BI-DISTRICT vs SEMINOLE

"New Season" Starts Friday At Levelland

It's a "whole new ballgame" for the Friona High School Chieftains, who

are riding the crest of a 10-game winning streak and headed into the football playoffs for the second straight season.

The Chiefs play Seminole in a bi-district game at Lobo Stadium in Levelland Friday, November 14. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

The Seminole Indians are the number two seed from District 2-AAA. Their only loss has been a 13-9 defeat at the hands of district champ Denver City, who plays Perryton Friday at Hereford.

Seminole broke a playoffs "dry spell." The last time they made the post-season was in 1981, and before that it was 1962. They lost in bi-district both times.

"We've had a good week of workouts. We mainly worked on blocking and tackling, the fundamentals that got us where we are," said Coach James Morton. "Although some folks are worried about the weather, we've told the kids not to become distracted about the weather. It's something we can't control, and if possible, we need to use to our advantage," Morton added.

The sixth-year Chieftain coach said FHS tailback Matt Kendrick, who suffered a pinched nerve, should be fine for the game. He was held out of contact work and spent time in the whirlpool.

"I think the experience some of our players gained in last year's playoffs should help, but the pure enjoyment of being there again is the main thing," Morton added.

We're Early

The Friona Star published one day early this week due to our Friona Chieftains entering their playoff run in the bi-district game against Semonole tonight.

We will continue to publish the Star one day early as long as the Chieftains remain in the playoffs, which we anticipate to be another five weeks.

Advertising and news deadlines will be Tuesday for the duration of the playoff run.

The Indians are paced by a big, fast tailback Toby Shain, who gained the staggering total of 1784 yards, playing in roughly eight and one-half games.

Shain suffered a pulled hamstring in Seminole's opening game, a 17-13 win over Kermit, missed the last part of that game and all of the second game, but came back full-speed with 245 yards and four TDs. His best rushing game was 304 yards.

Shain was the regular-season leading rusher and scorer for the South Plains. He scored 31 TDs, good for 186 points.

After opening district play with the 13-9 loss to Denver City, the Indians rolled to wins over Lubbock Roosevelt, 56-0, Brownfield, 40-7, Slaton, 52-13, Lubbock Cooper, 42-12, Littlefield, 40-6, and Floydada, 42-0.

"It was especially gratifying to beat Littlefield, as you Friona folks know," said writer John Hasselmeier

of the Seminole *Sentinel*. "They beat us last year and it knocked us out of the playoffs," the newsmen went on to say.

With all the hoopla about Shain, the Indians' passing game (like Friona's), is sometimes overlooked. Actually, Seminole QB Cole Kildough completed 32 of 72 passes for 509 yards and four touchdowns. Leading receiver is Kaleb Clay, a 6-5 split end, who has caught 17 passes good for 439 yards and two touchdowns. He was on the basketball team that went to the regional finals for SHS.

Seminole lost to Kermit, 19-7, in their last playoff appearance in 1981. They had lost to Dumas, 30-6 in 1962, and also 14-0 in 1961. Someone thought the Indians had won a playoff game in 1943, so the community is bound to be hungry for the experience that Friona enjoyed in 1996.

And for the Chieftains, their post-season appearance represents "unfinished business" from last season.

I think my people took that verse much too seriously, and I presume they neglected to read Proverbs 17:22 which says "A merry heart does good like a medicine; but a broken spirit drieth like the bones."

Thank Heavens, ministers are even lightening up their sermons with bits of humor these days. When I was a youngster, about a hundred years ago, you would never ever hear a joke told from the pulpit. Religion was a serious business.

The "pursuit of happiness" is even written into our constitution. And, boy, do we work hard at pursuing it! But while we are pursuing it, we put off fully enjoying the process of being alive, right now. We say: If I could just get some new drapes for the house then I'd be happy. Or, if I can get a promotion at work, then I'll be happy. Or, if I could get an invitation to that party, then I'd be happy. Or, if I could just lose 10 pounds, then I'd be happy.

