By most measures, Doggett is the liberal and Hance the conservative in the June 2 race that will produce a Democratic nominee for the U.S. Senate.

U.S. Rcp. Phil Gramm, who made use of political ads featuring testimonials by President Reagan, easily won the Republican nomination May 5.

The left-leaning wing of the party did well in 1982, with Democrats who preferred the tags "progressive" and "populist" tak- wins were confounded by some

ing several top state jobs. The Hance-Doggett event could be a 1984 update on the 1982 trend.

The 1982 victories by Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, Attorney General Jim Mattox, Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and Treasurer Ann Richards were less than clear signals that the more liberal wir.g had evicted the traditional conservatives in the party.

"It takes more than one race to say what the Democratic Party is," said Hightower. "After we all won they said, 'Oh my God, the Democratic Party is all of a sudden liberal.' That is hogwash.''

The 1982 progressive-populist

won a primary battle over conservative incumbent Warren Harding, who faced a misconduct indictment. Hightower's primary win was over conservative incumbent Reagan Brown, who was hurt by a well-publicized incident of Brown

saying "nigger" in public. The general election victories by Hightower, Mauro, Mattox and Mrs. Richards were attributed in part to the strong showings at the top of the ballot by middle-of-theroaders U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, Gov. Mark White and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby

#### Airpark auction bids goodbye to surplus

By CAROL BALDWIN Staff Writer

Id stoves, typewriters, desks, heavy machinery and vehicles were crammed into an old Air Force base hangar Saturday as hundreds of surplus dealers and bargain hunters gathered for a large-scale auction at the Big Spring Airpark.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars of goods were available during the auction, which was a combined effort of the Howard County Junior College District, the City of Big Spring, the Airpark and the Big Spring school district.

City Secretary Tom Ferguson, on hand at the hangar to watch the activities, said, "We usually have an auction once a year. This one has been a lot of work. We spent two weeks hauling things out here and setting up.

Ferguson explained that items sold off the auction are "surplus items. Property we have no use for" or property that has outlived its usefulness to the various agencies participating.

And while it may have outlived its usefulness in the minds of some, the bidding went quickly and the crowd at the Airpark was snatching up bargains as fast as they came before the auctioneer, Dub Bryant. Bryant, a retired furniture store owner, has been

an auctioneer for 25 years. He has been overseeing this auction for more than four years, Ferguson said. Bryant spent most of Saturday calling out dollar figures with a rapid-fire pace, but he took a minute to explain why he does what he does and how he learned

"I went into auctioneering because I went broke in the car business and I about starved to death,' Bryant said. "That was 25 years ago.

Bryant began as an auctioneer in Big Spring and has since built up a staff of seven, including his brother, Pete, who was on hand at the Air Park Saturday assisting his brother by calling out prices

"I learned by watching others and by practicing," Dub said. "They have schools, but I never went to

Bryant said he has worked as an auctioneer for 25 years because, "It's a good living." About noon, the late spring sun began shining

directly down on the long-time auctioneer as he moved the crowd out to the back of the hangar to heavy equipment setting on the concrete. He urged the crowd to hurry up the bidding and head back into the shadier hangar, which was cooled by fans.

And although he had been calling out prices for more than two hours, he said, "I don't get tired. You get used to it, and after you're used to it, it don't make you tired. Bryant kept a eye on all the items as they came up

for bids and were claimed by people in the audience. To the seasoned auctioneer, it was clear this was

Ferguson said the crowd at this year's auction was smaller than normal. "I don't know why. I think more people will be out later on."

Looking around at the large number of items still on the floor at noon, Ferguson said, "I don't know of anytime when we've not sold everything. We've always had good success."

Many of the buyers are surplus dealers who purchase in large quantities. Others are machine shop owners and small businessmen looking for office

Ferguson said any items remaining at closing time would be sold to surplus dealers offering the best

Sunny skies and temperatures in the 70s and 80s Saturday caused the heavy snowpack atop mountains in Utah and Colorado to start melting. The runoff pushed streams over their banks, and mudslides blocked highways.

