Construction in Big Spring took a \$420,000 jump last month over April's total, keeping building levels in the city during this fiscal year well ahead of last year's pace. However, last month's figure is about one third of the \$1.26 million

figure logged in May, 1983. The figures are based on monthly reports of building permits issued by the city Public Works

Department. Permits for about \$7.2 million in construction have been filed with the department so far this fiscal year. Year-to-date figures for May of last fiscal year show that permits were filed for a total \$5.9 million in construction.

Leading all permits in the department's May report was a \$100,000 concrete and brick addition for Big Spring Cable TV at 2004 Birdwell Lane. Construction on the addition began two weeks ago and is estimated to be completed by Sept. 1, Randy Rodgers, Cable TV manager, said this morning.

"As I'm sure almost everyone in Big Spring knows, it's way overdue. We've been operating in a much smaller space that we

should," Rodgers said. The new construction will expand parking at the business by 15 places and more than triple the amount of the business' customer service space, he said.

Other new commercial construction in the report included a permit filed by Bert Sheppard of S&H Floor Covering for a \$60,000, 4,800 square-foot metal building at 3210 11th Place.

Also included was a permit filed by Robert P. Shaffer of One-Hour Martinizing for a \$26,000, 1,750 square-foot dry cleaning establishment at the corner of 18th and

In addition, Granville Hahn of the Co-Exx Pipe Co. filed a permit for a \$15,000, 3,200 square-foot concrete slab building to be constructed at 714 Anna. Hahn said the building will be used for pipe

In residential construction, Byron Harris filed a permit for a 2,176 square-foot brick home to be built at 2800 Crestline, and Bob Brock filed a permit for a 559 square-foot addition to his home at 512 Scott. Estimated cost of the Harris home was \$70,000. The Brock addition was listed at \$39,500



# Weather-Heavy rain noted

MIDLAND — The drought is over for parts of parched West Texas, but several areas of the state are still aching for moisture, the National Weather Service says.

Heavy thunderstorms dumped almost 2 inches of rain on Midland and Odessa Monday, spawning a few unusual morning tornadoes and flooding some city streets.

Forecaster Jack Nunan said the rain, during a five-hour period Monday morning, brought the annual rainfall for 1984 to just under 6 inches, about normal for this time of

"You can pin that rainfall down to just the past few days, most of it anyhow," Nunan said. Last year, the area received about 10 inches, compared

to a 30-year average of 13.7, he said.

A weather service reporter in the Davis Mountains said a small shower brought about 0.1 of an inch and there was a significant thunderstorm early this morning in the vicinity of Fort Davis.

Thunderstorms continued to dump rain over Central Texas early today. Most of the heavy rains were located between the Waco and the Austin areas, with amounts of 3 inches recorded by early today in and around Austin.

Another cluster of thunderstorms occurred early today along the lower Rio Grande to the west and north of McAllen

Temperatures this morning were mostly in the 60s and

The weather service said scattered thunderstorms were likely to continue over the south, the central and the eastern sections of the state. But the clouds so far have skipped the Big Bend and

High Plains areas of West Texas, which have faced disaster conditions since last year. The drought also has extended this year through South Central Texas. Two-thirds of Texas — 166 counties — is already eligible


for emergency drought assistance, and state officials have estimated the drought gripping West Texas has caused \$7 billion in damages.


The dry heat has devastated cotton crops and forced many cattle ranchers to sell their thirsty herds early.

# Soil erosion takes toll

AUSTIN (AP) — Due in part to the continung drought, wind erosion has increased in Texas this year with 147 counties suffering damage to more than 1 million acres, the state agriculture depart-

Andy Welch, spokesman for the Texas Department of Agriculture, Monday said a federal soil conservation survey indicates that damage occurred to 1.34 million acres in 147 Texas counties between Nov. 1, 1983 and Feb. 29, 1984.

That is up from 311,000 acres damaged in the same four-month period the previous year, he said. About 86 percent of that is cropland and 12 percent rangeland, he added.

"We have suffered damage in this four-month period to an amount of soil that is equal in size to the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex and the greater Houston metropolitan area combined,' Welch said.

"I think a lot of people noticed an unusual amount of dust in the air this spring. Some people in Austin have joked that 'it must be Big Spring blowing in.' In fact, it was," he

Welch said there are several factors responsible for the erosion. The drought, now in a second year, has caused much of the

which depleted the soil of additional moisture. He said the federal Payment-in-Kind program kept much land idle and without a crop to hold the soil

damage. So did the winter freeze,

"In the Panhandle area with the spring winds, in one place road crews literally had to take bulldozers and clear soil off parts of the roadway," he said.

