The museum board has decided to open the museum on a regular basis every Monday and Friday, beginning July 18. Hours will be 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Tables and chairs will be set up at the park but folks are encouraged to bring chairs, blankets, and plenty of sunscreen to enjoy the many activities.



Agriculture GPS systems may face interference problems

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., continues to follow the situation regarding wireless broadband provider LightSquared and potential interference with the Global Positioning System.


LightSquared's goal is to build out a nationwide 4G ancillary terrestrial component (ATC) network that would cover 260 million people in the United States by 2014. In January the FCC granted LightSquared a conditional waiver which allowed them to proceed with the project in a limited fashion while a working group conducted research to determine whether the LightSquared network and GPS can coexist with no interference.

The deadline for that report was originally June 15 but was extended to July 1 after a request from LightSquared. According to a news article from Bloomberg, Light-

Squared CEO Sanjiv Ahuja said they would alter their original plan and use different airwaves which he said would resolve interference concerns for 99.5 percent of all GPS receivers in the United States. However that remaining 0.5 percent includes precision GPS receivers such as those used in agricultural equipment.

"If these interference concerns aren't completely resolved, this potentially could be a massive issue for precision agriculture," PCG Executive Vice-President Steve Verett said. "We have got to have 100 percent assurance

that this new technology will not affect any GPS receivers." Plains Cotton Growers will monitor this issue and keep you updated on any developments.

DPS looks for July 4 drunk drivers

During the Independence Day Holiday, the Texas Highway Patrol will conduct focused DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols target impaired driving and are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation.


The increased patrols are scheduled for June 27 through July 6. All available DPS troopers will patrof during this time to keep the traveling public safer by keeping drunk drivers off the roadways.

"Highway travel increases during the Fourth of July holiday, and we want to make sure that everyone is driving sober and getting to their destinations safely," said Chief David G. Baker, the DPS assistant director of the Texas Highway Patrol. "Anyone who plans on drinking, should also plan on having someone else drive them home."

Troopers are also participating in Operation Holiday and Operation C.A.R.E. from July 1 to July 4, both of which provide increased patrol to make holiday travel safer. In addition to looking for drunk drivers, troopers will focus on seat belt violators and speeders.


Last year during the extended holiday weekend, DPS troopers made 617 DWI arrests, issued 8,882 speeding citations and ticketed more than 1,600 seat belt and child safety seat violators.

With the ongoing drought and the high-risk of wildfires, DPS asks that all drivers avoid tossing cigarettes out of their vehicle. Drivers should also avoid stopping or parking vehicles in grass, which can catch fire when it comes in contact with an automobile's catalytic converter.




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
Hispanic, women farmers claims session in Hereford



The Internal Revenue Service announced an increase in the optional standard mileage rates for the final six months of 2011. Taxpayers may use the optional standard rates to calculate the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business

and other purposes. The rate will increase to 55.5 cents a mile for all business miles driven from July 1, 2011, through December 31, 2011. This is an increase of 4.5 cents from the 51-cent rate in effect for the first six months of 2011, as set forth in Rev-

enue Procedure 2010-51. In recognition of recent gasoline price increases, the IRS made this special adjustment for the final months of 2011. The IRS normally updates the mileage rates once a year in the fall for the next

calendar year. "While gasoline is a significant factor in the mileage figure, other items enter into the calculation of mileage rates, such as depreciation and insurance and other fixed and variable costs," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas.

IRS increases mileage rate to 55.5 cents per mile

The optional business standard mileage rate is used to compute the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business use in lieu of tracking actual costs. This rate is also used as a benchmark by the federal government and many businesses to reimburse their employees for mileage.

The new six-month rate for computing deductible medical or moving expenses will also increase by 4.5 cents to 23.5 cents a mile, up from 19 cents for the first six months of 2011. The rate for providing services for charitable organizations is set by statute, not the IRS, and remains at 14 cents a mile.

Local sales tax report

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said that state sales tax revenue in May was \$1.95 billion, up 9.9 percent compared to May 2010.

"Spending in sectors such as the oil and gas industry and manufacturing helped increase state sales tax revenue," said Combs. "Retail spending also grew. Texas has now had 14 straight months of sales tax revenue increases."

June's sales tax allocations represent sales that occurred

Parmer County's May 2011 payment totaled \$42,507.52 broken down as Bovina \$6,356.99; Farwell \$7,167.97; and Friona \$28,982.56. In May 2010 the tax payment total was \$37,337.90

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up 13.84%, broken down as Bovina 5.73%; Farwell 2.27%; and Friona 19.18%. For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$278,768.67 as compared to \$241,906.56 for the same period last year, a 15.23% change.

The Comptroller's July sales tax allocation will be made on Monday, July 11.