We get so ingrained in the habit of dreaming for a better tomorrow, that when tomorrow comes, and we get those new drapes, or that promotion, or we attend the party or lose the weight, we don't even know how to enjoy them. We spend our entire lives preparing for the future, rather than enjoying the present. I think some people just like being miserable.

Another thing that keeps us from enjoying life, is worrying about what other people think. Guess what! While you're so concerned about other folks watching what you're doing, they don't care. They're just worried about you watching them. We are all equally ridiculous.

The way we live our lives our attitudes and actions determine whether we will ever find that pot of gold called "happiness." We can get through all sorts of adversity in life if we'll just lighten up and hang onto that sense of humor. Can't you remember something bad that happened to you in the past, but now, as you look back on it, it seems pretty funny? A good mixture of love and laughter forms the glue that keeps us all from falling apart.

Laughter doesn't always have to be a rib hurting, tears streaming, can't catch your breath, ha, ha, ha. It can sometimes be a quiet inner warmth that spreads joy throughout your entire being. But plastering on a big toothy grin couldn't hurt. Your face won't crack, I promise. Go on try it!

VFW Chicken Dinner Set For November 23

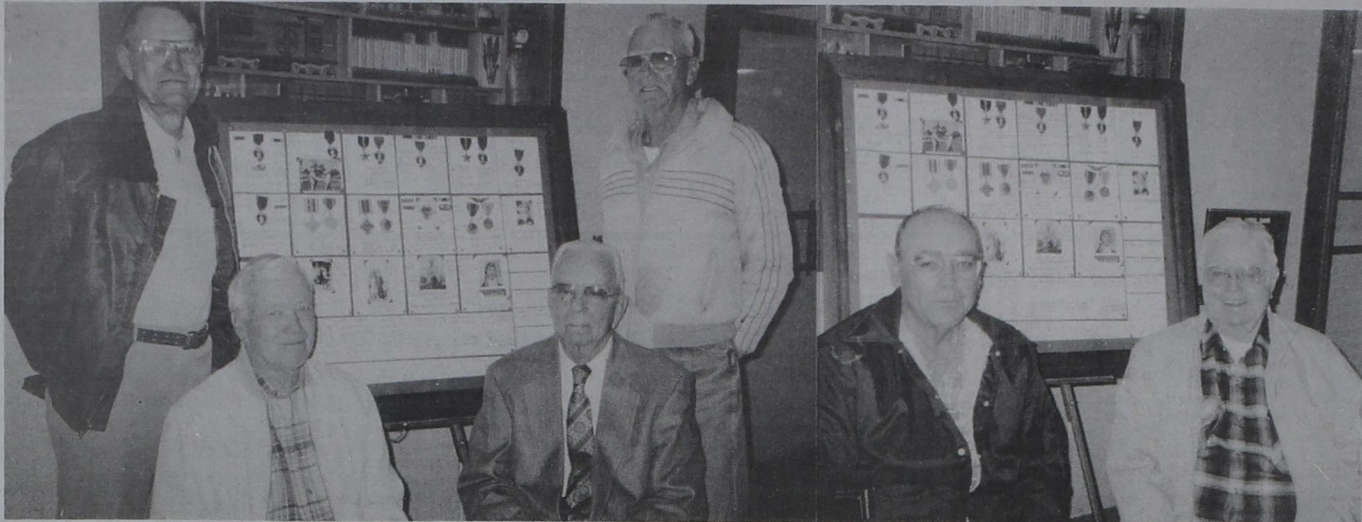
You are invited to be at the American Legion Hall, 6th and Euclid, on Sunday, November 23, for another "good old" famous and popular chicken dinner.

"If you are new in our community and have never attended one of these luncheons, you are in for a special treat," a spokesperson said.

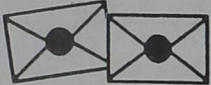

If not, he would be destroyed humanely, and at least, he would be fed. Or did you know that a veterinarian would put him to sleep, and for a small fee, would dispose of the carcass? It's quick and painless. Don't you owe your pet that much for the joy he's given you?