Time has just about run out for arranging mail-order ticket sales and advertising for June 22, said Bill Pickett, an official with Lexington Center, where the arena is located. "The following weekend is still possible," he added.

Jackson's mother, Katherine, announced two weeks ago that the six brothers would open their tour June 22 in Lexington. But Rupp Arena operations director Bill Humphrey said the arena still had no contract Monday afternoon.

No other tour dates have been announced. Jackson fans from across the nation have besieged the Rupp Arena switchboard with ticket requests, but Humphrey said no tickets could be sold until a contract is signed.

# A chimp off the old block

WASHINGTON - Jane Goodall, one of the world's leading authorities on chimpanzees, has

won the \$50,000 J. Paul Getty Wildlife Conservation Prize for helping "millions of people understand the importance of wildlife conservation to life on this planet," says the president of the World Wildlife Fund-U.S.

Dr. Goodall is best known for her pioneering research on chimpanzees in Africa. She has written several books on chimpanzees, and her work has been featured in films by the

JANE GOODALL National Geographic Society.

"She is indeed ... one to whom we look for continued guidance in preserving and protecting our natural environment," Russell Train, the fund president, said Monday.

Born in England, Dr. Goodall has spent her career researching primates throughout Africa. She makes ner home in Tanzania, where she is based at the Gombe Stream Research Center.

She is scheduled to receive the Getty prize, which has been awarded since 1974, at a ceremony in Washington later this month.

BALTIMORE - Plans are afoot to revive the "Saturday Night Club," H.L. Mencken's impromptu beer and musical entertainment sessions, when the rowhouse where the writer spent most of his life opens to the public.

The three-story west Baltimore house is scheduled to open June 15 as a museum and entertainment and reception center.

Mencken is "probably getting a good chuckle in his grave" over the plans, said Jeanne Fetting, who directed the project.

Henry Louis Mencken, born in 1880, moved to the house with his family at age 3 and lived there most of his life. He died in 1956.

Mencken, who worked for the Baltimore Morning Herald and the Baltimore Sun, is known for his coverage of the Scopes monkey trial in Dayton, Tenn., in 1925, his pungent commentaries and his editing of the literary magazines Smart Set and American Mercury. He also championed American authors such as Theodore Dreiser, Sherwood Anderson, Eugene O'Neill and Sinclair

TEGUCIGALPA (AP) The United States has built or upgraded seven military airstrips, put up two radar installations and carried out joint exercises in Honduras involving as many as 5,000 American troops since early 1983. Reagan administration as a centerpiece in its strategy to contain leftist revolution in the region: PALMEROLA AIR BASE This Honduran base is headquarters for the U.S. joint task force command

troops taking part in maneuvers. The Army Corps of Engineers expanded the runway to 9,000 feet to handle U.S. jet fighters and bombers.

The base has a U.S. military field hospital and is home to the 300-man 224th Intelligence Battalion, which conducts reconnaissance flights over El Salvador. The battalion is located in a fenced-in area of the base: signs warn that unauthorized visitors will be shot.

**EL AGUACATE** U.S. engineers extended the dirt runway from 4,300 to 8,000 feet. Located in a remote valley in thinly populated mountains, the El Aguacate military base is reportedly used by CIA-backed Nicaraguan rebels as a home base for planes that supply their fighters inside Nicaragua.

The Sandinista government said the pilot of a rebel plane shot down in Nicaragua in October 1983 admitted he had taken off from El Aguacate. Honduran soldiers stationed at the base told an Associated Press reporter last September that American military advisers operating out of El Aguacate had accompanied them on sweeps of jungles near the Nicaraguan border in search of Cuban-trained Honduran guerrillas.

# Reagan dines with queen

LONDON - President Reagan, at the midpoint of his 10-day European trip, lunched with Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace today as he settled in for a round of talks with other world leaders gathering here for an economic summit later in the week

The queen's husband, Prince Philip, greeted the president and Mrs. Reagan under a glassed-in portico in an inner courtyard of the palace and escorted them inside, where the queen was waiting out of sight of the clutch of reporters traveling in the presidential motorcade.

#### Soviets launch offensive

NEW DELHI - Sovit forces have sealed off the Panjsher Valley in northern Afghanistan and appear to have a firm hold on the strategic gorge, Western diplomats said here today.

