

Bomb explodes in paper machine; one man killed

DALLAS (AP) - A bomb exploded inside a coinoperated newspaper machine early today, killing a man who had opened the box to get a paper, police

The identity of the victim, who died at the scene, was withheld pending notification of relatives, police said. He was wearing his bathrobe and was found lying on his side. One investigator said he was a 66-year-old man who lived nearby.

"It hit him in the torso," said police Sgt. Carl

Police detective Don Ortega said investigators did not know of any prior threats and no one has claimed responsibility for the bombing, which occurred at 5:14 a.m. in north Dallas. No witnesses were found, investigators said.

No other injuries were reported, Ortega said. The box was owned by The Dallas Morning News. Ralph Langer, executive editor of the News, said the time the box was loaded with newspapers had not been determined exactly but it was within half an

hour" before the explosion. He said the person who had loaded the box was "talk-

ing to investigators at this time." The box was located near a creek beside the Valley

View Trails apartment complex. Debris was scattered more than 60 feet behind the box, including some hanging from a tree. A piece of the explosive device, believed to be a pipe

bomb, was found 200 feet away, investigators said. "We don't know if he was putting money in the machine or whether (the device) was placed in such a way that when you pulled the door it triggered it," said

Newspapers inside the machine were smoldering three hours after the explosion. A Dallas Times Herald machine also was damaged.

A small pool of blood was in front of the box. Dorman said officers answering a call at a nearby shopping center heard the explosion and went to the

"Our investigators are looking for the tiniest piece of device that might help us trace it," Shaw said. "The Dallas police department bomb squad made a search of the immediate area to see if any other devices had been placed there, but none had been found."

Sgt. Ron McCracken of the police bomb squad said the device appeared to be a pipe bomb, filled with some type of high explosive such as dynamite. See Bomb page 2-A

Staff Writer A lawsuit against the Big Spring Independent School District filed by the League of United Latin American Citizens was "amicably resolved" Thursday with a compromise which will elect three trustees at-large and four trustees by districts in a three-year revolv-

ing plan.
BSISD attorney Guilford Jones III and the attorney representing LULAC, Rolando Rios, presented the plan before a small audience gathered in the BSISD board room Thursday afternoon. It was accepted by the board by unanimous vote. The plan still faces federal approval.

Jones said the plan will fill vacancies on the board as expirations of terms appear. "There will be no terms lengthened or shortened, and no modification of the number of trustees on the board," Jones said.

Under the compromise, the city will be divided into four districts. Geographically, District 1 is northwest, and will be composed of mainly minority voters. District 2 is southeast; District 3 is southwest; District 4 is northeast and circles north and west around District 1 outside the Big Spring city limits. (See accompanying map.)

By population, based on the 1980 Census, District 1 has 6,857 people with a minority representation of 66.52 percent. Of that number, 12.53

percent are Black and 53.99 percent are of Spanish origin.

District 2 has 6,492 people and a minority representation of 15.68 percent, with 1.52 percent being Black and 14.16 percent being of Spanish origin.

District 3 has a population of 6,809 with a minority representation of 14.74 percent. Of that number, 2.45 percent of the population are Black and 12.29 are Spanish origin.

District 4 has a population of 6,742 with a minority representation of 12.49 percent. Of that number, 2.37 percent are Black and 10.12 percent are of Spanish origin.

The plan must now go before Judge Halbert O. Woodward in Abilene's Federal District Court. "He may or may not want a hearing," Jones said. Should he approve the plan, it becomes an order of the court. The district must also gain a pre-clearance submission to the

Department of Justice, Jones said. If approved, the plan will go into effect in the April 7 election this year. In April, trustees will be elected from Districts 1 and 3. The two trustees elected will fill the expiring terms of two board members.

In 1985, two terms will again expire and trustees will be elected from Districts 2 and 4.

In 1986, three board members will be elected at-large. District representatives and at-large

Project residents voice complaints

About 50 residents of a Big Spring low-income housing project met with project authorities for some 2½ hours last night to "air difficulties" experienced by some of the project's tenants.

In a closed session that was characterized by both laughter and anger, residents of the Northcrest Village at 1001 S. Main met with Thomas E. Barnes, housing director of project owner Medlock West Texas Property Management of Lubbock and Northcrest managers Curtis and Imogene Kittrell.

Among subjects covered by discussion was the backlog of maintenance work at the project, rent increases to make more money available for repairs, and complaints about unannounced landlord inspections and opened mail, Barnes said following the meeting. He called last night's meeting

"nothing extraordinary" compared to other meetings he has attended of a similar nature.

