pound senior, who completed 14 of 20 passes for 190 yards, bettered the SEC mark of 603 career completions by another Florida quarterback, John Reaves, who played from 1969-71.

Peace also moved into second place in SEC career total offense with 6,946 yards, passing Pat Sullivan, Auburn's 1971 Heisman Trophy winner, and John Bond of Mississippi State.

Meanwhile, Bobby Raymond tied an NCAA single-game record by kicking six field goals in as many attempts. He also set a Florida mark of 20 in a season as the Gators turned two fumble recoveries in the first period and a pair of interceptions in the second quarter into 20 points of a 23-6 halftime advantage.

Florida, headed for a Gator Bowl date with Iowa, finished the regular season 8-2-1, the best mark in Coach Charley Pell's five seasons. Florida State, which plays North Carolina in the Peach Bowl, wound up 6-5.

NFC East leaders in dead heat

The Washington Redskins and the Dallas Cowboys will try to keep pace with one another Sunday, one week before their National Football League showdown in Dallas.

The two clubs, both assured of playoff spots, are tied for first place with 11-2 records in the National Conference Eastern Division.

Washington will be at home against Atlanta, 6-7, while Dallas is at Seattle, 7-6.

Two teams can clinch playoff spots Sunday. Miami, 9-4, can win the American Conference East with a victory at Houston, 1-12, while Pittsburgh, 9-4 and first in the AFC Central can clinch at least a wild-card berth by winning at home against Cincinnati, 5-8.

Regular quarterback Steve Bartkowski did not play last week in Atlanta's 47-41 overtime victory over Green Bay and is questionable again Sunday. Backup Mike Moroski completed 22 of 35 passes for 303 yards and two touchdowns against the Packers.

The Atlanta defense, which couldn't stop Green Bay, will be faced with the passing of Joe Theismann, who has completed 232 of 386 passes for 3,117 yards and 22 touchdowns, and the running of John Riggins, 1,049 yards, and Joe Washington 682 yards.

Seattle scored 51 points in beating

Kansas City in overtime last Sunday — a total the Seahawks should not approach against the tough Dallas defense. But the Seattle defense gave up 48 points to the Chiefs, a total which almost certainly would get the Seahawks mauled by the Cowboys, who have won two previous meetings between the two clubs.

Miami needs to win just one of its three remaining games to clinch the AFC East and if they fail against Houston on the road Sunday, they

whipped by 45-3 by the Detroit Lion on Thanksgiving Day, while Cincinnati got picked apart by rookie quarterback Dan Marino in losing 38-14 to Miami last Monday night.

Against Tampa Bay, San Francisco will be trying to halt a slide that has seen the 49ers drop four of their last five games.

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Cowboys need good showing today

SEATTLE (AP) — Tom Landry refuses to speculate whether this season's edition of the Dallas Cowboys is good enough to win the Super Bowl.

"We played our best game on Thanksgiving Day," said Landry, whose Cowboys already are assured of the franchise's 17th playoff trip this year.

"I think our next three games are going to determine how good we are, because they're all against winning football teams."

The 11-2 Cowboys rate as six-point favorites against the 7-6 Seahawks, a team still alive in a battle to get to the playoffs for the first time in Seattle's eight years in the NFL.

Dallas, which won its first seven regular-season games this year, has been devastating in its last two games, both at home.

On Nov. 20, Dallas buried Kansas City 41-21 at home.

On Thanksgiving Day in Dallas

against St. Louis, the Cowboys were 35-17 winners.

After Seattle, the Cowboys play the defending Super Bowl champion Washington Redskins in Dallas Dec. 11 and wind up the regular season in San Francisco Dec. 19.

At 11-2, Dallas and Washington go into this weekend tied for first place in the National Football Conference East. Dallas shaded the Redskins 31-30 in the teams' regular-season opener in Washington Sept. 5.

In Sunday's game, the real Tony Dorsett will get a chance to study a new NFL Dorsett lookalike.

He is the Seahawks' rookie running back, Curt Warner, who is tearing up the American Football Conference and is coming off a club record 207-yard rushing performance.

Warner led Joe Paterno's Penn State Nittany Lions to the national collegiate football championship last season. Now, he's trying to lead

Chuck Knox's Seahawks into the NFL playoffs.

Because of his size and running style, Warner is compared constantly with Dorsett, 1976 Heisman Trophy winner from Pittsburgh who has achieved superstar status in his seven NFL seasons.

While Dorsett has rushed for 1,138 yards this year, Warner leads the AFC in rushing with 1,249 yards. Warner ranks second to the Los Angeles Rams' Eric Dickerson, a rookie with 1,531 yards, in the entire NFL.

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Oilers test Miami's talented Marino

HOUSTON (AP) — Perhaps Miami Dolphins rookie quarterback Dan Marino was in the National Football League in another life.

He certainly has teammate wide receiver Nate Moore thinking of him in such mystical terms.

Some scouts and National Football League coaches may have downgraded Marino because after a sparkling junior year, he had an off senior season at Pittsburgh.

But not Coach Don Shula, who drafted the strong-armed Marino in the first round of the 1983 draft after 26 other teams had passed him by.

Because Shula had faith and veteran David Woodley was inconsistent, Marino will go into Sunday's game in the Astrodome against Houston as the No. 2 rated quarterback in the American Football Conference.

"He's not supposed to be doing these things week in and week out," Moore said. "But let's face it. He's playing as well as any quarterback in the league. He's playing like he's been there before."

Shula was happy to have Marino to turn to when the Dolphins sputtered under Woodley.

