Spring Ex-car dealer sought for theft

Three felony theft arrest warrants involving amounts totaling more than \$60,000 have been filed against a former Big Spring car dealer by law enforcement agencies investigating what Texas Rangers Charles Brune calls "large-scale fraud."

Two Howard County felony theft warrants were issued April 27 against Anthony "Tony" Ginnetti

doing business as Car City Auto the warrants and law enforcement today. Information about the warrants was withheld at the time pending an arrest, he said.

Both the two Howard County warrants and a Swisher County warrant issued at approximately the same time charge Ginnetti, whose address is listed as Decker Road, with felony theft of more than \$20,000. Brune said.

Sales and Service Inc., Brune said agencies do not know Ginnetti's present location, he said, but he believes Ginnetti is aware of the charges against him.

An official complaint was made to the (Howard County) sheriff's office and the Texas Ranger's office on April 12 of a "large-scale fraud" taking place in Howard County, Brune said.

The possibility that Ginnetti might have been involved in fraud

was brought to the attention of the Howard County sheriff's office by officials from a local financial institution, Brune said.

Brune said investigation by the Howard County sheriff's office, the Swisher County sheriff's office, the Texas Rangers and "numerous law enforcement agencies," indicated Ginnetti "has defrauded local financial institutions and other private people.'

Brune would not identify the

financial institutions involved in Howard County or in Swisher County. And he would not comment on the amount of money involved in the fraud or on the number of fraud incidents "It's too many to tell," Brune

said. "We are still investigating." Ginnetti used vehicles sold at Car City Auto, which he opened at 1506 Marcy about 112 years ago, to defraud both financial institutions

Knott subsoil tested

KNOTT — The state Department of Agriculture today will finish another round of testing here, searching for the cause of arsenic contamination in area water wells.

Six holes have been drilled for soil core sampling, and three more were to be drilled today.

David Davis of the agriculture department's natural resource division in Odessa, said the core sampling would determine whether arsenic sprayed as defoliant has leached through the soil into well water.

Davis said water samples also have been taken near each of the core samples. In previous testings, different

laboratories have been used to analyze the samples. "This time," Davis said, "all of the samples will be held, sent to

one lab and tested together for more uniform results." The tests are being conducted in a 7 square-mile area in the location

of gin sites, where the highest levels of arsenic have been found in The core tests also will help determine if gin trash has played a

major role in the contamination, Davis said. All of Knott's gins are located in the area of the Bud Hughes farm,

where the contamination was first discovered last December.

'Pothole' bill could help fix city's streets

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau AUSTIN - Officials with the 800-member Texas Municipal League met with Gov. Mark White Wednesday in hopes of garnering his support for a so-called pothole bill that would dedicate \$100 million every two years for local

League officials said the plan, if endorsed by the Texas Legislature, would guarantee Big Spring \$547,800 each biennium to help improve damaged roads.

Such a proposal, however, is contingent upon a doubling of the state's motor fuels taxes. That increase is one of several tax options expected to be debated during a special session of the Texas Legislature this summer. White has said he will call the session to continue his push to increase teacher salaries and the state's highway fund.

Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock has estimated doubling the motor fuels tax would add \$351.9 million to state coffers in the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1, and \$450 million the following year.

One-fourth of the state's motor fuels tax - levied on gasoline, diesel and lubricants - is set aside for education under the Texas Constitution. The remainder is obligated to state highway needs.

The league proposal would earmark \$100 million of the tax increase for local road improvements. The state's gasoline tax has remained at a nickel-agallon since 1957, and is the lowest in the nation.

Each year, cities would receive \$1,660 per paved street mile for road repairs. Similar legislation failed during the 1983 Texas Legislature.

The governor said he is with us in principle and I understood him to say that next to teacher salaries, this is his number one priority, said Corpus Christi Mayor Luther Jones, the municipal league's immediate past president.