In the East, a tornado touched down at a fairgrounds in Altamont, N.Y., 12 miles west of Albany, scattering people at a flea market and injuring at least 10 people.

Mudslides triggered by supersaturated soil blocked two highways and restricted travel on an interstate highway in the western half of Colorado, the state

An 1,800-foot mudslide in central Utah's Spanish Fork Canyon appeared to have stabilized Saturday, a day after it slipped off the canyon and filtered between about 40 homes, said Utah County sheriff's dispatcher Ralph Coones.

"It came right around some of the homes, but there was no damage to any of them," he said. "There's a lot of cleanup to be done, though.'

The rapid snowmelt is expected to continue into the early part of the week, the weather service said.




Except for a few showers scattered over portions of western Minnesota, western Iowa and western Missouri, sunny skies prevailed over most of the

Witness after witness stressed the importance of improving trade and helping border regions, but frequently their suggestions were general and sometimes conflicting.

Some witnesses referred to other states setting up new agencies and establishing foreign offices to promote exports. Others called such efforts costly and ineffective. The testimony was to a joint

meeting of the House State, Federal and International Relations Committee and the House **Business and Commerce Commit**tee, which are studying ways Texas can improve trade involving Texas products.

Because of the state's common Ms. Richards thinks the "real border with Mexico, a major focus economic crisis has severely hurt they held out little hope for fast

relief "It has been devastating," Barbara Chaney, new Texas Economic Development Commission member from El Paso, said of recent devaluations of the Mexican

Devaluations, she said, made shopping in Texas too expensive for many Mexican border residents and that caused many U.S. stores to close or cut back. Although she agreed the border economy should be diversified, she added: "We along the border, whether we like it or not, are heavily dependent on Mexican trade...We need to be less dependent, but we cannot forget that our backyard is Mexico."

Ms. Chaney, a bank executive, said in the long run there are reasons to be optimistic about the Texas border region. The development of twin-plants, whereby U.S. goods are sent to plants in Mexico for assembly and then returned, has helped both sides of the border,

#### Haunted house fire kil

JACKSON TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) - Investigators poked through the ruins of an amusement park's Haunted Castle attraction Saturday, seeking the cause of a fire that killed eight people trapped in a narrow, dimly lit maze of metal trailers.

Eight others were injured in the fire Friday night at the Six Flags Great Adventure Park.

Seven of the bodies were found huddled together and the eighth was a short distance away, Ocean County Prosecutor Edward Turnbach said Saturday. A spokesman for Great Adventure, Glenn Vallach,

said neither he nor investigators could explain why the victims had been unable to get out. Vallach said he had heard rumors that some patrons believed the fire was part of the attraction. Preliminary examinations indicated seven of the victims were male and one was a female, Turnbach said. Four of the victims, all of whom were believed

to be teen-agers, were tentatively identified, he Vallach said Six Flags had held a drill at the Haunted Castle on April 1. He also said all attractions at the park were inspected by fire officials

April 14 and approved as safe. There were no sprinklers in the Haunted Castle, he

Jackson Township Mayor William Schreiber said he had no concerns about safety at the park. "You people would have to come here when there is not a tragedy to see how well it is run," he told reporters.

On Saturday, thousands of tourists attending Family Christian Day at the park were prevented from viewing the burned-out attraction by a makeshift plywood wall 6 feet high.

Telephone calls to the park dwindled as most of the anxious parents whose children were among the park's 20,000 visitors Friday evening were reunited with their youngsters.

'The switchboard was overloaded all night. Any person who had a child who was even late or slept over at someone's house was concerned," said Police Commissioner Richard Borys.

Investigators have not ruled out arson as a possible cause, Borys said Saturday. Turnbach said the investigation of the fire was continuing and "we have no suspicions of anything as to cause.

The fire struck the 17 metal trailers that make up the Haunted Castle and spread quickly as winds fanned the flames. Firefighters said the blaze reached heights of 100 feet and temperatures inside the trailers reached up to 2,000 degrees.

At the start of one of the most dramatic rebel exploits in the capital in four years, the guerrillas tried to hold up El Tiempo grocery store on the south side of the capital, but the attempt was foiled when two police cars arrived at the scene.

