## for tax increases

It looks like a special session of the Texas Legislature will come to pass this summer to address a topic Texans haven't axes.
Gov. Mark White is moving cautiously, working to line up support for his tax hike proposals with the decision whether to in an election year, we think the consensus will be that increased revenues are essential
A tax increase in one or more areas, in a little or a bigger bite, is probably inevitable if Texas is going to forge ahead in the '80s. The money to be generated is earmarked for education and highways, both areas in need of a financial shot. Among the proposals White trial-ballooned Friday are a
5-cent per gallon boost in gasoline taxes; a 20 percent increase 5-cent per gallon boost in gasoline taxes; a 20 percent increase pack tax on cigarettes, with one penny of that going to cancer research. These are all likely candidates for generating additional revenues.
The gasoline tax in Texas is among the lowest in the nation, and a 5 -cent across-the-board boost is a relatively painless
moneymaker. The "sin" tax increases, while destined to be moneymaker. The "sin" tax increases, while destined to be
fought by the respective lobby groups, are hard to argue against. They are guaranteed sources of additional revenue, without a valid counterargument that they will hurt the poor or constitute repressive taxation. Consumers can simply cut their consumption a corresponding amount if they wish. Texas has long been known for fine roads and excellent access. The additional gasoline tax revenues will guarantee this
deserved praise continues. And while the package of recommendations of the Perot Committee on Education has been controversial, one truth in education reform is the need to spend more money on schooling our children. A major concern is teacher pay, where better compensation will reward the dedicated teachers and attract those who are talented but unwilling to enter an underpaid profession.