I suppose you thought he would be happy living in the pasture where you dumped him, running and playing and catching rabbits to live on. I suppose you told yourself that as you put him out and drove off, with him desperately chasing, trying hopelessly to catch you and go home.

I'm sorry I had to kill him. The first shot didn't kill him. It took a second, while he lay screaming and terrified. As I walked closer and took aim for the second shot, he looked at me with sad, pain-filled eyes.

It turned my stomach to do it. It will haunt me for a long time. I am so angry at you. Your dog died a slow, painful, bloody death.

I felt that the gun was the most humane way to dispose of your problem, since you didn't choose a more painless way. But did you know that many people put out poison for stray dogs? Starving, they eat the poisoned meat hungrily and die an agonizing death, with the pain gnawing inside them, and they can't understand.

35 Yrs Ago-Nov. 15, 1962

The Running Water Draw Watershed project cleared a legal hurdle in Parmer County on Tuesday, when the commissioners' court tentatively agreed to act as co-sponsor of the project. The Parmer County Soil Conservation District, original sponsor, asked the commissioners to co-sponsor the project.

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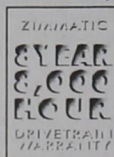

To help out, area citizens may call the church office, or contact a member, for more information.



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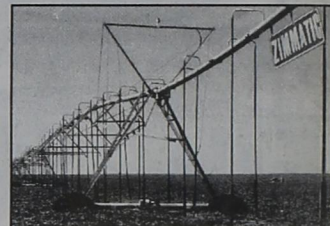

Local Man Is A Self-Taught Scottish Highland Bagpiper

On a daily basis, Harald Taylor will sell you an appliance for your home, will repair your broken dishwasher, or will take your dirty clothes and have them cleaned for you. But if you have a special occasion, Harald will don his full dress kilt and tartan and will play the bagpipes for you.

Harald belongs to the West Texas Highland Pipe Band of Lubbock. This group and the individual members of the group, play for weddings, funerals, memorials, competitions, church services, parades and just about any kind of ceremony you can name.

About 25 years ago, Harald heard a tape of a bagpiper playing that famous old hymn "Amazing Grace" and it was at that moment that he decided to learn to play the bagpipes. The pipes are known the world over to be an extremely difficult

instrument to master. He ordered his first set of pipes from the music store in Clovis. This was a second-hand set, rather old and unwieldy, which made it even more difficult as a learning instrument.

Harald is self-taught, which is almost unheard of among the piper circles. Playing the pipes requires a lot of breath. His doctor tells him that his heart is in excellent condition, probably from his regular workout on the bagpipes. His current set of pipes, worth several thousand dollars, was specially made for him and is decorated with ivory and silver.

He has been to several competitions and nearly always comes home with a plaque or two. He won three first place awards in Dallas a few years ago and a third place in Oklahoma City.

More recently he has taken a first place in El Paso's Bel Air Festival and Games in the individual competition last month, October 1997. And just last weekend he attended the "big one," the Salado Scottish Gathering and Highland Games, winning a second and third place. Participants are

judged, not just on their playing ability, but also on their attire, their instrument, their technique, deportment, marching, etc.

Harald notes that he is proudest of the Salado, Texas awards, since this is a competition that carries a lot of prestige.

"Getting a second and third there is like getting a first place anywhere else," Harald said. This is a well known competition that has been held in the little town of Salado for the past forty years. Salado is a town of about twelve hundred people, (smaller than Bovina), located in Bell County just southwest of Temple. About twenty thousand people pour into the little town of Salado every year for this annual gathering.

Harald belongs to the Cameron Clan of Scottish Highlanders which entitles him to wear the official uniform and tartan of the pipes and drum unit of the Queen's Own Cameron of Erracht. His full dress uniform is authentic right down to the black knife which is worn in the top of the hose.