After a brief gunbattle at 6:30 p.m. Friday, the rebels retreated inside, forcing 20 store employees and 52 shoppers to lie face down on the floor of a back room while the gunmen negotiated

It looks like a special session of the Texas Legislature will come to pass this summer to address a topic Texans haven't had to face in any significant manner for a decade — raising taxes

Gov. Mark White is moving cautiously, working to line up support for his tax hike proposals with the decision whether to even call the summer session riding on the outcome. But even in an election year, we think the consensus will be that increased revenues are essential.

A tax increase in one or more areas, in a little or a bigger bite, is probably inevitable if Texas is going to forge ahead in the '80s. The money to be generated is earmarked for education and highways, both areas in need of a financial shot.

Among the proposals White trial-ballooned Friday are a 5-cent per gallon boost in gasoline taxes; a 20 percent increase in taxes on liquor, wine, beer and mixed drinks; and a 5-cent a pack tax on cigarettes, with one penny of that going to cancer research. These are all likely candidates for generating additional revenues.

The gasoline tax in Texas is among the lowest in the nation, and a 5-cent across-the-board boost is a relatively painless moneymaker. The "sin" tax increases, while destined to be fought by the respective lobby groups, are hard to argue against. They are guaranteed sources of additional revenue, without a valid counterargument that they will hurt the poor or constitute repressive taxation. Consumers can simply cut their consumption a corresponding amount if they wish.

Texas has long been known for fine roads and excellent access. The additional gasoline tax revenues will guarantee this deserved praise continues. And while the package of recommendations of the Perot Committee on Education has been controversial, one truth in education reform is the need to spend more money on schooling our children. A major concern is teacher pay, where better compensation will reward the dedicated teachers and attract those who are talented but unwilling to enter an underpaid profession.

My jailmates during my cell so-journ will be City Manager Don Davis, Police Chief Rick Turner and school Superintendent Lynn Hise. That's the humiliating part.

I was sentenced two months ago when the directors of the Rainbow Project, a shelter for abused children, asked me to participate

in a fund-raising event. They said they were going to imprison several locals and hold them in a makeshift jail until someone made their bail. The bail money would go to the Rainbow Project. "So you want to put me in jail so people will come bail me out?" I

'Are you kidding? We want you because everyone will cough up cash to keep you in jail," the directors said. "You could make our

budget for the next two years." At first I thought this Quigmans backlash, a vengeful plot in retaliation for my thorough thrashing of the cartoon in a

an unassailable argument: "We really want you out there to show the people we really care about kids and we don't want any of

them growing up to be like you."
I go behind bars at 1 p.m. If you love kids and hate me, put your



The movie rating system is out of date. Advances in makeup and costuming and the propensity of directors to liven their movies with grossly ghoulish monsters makes it imperative that an "S" factor be added to the rating system.

"S" is for scary. Considerable care is taken in screening the movies our young children watch on the premium channels we've beamed into our home. These are movies that are uncut and commercial free, both of which can be problems for parents of kids. Since they are not "edited for television" we must take pains to know what channel is on when, and since they are commercialfree we have no built-in break times to refill water glasses or take care of other needs children fre-quently have.

PG — parental guidance — rated films are the biggest problem. Some are suitable for kids, some are not. We hate to deprive the children of a movie they may love and which is only minimally a problem for their age level; but it's

Love ya, Ma This story is an unabashed love

letter to my mother. If you're not in the mood for something mushy, or if the sen-timental tends to sicken you, you might as well skip on over to Buchwald.

It is a hard story to tell, because it's very personal. But it explains why I will think of my mother with a special love this coming Mother's

Day.
The story begins more than 10 years ago.

It was not that I, at the age of 16, was unprepared for the death of my grandfather - my mother's father - so much that I couldn't relate to death as a concept.

Being so young, I was callous to the depth of her feelings for this man, who, as she has only told me recently, had been such a stern father

With a deep sense of guilt, I now understand her hurt when I told her would rather not attend her father's funeral. I remember saying something flowery along the lines that I would rather remember Grandpa as he had been, not as the encased corpse he had become.