He said the meeting "covered a lot of territory" since it was the first such tenant's meeting at Northcrest in four years.

There will be another meeting of Northcrest tenants within 30 days and monthly meetings thereafter, he said.

While rent increases should make more money available for repairs at the project, the increases should not affect tenant payments, Barnes said. The federal Department of Housing and URBAN Development will make up the differences in the increased rent payments, Barnes

Tenants will be notified prior to inspections of their apartments, Barnes said. Although he could not name specific time spreads for notification, Barnes said that, for example, tenants of Buildings 1 and 2 would receive notices that their apartments would be inspected during a specific week. The lease agreement at the apartments specifies inspections will be made only during reasonable hours.

Barnes said his managers will consider a notice for service as 'automatic permission to enter apartments

Barnes said nothing was resolved as to tenant's not receiving their mail and finding other mail already opened in mail boxes. He said he could offer nothing pending a postal service investigation.

Flu strikes Texas schools

AUSTIN (AP) — A sudden, "overwhelming" flu has struck Texas, with some schools reduced to 80 percent attendance because of the virus, says a state health

"What is unique is the very suddenness with which it has occurred," said Jeff Taylor, an epidemiologist with the Texas Department of Health.

"Last week, Jan. 15, there was nothing, and then within seven to 10 days, it seems that everybody's sick. It was very sudden, very overwhelming," Taylor said

I haven't seen (school) absentee levels like this in over two years," he said.

In schools districts in Tarrant and surrounding coun ties, some schools have experienced absentee rates as high as 22 percent to 25 percent.

Officials in the Bridgeport Independent School District, northwest of Fort Worth, even considered shutting down the schools.

Thomas Myers, superintendent at Bridgeport, said the district had an average absentee rate of 300 students per day this week out of the 1,400 enrolled. "It's on a downturn now," Myers said. "We contemplated (closing) but it has subsided somewhat. But it was rough.

Taylor said school districts in Austin, Texarkana, Round Rock and Marble Falls all have reported absentee rates of up to 20 percent as a result of the flu, compared with a normal rate of 5 percent to 8 percent.

Taylor said, however, he thinks the flu is much more

"You don't need to call that many schools to know. If you've got it in one part of the state, you've got it in others. You don't need to culture everybody in the state to know," he said. "It spreads so quickly."

"Schools are a great place to transfer viruses around primarily because of hygiene reasons," he said. "For instance, children don't put their hands over their mouth when they cough and they are in close proximity to each other.

He said he also had found flu outbreaks at Baylor, Texas A&M and Southwest Texas State at San Marcos, "and if I looked, I'd probably find it at SMU" and other

He said flu cases across the state are reported by county health departments and local physicians, and it will be three to five weeks before "we get figures for

Tarzan's boy

Former child star recalls his jungle days

CHULA VISTA, Calif. (AP) - Forty-five years ago, John Sheffield's parents spotted an advertisement in a Hollywood trade journal that asked, "Do you have a Tarzan Jr. in the house?'

They were convinced their son fit the bill, and they were right as young Sheffield passed a screen test at MGM studios, beating out 300 other youngsters for the part of "Boy," the cinematic son

Sheffield was just 8 when he first met the popular film star, Johnny Weissmuller, who was playing Tarzan at that time.

"He was a fine guy. He was like a father to me," Sheffield says of Weissmuller, who died in Mexico last week at the age of 79.

Sheffield, now 52, starred with Weissmuller in five Tarzan movies between 1939 and 1949, spending much of his formative years clad in a leather loin cloth in the backwaters of Florida, where much of

the jungle footage for each production was shot. Sheffield says the first thing he had to do was learn to swim, and he had the best teacher -Weissmuller himself, who was a record-setting Olympic swimming champion.

Sheffield recalls he got his first lesson at the Hollywood Athletic Club, prior to the filming of "Tarzan Finds a Son," which also starred actress Maureen O'Sullivan as Jane.

"Big John got into the deep end of the pool and told me to jump in," he says. "I jumped in like he told me. He grabbed me as I was thrashing around and when I put my foot on his knee to catch my breath, it was like I was standing on a rock. He was so strong. It was like standing on dry land.

"Today's swimmers are specialists. But he did it all - up-river, down-river, sprints and longdistance. He was like a motorboat in the water.'