"Marino has been exceptional since the day we picked him," Shula said. "He's done everything that we've asked him to do down here. Since Marino has taken over, our offense has really juiced up and we're becoming more and more productive."

Marino has started the last eight games for Miami and the Dolphins are 6-2 over that stretch.

Since assuming control of the Dolphin offense, Marino has vaulted to the top among American

Football Conference passers. He dropped off to second place with an efficiency rating of 97.1 following last week's 38-14 victory over Cincinnati.

Marino said he never lost confidence last season but declines to take full credit for his resurgence in the pros.

"It's a big advantage to be with a quality football team," Marino said. "I'm just playing with some good personnel."

"The learning process is the biggest adjustment right now. I'm learning everyday and week to week."

Marino has completed 156 of 270 passes for 2,015 yards and 19 touchdowns, two short of the club single-season record 21 held by Bob Griese.

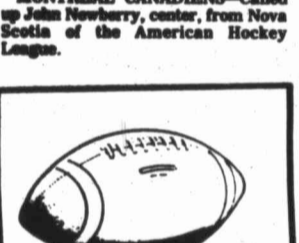

Cookie airlift begun for soldiers

DALLAS (AP) — About 25,000 chocolate chip cookies Saturday began the first leg of a mission to bring a taste of home to Americans stationed in Beirut and Grenada over Christmas.

"America's Toll House Cookie Airlift" was organized by four women who recruited about 100 volunteers to bake the cookies at L.D. Bell High School in Hurst.

The Army National Guard was scheduled to pick up the cookies Saturday and take them to nearby Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport.

The cookies will be transported to Fort Bragg, N.C., where they will be loaded onto military aircraft for flights to Grenada and Beirut.

"I feel like when you have an opportunity and a privilege to do something for your country and those boys, you take the time," said JoRae Davis, one of four Bed-

ford women who planned the airlift. "It's one of the most gratifying projects I've ever been involved in."

Volunteers spent more than a month gathering thousands of pounds of ingredients, selecting packages and packing materials, planning the itinerary and securing the necessary government clearance, she said.

Mrs. Davis, Shirley Rhea, Jan Bowman and Nina Martello thought of the project over lunch in October. The four women's children attend Bell High School.

Cookie ingredients included 600 bags of chocolate chips, 675 pounds of flour, 225 pounds of sugar, 190 pounds of brown sugar, 100 dozen eggs and 600 teaspoons each of baking soda, salt and vanilla, the women said.

Nestle donated \$1,200 worth of chocolate chips.

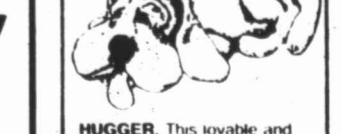

The BIG swim meet — one of them, anyway — for YMCA swimmers is being hosted next year by Big Spring. The strange thing is the event won't be held in Big Spring.

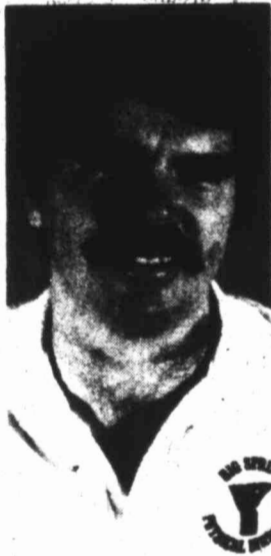
The Texas State YMCA Swim Championships are scheduled for the City of Midland pool, located 45 miles to our immediate on Interstate 20. That's not exactly two streets over, you know. But Bob Morton, physical director at the local Y, is glad to be part of the state meet.

Wherever it may be held. YMCA's around the state gather twice a year, once in the spring and again in the summer, for their championship swim meets. West Texas swimmers usually pile into a van or station wagon and drive hundreds of miles to Dallas or Houston to swim against the state's best.

Finally, the meet has come to our home turf, er, water. Abilene was also interested in getting the meet but like Big Spring, the Key City is also minus adequate facilities to host such a large congregation of swimmers.

And so the two cities have combined to host the meet. In Midland. You've seen all the tall buildings over there? And the pump-jacks and oil storage tanks surrounding the tall buildings? Midland, you see, has the cash to build a facility with eight 25-yard swim lanes, Colorado Timing System, non-turbulent lane lines and a teaching pool all under one roof.

Morton doesn't mind the inconvenience. He's looking forward to the day — four or five years from now — when the Big Spring Y can get a new pool. The main concern right now is stopping the roof from leaking. And maybe putting in some new light bulbs so swimmers can see from one to the other.

It would be great if the meet was in Big Spring. "We're expecting over 600 swimmers," Morton said, "and that's not including all the parents and other adults. There will be 200 there from the Houston Dad's Club alone." Big Spring merchants, I'm sure, would love to have visions of youngsters swimming in their heads.

The income instead is going to Midland, a city which really needs it.

Remember, Morton isn't complaining. He's had great cooperation from the Midland Chamber of Commerce in finding motel rooms for everyone, finding a computer system to keep track of results and providing transportation from the motels to the pool.

They're expecting \$10,000 to enter the community from the Houston swimmers alone.

Really, Big Spring would have no use of that type of cash at all. Right, Bob? He just smiles.

There is hope. Morton is pushing to have the YMCA summer meet right here in Big Spring. Since it's warmer in the summer, the meet can be held outdoors at the city pool in Comanche Trails Park. It's long enough and big enough. Too bad it can't be used in March.