Soviet troops blocked the main entrances to the valley and reportedly captured about 800 rebels in the latest offensive, but some fighting continued, the diplomats quoted reports from Kabul as

Soviet casualties also were said to be heavy, with several plane loads of dead and wounded flown to Kabul

# Israeli diplomat wounded

CAIRO - An Israeli diplomat was shot at from a speeding car in a Cairo suburb and wounded in the hand and shoulder, an Israeli Embassy spokesman said today.

The spokesman, Isaac Bar-Moshe, identified the diplomat as Zvi Kedar, an administrative attache, and said he was ambushed late Monday

It was the first attack on an Israeli diplomat in Egypt since the signing of the Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty in March 1979. The two countries

established diplomatic relations in February 1980. Bar-Moshe said Kedar was shot at after he stepped from his car outside his home at the southern suburb of Maadi.

### 16 killed in Punjab battle

NEW DELHI - Sikhs in the heavily fortified Golden Temple in Amritsar exchanged gunfire with government forces again today, a day after a five-hour gunbattle in which at least 16 of the militants inside reportedly were killed.

Sources in Punjab state, who asked not to be identified, said by telephone that the latest firing began just before dawn near the shrine.

Police in Punjab said at least 16 Sikhs were killed in Monday's shootout; other official sources said the death toll was 36.

### Sikhs attack consulate

VANCOUVER - Two sword-swinging Sikhs attacked the local Indian- consulate, leaving diplomats jittery for hours afterwards.

Two men were taken into custody for a time, but no charges were filed as of early today, police

In Ottawa, Indian officials asked the External Affairs Department to review security for Indian diplomats in Canada.

# U.S. providing escort for oil tankers to gulf

WASHINGTON (AP)— Oil tankers chartered to haul fuel to Navy ships are being escorted in the Persian Gulf by U.S. warships, Pentagon officials have confirmed.

The oil tankers are escorted by Navy frigates and destroyers after they enter the Persian Gulf, according to the officials, who spoke Monday on condition they not be identified.

But these officials stressed that the Pentagon has not established a new policy of escorting tankers operating in the gulf. Navy warships permanently assigned to patrol the southern gulf monitor the movements of the chartered tankers, the officials

The tankers do not operate near the combat zone of the Iran-Iraq war, where commercial ships have been attacked by warplanes of the two warring na-

The commercial tankers are chartered to deliver oil from the gulf oil port of Bahrain to a U.S. aircraft carrier battle group operating in the Arabian Sea and Navy bases in the Philippines, Diego Garcia in

One of the tankers, the Falcon Leader, is chartered by the Navy but manned by a merchant marine crew, officials said.

The Soviets want to negotiate a ban on all space weapons. President Reagan should take them up on the proposal.

Mr. Reagan said in February that it would not be wise to open negotiations with the Soviet Union on a new spaceweapons treaty because it would be almost impossible to verify Soviet compliance.

But since then he has proposed a comprehensive poison-gas treaty which would require on-the-ground verification. If such verification is possible where poison gas is concerned, it must be possible where space weapons are concerned.

The president wants to proceed with his plans to research and develop anti-ballistic-missile defense systems known variously as "High Frontier" and "Star Wars" defense. But such research and development could proceed, at the same time that negotiations are under way with the Soviets on a new space-weapons treaty. If the negotiations fail and the research shows new weapons would be cost-effective, production of the weapons could proceed on schedule. If the negotiations succeed, a costly new arms race in space could be averted.

The Russians have walked out of arms control talks, saying they would not resume negotiations until we agree to stop deploying new medium-range missiles in Europe.

But they say that steps to ban space weapons must be taken quickly - before the militarization of space "acquires an irreversible character," in the words of Soviet Premier Konstantin U. Chernenko.

If they feel that way, we should not miss the opportunity to negotiate a verifiable ban on space weapons. We should test their sincerity at the bargaining table.

'You mean the 'Peacekeeper'?' "Is that what you call it now?"

"That's what President Reagan calls it. We scrapped the race track concept and decided to put them into stationary Titan silos in Wyoming.

'I thought the whole idea behind the weapon was that it would be mobile. If you put them in stationary silos, won't they be vulnerable to attack?"

"Not if we harden the concrete. If the 'Peacekeeper' doesn't make the Russians see the value of arms talks, nothing will."

"How much are we talking about now?

"We don't want to put a price on it until we get in all the bids from the cement companies.

I was so busy with the placing of the cruise missiles in Europe I didn't have time to think much about the "Peacekeeper" until my friend called me last month and said, "Well, we really think we've got the system worked out now. Instead of placing the 'Peacekeeper'



WASHINGTON - My recent reports on corruption in Mexico stirred a hornets nest south of the border. The Mexican government lodged a formal diplomatic protest, which led the State Department to issue a delicately worded quasiapology.