Although Sheffield rarely saw Weissmuller after he left show business 30 years ago, he says his Hollywood father was always "kind and tender toward me.

"He was always looking out for me. We worked with a lot of live animals and a lot of times, when they got tired, the animals would get feisty," Sheffield recalled.

"There was this one big chimp who got pretty mad one day and was about to bite me while we were on the set. But Big John stuck his leg between me and the chimp and he was the one who was bitten,"he said. Weissmuller's rush to rescue his young co-star was a central theme in their movies. which included "Tarzan's Secret Treasure," "Tarzan's New York Adventure," "Tarzan Triumps," and "Tarzan and the Huntress."

Sheffield went on to make seven jungle-genre films; among them "Bomba the Jungle Boy" and

"The Lost Volcano," before ending his film career in the mid 1950s.

"I wasn't into the crowds and adulation. You got to love it to be in that business," says Sheffield, who is married and has three children.

Although he has been out of show business for years, Sheffield says he has paid keen attention to the recent Tarzan films, complimenting the modern versions "as nice clean entertainment.

But, while he compliments Weissmuller's successors, Sheffield reserves his highest praise for his

"The others were good, but Big John was the best. I believe that," Sheffield says.

To run (for the position of trustees) from a district, you must live in the district," Jones explained. "To vote for a candidate from a certain district, you must live in that district.

During the at-large elections, 'you may live anywhere'' within the BSISD to vote or seek election.

During Thursday's meeting, members of the board agreed to have at least two polling places in each district. The locations of polling places for District 1, written into the proposal, are the Northside Fire Station and Airport School. Trustees voted to determine the polling places for Districts 2, 3 and 4 at a later date.

When presenting the plan, Jones

said, "The school board denies that there is discrimination" in the present method of electing board members. "However, the facts are undeniable. There has been no minority ever elected to the board."

School board trustees were previously elected in at-large elections and "We felt the process was fine, democratic, Jone was our preference not to change

When LULAC filed a suit against the election process, they requested that all seven school board members be elected from single member districts, Jones said .. To reach the compromise "both

sides gave up some things, and both sides got some things" they wanted,

Jones called the compromise "a decent, out of court settlement of what could be a difficult lawsuit."

Rios said, "In my opinion, the decision reached demonstrates a concrete, positive effort on the behalf of the board to recognize the need for a more positive integration of the minority population into the political process.

The board "made an affirmative attempt" in resolving the lawsuit,

BSISD Superintendent Lynn Hise said, "I'm glad the litigation is complete. The amount of time and effort that I and other staff members have put in on this is time lost to efforts in maintaining and improving programs for kids in the district.'

Pat DeAnda, president of the Big Spring LULAC chapter, said, "On behalf of LULAC, we're happy we settled out of court." Of the compromise, "We're very glad, the whole organization is glad to have reached a compromise.

Hurricane-force gale whips into California

Hurricane-force winds that killed three people and knocked out power for half a million homes fanned firestorms through California brushlands today, burning more than a dozen houses and forcing the evacuation of 110 others.

In the Pacific Northwest, rain this morning threatened to further bloat ice-jammed rivers that have forced hundreds of people to flee. Temperatures were expected to remain well above freezing, with snowmelt

swelling the waterways. The windstorms with gusts up to 100 mph Thursday uprooted trees and flipped over trucks. Killed were the driver of a van that was hurled several hundred feet over a cliff, a Yosemite park worker who was crushed by a tree and a man who was electrocuted by a downed

power line. Elsewhere, up to 3 inches of snow powdered Michigan and dense patches of fog descended on Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas and Alabama.

Winds gusted to more than 90 mph at Laguna Peak, Calif., during the night and forecasters warned of powerful bursts throughout the day in Southern California

High wind warnings also were posted today on the eastern slopes of the Rockies, with gusts up to 90 mph expected in parts of Montana. In Colorado, winds were clocked this morning at 82 mph at Big Timber, 74 mph at Lethbridge and 68 mph at Cut Bank. Pasadena's Jet Propulsion Laboratory was in the

path of one fire still burning out of control today, a 639-acre blaze that jumped the Angeles Crest Los Angeles County Fire Capt. Gordon Pearson said

that fire destroyed or damaged 14 homes and 20 were evacuated in the La Canada-Flintridge area. "One of the houses is about half gone," he said. "On one of them, only the walls are still left."