I thought such sentiments would

sound adult and caring, coming from a sixteen-year-old, but it was a bunch of bolshoi. It's sad to say that I was more moved by the thought of the unchaparoned parties I could have during the three days my parents were out of town for the funeral.

It is really no surprise that, with what I remember to be the speed of light, my father shuffled me from the room. He informed me in no uncertain terms that I was going and there would be no argument. Looking back, it is also no sur-

prise that I was shut out of the ilness and death of my mother's brother several years later.

I had just returned from overseas and the letters I had received from home made small references to Uncle Bud's illness, but did not let on.

I was unaware of its severity until I came home and my father pulled me aside to say it looked pretty bad, but there was really no need for me to become involved.

No reason to become involved! I still wonder at his motives for telling me this. Was he simply trying to protect me from the pain of another death? I cringe to think that it was perhaps my mother he was protecting. I had been so hurtful and selfish during the last family death, was he wondering if I could be trusted to take part in this

Daily, she went to the hospital to take care of him, to simply be with Mother and Dad saved me from

involvement in Bud's death and I let them do it. I did little else than meet them in Oklahoma for the A few years later, this past sum-



#### Regent raps prof clothes

HOUSTON (AP) - Professors who dress "like mechanics" are setting a bad example for students at Texas Southern University, a member of the board of regents

"Some TSU law professors come to class dressed in blue jeans and sandals, or dirty mechanic's clothes and that's no way to set an example or be role models for our young blacks," Regent Naomi Andrews said during a board committee meeting Friday.

Most Texas Southern students are black.

"I have observed they come to school looking like mechanics," Mrs. Andrews said of the professors

Mrs. Andrews, who did undergraduate work at Texas Southern in the late 1950s, was awarded her law degree from the school last year. She said the board ought to consider a policy that encourages acceptable dress.

"I'm nct suggesting a formal dress code but what I saw while in law school and on the campus was simply deplorable," she said.
"Many of my law school classmates complained about the way the faculty dressed. How can one set an example that way?"

The board took no action on her


School President Leonard Spearman said he has been concerned about the dress habits of some faculty members, who he said were "children of the 1960s" who grew up rebelling against established practices of the day, some of which

had to do with modes of dress. He said teachers should take every opportunity to prepare students for what to expect in the professional world, but stopped

short of advocating a dress code. "We can't tell them how to dress cern," board attorney Ted An-

drews said. Law school Dean James Douglas said it is especially important for teachers to serve as role models for students preparing for professional

Hale's accomplishments came despite missing almost two weeks of workouts due to time spent showing livestock and some minor injuries.



#### Tech-bound athlete under pressure

TUCUMCARI, N.M. (AP) - This is the story of life and death and the system that killed Rod David.

David, 18, was an all-sports star at Tucumcari (N.M.) High School. On April 9, he took a shotgun and with one squeeze of the trigger, snuffed out a life headed for the stars. He was to enroll at Texas Tech this fall on a football scholarship

The questions lay the blame on critical opponents whose insidious remarks drove "Roddie" to the brink of destruction

'Roddie was such a loving boy,' said Ward David, "he never could understand why those people didn't like him.

'Those people' blame Ward David, a strong willed man who once played basketball at the University of Nebraska, for pushing his son too hard into

In truth, neither party si ould bear the brunt of the blame, according to Dr. Josh Kaplan, psychiatrist working with Tucumcari youths to make sure no such tragedy occurs again in the community

"Even with parental pressure, the decision is the victim's,

But if the victim is condemned, shouldn't the system at least be tried? Kay David, Rod's mother, believes so "If the kids could just have

fun...play sandlot ball without their parents around to rile them up, I think they'd be a dot better off, Rod David was the kind of boy

who had his life before him and nothing but backslaps and handshakes behind him. A two-time allstate performer in football and basketball, and a state recordholder in the long jump, David was considered by some to be New Mexico's top schoolboy athlete this

He was cut from the same kind of cloth as Jack Armstrong. The kind of son any family would adore.