In the early days of clans in Scotland, the knife was typically hidden in a pocket under the arm, but when a man entered your home to

visit, he was supposed to show friendship by displaying his weapon in plain sight. And so he would remove it from the hiding place and tuck it into the top of his stocking so that it could be seen by all. Typically today it is worn in the top of the stocking at all times.

The clan system began in Scotland among the Celtic people even before the Roman occupation of 55 BC. The word "clan" can be translated to mean "kin." The kinsmen and others living in a certain district grouped themselves under the protection of a chief or leader. The name of the chief's family became the name of the clan.

Other families belonging to the clan, but not sharing the same name, were called sept. The chief's set of tartans or plaids would be adopted by others in the clan as a means of identification. The tartans have played an important role in Scottish history.

Various Clan gatherings are still held yearly all over this country and, of course, in the British Isles. These get-togethers involve all sorts of competitions such as Scottish dances, pipe and drum corps playing and marching, and several different athletic endeavors.

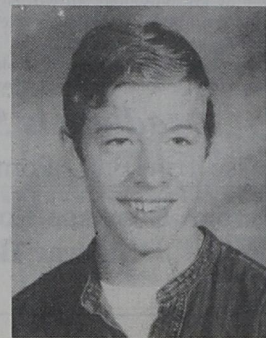

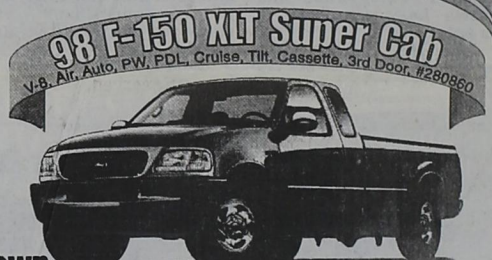

Total payment received for Parmer County was \$34,016.73, broken down as follows: Bovina received \$2,891.11, Farwell received \$4,124.87, and Friona received \$27,000.75.

For the same period last year, the total county receipt was \$24,845.09, which is a 36.91% increase in 1997.

Payments to date in 1997 of \$282,037.09 compared to \$272,870.57 in 1996 are a 3.35% increase.

In year-to-date 1997 revenue, Bovina received \$25,211.13, Farwell, \$41,162.06 and Friona, \$215,663.90. Farwell's total to date is down 3.47%, while Bovina and Friona's totals and are up 7.22% and 4.32% respectively.

He was born February 2, 1931 in Franklin County, Texas. He married Anne Glessel December 23, 1954 in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

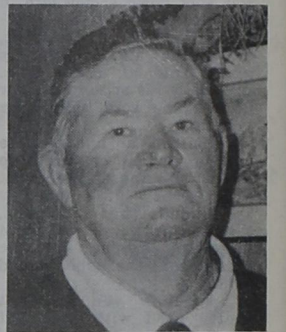
He was a member of the Methodist Church and was a former member of the Bovina City Council.