New law to protect grain producers

Governor Rick Perry has and others." signed landmark legislation that will allow Texas grain producers to vote on whether to create and pay for a self-insurance program that will cover their losses when they are not paid for grain they deliver to a buyer or a storage facility.


Rep. Larry Phillips of Sher-Wichita Falls introduced the legislation after a series of grain elevator financial failures in recent years resulted in millions of dollars in losses to Texas grain producers who were not compensated for their stored or contracted grain. "Passage of this new law has been a top priority for Texas producers who need this additional riskmanagement tool to protect themselves from catastrophic losses that could put them out of business," David Gibson, executive vice president of the Corn Producers Association of Texas, said. "This law is the result of efforts from many organizations across our state, including the Texas Farm Bureau, grain producer associations, grain buying associations

The Texas legislation was modeled after successful indemnification programs that have operated for decades in more than a dozen other major grain producing states. "This will be similar to the checkoff programs that producers are familiar with," Gibson said. "And man and Sen. Craig Estes of grain producers will have an procedures and set a date for the opportunity to vote on whether to move forward with funding and operating the program."

If approved by producers in a referendum, an indemnification fund will be created and financed by a small assessment. deducted from a producer's proceeds when grain is sold. Grain buyers will withhold the assessments from the sales and remit the assessments to the fund each quarter. If a grain producer suffers a loss when a grain elevator has a financial failure or a grain buyer fails to pay for delivered grain, the producer can file a claim with the fund to recover up to 90 percent of the value of the grain lost. The program will apply to transactions involving com, soybeans, wheat and grain

After the law becomes effective on September 1, 2011, the Agriculture Commissioner will appoint a nine-member board with representatives from grain producers, storage facilities and grain buyers to conduct the referendum and oversee operations of the indemnification fund. The board will adopt producer referendum. Producers will have 90 days notice before the referendum is held. The cost of the referendum will be paid by producer organizations.

"My hats off to the corn producers board and association, Texas Farm Bureau, TDA, Texas House Agriculture Committee and the Texas Senate Agriculture Committee for their leadership in crafting a risk mitigation tool for the benefit of Texas grain producers," Mitchell Harris, CEO of AgTexas Farm Credit Services, said. "The grain indemnity fund legislation brings a very cost effective, farmer funded vehicle for grain farmers to mitigate the counterparty risk of a failing grain elevator in these volatile times.

The Bert Corona Leadership Institute is a program that helps migrant students speak out in their communities. Three Friona students, Luis Campos, Miguel Soto, and Magali Moralez, were chosen to be a part of the Region 16 Leadership Team for a trip to Washington D.C. June 5-10.

The team consisted of nine students from the Panhandle. About 40 Panhandle students applied. All the students had to submit a college type resume to qualify for the team. The three Friona students chosen had the highest application scores.

Two chaperones accompanied the group. They are Region 16 migrant counselors, Wendy Branstein and Angela Hochstein. In addition to having fun the students had to prepare an agenda and meet with Representative Mac Thornberrry and Senator John Cornyn.

"Not many people get the chance to do this in their lifetime," Magali Moralez said. "We did get to go sightseeing on Capitol Hill as well as visit the historical monuments."

These are their personal experiences as told by the students.

Luis Campos

My experience in Washington D.C. is unlike anything I've ever done. For example, I was looking forward to flying on an airplane for the first time which I got to do on this trip.

On June 5 a tour guide took us to see Arlington Cemetery, the White House, Lafayette Park, and other monuments and major sites. Washington D.C. is where the history lies. Bovina defibrillator grant from Great Plains Ag

The Great Plains Project HeartSafe was established to save lives by ensuring that AEDs are widely available in the region, especially in rural communities.

Sudden cardiac arrest remains a leading cause of death in this country, responsible for an estimated 250,000 deaths each year. The American Heart Association (AHA) reports that up to 50,000 lives could be saved annually with the prompt use of automatic external defibrillators (AEDs).

Individuals, organizations, businesses and government agencies are eligible to purchase an AED unit through Project HeartSafe. This program provides a greatly reduced purchase cost through the generosity of Cardiac Science and the possibility of cost sharing. The cost-share program may provide up to \$600 in assistance to those who wish to purchase an AED through the program. This assistance is provided jointly by Great Plains Ag Credit and Cardiology Center of Amarillo.

Recently, the City of Bovina purchased a portable automated external defibrillator (AED) for use by Bovina Fire Department at the reduced cost and received cost sharing grants which reduced their purchase price to \$700; a small but essential investment in the health and well being of the citizens of Bovina.

"Time is critical when a person's heart stops," said Great Plains CEO Tim McDonald. In the rural areas we serve, medical help can be up to an hour away, and many government agencies don't have the budgets to purchase AEDs for their first responders. The goal of Great Plains Project HeartSafe is to save lives, by making portable AEDs more affordable and more widely available."


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
