

Sales tax rebates hold upward trend

Big Spring's June sales tax rebate is higher than for June of 1983 and continues a trend toward catching up with last year's retail

Big Spring rebates totaled \$91,916 this month, up from the approximate \$79,000 figure for June of last year, according to figures released today by the state comptroller's office.

The city's year-to-date figure of \$711,631 is down some 10 percent from the 1983 year-to-date figure of \$791,697, according to the comptroller's office.

Comparisons with previous months show the city in April lagged 15 percent behind 1983. By May, the gap was closed to 13 percent.

Statewide, sales tax payments to cities are running about 13 percent \$1,756 to \$2,195. ahead of payments to cities at the

same time last year, according to the comptroller's office.

The June rebate represents the city's 1 percent share of the 5 percent sales tax collected on most non-food items. Four percent of the tax goes to the state. The payment reflects taxes on sales made during April and reported to the office by

Big Spring city administrators Tuesday received the \$92,000 check, according to City Manager Don Davis

Drought's grip holds

The rash of heavy thunderstorms battering much of the state this week will ease parched conditions in some areas, but will do little to break the drought plaguing West and South Texas, weather experts said Wednesday.

"To break the drought we need rains over several days amounting to five to eight inches. And we've hardly begun to get that much," said George Bomar, a meteorologist with the Texas Department of Water Resources in Austin.

"I'm afraid we're going to run out of time because the rainy spell is ebbing. It probably won't last more than another day or two," he said.

The rains began in West Texas last weekend, shifted to the Rio Grande Valley, then to North Central and Central Texas Tuesday. The storms were moving in an easterly

National Weather Service meteorologist Skip Ely said the drought in West Texas probably will not be arrested before the normally dry months of July, August and September.

'We're talking about a drought that has been going on for six months and it takes more than a couple of rainfalls of two inches to cure that," Ely said in Fort Worth. "Some areas out there need a good 10

Bomar said rains this week have been scattered but generally unsubstantial.

Two inches of rain fell on Midland earlier this week and brought that city up to its normal rainfall amount for the year, but showers didn't amount to as much in other areas of West Texas such as the Davis Mountains, the Pecos River and the Edwards Plateau

"Rainfall amounts of onehalf to one inch were much more common in those areas," Bomar said.

About two-thirds of the state 166 counties — has been declared eligible for federal disaster assistance because of

the drought.

The precipitation did little to ease parched conditions in the Big Bend and extreme South Texas from Corpus Christi to Laredo, areas which have been dry for more than a year.

On Tuesday, Rio Grande City had 2.39 inches and McCook reported 1.93 inches. But rainfall in most other areas of the Valley have been insignificant during the month of June.

As of June 1, three Texas cities, including Corpus Christi, Alice and Grayford, were under mandatory water rationing because of the drought, said Tom Milligan of the Texas Department of Water Resources. Another 10 cities had instituted voluntary rationing programs, he said.

Yes, water is saltier

Staff Writer Big Springers complaining that city water is saltier than usual aren't imagining things, according to Owen Ivie, manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

"The quality of water in Lake Thomas is excellent," Ivie said. "The undesirable taste is from the quality of water at Lake Spence.'

The saltier taste is coming from "natural salt pollution" from sodium and chloride

found in Lake Spence. Water is pumped into the city reservoir from Lake Thomas, located 32 miles north of Big Spring, and from Lake Spence, located 75 miles southeast of Big Spring.

Both are pumped into the city's 15 million gallon reservoir four miles northeast of Big Spring. Ideally, one part Lake

Thomas water is mixed with two parts Lake Spence water.

But drought conditions in West Texas have affected the lake levels. "Because of low reserves at Lake Thomas, we're not able to mix at the ratio we would like.

Ivie said about one part of Lake Thomas water is being mixed with 41/2 parts Lake Spence water now

'Thomas has 27,000 acre feet of water, which is about 14 percent of capacity," Ivie said. "That's low, but there's still quite a bit of water" in the lake. 'It's been considerably lower, for example, in 1970 and again in 1980.

Ivie said he wasn't concerned at this point because "we've survived without any rainfall" for long periods in the past. "We could literally empty the reservoir" if necessary, he


Lake Spence now holds 232,000 acre feet water," Ivie said.

