Amendment XIV-This constitutional amendment was passed by Congress on June 13, 1866 and ratified on July 9, 1868.

Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution was modified by Section 2 of Amendment XIV. It defines the election of representatives according to numbers, excluding Indians, not being taxed.

Section 1 defines citizenship, privileges, immunities, due process, and equal protection.

Section 3 states post Civil War rules and remedies concerning the rebellion.

Section 4 states that Confederate debt is considered illegal and void.

Section 5 gives Congress power to enforce this amendment....Mary Johnston
