"My reaction is the same as before," Davis said, "I'm not really surprised but glad they acted in a timely manner." Wane Burns, attorney for the trio, sent the petition on Feb. 17 to the federal court by ex- press mail. The three would-be candidates had previousl filed their petition in the state Court of Appeals in Eastland and the state Supreme Court in Austin but were denied a hearing in both courts. Burns today was not available for comment. 33 percent do not, according to a recent telephone
survey of Texas voters by Houston Republican pollster survey of Texas v
Lance Tarrance.
Sixteen percent said they were either undecided will decide whent said they were either undecided or
Democratic nominee is chosen according to the survey taken Jan. 16-18 and expected The survey also showed that 61 percent in Texas ap-
proved of Reagan's job performanee, his highes
rating in the state since taking office, Tarrance said rating in the state since taking office, Tarrance said.
Thirty percent of those survey disapproved of the Reagan presidency.
Despite the high marks, top Reagan campaig strategists interviewed during the past week are cau-
tioning against a premature GOP celebration in the lone star state.
Reagan, they say, will face a tougher challenge in rexas than in 1980 when he defeated Jimmy Carter by 14 points. The main reason: Democrat Mark White -
and not Republican William Clements - will be pulling strings from the governor's mansion.

"The governor's chair is an invaluable political the Reagan-Bush 84 campaign in Texas. Kettlewell said recent Republican polls showed
Reagan ahead of Democratic front runner Walter Mondale by $6-10$ points in Texas. The assertion is disputed by Texas Democratic Party Chairman Bo Slagle, who called the race a "toss-up."
Regardless, Reagan's conservative policies and af fable personality are scoring points in the state, according to the GOP strategists. And Texas Republicans Mondapp, whom the strategists say will be the Democratic nominee.

storm produced blizzard-like conditions with 50 -mph winds across the Midwest. Chunks of ice stacking up 7 feet high damaged eight beachfront homes on lower Michigan's
Saginaw Bay, on the shores of Lake Huron. aginaw Bay, on the shores of Lake Huron.
Snow came down as fast as 2 inches an hour in western Pennsylvania and western New York, where one deputy said patrol cars had
to "bang through the drifts" to reach stranded motorists.
In Indiana, 10 inches of snow fell at Plymouth, Ind., with Indianapolis reporting 9
inches and Detroit and Fort Wayne, Ind., 9 ininches and Detroit and Fort Wayne, Ind., in-
ches. Six to 12 inches of snow fell in Ohio from near Dayton northeast to the Lakeshore and
from Sandusky east to Pennsylvania.

Schools, banks, offices and factories were
losed in much of the Indiana and Gov. Robert
D. Orr ordered the state's 81 National Guard
armories on alert to receive stranded notorists and others needing shelter.
During the night, up to 18 inches of snow fell at Niagara Falls, N.Y., with 10 inches collec ting at Buffalo and 9 inches at Rochester. Up Winter storm warnings were in effect for northern Illinois, northern Ohio and the nor heastern corner of the nation.
Visibility was near zero across Illinois and Indiana.