Jones was among eight Texas mayors — including San Angelo Mayor Tom Parrett — who attended the meeting with White.

Jones said that most Texas cities

are experiencing an increase in the number of vehicles that use their roadways, but noted that municipalities have been unable to keep step with rising maintenance

"Most of the gasoline that is consumed in Texas is consumed on city streets," Jones said. "But very little of the motor fuels tax money goes back to the cities."

One exception, Jones said, occurs in cities dissected by a state

dent Reagan's Democratic critics in Congress predict he will get some of the money he wants to bolster El Salvador's armed forces, but it will not buy a military solution to the "chaos and anarchy" he says communists are spreading in Central America.

Democrats branded Reagan's televised address Wednesday night as a "saber rattling" call to arms that paid only lip service to efforts for a negotiated settlement and could lead to another debacle like the involvement of U.S. Marines in

But they conceded the president will win at least a limited grant of additional funds to buttress the Salvadoran army against the onslaught of Marxist-led guerrillas.

Reagan's speech was his most strongly termed defense yet of his Central American policies, comparing his critics to those who concluded in the years before World War II that "the aggressor's appetite would be satisfied" with just one ...ore conquest or international transg. ession.

"What we see in El Salvador is an attempt to destabilize the entire region, and eventually move chaos and anarchy toward the American border," the president said.

"We have provided just enough aid to avoid outright disaster but not enough to resolve the crisis, so El Salvador is being left to slowly bleed to death. "The simple questions are: Will

we support freedom in this hemisphere or not? ... Will we stop the spread of communism in this hemisphere or not? Will we act while there is still time?" the president asked.

Sen: Paul Tsongas, D-Mass., one of the Senate's harshest critics of administration policy in the reion, said, "The president will get his aid, but not for the right reasons."

"The Republicans will support their president," Tsongas said. "The Democrats to a large extent will give the president what he wants just so that we will not be

blamed if anything goes wrong."
Sen. Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island, the senior Democrat on the Foreign Relations Committee, called the address "a strong and in my view saber rattling speech that ignores the wishes of the leading countries of the area, who prefer the negotiating route to the

military one."

Reagan repeated his previous pledge to keep American troops out of a Central American war, saying the argument was "definitely not about plans to send American troops into combat in Central America.

But he said that without more aid El Salvador may not be able to withstand a Cuban-backed guerrilla offensive that the United States believe is planned for the

And he divulged a new assessment of the strength of Cuban forces in leftist-ruled Nicaragua, saying the Cuban force there has grown from 165 in 1979 to 10,000.

Meanwhile, the Wall Street Journal reported today the CIA funnel ed money into El Salvador to assist parties competing with right-wing candidate Roberto d'Aubuisson. On Tuesday, Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., made a similiar allegation, saying the CIA and the State Department "bought" the presidential election for moderate Jose Napoleon Duarte.

The journal, quoting unidentified intelligence sources, said Duarte, a moderate, was the chief beneficiary of aid. But the newspaper also said aid was given to at least one other party, headed by Francisco Jose Guerrero.

The story said sources familiar with the program say it was carried out with Reagan's approval. Both the House and Senate Intelligence committees were informed about the program, the newspaper said, but the level and detail of involvement by the CIA have surprised some key members.

The CIA finances included money to hire news media and political consultants. It has previously been reported that the CIA spent money to buy election equipment.

The newspaper said Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., a member of the Senate Intelligence Committee, has protested to Secretary of State George Shultz.

In response to Helms' charges Wednesday, White House spokesman Larry Speakes said he would not comment. "But I am pointing out that we have always said we were neutral in the election. That's a fact.'

Child not identified as missing

From staff and wire reports A woman and a young girl were released by authorities in Sweetwater Wednesday after several hours of questioning convinced officials the girl was not a missing Breckenridge child. The woman and child stayed

in Big Spring with relatives while authorities studied laboratory tests to determine if the child was Ryan Nicole Burton, who was abducted from her Breckenridge home Aug. 6, 1981.