In Modjeska Canyon, east of Orange, 90 homes were evacuated after a fire blackened 1,160 acres and edged within two miles of the residences, Orange County Fire Department spokesman Chuck Murphy said. More than 440 firefighters battled the blazes early today, and officials said it was 80 percent contained.

Joyce Rickman, a resident of Modjeska Canyon, said she saw the fire start near where prison inmates had been burning off brush.

'I saw it on the edge and said, 'My God, it's going to take off,' and it did. It became a full-blown firestorm.'

Another fire burned 75 acres on Bedford Peak above Orange County's Silverado Canyon. Winds carried a spark from sawdust burners at an American Forest Products lumber mill in the Madera County community of North Fork, igniting a \$5,000

blaze that destroyed four lumber drying kilns, said state forestry dispatcher Chuck Jay. About 500 residents of Pinecrest, a vacation area 130 miles east of San Francisco, were isolated by downed trees and power outages, sheriff's spokesman Mark

Bennett said. Falling trees damaged at least three dwellings and a ski lodge. "It's progressed into quite a disaster," said California Highway Patrolman Ben McThorn.

American killed by leftists

SAN SALVADOR — An American woman traveling with her family down a highway was shot and killed after leftist rebels gave orders to stop but her husband kept driving, a U.S. Embassy spokesman says.

The spokesman, Gregory Lagana, said he was "pretty sure" the rebels killed the woman, whom he identified as Linda Louise Cancel, 23, of Culver City, Calif.

However, he said the gunfire came from nearby hills, and all reports on the sheeting were incompaled.

hills, and all reports on the shooting were incomplete.

The Americans were heading east on the Pan
American Highway toward the Honduran border early
Thursday when rebels ordered them to stop, Lagana
said.

The woman's husband kept driving and "several shots were fired from the surrounding hills," Lagana said. One of the shots struck the victim on the right side of her chest, he said.

The family was traveling with a Salvadoran customs agent, Lagana said. The family's destination was Costa Rica where "apparently they were going to live," he said.

He said the other people in the vehicle were not hurt.
The rebels have been waging a civil war against the
U.S-backed government for four years.
The embassive probasing identified the horder goard.

The embassy spokesman identified the border guard as Modesto Perdomo Osorio, and said the agent had accompanied the family since they crossed the border from Guatemala on Wednesday.

Lagana said Ms. Cancel was riding with her

Lagana said Ms. Cancel was riding with her common-law husband, Curtis Hendersen Lewenz, 35, and two children — Lila Reveti Cancel Lewenz, the 18-month-old child of Ms. Cancel and Lewenz, and Christopher Len MacDonal, Ms. Cancel's 5-year-old child by a former marriage.

The family was traveling with many of their belongings in a converted schoolbus with Alabama license plates, Lagana said.

Lagana said travelers may hire a customs officer to accompany them for a \$20 fee so they will not have to make complete inventories at the border with Honduras.

Two U.S. consular officers flew by helicopter to give assistance when the embassy heard of the incident and brought the body and the family back to San Salvador. He said Ms. Cancel's body will be sent back to the United States, probably today.

Lagana said that since last year the State Department has been warning Americans it is dangerous to travel in El Salvador, especially in eastern regions where guerrillas have strongholds.

Reagan OK after copter lands

WASHINGTON — The helicopter carrying President Reagan was forced to make an emergency landing at a

naval base Thursday shortly after taking off from the White House when a red cockpit light warned of possible problems, a White House spokesman said.

Reagan was never in any danger and transferred quickly to another helicopter to continue his trip to Andrews Air Force Base and then on to Atlanta for his first campaign trip of 1984; s a i d White House spokesman Larry Speakes. "When we left the White

"When we left the White
House this afternoon, shortly
after takeoff, the pilot noticed a red warning light in the cockpit indicated possible
trouble. We landed at Anacostia Naval Air Station, and

the president was switched to another helicopter," said Speakes.

Speakes said he did not know the nature of the problem indicated by the light nor whether the problem might simply be a faulty indicator light. Kim Hoggard, a White House press officer, said Marine mechanics were still examining the helicopter late Thursday night and that more information about the problem

should be available Friday.

"The pilot's action was a standard procedure. The president was never in any danger, the military assured me," he said.

Speakes, who was on the helicopter with Reagan, did not reveal the emergency landing for more than five hours. He waited until Reagan had finished two speeches in Atlanta before briefing reporters on Air Force One as they returned to Washington.

Jones ran out of explanations

GEORGETOWN, Texas — Dr. Kathleen Holland says nurse Genene Jones ran out of explanations when the doctor found two holes in a vial of the drug allegedly used by the nurse to kill a baby.