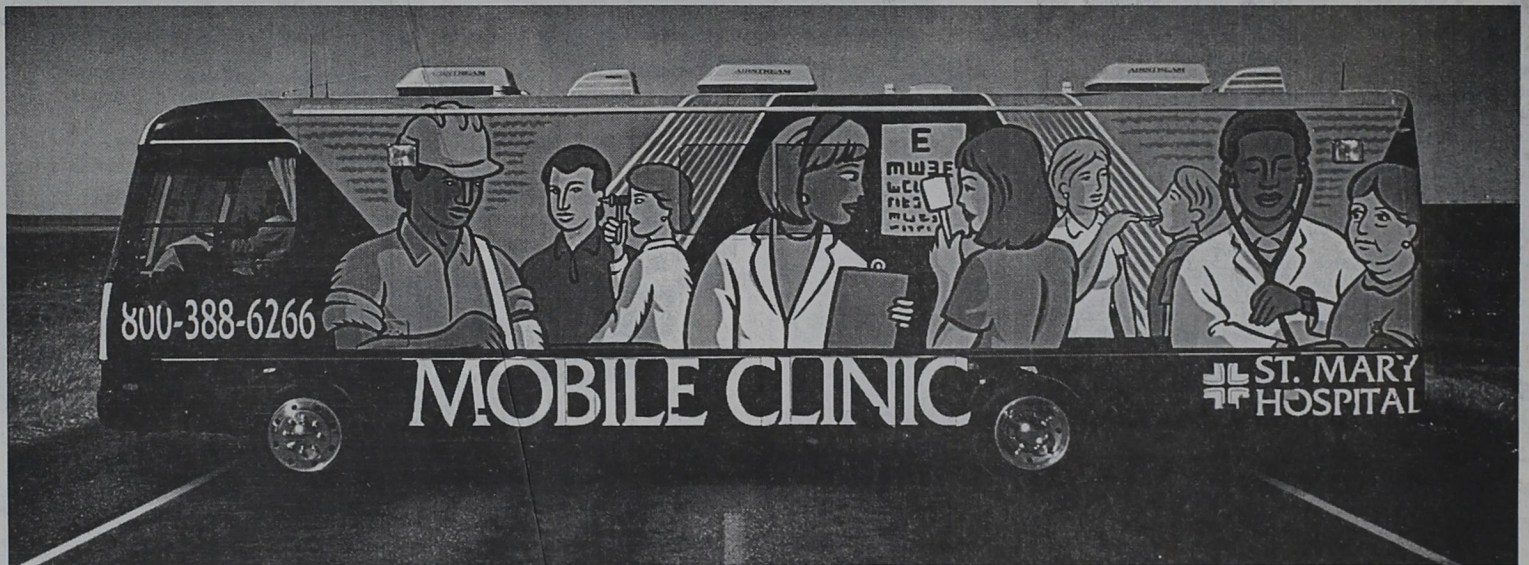

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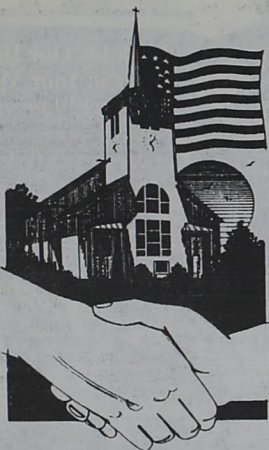
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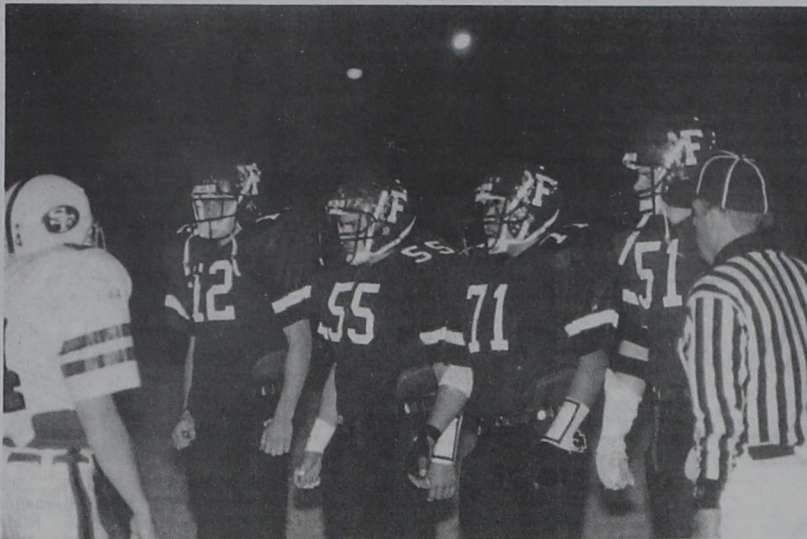

FRIONA WINS, 42-7 Chieftains De-feather S-F, Post 10-0 Mark

Football was first played in Friona in about 1924. So, finally--about 73 years later, the Chieftains decided to have a perfect 10-0 season.