Nolan County Sheriff Jim Blakely and a deputy stopped the two Tuesday after someone in a fast-food restaurant reported that the woman resembled a sketch of a woman sought in connection with the 1981 kidnapping of the Burton

Blakely said footprints of the girl, age 6, were wired to Dallas for comparison with those of the kidnapped girl.

'We have received no word from Dallas, but we had no reason to continue holding them," Blakely said. He said the woman's fingerprints also were taken as well as photographs of the child.

The woman said she and the child were from Waterford, Calif. She said she was en route to Florida and then to Ohio to visit her parents. Blakely said she agreed to return to Big Spring and stay with relatives while authorities checked her background. Officers followed her to Big Spring.

Clear skies dominate Texas weather picture

Clear skies and mild temperatures dominated the Texas weather picture before dawn today as forecasters looked for rain-free conditions to continue into the weekend.

The pleasant weather was the result of a dome of high pressure that remain anchored offshore in the Gulf of Mexico, the National Weather Service said.

Temperatures were in the 50s and 60s before dawn. Readings at 4 a.m. ranged from 50 at Marfa to 67 at Dallas

Houston set a record low for the date today. At 5 a.m., the mercury fell to 52 degrees at Houston Intercontinental Airport, breaking the old mark of 53 set in 1961.

Southerly to southwesterly winds prevailed across the entire state at speeds ranging from 5 to 15 mph. Southwesterly winds gusting above 25 mph were reported across the South Plains near Lubbock before dawn.

The forecast called for fair skies in North and West Texas and partly cloudy skies in South Texas through Friday. Slightly warmer temperatures were forecast with afternoon highs hitting the upper 80s and 90s over wide sections of the state. A few readings were expected to top out over the 100-degree mark in the Big Bend valleys.

Floodwaters swirled in parts of Tennessee and Alabama today and forecasters warned that rivers may leave their banks in western and central Kentucky, but a break was predicted in the violent storm pattern that has spawned more than 300 tornadoes in two weeks.




Fair skies were the word early today from California across the southern half of the Plains into the Southeast. The showers that could be found were falling on parts of Washington state, the eastern Dakotas and the eastern

The Tennessee River crested Wednesday at nearly five feet above flood stage in Chattanooga, Tenn., where officials say about 400 people have been evacuated.

About 6,000 people evacuated when floodwaters rampaged through southern West Virginia and eastern Kentucky have begun returning to soggy mud-covered houses. Federal officials are expected at the area today to begin evaluating

Meanwhile, forecasters said the worst may still be ahead for central and eastern Kentucky. "We're not completely out of danger in the Green River area," said state Adjutant Gen. Billy G. Wellman.

would not comment on exactly how the cars were used in the reported fraud scheme.

Ginnetti's car dealership closed April 16, four days after the investigation into a possible fraud scheme began, Brune said. Warrants have not been filed

against other employees of Ginnetti's business, Brune said. "At this point, there is no indication that anybody else (from the com-

pany) was involved," Brune said. Law enforcement officials are still investigating how long the fraud might have been going on, Brune said.

Prior to opening his own business, Ginnetti was employed at

another local car dealership. However, Brune said he did not have any evidence that Ginnetti was involved in fraud before opening his own business. "I have no knowledge of other car dealers being involved in fraud," Brune said.

Lawienforcement officials have contacted the 118th District Attorney's office, but the investigation may not be completed in time to present to the next Howard County grand jury, Brune said.

District Attorney Rick Hamby said "it is a possibility" the matter will be presented to the next Howard County grand jury, scheduled for the end of the month.

The investigation is "far from complete," Brune said.

World Court orders U.S. News in brief to halt mining operation

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) - The World Court ordered the United States today to halt the mining of Nicaraguan harbors and other aggressive actions against Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista

The court, judicial arm of the United Nations, has no enforcement powers and depends on voluntary adherence to its rulings. The United States has said it would not accept the Court's jurisdiction in the case.