Ivie said the Lake Spence water contains more sodium and chloride which it picks up from surface run-off along the Beal's Creek and Colorado River banks. "Lake Thomas has a very low content of each of those.

Ivie is optimistic that both lakes will pick up more water before the normal spring rain season ends

"We are in about the middle of the better time of year to experience rain," Ivie said. But, "we're still waiting for the big rain. We haven't had enough to contribute any run-off, but it could come tomorrow," he

After about the middle of July, "We don't normally expect to receive any run-off" until September.

plan is 'fairest' one \$4.8 billion tax plan studied

White says his tax

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau AUSTIN - Gov. Mark White said today his \$4.8 billion tax plan for education and highway improvements is the fairest revenue proposal around, but said he isn't ruling out other tax proposals.

White's comments came as the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee - which must clear any tax plan in the current special legislative session - continues to push for the removal of special-interest state sales tax exemptions.

State Rep. Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen, also suggested that White's fight to win significant education reforms and approval of a tax package to finance them is almost impossible during the current 30-day special session.

White told his weekly news conference that his package, including a call for a 1-cent increase in the state sales tax, is more realistic that removal of sales tax exemptions

Removal of exemptions - on such items as movie tickets, bowling charges, medical and legal services - would translate to a 5 percent or 6 percent increase in state sales tax

"I haven't said it shouldn't be Timmy said that he wasn't sure done," White said at his weekly news conference. "I just say that my plan is one that I believe to be acceptable under the standards of fairness and acceptable on the basis of equity.

> White also nixed notions suggested by state Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, that revenue for education reforms be raised through a state-conducted lottery.

The House Ways and Means Committee was debating that possibility Thursday.

White alone determines what the

being a big winner in most of those lotteries is something like being struck by lightning seven times in a row," White said

During the special session, state Rep. Stan Schlueter, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said a small miracle would be needed for the Legislature to pass a major school reform package with full funding in the 30-day special session. He expressed worry that state budget needs next year will require another tax increase and has asked Gov. White to promise to veto any 1985 tax bill.

If the sales tax is simply increased one cent, that will cut down the options for future funding and will move Texans closer to a state income tax, he said.

Art theft mystery continues

The Great Art Caper is over almost as soon as it began. But the mystery continues.

In an unusual burglary Monday evening at 2106 Hunter, a single picture valued at \$250 was taken. The selective thief left behind several pieces of antique silver and silver trays, and did not disturb other boxed items in the room.

The painting, a pastoral autumn farm scene with the traditional red barn, was the second major work completed by 10-year-old Timmy Majors, who lives at the house.

The painting was returned to the back porch of the Bolton home Wednesday evening, as mysteriously as it disappeared, according to Karan Bolton, Timmy's

Timmy takes art lessons locally and paints during his spare time. His grandmother, Manette Ussery, encourages him to paint when he helps out at the family's Wasson Road Chevron service station.

Timmy began painting two years ago when he was 7. The missingand-now-returned painting was completed as a class project when he was 8. Last year, Timmy took second place in an art show in competition with other art students.

During summers, Timmy said he interrupts his art lessons in favor of playing baseball or helping out at the family's service station. Police told Mrs. Bolton that they

believed the burglar who took the painting had a key to the house and had opened a window from inside the house to confuse the investigation into the missing painting.

Mrs. Bolton and her three children were moving into the Hunter street house, and had hung the painting earlier in the day. The

silver and other items were still semi-packed in the same room. Although Timmy has never sold

a painting, his grandmother said photographs of his work are on display at the station, attracting some offers and special requests

that he wants to be an artist in the years to come. The freckled-face boy with shaggy blond hair said that he was glad that the painting has been returned, and that he can repair the small amount of damage that the canvas received.

Mother and grandmother say they continue to be puzzled by the theft and reappearance of the painting but "are glad that its been returned."

Police say investigation into the missing painting continues.

Showers predicted

Patchy drizzle produced by moist Gulf air fell in Central Texas today, while light fog formed in eastern sections, and more showers were predicted.

The moist air brought a layer of low clouds to much of North and South Texas, and created the foggy conditions, the National Weather Service said.