David had a fractured and failing relationship to hold on to His mother and father had split up during his high school years and a testy relationship with his 16-year-old girlfriend had evaporated.

But as in all things this complex, the reasons for Rod David's demise went much deeper than that. As far ack, perhaps, as his freshman year at Tucumcari High when he was elevated to the Rattler varsity football team.

A trip to the varsity from the junior varsity at the ripe old age of 16 is a treacherous flight.

'You're taking him away from his friends, and then there is the question of higher expectations, said coach J.D. Hawkins, who was out of town the day David shot

In David's case, there was always the question of higher expectations. Both his brothers, Mick and Stan, were well-known athletes at Tucumcari before him. Stan recently completed an all-Southwest Conference year as a Texas Tech defensive back.

"I think what the problem was, maybe some of his family wanted him to emulate his brothers," said Hawkins

That was precisely what young David did not want to do. He purposely made two Bs his freshman year so his grade-point would not be compared with Stan's 4.0 overall GPA his senior year

Rod wanted to play quarterback at Tech so he would not have to follow in Stan's footsteps. And Tech Coach Jerry Moore was perfectly willing to let him try

'We had recruited him primarily as a defensive back, but we were going to let him come in here and

try his hand at quarterback, too,'

Moore said. There were some who believed David probably would have preferred to play basketball, and others who believed he was never really that intense about sports all along

"Stan did this and Stan did that, said Coach Mike Sparaco of rival Raton (N.M.) High School Maybe Rod just wanted to be a regular high school kid with regular high school kid problems: Boots Rabb, who as sports editor

of the Quay County Sun has covered David's every move the last four years, recalled a conversation he had had with one of the youngster's good friends four years

'They had a summer softball league, and he (Gary Montano) had stopped by with the scorebook one night," Rabb said. "We got to talking about Rod, and he said he wouldn't be surprised if Rod wasn't around in four years.

Obviously, Montano was not talking in literal terms, but athletically. Nobody could foretell David's death. But apparently then it was clear to see Ward David's overbearing nature was having an







#### After bout with Howard

#### Leonard retires again

WORCESTER, Mass. (AP)-Another pot of gold was there for Sugar Ray Leonard to grab. He walked away. Leonard came back from a

27-month layoff Friday night with a nine-round victory over Kevin Howard, then retired again, saying, "It's just not there."
"He's the only man in the world

who can walk away from that amount of money," said Pat Petronelli.

Petronelli, the co-manager of Mavelous Marvin Hagler, the undisputed middleweight champion, said negotiations had been nearly finalized for a fight, which would guarantee Leonard and Hagler each \$11 million.

Leonard has made between \$38 and \$43 million in the ring.

"It's one of those things," said Hagler. "I think he did the right

"My confidence wasn't there," said Leonard, who was knocked down in the fourth round for the first time in his 33-bout pro career. "My ability was. I was apprehensive at being hit. I had cold feet."

"I'm not taking chances with my health and family," said Leonard, who had retired Nov. 9, 1982, following surgery for a detached retina of the left eye. Last Feb. 13, he had undergone treatment to strengthen the retina of his right

"I'm pleased I won, but not with my actual performance," said Leonard, who left the ring to a chorus of boos from an announced crowd of 10,401 at the 13,866-seat Centrum

"They knew he wasn't going to win. That's why they stopped it," World Boxing Council title victory said the 23-year-old Howard. over Wilfred Benitez in 1979, his the fight at 2:28 of the ninth round with Howard in deep trouble, but

still on his feet. Howard was behind on all three official cards and would have needed a knockout in the 10th, and final round, to win.

"Remember, we were in Hagler's ranch," Angelo Dundee, Leonard's manager, said of the crowd's reaction. Hagler lives at Brockton, Mass., about 55 miles

"The crowd was upset," said the former undisputed welterweight champion. "I can't go on humiliating myself."