In a unanimous ruling, the 15-judge panel ruled that "the United States should cease and refrain from any actions in restricting, blocking or endangering the access to Nicaragua and from Nicaraguan ports and in particular the laying of

The court said in a separate ruling - from which a U.S. judge dissented - that "the right to sovereignty and political independence of Nicaragua should be respected like the sovereignty and political independence of any other state in the region or in the world, and that it should not be jeopardized by military or paramilitary actions."

The rulings were interim measures requested by Nicaragua while the court deliberates on the Sandinista government's complaint that the United States violated international law by supporting anti-Sandinista rebels and directing the mining of Nicaraguan harbors.

Under the Court's procedural statutes, it is empowered to take the interim measures when the sovereign rights of a nation are in jeopardy, even before final adjudication in a case.

Carlos Arguello, his country's chief representative at the Court, said that the Court decision was "a moral victory" for Nicaragua, and that the ruling of "a prestigious organ" like the World Court would have a "positive effect" on the Contadora peace

The Contadora group, consisting of Colombia, Venezuela, Panama, and Mexico, is negotiating with all Central American nations in an effort to reach a solution to the political, social, and military problems of the region.

Adams dies in Florida's electric chair

STARKE, Fla. (AP) - James Adams died in Florida's electric chair today for the beating death of a millionaire rancher more than a decade ago, becoming the fifth convict executed in the state since the death penalty was restored and the 19th nationwide

Adams, 47, was pronounced dead at 7:11 a.m. at the Florida State Prison, where four

other men have been put to death since May 1979. In a final statement, he urged other death row inmates to "keep on fighting."

He was convicted of the murder of Edgar Brown of Fort Pierce, a rancher and former St. Lucie County sheriff's deputy who was beaten to death during a Nov. 12, 1973, rob-

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
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

D'Aubuisson claims win

SAN SALVADOR - Roberto d'Aubuisson withdrew his far-right party from participation in the official count of presidential votes, charging U.S.-backed fraud, and said he would win if illegal ballots were thrown out.

D'Aubuisson, candidate of the Republican Nationalist Alliance, claimed at a news conference Wednesday that his party's tally shows he won 52 percent of the valid votes in Sunday's runoff election to 48 percent for moderate Jose Napoleon Duarte, a Christian Democrat.

No official results have been released, but Duarte claimed victory Monday, saying his party's figures showed he won about 55 percent of the vote.

"Our results are legal, theirs are fake," said d'Aubuisson.

D'Aubuisson also accused the U.S. State Department and the CIA of conspiring with the

Christian Democrats to fix the election. Khadaty appears on TV

TRIPOLI, Libya - Armed guards were stationed at roadblocks in Tripoli today after an unsuccessful attack against Col. Moammar Khadafy that the Libyan leader claims was supported by the United States.

Details of the attack still were sketchy two days after it occurred, but Khadafy clearly escaped

He was shown on Libyan television Wednesday, smiling and laughing as he toured a clothing store in downtown Tripoli. He joked in English that Britain had given up exporting clothing to Libya and instead was exporting terrorism.

He also blamed the United States and Sudan for backing Tuesday's attack.

Khadafy called President Reagan "the worst terrorist in the world" and said U.S.-trained Moslem Brotherhood extremists were responsible for the attack, according to reports from the French newspaper Le Monde and the Italian news

Stormy skies clearing

Floodwaters sweeping downstream today threatened to spill over their banks in western and central Kentucky as thousands of residents returned to soaked and mud-caked homes in West Virginia and eastern Kentucky, where damage was estimated at \$24.5 million.

Officials warned that the danger of flooding remained even though skies had cleared in the mountain region today. Rivers were brimming after three days of storms in Kentucky and in the Tennessee Valley of southern Tennessee and northern Alabama

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
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

Police policy fails to serve the public

Police here pick and choose what crimes they want to tell the public about. It is a policy, although it's not written down anywhere. We are reasonably certain it exists with the full knowledge and complicity of the city administration.