The Kerrville pediatrician told jurors Thursday that her nurse was "coolly defensive" when confronted with the holes in the bottle's stopper. Ms. Jones was out of explanations, but not out of ideas, she said.

The nurse wanted to throw the bottle away, the doc-

tor testified.

By that time, 10 days after the Sept. 17, 1982, death of 15-month-old Chelsea McClellan, the Kerrville medical

nurse had a plan;
"She said, 'I don't think we should explain (the holes) at all. We thought we lost the vial. Throw it out and tell them we lost it."

Ms. Jones is charged with injecting the young girl with a powerful muscle relaxant that caused her death. It was in a small vial of that drug that the doctor found the holes.

Senate turns down pay raise

WASHINGTON — Legislation to repeal a \$2,400 pay raise for members of Congress is headed for House action after winning a hearty 66-19 election-year endorsement from the Senate.

The Senate took less than an hour of debate on Thursday in voting to kill the automatic 3.5 percent automatic pay raise members of Congress received on Jan. 1.

"This is a good start on that down payment President Reagan was telling us about," Sen. Roger W. Jepsen, R-Iowa, told colleagues. He was referring to Reagan's State of the Union appeal on Wednesday for Congress to join him in making a down payment this year in trimming soaring federal deficits.

The repeal bill is now before the House, which is expected to go along with the Senate action.

"In an election year, there's no way to stop the bill,"

said one congressional leadership aide who did not want to be identified.

The move would return congressional salaries to

\$69,800 a year, the level before the Jan. 1 cost-of-living increase that boosted them to \$72,200.

"We are in hard times. Our country is going broke. It is hard for us to ask for cuts to be made in other areas while we accept this salary increase," said Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., the prime sponsor of the repeal bill.

Reagan won't use trickery

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, responding to Democrats' fears of an election-year ambush, asserted today there was no political trickery behind his plan to shave the budget deficit by \$100 billion through bipartisan negotiations.

The president, at a breakfast meeting with Republican members of Congress, said, "I want you and your Democratic colleagues to know that I'm serious about negotiating a down payment on the deficit. This is not a political posturing, as some suggested."

However, Democrats in Congress are suspicious about Reagan's proposal and say they will wait to see the president's new budget and his ideas for shrinking government red ink before accepting his invitation to the bipartisan talks.

"I'm not ruling anything out as beyond the bounds of legitimate debate," Reagan said today, addressing congressmen seated at 16 tables in the chandeliered East Room.

"But I do think that we should try to concentrate on the less contentious issues. If we all focus on what's 'do-able' we can get something done for the American people," he said.

Reagan's offer is either "a great opportunity or a

Reagan's offer is either "a great opportunity or a very good political ploy," said Sen. Lawton Chiles of Florida, senior Democrat on the Senate Budget Committee

Republicans, meanwhile, see the talks as the only chance at passing deficit-reduction measures amid the campaign atmosphere on Capitol Hill.

"This is our best shot — and it may be our only shot — at doing something constructive about the deficits" this year, said House Republican Leader Robert H. Michel of Illinois.

During his State of the Union address to Congress Wednesday night, the president offered to have top White House aides negotiate with a bipartisan delegation from Congress on ways to trim the budget deficit by \$100 billion over three years. He called it "a down payment" on deficits that are stuck at a level of nearly \$200 billion a year.

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

Sunny skies on tap today

A weak cold front moving through West Texas overnight brought light fog to the Gulf Coast and coastal plains early today, while forecasters predicted sunny skies and mild temperatures as the cool air mass moves through the state.

The front was centered over North Central, Central and South Texas, the National Weather Service said. Dry air was pumped in behind the front, with little cloudiness noted.

High cloudiness noted.

High cloudiness developed over southern sections of the state. Winds behind the front were northwest at 5 to 15 mph, and light and variable ahead of it.

Temperatures were mild over the Lone Star State at 4 a.m., with readings in the 30s and 40s over most of Texas. Extremes were 27 degrees at Amarillo and 51 at McAllen located in the lower Rio Grande Valley, officials said.

The weather service said clear skies and mild temperatures should conotinue through Saturday. In North Texas, the high should reach the upper 50s today, with the low tonight in the middle 30s and the high Saturday in the middle 60s.

Winds are expected to be northerly at 10 to 20 mph, becoming light tonight, and decreasing slightly from the southwest at 10 to 15 mph, shifting to the northwest in the afternoon.