A new pool at the Y would be great. Big Spring High swimmers are at a disadvantage when they compete elsewhere in Olympic size pools. And not too many visitors to the local Y have been heard to comment, "My what a nice facility."

"Very realistically," Morton says, "we could get a new pool in four to five years. Of course I'd like to see one much sooner. But I don't think so."

For right now, then, a state meet in the West Texas region will have to be held somewhere else besides Big Spring. It's not just a matter of pride but of things like economy. At least Big Spring Y personnel will get a taste of running a big meet and be prepared for the day they can host one in our neighborhood.

Until then, we'll just have to jump in the car and drive to somewhere else to swim.

Surprise...Heisman goes to Rozier

NEW YORK (AP) — Mike Rozier of the University of Nebraska, only the second man in NCAA history to rush for more than 2,000 yards in a season, won the Heisman Trophy Saturday night.

Rozier, a senior, became the 33rd running back to win the Heisman, which has been awarded annually since 1935 by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York to "the outstanding college football player in the United States."

Rozier rushed for 2,148 yards last season in leading Nebraska to a No. 1 ranking, a berth in the Orange Bowl Jan. 2 against Miami, Fla., and a possible national championship.

The only other player to rush for more than 2,000 yards in a season was Southern Cal's Marcus Allen, who ran for 2,342 yards in 1981, the year he won the Heisman. Rozier ended his career with 4,780 yards rushing for a Big Eight Conference record, and he set an NCAA record with 29 rushing touchdowns this season.

In becoming the only Nebraska player to win the Heisman besides Johnny Rodgers in 1972, Rozier, who received 1,801 points, outpolled quarterbacks Steve Young of Brigham Young, who had 1,172, and Doug Flutie of Boston College, who finished with 253 points from the 1,050 voters in the six regions comprising the Heisman Memorial Trophy Committee.

Rodgers, a flanker, also was the last non-running back to win the award. The last quarterback to win the award was Pat Sullivan of Auburn in 1971.

Rozier will receive the award on Thursday at a formal dinner at the New York Hilton.

Rounding out the list of top 10 finishers were Rozier's teammate, quarterback Turner Gill, defensive back Terry Hoage of Georgia, running back Napoleon McCallum of Navy, quarterback Jeff Hostetler of West Virginia, offensive tackle Bill Fralic of Pittsburgh, quarterback Walter Lewis of Alabama and quarterback Norman "Boomer" Esiason of Maryland.

Rozier, a 5-foot-10 210-pounder from Camden, N.J., actually was recruited by Nebraska by accident.

Former freshman Coach Frank Solich, now the Cornhuskers' varsity backfield coach, went to a game in New

Jersey five years ago to recruit a tight end, whose name he doesn't even remember.

But, during the game, he saw Rozier and was impressed — impressed enough to inquire about the player.

"I asked the coach where the back's school was, went over there and started recruiting Mike," Solich says.

Rozier spent his first college year at Coffeyville, Kan., Junior College to improve his grades, then moved to

Nebraska. The rest is history.

During his sophomore season, Rozier teamed with Roger Craig in Nebraska's I-back formation to gain 949 yards. Last year, he rushed for 1,721 yards and was named Big Eight Offensive Player of the Year.

With 4.54 speed in the 40-yard dash, Rozier competed on Nebraska's indoor track team in 1982. It was that speed, along with his ability to bench press 325 pounds, that made Rozier the premier runner in college this year.

In the second game of the season, Rozier surpassed I.M. Hipp's school rushing record of 2,814 yards. The previous Big Eight rushing record was held by Oklahoma State's Terry Miller, who ran for 4,582 yards from 1974-77. And Rozier's 29 rushing touchdowns broke the single-season mark of Penn State's Lydell Mitchell, who ran for 26 touchdowns in 1971.

Rozier also set an NCAA record with an average of 7.156 yards on 668 carries. He tied NCAA marks for touchdowns scored in a season with 29 and for consecutive 100-yard games with 11.

Rozier had four straight 200-yard games last season, including a school single-game record of 285 yards on 31 carries against Kansas. He failed to gain 100 yards in only one game, the season opener when he rushed for 71 yards on 16 carries against Penn State.

Young, a direct descendant of his school's founder, Brigham Young, led the nation in passing this year with 306 completions in 429 attempts for a 71.3 percentage. The senior quarterback threw for 3,902 yards and 33 touchdowns as the ninth-ranked Cougars, 10-1, earned a berth in the Holiday Bowl on Dec. 23 against Missouri.

Flutie, a junior, completed 177 of 345 passes for a completion ratio of .513. He threw for 17 touchdowns and led Boston College, 9-2, into the Liberty Bowl on Dec. 29 against Notre Dame.

Last year's Heisman winner was junior running back Herschel Walker of Georgia. Walker signed with the New Jersey Generals of the United States Football League.

Hawks flatten Frank Phillips, 116-47

BORGER — Dwight Harris scored 24 first half points as Howard College built a 36-point halftime lead and went on to crush Frank Phillips 116-47 here Saturday night.

The win boosts the Hawks to 2-0 in Western Junior College Athletic Conference play and to 10-1 for the season. FPC slips to 6-6 overall and 1-2 in the WJCAAC.

"I was afraid we might have an emotional letdown after the Amarillo game," HC coach Mike Mitchell said. The Hawks upset AC 77-72 Thursday night but showed no signs of being flat against the Plainsmen.

"It was supposed to be a lot closer," Mitchell said. "They were dedicating a new gym and this was a big event. Through they years they've been hard to beat up here. I thought it could go either way."