The policy does the public a disservice. By setting themselves up as the arbiter of what the public should be allowed to know, police are assuming that there is some benefit in less than 100 percent openness with the city's residents. We can see no such benefit.

Normal procedure calls for crimes to be notated as soon as they are reported on what is called the police blotter, simply a running log of police activity. If the crime is worthy of a news story, we seek the offense report, a sheet detailing the basic information about a crime: who, what, when, where and how. If it's a major crime, we ask for additional information sufficient to inform the public.

The blotter is a document open to the public under the Texas Open Records Act as interpreted by the state attorney general's office. If the crime does not show up on the blotter no one outside the police department knows it was committed until an arrest is made or some other law agency takes action on it later. Oftentimes, we find out about a crime that was left off the blotter through other sources. But this is not the way the system is supposed to work, and sometimes it is well after the fact. Late reporting does little good in warning the residents about criminal activity, which is one reason we print crime

When crimes are not recorded on the blotter, what people get is a distorted view of their city. If a case of rape or child molestation is withheld, people cannot act quickly to secure their homes and loved ones from another possible attack.

We understand the situation of the victim. In sensitive cases of sexual abuse we do not print the names of or otherwise specifically identify victims. It is important, though, to women to know a rape has occurred, and to parents to know that a child in the neighborhood has been molested. When this information is withheld by police, women and parents have no opportunity to take defensive measures.

That's what is so disturbing about the police department's stubborn stance in selectively listing the crimes of Big Spring. Police in other cities generally do not withhold reports about crime; we cannot understand why they insist on doing so here.

The million-dollar mind readers

WASHINGTON — In past columns, I have reported that the Pentagon is engaged in "Twilight Zone" research, using psychics to spy on the Soviet Union. Now I've learned that the Pentagon is spending \$1 million a year on the project and is sharing the results with the Central Intelligence Agency.

Weird though psychic espionage may seem, top-secret reorts from the CIA and Defense Intelligence Agency claim some remarkable successes for their long-distance mind readers. Psychics have "seen" things deep inside the Soviet Union that they couldn't possibly have known about. And their psychic sightings were later confirmed by spy satellites or human agents.

The Pentagon project, called "Grill Flame," is being conducted by SRI, a research institute, in Menlo Park, Calif. One source insisted that the project, which was begun before 1978, was officially killed in

But other sources told my assocaite Dale Van Atta that the project's apparent disappearance was simply a bookkeeping matter. The funding, which jumped from \$200,000 to \$1 million a year, was merely transferred from DIA's budget to the Pentagon's

general budget.
One of Grill Flame's project leaders is a respected physicist, Harold Puthoff. And the project's top psychic, Ingo Swann, is no tea-leaf reader. He's a cigar-smoking New York artist with an impressive record of successful "remote viewing.

He first got skeptical SRI researchers interested in 1973, when he used his unexplained psychic power to magnetometer off track. The researchers are convinced that Swann's feat could not have been

psychic project, which was called "Scanate." He and other psychics used their powers, with startling success, to "view" installations at secret locations, using geographical coordinates. Yet Swann has been relucant to promote "remote viewing" as a spy technique because it often produces bad information along with good.

Rep. Charles Rose, D-N.C., a sensible proponent of the Pentagon's psychic research program, is concerned that the intelligence community is pushing for quick results before the necessary scientific research is completed.

Sharing this opinion is Russell Targ, a former partner in the Scanate and Grill Flame projects. In fact, Targ reportedly quit the government-funded projects in 1982, partly because the CIA and DIA wanted to skip the longterm research and go for immediate

Targ also feels that the American people are entitled to know, insofar as possible, what their tax dollars have been paying for all these years. He has joined Keith Harary, a psychologist and psychic, in writing a book, "The Mind Race: Understanding and Using Psychic Abilities," which details and demystifies unclassified SRI experiments.