Elsewhere in the U.S., strong wnds gusting to 70 mph punished Southern California today, knocking out power and whipping up brush fires, while more rain in the Pacific Northwest swelled rivers already over their banks.

About 3 inches of snow fell on parts of Michigan, and rain extended from southeastern North Carolina across South Carolina, Georgia and northern Florida.

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Minorities: 'Out of sight, out of mind'

The record of the Urban League has been so largely nonpartisan and conservative that anyone who knows that record will be startled to read of its biting criticism of present treatment of the black minority in this country.

An Urban League study shows that while overall unemployment has dropped to 8.1 percent, black unemployment stands at 17.8 percent. The percentage of blacks below the poverty level rose from 34.2 percent in 1981 to 35.6 percent in 1982, the highest in 10 years. The gap between white and black median income is the greatest since 1960. Urban League President John L. Jacobs says black Americans face continued depression and "callous disregard" for which both the Administration and Congress must share blame. He says the black poor have been put "out of sight, out of mind."

The position of the Reagan administration's new subservient Civil Rights Commission would put the black poor farther out of sight. The commission voted to cancel a study of the effects of cuts in federal aid to black and Hispanic colleges, on the theory that discrimination might not be the cause of disparity of incomes. This is to ignore how a history of centuries of slavery and discrimination did, indeed, produce deprivations to which later voluntary immigrants were not subjected.

Congress intended financial aid for black colleges as a measure to advance equal opportunity, and that is only one example of the use of federal funds to help overcome decades of discrimination. Public funding, in short, is an essential part of the remedy for discrimination, and it ought be a particular concern of the Civil Rights Commission. When American society places a large minority out of sight and out of mind, that society cannot be very proud of itself, or very healthy.

There was a time in my life that when people told me to go fly a kite, I took them literally.

I'm serious. I suppose people thought I was a little spaced-out, but when I needed a release or just wanted to waste some time on a spring day, I would grab for my kite and make my way to the nearest clear space for an hour or so of communing with the wind.

We would cut out block letters from construction paper and then paste messages on our kites. For some reason, I remember putting the message, "Bon Voyage, Titanic," in big red letters on mine. Lord only knows why.

Then, if we didn't already have a block of wood with string wound around it, we would have to sit for a good twenty minutes winding the string from its store-bought package onto a short piece of wood. These pieces of wood could always be found in the garage, for some reason

Finally we would be ready to go and try our kites out in the wind. Sometimes, on wimpy days with no wind, we would come home disappointed. We couldn't get the darn thing off the ground, no matter how much running we did with it.

My kite-flying habits stayed with me until well into my college years. If the day was fine with at least a little wind, my friends knew they could find me on the hill above my school with my kite as well as the world on a string

I am brought back to those idyllic days by the fine weather of the past week. Though we haven't had much in the way of wind, the warmth of the sunshine and the clearness of the sky leave me waiting for someone to say, "Go fly a kite, Rick."

 Our own Central Intellligence Agency may have helped to set up the first death squads in Guatemala. They evolved out of the National Liberation Movement, a paramilitary-political organization which overthrew leftist president Jacobo Arbenz in 1954 with the notso-covert aid of CIA agents.

- The CIA has continued to maintain contacts inside the death squads. The Reagan administration, therefore, knows more than it cares to admit about the composition and operations of the death squads. In fact, the administration has given a list of death squad leaders to the interim civilian president of El Salvador, Alvaro Magana.

 Some death squads operate through the World Anti-Communist League. This was once a respectable association of ultraconservative groups, but it has come increasingly under the influence of extremist, even neo-Nazi organizations. Nevertheless, some of Reagan's staunch supporters continue to sympathize with the

But the death squads are so deeply entren-ched in these governments that it is almost impossible to extricate

I have been investigating the death squads, which operate throughout Latin America under the name of La Mano Blanca (White Hand). In the cause of executing communists, they have slaughtered tens of thousands of suspected leftists - including four U.S. churchwomen — without the formalities of a trial. All it takes is a loose rumor or accusation to bring a death sentence upon an entire

La Mano Blanca's political assassins are protected by a Mafialike code of loyalty and silence. One of the rare sources who dared to talk about the death squads explained to my associate Jon Lee Anderson: "La Mano Blanca means that whoever is involved in the killing is protected by powerful, invisible hands. These hands whitewash all evidence leading to a member."