The Hawks put Mitchell's worries to rest by blasting off to a 23-4 lead as Harris and Jerry Stroman, who finished with 24 points, led the scoring attack. Harris had only 10 points against Amarillo two nights before. He played on 3 minutes of the final half.

Mitchell played his second team

the final 11 minutes in the game. Nicholas Jones and Mike Fulkerson came off the bench to score six points each.

"Nicholas played very well during the 11 minutes he was in there," his coach complimented. "He did a good job running the team and breaking the press."

Howard boosted its lead to 40 points at 76-36 with 11:41 to play and over 50 points, 92-41, on Jones' slam dunk with nine minutes to play. Michael Porter's baseline jumper put Howard at 100 points, the second time this season the Hawks have topped the century mark.

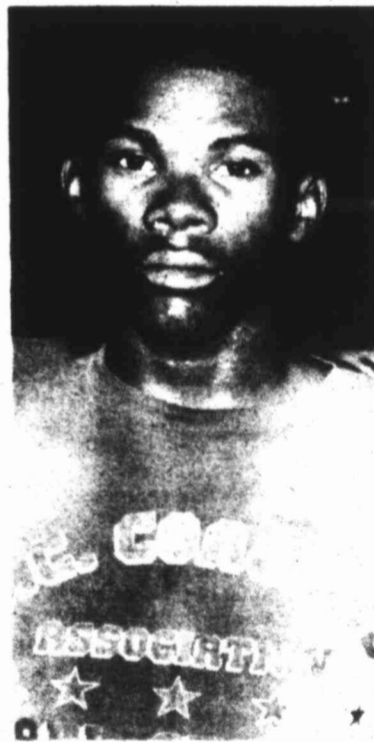
The Hawks play again next Thursday, taking on Western Texas College in Snyder.

Rugged Lee defense smothers Permian, 20-0

LUBBOCK — "No Mo Mojo," the sign painted on the Rebel car window read. When all was said and done Saturday afternoon in Jones Stadium, Odessa Permian was indeed no more in the state high school football playoffs.

A swarming Rebel defense forced three Permian turnovers and the offense cashed in all three for points as Midland Lee shocked the Panthers 20-0 in a Class 5-A quarterfinal game.

The win sends the Rebels into a semifinals contest next weekend against Plano. Plano tripped Houston Klein 21-0 in another semifinal game played Saturday. The defeat marked the first time ever Permian has fallen in quarterfinals play and the first time the Panthers had lost twice to the same team in a single season. Lee downed Mojo 20-7 in October when the teams met in a District 4-5A game in Odessa.

Saturday's result wasn't much different. If anything, it was worse.

The hard-hitting Rebels held Permian to 15 yards rushing and limited quarterback Rex Lamberti to 86 yards passing. Five times the Panther senior was buried by Lee linemen while trying to pass. His interception and fumble in the second half set up two Midland scores.

"I thought our defense was the difference in the game," Lee coach Spike Dykes understated. "That's as good a defense as we've played. I thought we did a good job putting pressure on him (Lamberti). I thought that was the key to the game."

While Lee's defense was consistently excellent throughout the game, the Rebels' offensive showing in the third quarter against a brisk northerly wind proved fatal to Permian.

Taking the wind after halftime, the Panthers kicked off hoping to stop Lee on defense and use Lamberti's arm to erase the Rebels' 7-0 lead. The strategy

backfired, however, as Midland kept the ball on the ground and used nearly eight minutes of the quarter on its first drive.

Fullback Isaac Garnett, held to just 22 yards on eight first half carries, was the workhorse in the drive, carrying 11 times for 60 yards.

Permian's defense, pinned inside its own 10, stiffened and forced a 22-yard field goal by Craig Kamradt. Although the Rebels didn't get a touchdown, they added another penetration and kept the ball away from the multi-dangerous Lamberti.

"That was a turning point in the game," Dykes said. "We were able to take eight minutes off the clock and that really juiced us up."

"They just took the ball and drove it on us," said Permian head coach John Wilkins. "They only got a field goal but they ran eight minutes off the clock."

When the Panthers finally lined up on offense, Lee's defense dealt its hardest blow of the day. Lamberti dropped back to pass on third down from his 47 but Rebels Pat Stevens and Billy Cornelius sandwiched him in the pocket. The football popped free and Cornelius recovered at Mojo's 36 yard line.

Walter Jones burst for 24 yards on Lee's first play and three plays later, Tyrone Thurman scored his second touchdown of the afternoon from three yards out. Kamradt added the PAT and with six seconds to go in the quarter, Lee had an insurmountable 17-0 lead.

Lee added its final points with 3:32 left when Kamradt connected on a 28-yard field goal. Moments

before, Eddie Kittle made a one-handed interception of a Lamberti swing pass at the Lee 15.

The Rebels rushed for 226 yards with Jones getting 88 and Garnett 87. Both of quarterback Jeff Motley's passes went incomplete.

Gary Homsey rushed only four times for 21 yards but ended the game as the Panther's top rusher. Lamberti hit nine of 16 passes for 72 yards but had to keep his throws short because of constant Lee defensive pressure.

"We were as prepared as we've ever been," Wilkins said. "They dominated the line of scrimmage against us. We kept thinking something was going to happen for us but they played near-perfect football."

Few good things happened to Permian. Lamberti, linebacker Britt Hager and receiver Kirk Strahan each were escorted from the field after being shaken up during the game. While Permian had three turnovers, the Rebels made no mistakes.