Leonard, who will be 28 next Thursday, said he reached the decision to retire when he was knocked down by a right to the jaw. "I looked at my wife to see if she was OK," he said. "It hit me:

'What am I doing?' It's just not there. In the corner, I felt it wasn't there. I have retired for good." However, Leonard didn't announce his decision to retire until after talking to his wife, Juanita,

who is eight months pregnant, and to his 11-year-old son, Ray Jr. After they arrived in his dressing room, he talked to them privately. There were no tears, no loud talk, said someone who was there

Leonard then met the news media and announced his decision. There was no day-after news conference as there had been after so

Referee Richard Flaherty halted revenge win over Roberto Duran in 1980 and his 14th-round stoppage of Thomas Hearns for the undisputed welterweight championship in

The Hearns fight was the crowning moment of a career which Leonard was reluctant to begin.

After winning a gold medal at the 1976 Olympics in Montreal, Leonard said he had achieved his But family health problems caus-

ed him to change his mind, and he launched his dazzling career Feb. 5, 1977 with a six-round decision over Luis "The Bull" Vega at Baltimore.

Leonard's career reportedly ended with a third-round knockout of Bruce Finch on Feb. 15, 1982.

Leonard was scheduled to defend the title against Roger Stafford May 14, 1982 at Buffalo, N.Y., bt on May 9, Leonard underwent surgery for the detached retina. On Nov. 9. he announced his retirment

His record was 32-1, with 23 knockouts. He had the undisputed welterweight title and the World Boxing Association junior middleweight title, which he relinquished without defending.

Leonard's place in boxing lore was secure.

However, the itch for fighting returned and last Dec. 10 after a six-round exhibition at Andrews Air Force Base near Washington. Leonard announced his comeback.

as he stepped out of bounds, two Raton players "drilled him," according to Sparaco.

Sparaco admitted Ward David was right.

"Rod was a most gifted athlete. His only problem was his ego. His attitude was his only liability," he "Rod came up swinging and we said. "We always knew if we could keep the pressure on him, get him rattled, he'd start pointing fingers.

# Red Cross is 'people helping people'

The phrase, "people helping people," best describes the work of the American Red Cross and its Howard-Glasscock County Chapter. But many people don't realize what the Red Cross actually does, local chapter member Edith Gay said

The Red Cross provides emergency reporting services to the military for U.S. Armed Forces members and veterans. The service is available when information is needed by military authorities making decisions about emergency leave or emergency extension of leave and to family members unable to talk directly with the service member during a crisis because normal channels of communication are disrupted.

In addition, the service also is provided to service members who can't communicate directly about a home situation or who need to check on a home situation for leave or other purposes

'They (the military member) don't get emergency leave if the parent calls and says the father died,' said Marianne Brown, a member of the local Red Cross board of directors. Mrs. Brown operates a telephone-answering service for emergency calls related to this service.

The American Red Cross also handles any emergency leave. After the family calls the local chapter, the information is passed on to Mrs. Brown, who verifies the emergency and-or details of funeral arrangements.

Then she relays the information to the Red Cross representative where the serviceman is stationed, who works with the serviceman's company commander to make leave and travel arrangements.

Mrs. Brown enjoys the job, she says, because she is able to help people "I LOVE THIS JOB. I really do. It's nice. I follow

up on it and ask if there is something else I can do. (The family) is alone and they think their world is gone sometimes. I've been in situations where I needed help, and it's good to know someone can help," Mrs. Brown said.

Red Cross policy requires a doctor's statement when a birth, death or illness occurs in the family, before the message will be relayed, she said.

"Doctors often don't realize that it is the procedure when the Red Cross calls and interupts their work. But it is part of the requried process we have to go through to get someone a message and help the family," Mrs. Brown said.

The same Red Cross service provides a health and welfare report for families who have lost contact with a relative in the armed forces. Red Cross tracks down the person and transmits the message to call home. Red Cross also sends fathers news of a birth.

If the military member is unaware of his family situation before he or she receives an emergency message, the Red Cross representative will counsel

The Red Cross also provides financial assistance in emergency situations under the following conditions. Emergency Travel Fund money is loaned to military members traveling home on emergency leave with no money.

Military dependents are alloted part of the serviceman's salary. If it doesn't arrive on time and creates a financial burden, the Red Cross tries to help, Mrs. Brown said.