On a visit to Moscow, the authors learned that the Soviets had duplicated U.S. remote-viewing successes. "It was clear," Targ said, "that psychic research has been taken seriously at the highest level of the Soviet scientific community."

In fact, the Soviet interest has caused the CIA to start scrambling for a "psychic shield" to protect U.S. facilities and technicians from reverse remote

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

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
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WASHINGTON (AP) - An ebullient Richard Nixon, standing center stage once again with a speech before the nation's newspaper editors, predicted Wednesday that President Reagan will win a close election victory in November, saying "I wouldn't bet the ranch on it, but I would bet the main house.

And, he said, "unless the economy goes down, I wouldn't even bet the uthouse on Walter) Mondale.

Nixon, gesturing like the president of old, spoke

before the American Society of Newspaper Editors on his favorite subject, foreign policy. But it was during the question and answer session afterward that he warmed to domestic politics.

"I think it will be a closer election than the optimists in the Reagan campaign believe," he said. "I think Reagan will win. I think he will win because he is a better candidate.'

Nixon forecast a first-ballot victory by Mondale, who was vice president under President Carter, at the Democratic National Convention in July.

Alluding to his own bitter experience with televised debates in his losing campaign for the presidency against John F. Kennedy in 1960, Nixon said:

Mondale will win the debates, but Reagan will win the audience. I predict a Reagan victory in November — close vote. I wouldn't bet the ranch on it, but I would bet the main house."

It was the seventh time since 1954 that Nixon has addressed the society, but only the first time since he resigned the presidency in disgrace nearly 10 years ago because of the Watergate scandals.

Society president Creed Black, publisher of the Herald-Leader in Lexington, Ky., said Reagan and Vice President George Bush, as well as all three former presidents, were invited to speak. Of the three - Carter, Gerald Ford and Nixon only Nixon accepted.

The former president said the only question remaining at this stage of the Democratic campaign is who will be the vice presidential

Nixon predicted that Mondale "will bow to women, interview them and not take one ... a woman on the (Democratic) ticket wouldn't help. A woman on the

because they need them.' After saying that his predictions for the fall campaign would "sure be entertaining," Nixon offered his audience "a state-by-state analysis" of how the election will

He believes Mondale's running mate will be either Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado, his primary campaign rival, or Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of

"He has to make a decision how important Texas is to him," Nixon said. For Hart to be selected, he "Hart has to quit running against Mondale and start running against Reagan.'

The first question from the floor was from a California editor who said he had been in the audience at another newspaper convention 10 years ago when Nixon heatedly asserted that "I am not a crook He asked Nixon what lessons he had learned from Watergate.

"I lived through it," Nixon said, with some emotion. "I wrote about it at excruciating length, I went through the (television) interviews with David Frost and Frank Gannon. As far as I am concerned, I covered the subject as well and as honestly as I can. I want to talk about the future and not the past."

And then, in an echo of his 1974 State of the Union address, when he declared that "one year of Watergate is enough," Nixon told the editors: "Ten years of Watergate is enough.'

The line brought Nixon one of the few rounds of applause in his hourlong presentation.

Nixon was asked about his defense of his vice president, Spiro T. Agnew, during the recent Gannon interview televised on CBS-TV's "60 Minutes" program. Agnew resigned Oct. 10, 1973, after pleading no contest to a charge of federal income tax evasion.

"As far as I am concerned, he's suffered enough and I'm not going to stand here and kick him around again," Nixon said.

Nixon dwelled on the theme of his 1980 book, "The Real Peace," in saying that there is no chance for peace "unless there is established a new relationship between the Soviet Union and the United

States."
The former president said the United States wants to reduce tensions with the Soviet Union and "the Soviet Union needs to reduce tensions with the United States.'



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
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

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

Allergy kit needed for reactions

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am a 58-year-old male who has a very strong allergy to nuts of all kinds.