A bad thing for Permian and a good thing for Lee set up the only touchdown of the first half. The Panthers stopped Lee cold on its first possession of the game but punt returner Keith Metcalfe dropped the ball and Lee's Tracy Sherman fell on the loose ball at the PHS 32.

On third down and two, Thurman dropped a pitchout from Motley. While the Panther defense converged towards the spot of the bobble, Thurman caught the ball on the bounce and scooted around his left end for the touchdown. The score came only 3:49 into the game but Lee already had all the points it would need to win.

Permian, unbeaten in eight state quarterfinals games, closes its season at 12-2.

NEW YORK (AP) — Bernard King scored a game-high 31 points and Bill Cartwright added 22 as the New York Knicks streaked to their fourth straight National Basketball Association victory and eighth consecutive win at home with a 117-101 decision over the Houston Rockets Saturday night.

Tigers, Gators win pre-bowl games

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Bo Jackson made the last strike in the third quarter before heavy rain arrived and that was all third-ranked Auburn needed to wrap up an outright championship in the Southeastern Conference football race Saturday.

Jackson rushed for 256 yards, including scoring sprints of 69 and 71 yards, as the Tigers trimmed No. 19 Alabama 23-20.

It was an offensive shootout for three quarters, but the fourth quarter belonged to the inclement weather, with Auburn netting 62 yards and Alabama 18 in the final 15 minutes.

"I think that Bo (Jackson) tonight put his name in the record book at Auburn and established himself as a genuine candidate for the Heisman Trophy for the next two years," Auburn Coach Pat Dye said.

"I don't consider myself a candidate," Jackson said. "I think you should be talking to the offensive line, because if I do become a candidate, it will be because of them."

"There was an awful lot at stake," Dye said. "I think the conditions of the weather made me look stupid out there at times. The wind was swirling and it was hard to make a decision on the field goals."

"For whatever consolation it is, I was proud of the way our players fought and battled even though we came up short and lost," Alabama Coach Ray Perkins said. "They played their hearts out."

"Both Pat (Dye) and I were aware the weather could change," Perkins said. "I felt it was important to get something on the board before it hit."

Alabama did that. Ricky Moore raced 57 yards to give the Crimson Tide a 20-16 lead with 2:20 left in the third quarter, but it was only 17 seconds later that Jackson got the final score of the day, his 71-yard burst down the left sideline.

"I wouldn't say I had a good day," Jackson said. "I would say Auburn football had a great day."

No. 12 Florida 56, Florida St. 14

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Florida quarterback Wayne Peace set a Southeastern Conference career record of 610 pass completions and ran for two first-half touchdowns Saturday in leading the 12th-ranked Gators to a 53-14 rout of Florida State.

Peace sneaked 1 yard for the game's first score at 6:56 of the opening period and darted 5 yards on what appeared to be a busted play with 5:35 left in the second quarter for a 20-6 lead.

The 6-foot-2, 213-pound senior, who completed 14 of 20 passes for 190 yards, bettered the SEC mark of 603 career completions by another Florida quarterback, John Reeves, who played from 1969-71.

Peace also moved into second place in SEC career total offense with 6,946 yards, passing Pat Sullivan, Auburn's 1971 Heisman Trophy winner, and John Bond of Mississippi State.

Meanwhile, Bobby Raymond tied an NCAA single-game record by kicking six field goals in as many attempts. He also set a Florida mark of 20 in a season as the Gators turned two fumble recoveries in the first period and a pair of interceptions in the second quarter into 20 points of a 23-6 halftime advantage.

Florida, headed for a Gator Bowl date with Iowa, finished the regular season 8-2-1, the best mark in Coach Charley Pell's five seasons. Florida State, which plays North Carolina in the Peach Bowl, wound up 6-5.

NFC East leaders in dead heat

The Washington Redskins and the Dallas Cowboys will try to keep pace with one another Sunday, one week before their National Football League showdown in Dallas.

The two clubs, both assured of playoff spots, are tied for first place with 11-2 records in the National Conference Eastern Division.

Washington will be at home against Atlanta, 6-7, while Dallas is at Seattle, 7-6.

Two teams can clinch playoff spots Sunday. Miami, 9-4, can win the American Conference East with a victory at Houston, 1-12, while Pittsburgh, 9-4 and first in the AFC Central can clinch at least a wildcard berth by winning at home against Cincinnati, 5-8.

Regular quarterback Steve Bartkowski did not play last week in Atlanta's 47-41 overtime victory over Green Bay and is questionable again Sunday. Backup Mike Moroski completed 22 of 35 passes for 303 yards and two touchdowns against the Packers.

The Atlanta defense, which couldn't stop Green Bay, will be faced with the passing of Joe Theismann, who has completed 232 of 386 passes for 3,117 yards and 22 touchdowns, and the running of John Riggins, 1,049 yards, and Joe Washington 682 yards.

Seattle scored 51 points in beating

Kansas City in overtime last Sunday — a total the Seahawks should not approach against the tough Dallas defense. But the Seattle defense gave up 48 points to the Chiefs, a total which almost certainly would get the Seahawks mauled by the Cowboys, who have won two previous meetings between the two clubs.

Miami needs to win just one of its three remaining games to clinch the AFC East and if they fail against Houston on the road Sunday, they

can do it at home against Atlanta and the New York Jets. But both the Falcons and Jets are tougher than the Oilers, who last week lost 35-24 to Tampa Bay to become the NFL's losingest team. It was Tampa's Bay second win against 11 losses.

Terry Bradshaw is practicing again, but Cliff Stoudt, who has been the starter all season, will be at quarterback when Pittsburgh tries to snap a two-game losing streak in a battle of two teams that both were embarrassed in their last starts.