An admitted assassin, whom I call El Lobo (The Wolf), boasted: We go by different names in each country and make up new ones to confuse our enemies. But we are all La Mano Blanca.'

death squads, he confirmed, is the Latin American Anti-Communist Confederation, which is an affiliate of the World Anti-Communist League. The affiliate, known by the initials CAL, pretends to keep its skirts clean of the clandestine murders. But sometimes the truth slips out.

Stamping out death squads not easy task

At a World Anti-Communist League meeting in 1981, CAL secretary Rafael Rodriquez came close to letting the black cat out of the bag. He boasted taht many members of the Latin American affiliate were involved in "active resistance" to the communist threat, "whether with weapons, with the pen or with the spoken word ... Their mission is to back with action any authority taking effective measures to oppose communism." Rodriquez concluded his peroration with this assurance:

"All the member organizations of CAL in El Salvador, and the Liberation Movement in Guatemala, are on the front line in this battle. Their fight is permanent and to the death, without backing down and without cowardice." Unfortunately, this was no mere rhetorical bombast, as the widespread slaughter can

In El Salvador, President Magana has nervously accepted the list of death squad leaders from Washington. He has shipped some of the top military officers on the list into "diplomatic exile" at Salvadoran embassies abroad. But beyond that, he has admitted he is largely powerless to crack down on the political assassins

In Guatemala, the National Liberation Movement is headed by Mario Sandoval Alarcon, one of the nation's former vice presidents and a longtime member of the World Anti-Communist League. he is believed to be the driving force behind the death squad operation is in his country. Indeed, the National Liberation Movement campaigns brazenly as "The Party of Organized Violence."

Despite pressure from the White House, no criminal charges have yet been brought in either El Salvador or Guatemala for rightwing assassinations. La Mano Blanca is simply too powerful.

Meanwhile, the butchery goes on. CONFIDENTIAL FILE: Like any Marxist regime, the mainland Chinese government takes a dim view of citizens who practices any religion — "the opium of the people." But some organized religious groups find a greater degree of tolerance in China than others. State Department sources say Buddhist and Taoists get the worst treatment. Christians do a bit better, because their plight comes to the attention of co-religionists

Dog rescued from water tank

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BROWNWOOD, Texas (AP) - No one knows just how long it lay in a deep pit.

But for at least 10 days Queenie, a white German shepherd who had been living at the Golden Age Nursing Home, was trapped in a dry water tank about 7 feet deep at the Brownwood Cattle Auction.

Jerry McGuffey, administrator of the nursing home, appealed through the Brownwood Bulletin for the return of the dog that has become so important to the nursing home.

Over a week went by and many called about dogs they believed to be Queenie, but it was never the right

Finally McGuffey, realizing how much pet therapy has done for the patients of the home, went to the Brown County Animal Shelter and returned with

Patients were pleased and accepted their new friend. But it was obvious that they still missed their white shepherd whom they had grown to love.

No one really knows how long the dog lay in the tank, but it is theorized that it might have been chasing one of the cats that freely roam the auction barns and tumbled into the tank.

A worker at the cattle auction spotted the animal trapped in its "prison" and called Clell Murray to the location. Murray without hesitation went down into the tank and rescued the animal.

The dog was thin, dirty, frightened and extremely weak, but still breathing. Carefully lifting the dog and

carrrying it to his pickup, he drove it home.

Murray wasted no time feeding and bathing it and

immediately started giving it vitamins. "I was planning to take her to a veterinarian right away," he said. When his brother-in-law, Cullen Sliger, also of Early, learned about the animal, he remembered seeing an article in the Bulletin about the lost shepherd.

It didn't take long for Murray to contact McGuffey. When McGuffey rushed to Murray's home, he knew that he had found Queenie

The dog was quickly taken to Dr. Doyle Cooper, a Brownwood veterinarian, who checked it over and found the animal to be in "remarkably" good condition for what it went through.

Cooper said that a dog in good shape can survive two to three weeks without food as long as it has water. Obviously there must have been some moisture in the tank or the animal could not have survived, the Cooper said the only real medical problem he found,

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Floyd going for first win in West golf action

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Ray Floyd has carved out an enviable record in a PGA Tour career that spans more than two decades: 18 victories, including a pair of PGA national championships, a Masters green jacket and more than \$2 million in earnings.

Strangely enough, however, he's never won in the West.

"I'm going to fix that situation this year," he said.

And Floyd took a major step in that direction with an eight under-par 64 that gave him the first round lead Thursday in the \$400,000 Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open golf tournament.