Rainfall amounts were reported in Killeen, said the weather service. Elsewhere in the state, high cloudiness prevailed in the wake of a surface low-pressure system.

The weather service said low temperatures hovered in the 70's. Winds were southerly at 10 to 20 mph, except westerly in far West Texas. Extremes were 69 degrees at Amarillo and 78 degrees at Houston.

Parts of Northwest Texas continued to have a slight chance of thundershowers. Partly sunny skies were expected statewide. Highs were expected in the 80s and 90s On Wednesday, heavy thunderstorms spawned at least

one tornado that killed a man near San Angelo. High winds downed power lines and ripped roofs off buildings in Houston and Gonzales. A twister ripped a mobile home off its foundation 12

miles northeast of San Angelo and flung it about 75 yards, authorities said. A 47-year-old Mexican citizen inside the home was killed.

Thunderstorms caused severe flooding early today in Vermont, while other storms in the Mississippi Valley spawned tornadoes and dumped up to 5 inches of rain. Up to 8 inches of snow fell in the Rockies.

The floods in Vermont blocked highways, destroyed or washed away a half-dozen homes and caused power outages in three counties, but no injuries were reported. Stowe, Worcester, Morrisville and Plainfield were among the areas hardest hit and flash flood warnings remained in effect for Lamoille, Franklin and Washington

The town of St. Albans got 3.75 inches of rain overnight. Green Mountain Power spokesman Arthur Ristau said many people were without electricity in the hard-hit areas, but that it was difficult to pinpoint trouble areas because most telephone lines also were down and flooding blocked repair crews.

The National Weather Service said a tornado hit Moreauville, La., damaging three mobile homes.

Illegal alien jilted, jailed

HOUSTON (AP) — An illegal Pacetti asked Ms. Canos if she had alien came to court seeking satisfaction from a U.S. citizen who she says reneged on his promise to marry her for \$1,000, but found only immigration officers waiting for

Justice of the Peace Kenneth Pacetti said he felt sorry for Reina Canos, a Salvadoran refugee, but said he couldn't help her.

"It's kind of a shame," Pacetti said. "But she is an illegal alien."

As for the man she says was her reluctant fiance, Pacetti said, "he's a bad guy and he wins."

Pacetti identified the man Ms. Canos was suing in Tuesday's hearing as Michiael Galaviz.

Ms. Canos, who works as a maid on an office building cleaning crew, said she was trying to block the possibility of being deported by marrying her supervisor, who is a U.S. citizen.

The marriage would have given the woman resident alien status.

But she said the man refused to go through with the marriage and would not return the money.

Ms. Canos sued to get the money back, but, instead of a day in court, she was taken into custody on Tuesday by U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service officials.

In her brief court appearance,

given the money to the man. She said she had and that the man would not marry her.

The judge told her to sit. Moments later the INS agents entered the courtroom and led her

Ms. Canos initiated the legal action against the man with a May 22 letter to Pacetti. In the letter, she said she worked as a maid at an office building and that her intended husband was her supervisor.

"He offered to marry me for the fee of \$1,000. In exchange for the money, I would be a resident alien, since he was a U.S. citizen," she said in the letter.

She said she paid the man \$1,000 and also paid for the pre-marital blood tests. But when her wedding day arrived, the intended groom did not show up as planned.

Ms. Canos said she confronted him the next day and he said "he no longer planned to marry me.

When she asked for return of her money, the man gave her a \$100 check that bounced and a \$50 money order, but refused to pay

Pacetti said that what she offered to do, pay for a marriage to get a legal alien status, is marriage fraud, which is illegal.

Fire destroys vacant storage shed

Officials said they do not know who owns the shed.

Fire fighters also answered a call of a smoldering grass and trash fire behind a 1318 Utah residence at 10:47 a.m. Wednesday.

Reports said the fire was located in a large hole that had once been a storm celler at the residence. Firemen used 500 gallons of water to extinguish the smoldering fire and returned to quarters at 11:20 p.m., reports said.

A 22-year-old Big Spring man named in a Howard County grand jury indictment in January pleaded guilty Wednesday afternoon to a charge of felony delivery of marijuana.