When Friona outscored Sanford-Fritch, 42-7 at Chieftain Field last Friday, it marked the first-ever 10-0 season record in football at FHS. Chieftain fans packed the stands and stayed until the last second ticked off, in order to enjoy the moment.

Friona's scoring started early, and ended late. Sanford-Fritch won the toss and received the kickoff. Yet, just 1:28 of clock time later, Friona was enjoying a 7-0 lead!

Three quick plays failed to gain for the Eagles, and then their punter kicked the ball straight up; in fact, it went out of bounds for a -2 yard kick.

On the first play, Friona QB Aaron King rolled out to the right and threw a jump pass right to Quint Ellis, who caught the ball at the goal-line. Angel Vega's kick gave Friona the quick lead at 7-0.

It marked the seventh time in 10 games that Friona scored on its first possession of the game.

Penalties hampered the team in their next two possessions, but the Chieftain defense wasn't allowing the Eagles much in the way of yardage. In fact, when S-F finally gained a first down late in the opening quarter, they had only two net yards of total offense to show for their efforts.

Early in the second quarter, the visitors drove to Friona's 28, but lost the ball on downs after some good

defensive plays by Jeff Hamilton and Ellis. Kendrick took the handoff, burst through the line and was in the clear by midfield. No one caught up to the speedy tailback, who crossed the goal after a 72-yard scoring run.

Vega's kick gave Friona a 14-0 lead with 1:28 gone in the second quarter. The scoreboard clock registered the exact same time for Friona's first TD and this one.

A few minutes later the Chieftains again had the ball. King passed to Vega for a 17-yard gain, and then King broke loose for a 40-yard gain, keeping the ball on the option play. He moved the ball from the Friona 44 to the Sanford-Fritch 16.

Kendrick made a nice 13-yard gain, thanks to his usual second-effort, and two plays later he crashed into the end zone for his second TD. Officials ruled Vega's kick was just off course, but Friona had hiked its lead to 20-0, with 4:24 left in the half.

If you've followed the Chieftains, you know that this is plenty of time for another score.

Fritch drove to their 48, but had to punt for the fifth time. Vega had a chance to return this one, and ran it back 22 yards to the Friona 39.

King hit Vega for a 17-yard gain to the Eagle 24. After a penalty pushed the Chiefs back to the 29, King rifled a ball toward Kendrick, who was streaking toward the end zone. Matthew made a sparkling catch, diving for the ball, and his dive carried him just across the end zone for the TD. King ran across for two-points and a 28-0 Friona halftime lead.

Kendrick has been the receiver only seven times this fall, but three of his catches have been for touchdowns. He had another long pass-and-run play called back by a penalty at Muleshoe.

Friona put the ball in play to start the second half, and in just six plays the team drove 80 yards for their fifth score.

Kendrick ran 16 yards. King hit Vega for nine and Ellis for 29. A shoestring tackle in the wide-open spaces kept Quint from going 55 yards for a score. He settled for a gain of 29 yards.

Three plays later, King found Vega near the S-F goal-line, and "Acro" pulled in the pass and ran across the goal-line for his eighth touchdown of the season. He also added the point on a kick, and Friona's lead had become 35-0. Only 2:44 had been used in the scoring drive.

In spite of good defensive plays by Kendrick, Jesus

Mata, Luis Ramirez, Hamilton and Perry Hanes, Sanford-Fritch moved to the Friona eight-yard line, then the four. At this point, the Eagles, who had made every yard of the drive by running, decided to pass.

It was the wrong choice, as the toss hit safety King right in the hands. His end-zone interception foiled the scoring drive.

However, a few minutes later, S-F quarterback Haven Reed hit Josh Uzzell over the middle, and Uzzell showed some speed by outrunning the Chieftain secondary, to foil Friona's hopes for a shut-out win. The kick made it a 35-7 game with 10:55 left to play.

With reserves taking over, the Chieftains put together a 43-yard scoring drive. Mata ran 17 yards. Reserve QB Justin Daniel rambled eight yards to the Sanford-Fritch 13.