After eating even small bits that have been added to cakes, salads and ice cream, I become very ill. The first effet is within seconds, like tongue blisters. If I eat a bit more nuts than I suspect is present I soon become nauseated and in great distress. I vomit in about an hour. I also get hives on occasion. I

have had this problem since birth and hoped that it would improve with age, but now I find it getting worse. What helpful advice can you give, treatment, medicine, etc.? — Food allergies are more common

in children and we tend to outgrow them. I'm sorry your problem has been chronic and worsening. Seafoods, eggs, nuts and seeds lead the list of offending foods, so maybe you have to investigate more than just nuts as an allergy

I'm sure I don't have to stress avoidance, and I realize what a problem you face with all the hidden sources of these food offenders. I have to assume that you have suffered all these years silently, without seeking professional help and advice. Once a reaction has occurred, the medicines employed for food allergy are the same as the

ones used for respiratory allergies, like hay fever. Those are the antihistamines and steroids, on occasion. For respiratory distress, the bronchodilators are used.

I do hope you see an allergist. He can try to ferret out any other allergy-causing substances in the total reaction picture and he can provide you with a kit to be used in emergencies — such as a reaction that seriously affects breathing. The kit has a syringe pre-filled with adrenalin to abort an attack. You should talk this over with a doctor, for your reactions seem out of the ordinary and potentially dangerous

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
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Judge bars media from courtroom

district judge barred the media from an open court of inquiry on prostitution, saying that he was angered because a witness had been identified in news reports.

Judge John Delaney took the action Wednesday after telling the reporters that he held them responsible for any harm that might come to a witness who testified about alleged prostitution at a College Station-area establishment known as Babe's Mini-Movies.

"I had a vision of (the witness') body lying in a ditch covered with ants," said Delaney.

Attorneys for the Bryan-College Station Eagle asked the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals to overturn Delaney's order

Brazos County District Attorney Bill Turner asked reporters Tuesday not to use the woman's name, but Turner backed away from his request later in the day. Delaney never indicated that he expected the woman's name to be kept secret, the Eagle reported.

A court of inquiry is a special procedure used by prosecutors and the court to gather evidence concerning suspected crime. By state law, it is open to the public.

However, Delaney on Wednesday ordered reporters representing the Bryan-College Station Eagle, the Houston Chronicle. Bryan television station KBTX and College Station radio station WTAW to leave the hearing.

"I declare you no longer part of the public or this proceeding," Delaney said.

"You can crucify me, you can pillage me any way you want to, or you can make me look bad any way you can and, if the voters toss me out of office in four years, I'll go back to being a practicing attorney," the judge said.

Delaney recently was appointed to the judgeship after Bradley Smith resigned earlier this year. Smith, representing the Eagle, unsuccessfully argued for the judge to withdraw his order Wednesday. Attorney David Donaldson, of



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

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

and gave most of it to the poor. But now the admitted embezzler has repented and is asking the Revs. Jerry Falwell, Jimmy Swaggert and other TV evangelists to return the money she gave them.

"It appears none of the stolen money went to her own family, although there was a need," said James Epstein, an assistant district attorney in Mercer County. where Mrs. Chapin was prosecuted. "It's a very unusual

In tearful testimony, Mrs. Chapin said she had embezzled

Chapin stole \$160,000 from the rich of Jefferson Township, where the mother of four worked as a bookkeeper and her husband was a supervisor.

> The scheme went on for about "six or seven years," said Mrs. Chapin's attorney, public defender Lorinda Hinch, with the last theft occurring in October 1982. A company vice president discovered it.

> Howard Chapin never knew of his wife's activity, even though she embezzled by forging his signature on company checks, Ms. Hinch said. At least \$15,000 went to church and evangelistic organizations around the country, said Eps-

The groups are under no legal obligation to return the money, Epstein said, but most appear ready to do so.

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


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
