COLUMBIA - Native son Jesse Jackson claimed his presidential campaign's first clear-cut victory Saturis own in the Southern state. got some delegates of The Rev. Jackson, a Greenville native, won 34.4 perent of the vote and 17 of the state's national delegates Uncommitted dropped to second place with 27.1 percent of the vote, or 12 elected delegates.
Mondale and Colorado Mondale and Colorado Sen. Gary Hart, who finished
close in the unofficial percentages, will get six elected delegates each, said South Carolina party officials. But the total count after Saturday stood at 17 for Monsole, 14 uncommitted, seven for Hart and six for volved in the voting already have stated a preference - "Two uncommitted and one for Hart. This exceeds my wildest dreams,"' said Dr. Walker solomon, chairman of the Jackson effort. "This says to
the nation that South Carolina loves her children. If
you work hard with a good candidate you can win.",
In Virginia's caucuses, Jackson won the popular In Virginia's caucuses, Jackson won the popular quirk in geographic distribution.
Hart campaigner Phil Hart campaigner Phil Noble said efforts for Hart
succeeded. "I don't think anybody expected us to demolish Mondale down here," he said.
Noble predicted that three to five of the unpledged national delegates eventually would go for Hart.
Mondale organizer Samuel Tenenbaum had simer comments: "We are very happy. We've achieved a
significant victory for Mondale considering where we Tenenbaum predicted Mondale would get three-

## Paying the price of killing freedom

The Soviet Union has invested nearly $41 / 2$ years, millions of rubles and more than 100,000 troops in its unsuccessful attempt
to conquer Afghanistan. Yet recent reports from that to conquer Afghanistan. Yet recent reports from that
beleaguered country suggest that things are looking even worse for the invaders.

Recently it was announced that the Soviet army had started its seventh major offensive against the Afghan freedom fighters in the strategic Peshawar Valley located some 60 miles faring no better this time than they have in their previous campaigns.

According to diplomatic sources, the Afghans have already engaged the Russians in two separate raids and have killed or captured at least 60 Soviets soldiers and destroyed 20 vehicles. To date, the Soviets are estiamted to have lost between 7,000 and 11,000 men (precise figures are unavailable) and have little beyond communist control. Assassinations of government officials are so commonplace that it is difficult to recruit local leaders as replacements. Last year, the Marxist Afghan army lost through deaths, desertions and defections nearly a third of its men. The situation is so desperate that the government has resorted to forced conscription where young men are physically The government has also begun drafting communist party members, a previously exempt group, because they are considered less likely to collaborate with the enemy.
Consequently, frustrated Soviet forces have retaliated with terror tactics such as chemical and biological warfare, saturafighters, and summary executions of women and children. But the resistance remains undaunted.
Public utilities are sabotaged daily, local merchants refuse to stock goolds requested by the occupying army, and truckers make monthly protection payments to the resistance so their attacks against the Soviet embassy in Kabul have caused the army to triple its security forces there. Still the invaders live under constant fear of reprisals from the locals.
Such is the price to be paid by the Kremlin as it continues to prop up a puppet regime in Afghanistan.

ed more than 200,000 youths from around the world Saturday and urged them to play a "prophetic role" in combating world „problems and what he called a "It is up to you to play a kind of prophetic role. You can carry out an action of denunciation against today's
evils," the pontiff said from a platform in St. Peter's Square.

170,000 Italian youths and more than 30,000 others from 170,000 Italian youths and more than
countries including France, West Germany, Spain, countries including France, West Germany, Spain,
Poland, Japan, and the Philippines in the square.

The pontiff urged them to "speak above all against

## Protect your dog from disease

Part of caring for man's best friend, the dog, is giving him all the necessary shots. One of these shots is for a relatively new disease called Parvo virus.
"Parvo is a strange and nasty disease. It is deadly, but preventable and treatable, said Betty Innis, kennel owner. "Parvo strikes the very young and the very old dogs. It's a devastating thing to have hap pen to a dog."
Parvo virus effects the dog's intestines. "In the intestines are structures called said Dr. Bobby Lawdermilk, veterinaria, "The villi increase the absorption area of the intestine. The virus attacks the vill and destroys them
'Parvo can be controlled through the vaccine, but it's not going to go away. Without vaccinating your dog, you can't protect him from it.'
VETERINARIANS started recognizing the disease Parvo during the the late 1970s. "We don't know where it came from for sure. Up until that time we didn't have As far as Lawd

"The virus does not only effect absorpion but also leaves an area in the intestine susceptible to bacterial invasion, which can lead to blood poison.
Since Parvo effects the intestines, the
dog with Parvo will have intestinal-like symptoms including vomiting, diarrhea Altotting of the stoo
Although some syptoms are evident, some dogs just lay down and dehydrate on you," said Mrs. Innis. "Animals don't show symptoms like humans. When it has symptoms you can bet it's sick.
"WHEN PARVO HITS, it hits quick," she said. "If you get the dog to the vet, you can stop it just as quick.
"Their best chance for recovery is if you treat them as soon as you notice the symptoms. You've got to treat them right then. You can't wait until the next day," she said.
If a person can't find a veternarian when his dog becomes ill at night or on the weekends, he can take the dog to Permian Basin Emergency Veternarian Clinic between Odessa and Midland. "It's, just like the hosp

A vaccine does exist for Parvo. "Parvo can be controlled through the vaccine, but its not going o go away. Without vacfrom it," Mrs. Innis said. "When you are having an outbreak of it, nobody's dog is safe unless it is vaccinated. The vaccination can mean the difference between life and death.
The Parvo vaccine has an 85 percent effective rate, said Lawdermilk and Mrs. Innis. "During Parvo season, the best Mrs. Innis. When a person takes his dog to get his shot, he should tell the veternarians to give the dog all the necessary shots. That way no disease is overlooked.