Pittsburgh looked inept in getting

whipped by 45-3 by the Detroit Lion on Thanksgiving Day, while Cincinnati got picked apart by rookie quarterback Dan Marino in losing 38-14 to Miami last Monday night.

Other Sunday games will be Cleveland, 8-5, at Denver, 7-6; the Los Angeles Rams, 8-5, at Philadelphia, 4-9; Tampa Bay, 2-11, at San Francisco, 7-6; New Orleans, 7-6, at New England, 6-7; Chicago, 6-7, at Green Bay, 6-7; Buffalo, 7-6, at Kansas City, 5-8; the New York Jets, 6-7, at Baltimore, 6-7; St. Louis, 5-7-1, at New York Giants, 3-9-1.

Monday night, Minnesota will play at Detroit, which are tied for first in the NFC Central with 7-6 records.

Cleveland has fought its way back into the AFC Central title hunt and hopes to tie Pittsburgh for first place or remain just one game behind the Steelers by beating Denver, something the Browns have not been able to do in five straight meets. In their last game, in 1981, the Broncos won 23-20 in overtime.

Los Angeles will try to hold its one-game lead over New Orleans and San Francisco by beating Philadelphia.

Against Tampa Bay, San Francisco will be trying to halt a slide that has seen the 49ers drop four of their last five games.

Cowboys need good showing today

SEATTLE (AP) — Tom Landry refuses to speculate whether this season's edition of the Dallas Cowboys is good enough to win the Super Bowl.

"We played our best game on Thanksgiving Day," said Landry, whose Cowboys already are assured of the franchise's 17th playoff trip this year.

"I think our next three games are going to determine how good we are, because they're all against winning football teams."

The 11-2 Cowboys rate as six-point favorites against the 7-6 Seahawks, a team still alive in a battle to get to the playoffs for the first time in Seattle's eight years in the NFL.

Dallas, which won its first seven regular-season games this year, has been devastating in its last two games, both at home.

On Nov. 20, Dallas buried Kansas City 41-21 at home.

On Thanksgiving Day in Dallas

against St. Louis, the Cowboys were 35-17 winners.

After Seattle, the Cowboys play the defending Super Bowl champion Washington Redskins in Dallas Dec. 11 and wind up the regular season in San Francisco Dec. 19.

At 11-2, Dallas and Washington go into this weekend tied for first place in the National Football Conference East. Dallas shaded the Redskins 31-30 in the teams' regular-season opener in Washington Sept. 5.

In Sunday's game, the real Tony Dorsett will get a chance to study a new NFL Dorsett lookalike.

He is the Seahawks' rookie running back, Curt Warner, who is tearing up the American Football Conference and is coming off a club record 207-yard rushing performance.

Warner led Joe Paterno's Penn State Nittany Lions to the national collegiate football championship last season. Now, he's trying to lead

Chuck Knox's Seahawks into the NFL playoffs.

Because of his size and running style, Warner is compared constantly with Dorsett, 1976 Heisman Trophy winner from Pittsburgh who has achieved superstar status in his seven NFL seasons.

While Dorsett has rushed for 1,138 yards this year, Warner leads the AFC in rushing with 1,249 yards. Warner ranks second to the Los Angeles Rams' Eric Dickerson, a rookie with 1,531 yards, in the entire NFL.

When Warner ran for his team record 207 yards here last Sunday, he also scored three touchdowns in a 51-48 overtime victory over Kansas City.

Knox even has more on his mind than the Cowboys these days. He's scratching his head about the plight of his new quarterback, Dave Krieg.

Oilers test Miami's talented Marino

HOUSTON (AP) — Perhaps Miami Dolphins rookie quarterback Dan Marino was in the National Football League in another life.

He certainly has teammate wide receiver Nate Moore thinking of him in such mystical terms.

Some scouts and National Football League coaches may have downgraded Marino because after a sparkling junior year, he had an off senior season at Pittsburgh.

But not Coach Don Shula, who drafted the strong-armed Marino in the first round of the 1983 draft after 26 other teams had passed him by.

Because Shula had faith and veteran David Woodley was inconsistent, Marino will go into Sunday's game in the AstroDome against Houston as the No. 2 rated quarterback in the American Football Conference.

"He's not supposed to be doing these things week in and week out," Moore said. "But let's face it. He's playing as well as any quarterback in the league. He's playing like he's been there before."

Shula was happy to have Marino to turn to when the Dolphins sputtered under Woodley.

"Marino has been exceptional since the day we picked him," Shula said. "He's done everything that we've asked him to do down here. Since Marino has taken over, our offense has really juiced up and we're becoming more and more productive."

Marino has started the last eight games for Miami and the Dolphins are 6-2 over that stretch.

Since assuming control of the Dolphin offense, Marino has vaulted to the top among American

Football Conference passers. He dropped off to second place with an efficiency rating of 97.1 following last week's 38-14 victory over Cincinnati.

Marino said he never lost confidence last season but declines to take full credit for his resurgence in the pros.

"It's a big advantage to be with a quality football team," Marino said. "I'm just playing with some good personnel."

"The learning process is the biggest adjustment right now. I'm learning everyday and week to week."

Marino has completed 156 of 270 passes for 2,015 yards and 19 touchdowns, two short of the club single-season record 21 held by Bob Griese.

Nevada-Reno 20, North Texas 17 (OT)

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Tony Zendejas booted a 32-yard field goal in overtime Saturday to lift Nevada-Reno to a 20-17 victory over North Texas State in the quarterfinal game of the NCAA football Division I-AA playoffs.