An offside penalty against the Eagles kept the drive alive when it had stalled, and Sammy Perez raced into the end zone from two yards out. Vega came back out to kick the PAT, and the final score of 42-6 had been posted with 1:02 left to play.

Kendrick gained 164 yards; King added 65

King completed seven of 12 passes, including three for TDs. His 18 season touchdown passes is a new school record.

Kendrick gained 155 yards rushing, to finish the season with a total of 1,461 net yards. This is the most since Tony Perea gained 1,761 yards in 1968.



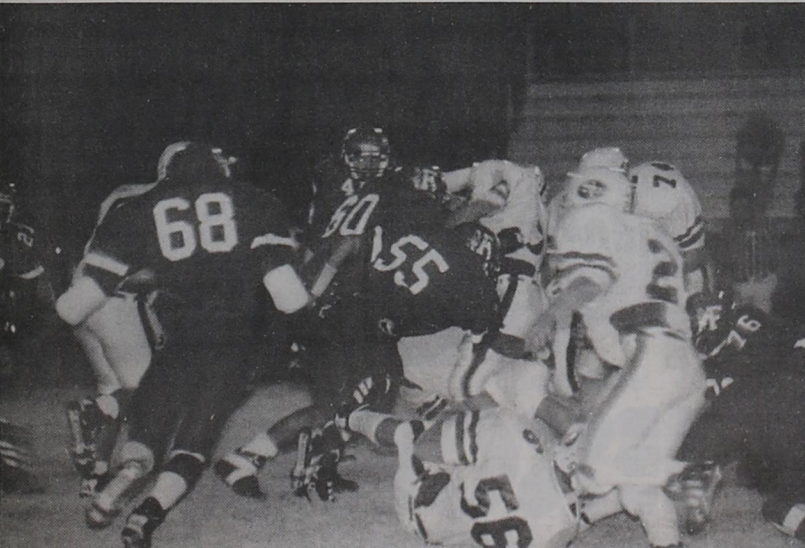

New Offensive Mark Set By '97 Chieftains

Fans who have watched both the 1997 Chieftains and the 1996 team may have noticed that the two teams had a lot in common.

A quick tally of the 1997 Chieftain team's offensive totals indicates that the current team, in its first ten games, gained just 58 yards (or 5.8 yards per game) more than the '96 team, which was the school's "total offense" leader for exactly 12 months.

The 1997 Chieftains gained 3103 yards rushing, which was 46 yards more than the 1996 team gained--3,057 yards.

The passing totals were almost a "draw." This year's team has gained 858 yards, which is just 12 yards more than the 1996 Chieftains gained through ten games.

By contrast, when the 1996 team rolled up their 3,903 yards in ten games, they had gained 633 yards more than any other Chieftain team up to that point.

The Chieftains of '97 gained 400 yards or more in exactly half of their games. They were close in two others, with 385 against Dalhart and 386 against Shallowater. The 1996 team had six consecutive games (their last six) where they gained over 400 yards.

Friona gained its most yardage--520--against district rival River Road, and had a couple of long runs called back by penalties in their game against the Wildcats.

The second-highest game was against Dimmitt, when Friona tallied 455 yards. Once again, a 50-yard touchdown pass from Aaron King to Angel Vega was nullified, which would have put the Chieftains over the 500-yard mark against their longtime rivals.

Now ranking third all-time in the yardage gained department is the 1968 Chieftain team, which posted

a mark of 3,270 total yards. The 1968 team was led by Tony Perea, who set the all-time rushing (season) record with 1,761 yards.

Quarterbacking the 1968 Chieftain team was Danny Kendrick, the father of the current rushing champion Matthew, and the 1996 champ, Andy, as well.

The 1997 team pushed another James Morton-coached team, the 1995 Chieftains, into fourth place in the total offense department. The '95 Chieftains gained a total of 3258 yards.

Now ranking fifth all-time is the 1987 Chieftain team, which netted 3172 total yards. That team was led by QB Daniel Echols, who led the team in both rushing (with 1202 yards) and passing (460 yards).