Rep. Henry Gonzales, D-Tex., was even moved to suggest that my reports were the result of deliberate leaks from elements in the Reagan administration trying to discredit President Miguel de la Madrid during his state visit to Washington last month.

All this is preposterous. My associate Dale Van Atta had been digging up the facts on Mexican presidents' self-enrichment for months. I had the essential information late last year and spent the ensuing months confirming it. De la Madrid's visit was simply a convenient news peg for the stories.

The particular hornet that stung de la Madrid was my report from secret sources that the Mexican president had squirreled away some \$162 million since he took office in 1982. I noted that this was a modest sum compared to the \$1 billion to \$3 billion stashed away by his predecessor and mentor, Jose Lopez Portillo, during his six-year

Interestingly, the first word most Mexicans had of the alleged selfenrichment of their president came when his denial was issued. But there was no quiet there. Phones were ringing off the wall. The rest of the state had finished tabulating and everyone was waiting impatiently to see who had won the Hance-Doggett Senate runoff. That race was too close to call and was depending on the **Howard County vote.** 

We were famous. Everyone in the state was repeating our name Hance and Doggett won't soon forget this county

Local candidates began filing in to the courthouse. It was growing late and these people were getting nervous. But they would have to wait, because the Secretary of State's office was concerned with the Senate race. Reporters from Odessa, San

Angelo, Fort Worth, Dallas, Abilene, Lubbock and even as far away as the Washington Post in Washington, D.C., heard of the problems locally and were calling. It felt good to be at the scene while the "big guys" were miles away.

I was impressed with the hand count that County Clerk Margaret Ray and her deputies tallied. These people were tallying punched-out computer cards, which was a tedious task made even more tedious by the early morning hour. But they came within one vote of being correct. There are two things I will never

do again. One is trust computers and the other is to consider my vote unimportant. Saturday every vote counted

People who didn't vote should feel ashamed because every vote was getting statewide attention.

# Common virus can be fatal

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My husband died of cardiomyopathy after a long illness. Some months before he died he had a coxsackie virus infection. Is there any danger from this virus for the rest of the family? And where could he have contacted it? I would appreciate any information you can give me on the virus. — D.L.

I am so sorry to hear of your husband's death. His experience with the coxsackie virus is decidedly unusual. The virus is an ubiquitous one and most of us have been infected with it at one time without ever realizing it. For most people it is that mild an infection. For some there may be a short, feverish illness with diarrhea or perhaps respiratory symptoms.

episode a second thought. Your husband's death from it shows how even such a usually benign organism can cause a devastating

Some people, like your husband, have heart muscle involvement (cardiomyopathy). I can't tell you why that happens to some and not to most. Even when the heart muscle is infected, many still recover after prolonged convalescence. A few do succumb because the muscle damage has been so severe that the heart cannot resume its pumping duty.

Your question of family spread is a natural one. I'd lay odds, though, that your family members had been exposed to the virus, even

# Uncle Sam wants your dog

WASHINGTON (AP) - Uncle Sam, who used to want you, now wants your dog. And he's offering good money for pooches who qualify for "a rewarding career" in the military.

The Defense Department's Dog Center is trying to recruit 600 animals this year to help guard military bases and even President Reagan against possible terrorist attack, and for other security duties.

A Navy information bulletin describes it as "a rewarding career for eligible canines in the

military working dog program."
The Navy bulletin said the dogs are needed "because of the high incidence of terrorist activities and the government's war on drugs."

Officials at the center, located at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, said in response to questions that they don't know how many dogs already are on duty. After training, they are sent to military bases and federal agencies worldwide.

The center hopes that dog owners will be willing to donate their pets. However, the Navy bulletin said, the owners can receive up to \$400 if their dogs are accepted.

'Dogs accepted into the program are trained in a variety of duties such as protection of the president, the detection of explosives and nar-cotics, and patrolling federal installations," the Navy information bulletin said.

The center is looking for breeds of German shepherds, Rottweilers and Bouvier des Flandres.

The dogs do not have to be registered purebreds, the bulletin said, "but they must show predominant characteristics of





"There comes a point in time when I have to give my energies to another line of work," he said Monday. "Whether it's in television or whatever.'

He said he did not plan to call a news conference in Shreveport to announce his retirement, however.

"I'm taking calls one at a time and dealing with them that way," he told the newspaper. "I hate going out this way. I've worked so hard to get back. The operation this summer,