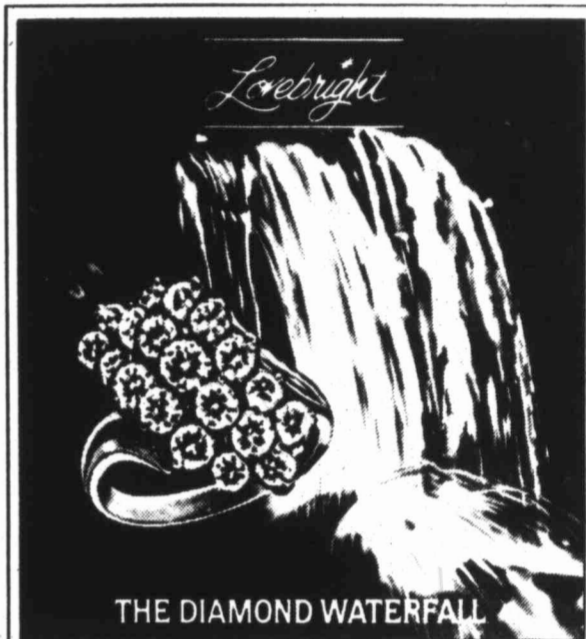
Nevada-Reno will play Southern Illinois next Saturday in the semifinal round.

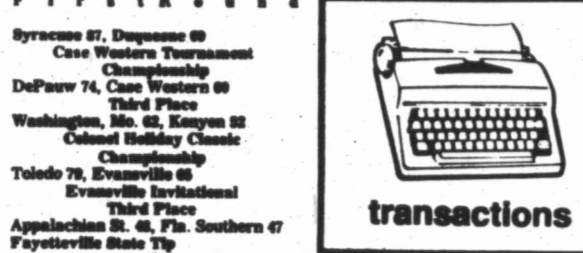

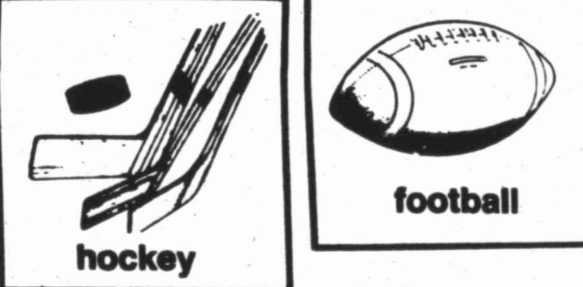

DALLAS (AP) — About 25,000 chocolate chip cookies Saturday began the first leg of a mission to bring a taste of home to Americans stationed in Beirut and Grenada over Christmas.

"America's Toll House Cookie Airlift" was organized by four women who recruited about 100 volunteers to bake the cookies at L.D. Bell High School in Hurst.

The Army National Guard was scheduled to pick up the cookies Saturday and take them to nearby Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport.

The cookies will be transported to Fort Bragg, N.C., where they will be loaded onto military aircraft for flights to Grenada and Beirut.

"I feel like when you have an opportunity and a privilege to do something for your country and those boys, you take the time," said Jolene Davis, one of four Bed-

ford women who planned the airlift. "It's one of the most gratifying projects I've ever been involved in."

Volunteers spent more than a month gathering thousands of pounds of ingredients, selecting packages and packing materials, planning the itinerary and securing the necessary government clearance, she said.

Mrs. Davis, Shirley Rhea, Jan Bowman and Nina Martello thought of the project over lunch in October. The four women's children attend Bell High School.

Cookie ingredients included 600 bags of chocolate chips, 675 pounds of flour, 225 pounds of sugar, 190 pounds of brown sugar, 100 dozen eggs and 600 teaspoons each of baking soda, salt and vanilla, the women said.

Nestle donated \$1,200 worth of chocolate chips.