Echols also led his '87 team in kickoff and punt returns, as well as interceptions. He passed Perea as the career leader in "all purpose yards," with 2,177, while earning a scholarship to Southern Methodist University.

Three other Friona teams coached by James Morton are also on the all-time list. The 1994 team gained 2,955 yards, which ranks ninth.

The 1992 team gained 2,189 yards, and Morton's 1993 team gained 2,099 yards.

The '94 Chieftains, also a district-winner, were led by Juan Gamboa, the rushing leader, Chris Hanna and quarterback Jay Belcher, who passed for 586 yards.

The 3,113 rushing yards by the 1997 Chieftain team also becomes a new regular-season record, edging last year's total of 3,057 and the 1968 team's 3,018 yards.

Matt Kendrick's net rushing total of 1,475 yards is the most since Perea had his 1725-yard year in 1968. However, since Perea had almost 100 more carries Kendrick in his record year,

Kendrick's post-season stats will be considered in the all-time season record.

Quarterback Aaron King edged Kyle Grimsley's 1996 passing yardage by just 12 yards! Grimsley passed for 834 yards and eight touchdowns. King's 18 touchdowns are a new school record for ten games.

The passing yardage is not an all-time record, as Blair Burney set the passing mark at FHS in 1992, Morton's first year as head coach. Burney completed 107 of 273 passes for 1,474 yards, and the team had 1,565 yards, since Jay Belcher contributed 91 yards passing that year.

The 1992 team is the only Chieftain team in 36 years to wind up with more passing yards for the season than rushing. In fact, their 1565 yards were more than twice their total on the ground, which came to only 624.

1997 Chieftains Are Top Scorers In FHS History

The 1997 Chieftains are the highest-scoring team yet fielded at Friona, at least through ten games.

The Chiefs scored 385 points during the regular season, a nifty 38.5 points-

per-game average, and allowed 123, or 12.3 points.

Friona's 1996 team scored 339 points during the regular season, 33.9, and allowed 130 points, 13.0.

The third-highest scoring team for FHS was the 1951 Chieftains of Raymond Cook, who scored 273 points and allowed only 47. This record was made in only nine games, so the team averaged 30.3 points per game, and allowed just 5.2 points.

Fourth highest-scoring Friona team was the 1968 team, which rang up 264 points while allowing 162, under Bob Owen.

The fifth-highest scoring team was the 1986 district

champion team, which scored 253 points and gave up an even 100 during their regular season.

Of the top five scoring teams, two were not playoff teams: the 1951 and 1968 teams.

In individual scoring, Matthew Kendrick became the top point-scorer in a regular-season schedule with 126 points. Only three other Friona football players have topped the 100-point mark in a ten-game season. They are Doug Dodd, 113 points in 1964, Tony Perea, 110 points in 1968, and Angel Vega, 100 points this season.

Chieftains, Kendrick Lead Panhandle Area Statistics

The Friona Chieftains were the best offensive team in the Texas Panhandle for the 1997 season, and Matthew Kendrick led the area in rushing and scoring, according to the final statistical compilation this week by the Amaillo Globe-News.

The Chieftains averaged 396.9 yards per game to pace the team offense department, beating all of the other district teams by over 45 yards per game.

Kendrick led the rushers with his 1475 yards on 180 carries. Quarterback Aaron King ranked seventh in rushing with his 791-yard total.

His three-touchdown effort against Sanford-Fritch allowed Kendrick to also edge Adkison in the scoring department. Kendrick's 126 (a new school record for the regular season), edged Adkison's 122. Teammate Vega was third with 102 points. They were the only area players scoring over 100 points.

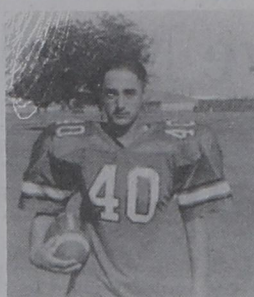