Perhaps significantly, the no bogey effort came on a course Floyd called "my nemesis." the North course at the Torrey Pines Golf Club.

At 6,667 yards, it's the shorter and easier of the two par-72 courses used for the first two rounds of this event. All the par fives are reachable. It's more sheltered from the Pacific winds. But it also can be troublesome.

"Over the years, it's been my nemesis," Floyd said. "I've lost this tournament two times in playoffs. And that's after playing the North in 68 and 69. If you're playing well, you feel like par is

"If you expect to do well in the tournament, you feel you ought to have a really

good round on the North," Floyd said. And he did. He had no bogeys, no fives on his card and a single one-putt par. "It's very nice to get off to a good

start," he said. A single stroke off the lead at 65 were Gary McCord and Brad Bryant, a pair of journeymen tourists still seeking their first Tour title.

The group at 66, six under, included Loren Roberts, Steve Liebler, Chip Beck, Don Pooley and veteran Gibby Gilbert.

Of the leaders, only Roberts played the 7,002-yard South course. And he needed his career-first hole-in-one. It came on the

High schoolers take a crack at child care

BEAVER FALLS, Pa.(AP) — The game of life is no trivial pursuit in the sociology class at Blackhawk

No one really loses, but everyone takes a crack at caring for a hard-cooked egg, an innovative approach to teaching child care that's made David Parry's class one of the Beaver County school's most popular.

Students are paired in "married" couples, and each "gives birth" to a hard-cooked egg, names it and cares for it. To simulate the responsibility of raising a child, Parry requires that the egg be attached, by string, to one of the partners or a guardian 24 hours a day for a

Parry suggests that at night the students tie the string to one of their toes and hang the "child" over the

"I can't figure out a way to have them woken up at night or I would," he said.

They name the eggs, decorate them. I get elaborate cribs. They are encouraged to think about ways to protect their child," he said.

MaryBeth Kautra, 17, persuaded her older brother to bring her egg to a basketball game because she was a cheerleader. Another couple got the principal to carry it in his jacket pocket so they could go to the game worry free.

"We had to make our parents baby sit," said Kelli Borello, 17. "My mom thought it was fun. It made her think, 'Someday I'll be a grandmother.'

"It (the ban) was not reviewed by me, and I was unaware of it," Reynolds said. "I first read about it

in the student newspaper." Reynolds also said Wednesday that he was unaware of orders issued to clerks at the campus bookstore to remove cocktail glasses and ashtrays

from the shelves. Several administrators at the Baptist-supported university say they decided to crack down on the posters and pictures of nude and semi-nude women after students returned from Christmas break on Jan. 16.

"There's a world of difference between our concern for student health and safety, as far as alcohol consumption is concerned, and what they want to put up in their rooms," Reynolds told the Austin American-Statesman. "They've been putting posters up since I was a young person.

"Just because an individual puts up a Budweiser poster in his room doesn't mean he's going to sit there every evening and drink a six-pack of Budweiser," Reynolds said.

Dorm residents were asked to remove the posters by last Sunday, but enforcement of the new rules was left to students, vice president A.A. Hyden said Tuesday

No penalties were stated for failure to remove the

None of several students interviewed Wednesday were aware that Reynolds had lifted the ban that day. Most of the posters were down, but a few remained in rooms of students who disagreed with the policy, the newspaper said.

John Inman, 17, said he was sincerely worried when some chemistry classmates "kidnapped" his child. It was found broken in a drawer, and the child was considered murdered. Inman was relieved the insurance he "purchased" covered the funeral.

"The thing that amazes me is the degree of commitment I get from them," said Parry.

Each couple in the class spins the wheel of fortune to learn their gross income, anywhere from \$9,000 to \$14,000. Then, they must live within a budget they make down to the last detail.

Couples look for apartments they won't rent, trudge through supermarkets pricing groceries they won't buy, select occupations they may never pursue.

The couples shop for groceries, insurance, furniture and apartments. They must pay to go to friends' weddings, to have teeth capped, to repair leaky pipes.
"I'm not sure this is good preparation for college sociology," said Parry, "but this course is an attempt

Parry began teaching a six-week marriage and family section in his sociology course 10 years ago. "It started as part of a poverty unit," he said.
"These kids were convinced you could live on \$3,500 a year for a family of four. It bothered me no end that

kids had no concept of what kind of money that was." By going through the motions of married life, Parry hopes his students will consider all the implications