"Sometimes you can call the landlord or utilities. Since you are the Red Cross, they believe you and try to work things out. Sometimes the Red Cross loans money," Mrs. Brown said.

Red Cross advances money to servicemen in transit to a new station if they have problems. It also provides invitational travel orders for the next of kin of a seriously ill military member stationed overseas.

Transportation costs are paid by the military. But if a relative doesn't have money to pay for transportation to the "port of military departure," the local

penses not covered by the military THIS RED CROSS service is offered round-theclock, Mrs. Brown said. Although she keeps office hours at North Side Center where she works, an anwering machine takes calls during the other

"That doesn't mean a Red Cross worker isn't available," she said. She contacts her anwering machine frequently to receive messages, she said. "I want people to leave a number where they can be reached when they call," to help her contact them,

Another Red Cross service is disaster relief.

'Should there be a disaster — fire, floods, tornado, hail storm or anything that would destroy people's shelter — they need food and clothing," says Louise Nuckolls, a local member who has helped with the Wichita Falls tornado, the St. Louis flood and smaller local disasters

"If a fire destroys a home, we try to get in there immediately and give them a replacement of clothing and food. If they can live in the place while it's being repaired, they may need bedding if the bedding is destroyed," she said "The disaster relief committee of the Red Cross operates by meeting the immediate emergency needs of food, clothing or maybe shelter.

"If something happened here, a tornado, the Red Cross first would get a shelter set up in a school auditorium or church's Fellowship Hall. It would be opened up to people who need immediate shelter and would feed them and see that they receive medical attention," Mrs. Nuckolls said.

"It (Red Cross) would set up a service center so (its) workers could fill out the applications for help for each family. The families would need food, clothing and shoes," she said. "The first 24 to 48 hours after a disaster is a madhouse.

TO PROVIDE the necessities, Red Cross issues a disbursement order to grocery or clothing stores for clothing, food or whatever is needed immediately. Each person receives an allotment in a disbursement order, which is like a blank check, Mrs.

Local merchants keep a running bill of what each individual spends, Mrs. Nuckolls said. Afterwards, the merchant sends the bill to the American Red

Cross office in Washington, D.C. for reimbursement. Last fall, the back bedroom and bathroom of a family's home on Benton were completely distroyed by fire. A divorced daughter and her children were living in the bedroom. They were able to share rooms with other family members; therefore, they didn't

have to move. To provide the woman clothing, shoes and toilettries, Mrs. Nuckolls issued a disbursement order at K-mart, she said.

"The merchants will cooperate with you real well," she said. "In addition to accepting the disbursement order, K-mart donated \$50 worth of linens for the woman's needs. I just thought that was

When that portion of the home was rebuilt, the Red Cross and Salvation Army worked together to give the woman bedroom furniture, Mrs. Nuckolls said. The Red Cross also provides nursing services dur-

ing disasters, often to elderly victims who have lost their glasses, dentures or medications. WHEN A DISASTER occurs in another area, Red Cross field directors call each chapter to ask if they

have someone who can help. Volunteers from throughout the United States assist with major Individual and business contributions are made to the American Red Cross. Forty-six percent of the income raised by each chapter goes to the national

headquarters for the organization's disaster relief fund to handle disasters and to pay the headquarter employee's salaries. The national office reimburses the disaster teams for their expenses in taking care of disaster victims.

Red Cross certified instructors. The course instructs people in what steps to take during a medical emergencies where CPR could be used

Local Red Cross chapters also offer several courses in first aid, water safety, small craft safety, nursing and health, youth services, safety aide program and instructor training. These courses are provided to promote individual well-being, to save human lives, and to prevent or reduce human suffer-The classes teach skills that enable students to avoid, be prepared for and cope with simple accidents that may occur in daily life, as well as lifethreatening emergencies, and caring for ill family

"THE RED CROSS has had organized, trained first-aid instruction from the word go," says Dale Young, who keeps records on any first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training performed by the local chapter

Today's courses include multi-media instruction: a film, lectures, practice session and instruction

"Each student upon completing a Red Cross course is issued a wallet-size certificate card," he said. "Red Cross has always tried to fill a need for mankind in peacetime, wartime and any other type of emergency

The local chapter has courses in first aid, CPR, swimming and lifesaving. Due to its small size and financial health, it is unable to provide instruction in several courses provided by larger chapters

Terri McIntosh, a certified lifesaving instructor, teaches the Red Cross lifesaving and swimming classes at her home. She offers the instruction because "they didn't have anybody certified to teach Red Cross swimming. I wanted to see more Red Cross programs in this town.'