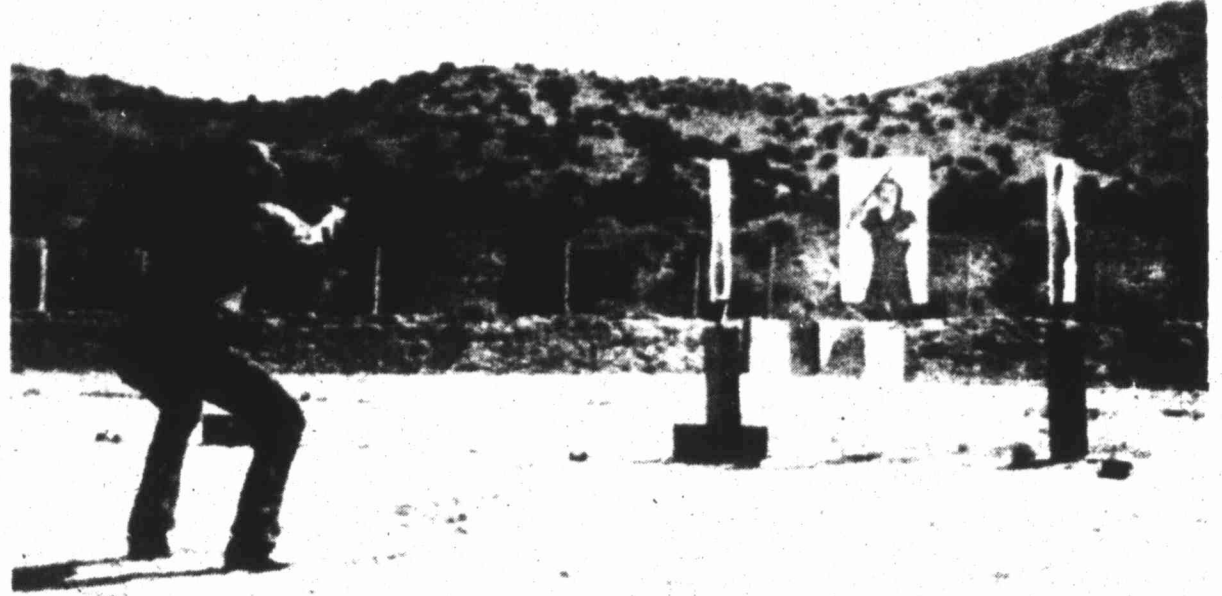

Elite cadre trains for mission

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The government calls them couriers. CBers use the handle "suicide jockeys." Their cargo is earmarked for distant targets, but they end up near hamlets such as Bunceton, Mo., and Rock, Kan.

The elite cadre of heavily armed, well-trained drivers who deliver America's nuclear weapons in \$800,000 "rolling vaults" are the key to the nation's most secure truck line.

The armored trucks cover some 8 million miles annually, toting missile warheads, nuclear weapons and components to some 125 sites in the 48 contiguous states.

Most shipments begin at Pantex, the Amarillo, Texas, plant that is the genesis for America's nuclear weapons. From there the shipments fan out in Safe Secure Trailers (SSTs) or Safe Secure Railcars (SSRs) to military installations and the nation's nuclear testing ground, 70 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

The rigs are driven by truckers who have a "Q" clearance, the highest security designation given by the FBI. The trucks are accompanied by escort vehicles containing armed couriers.

Their every move is monitored electronically by the Department of Energy's Safeguards and Security division at Kirtland Air Force Base, Albuquerque, N.M. All of America's nuclear weapons are produced, tested and transported

under the direction of the DOE. "We know where they are, what they're doing every moment," DOE spokesman David Jackson said of the special shipments. "And we're prepared to respond to any problem."

The DOE spent \$27.3 million last year hauling what Jackson refers to as "the most uptight cargo in the world."

Some 130 of the 230 employees in the DOE's Transportation Safeguards Division are drivers who haul the world's deadliest cargo for a salary averaging \$25,000 annually.

"If you don't like driving trucks our way — hauling atomic bombs around, shooting guns, strenuous training and keeping in shape — you need not apply," Jackson said.

From the outside, the SSTs resemble a normal 18-wheeler. That's where

the similarity ends.

"The tractor is armored and bullet-proof," said Jackson. "It has sophisticated communications equipment that allows us to keep track of a shipment at all times. And the trailer has a number of systems that deny entry. Unless you have the combination and do everything right, you don't get in. There are systems to disable the truck so it can't be moved."

The containers are designed for "worst-case" catastrophes and must pass a punishing series of tests such as fire, immersion and free fall.

"The trucks are so sturdy that in the event of a really severe accident, such as rolling down a cliff, the interior cargo would be well-protected," Jackson said. "The weapons are tied down in special containers and can't be armed. A nuclear detonation is virtually impossible."

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Globe-Democrat may have buyer

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A magazine publisher here who wants to buy the threatened St. Louis Globe-Democrat says he has sent financial data and a \$2.5 million "full-blown proposal" to attorneys representing the Herald Co., which owns the paper.

"Without any question, this is a good, viable business proposition," said Edward R. Grotzger. "It is already a viable situation."

In an interview Friday, Grotzger said he had sent the \$2.5 million offer late Thursday to the Herald Co.'s attorneys in New York. Included in the offer was the newspaper's name as well as its circulation and advertising information.

Grotzger publishes a magazine for hotel guests in St. Louis, New York and Houston. He also operates a tourist tram service in downtown St. Louis.

William E. Willis, a Herald Co. attorney, said that he hadn't received Grotzger's proposal. Willis said the Herald Co. had only a "non-committal letter from a bank" on Grotzger's behalf. He declined to comment on the offer until he received it.

Potential bidders for the Globe-Democrat have only until the close of business Monday to send financial data and publication plans to Herald Co. attorneys or the U.S. Department of Justice, which is overseeing the closing of the newspaper.

If no satisfactory plan surfaces, the Justice Department will approve the Globe-Democrat's plan to cease publication on Dec. 31, said department spokesman Mark Sheehan.

The department is monitoring the closing because of the joint operating agreement the newspaper has with the Pulitzer Publishing Co.'s St. Louis Post-Dispatch under the Newspaper Preservation Act. The act exempts the newspapers from certain provisions of antitrust laws.

Grotzger said he had complied with the Justice Department's deadline and with its data and planning requirements.

"The negotiations have begun so far as I'm concerned," said Grotzger. "This proposal contains the basis on which the negotiations will go forward."

G. Duncan Bauman, publisher of the Globe, announced Nov. 7 that the paper would close unless it could be sold. Bauman cited "substantial losses for many years" in the closing announcement.

Grotzger said he wanted the Globe-Democrat to be "a free-standing newspaper" that would be published in the morning. He said he was not interested in purchasing any part of the agreement between Pulitzer and the Herald Co., which provides that profits and losses be shared by the two newspapers.

The publisher of the rival Post-Dispatch has announced that it will cease to be an afternoon paper and begin publishing only a morning edition effective Jan. 1.

The Herald Co., is owned by the family of S.I. Newhouse Jr., of Syracuse, N.Y. The Newhouse family owns newspapers and broadcast outlets throughout the nation.