"A lot of places won't hire a lifeguard unless they have a Red Cross certified lifeguard certificate,' Young said. "I really believe in the Red Cross. They do a lot of

great thngs," Mrs. McIntosh said.



Are they Protestant, Catholic, or something in between? Call them anything you please. Episcopalians are Protestant because their forebears were among the leaders of the Protestant Reformation in 16th-Century England. But the word "Catholic" means "universal"...and Episcopalians are quick to embrace the universality of all Christian denominations. They do not believe that heaven is reserved for those who agree, jot and tittle, with their par-

What place does the Bible occupy in the Episcopal faith? It's central. No Episcopalian is required to accept any belief that doesn't agree with Holy Scripture.

ticular views

Then why do they use a Prayer Book? The Episcopal Book of Common Prayer serves several purposes. It's an excellent key to understanding the Bible. It assures reading and teaching in church solely from the Bible; it's a complete guide to worship.

The word "common" in the title means "together." Episcopalians pray and praise God together, believing-as they do-that worship is no spectator sport. Thanks to the Prayer Book. their services cannot be dominated by the minister's

Then why the need for instruction and confirmation? In the Episcopal church, confirmation marks the renewal of baptismal vows.

Thus the promises made for a child in baptism are confirmed by the candidate himself in a spirit of matured Christian conviction.

Correspondingly, the service signifies a confirmation, on God's part, of His promise of salvation.

Simple instruction by the clergy assures an understanding of the Church's basic beliefs and customs before the candidate assumes the responsibilities of communicant status.

Does this mean they have a "closed" communion? Not at all, although the Episcopal church regards communion as a true sacrament and not just a memorial. Any baptised person is welcome to join in an Episcopal communion service if his own church's discipline permits him to do so.

Are visitors welcomed to Episcopal services? Absolutely. At any service. It's customary for Episcopalians to remain quiet until they're outside the church, which explains why some visitors look on them as unfriendly. Just stick around after the service. There's usually cof-

fee in the nearby parish hall ... and plenty of opportunity to get acquainted. Feel free to ask the minister for an appointment to discuss anything you find puzzling about the Episcopal faith. He'll be delighted...and wouldn't think of "twisting your arm" to join his church. That sort of decision must come from you, or it loses meaning

pulse rate of 70. I have heard you subtract your age from 220 and take 70 percent of that figure to arrive at the proper exercise heart rate you must sustain for 15-20 minutes. - D.M.S. The formula you quote is a common one. Pulse or heart rate (same thing) is a convenient way to

measuring equipment and for the less scientific Borg Scale (see letter above) A 65-year-old raising his heart to 110 beats a minute assures himself aerobic benefits. You don't have to raise it any higher than that assuming you are using the scale to which you refer. And I hope you have approval for your exercise from your physician. Even following such a formula, as safe as it may seem, can be ontraindicated for certain out-of-shape individuals.

Now I can give you a more complicated formula. Subtract your pulse rate at rest from the maximum pulse rate attainable by a 65-year-old, which is 175. For you that would be 70 from 175, which will give you 105. Take 30 to 45 percent of that number (the 105) and you get a range of 31 to 47. That's the number of beats per minute you have to achieve over your resting pulse to get aerobic benefit.

Again for you, that is 70 plus 31 (for a total of 101 beats a minute) measure aerobic capacity and the up to 70 plus 47 (for a total of 117 aerobic effect of exercise. It's a beats a minute). In short, you can substitute for very expensive raise your heart rate to anywhere between 101 and 117 beats per minute and have a good aerobic effect on your cardiovascular