118th District Court Judge Jim Gregg sentenced Keith Carson of 1203 Lloyd to 10 years probation and a \$5,000 fine in a plea-bargain arrangement with the district attorney's office.

Carson, who was indicted in January along with six other persons for drug-related offenses, also forfeited his car through a civil proceeding instituted by the DA's

The delivery occurred on Nov. 4, 1983, according to the DA's office.

 Gene Lockhart, who lives near Farm Road 669 six miles south of the Borden County line, told deputies Wednesday that \$1,000 worth of tools was stolen from his barn between 9:45 p.m. and midnight.

Area residents reported seeing a green motor vehicle parked on the road about one-fourth mile north of the barn during the time period when the tools were stolen, according to a deputy's report. Mediocrity chided

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — Television and education have sacrificed "the exceptional for the sake of some universally achievable mediocrity," ABC News anchor Ted Koppel told graduating seniors at Harvard University's Class Day ceremony.

"Television embodies mediocrity. Its economic framework is designed to appeal to the greatest number, the lowest common denominator," Koppel, 44, said Wednesday.

Koppel, host of the interview show "Nightline," said television news reporters "are obsessed with immediacy and thrive on confrontation,' diminishing television's value as a thoughtful and reflective medium.

"And yet I do propose television as both the medium for excellence and the means toward telescoping time," he said. "We have lost, in education as in television, a clear sense of purpose.

India's Sikh leader found dead

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Troops found Sikh leader Jarnail Singh Bhindranwale dead in a bunker in the Golden Temple in Amritsar today at the end of a two-day assault on the heavily fortified shrine in which at least 250 Sikh extremists and 59 soldiers

More than 450 Sikhs were captured during the battle that ended with soldiers and paramilitary troops, backed by tank and rocket fire, storming the last pockets of resistance in the 12-square block

Rioting and arson flared in New Delhi and other cities as angry Sikhs protested the seizure of the temple and the death of Bhindranwale.

In New Delhi, police opened fire on hundreds of Sikhs demonstrating at the Bangla Sahib shrine. A teen-age boy was wounded in the shooting, which came after Sikhs pelted police with rocks, bricks and bottles and set fire to a national lawmaker's home near the New Delhi shrine.

damentalist preacher who has led a two-year terrorist campaign for greater Sikh rights, and two lieutenants were recovered from the fortified base ment of the Akal Takht. As the throne room of Sikh gurus, it is considered the "seat of immortal power."

The bodies of Bhindranwale, a 38-year-old fun-

He and followers armed with machine guns had held out against the government forces after the army took control of the rest of the sprawling 17th century temple Wednesday.

"Bhindranwale is dead," T.P. Khanna, additional secretary in the Home Ministry, told The Associated Press in New Delhi, 250 miles south of Amritsar.

It was not immediately known how he died. But Bhindranwale had vowed to kill himself rather than surrender or be captured.

The head of the youth wing of the Sikh political party, the Akali Dal, claimed Bhindranwale was murdered. "There were 72 rounds in Bhindranwale's body

and they (soldiers) shook his body to see if he was still alive," Kuldip Singh told reporters in the capital. He did not say how he obtained the information. Punjab state was sealed off by authorities last

Saturday. Roads were barricaded, telephone lines were cut, a round-the-clock curfew was imposed, and Western journalists were ordered out. Information about the situation there has since been limited, with most coming from the government or the local press. Singh said Sikh youths would march to Amritsar on Friday to demand the return of Bhindranwale's

body and the others for cremation. The Sikh religion requires cremation within 24 hours of death. 'If one Bhindranwale dies, a thousand are born,"

he said. Soldiers also reportedly found the bodies of Amrik Singh, Bhindranwale's nephew and president of the outlawed Sikh Students Union, and retired Maj. Gen Shuhbeg, said to be the mastermind of the Golden Temple defense in the last few days.

Air attacks injure towns people

Iraq said its forces attacked the Iranian towns of Dezful, Masjid Suleiman and Nahavand today to retaliate for Iranian shelling of Iraqi cities. Iran said more than 17 civilians were wounded in Iraqi air

A Liberian freighter was damaged by an explosion in the southern Persian Gulf today and insurance officials in London said the ship's master "believes the explosion occurred after the ship striking a mine.'

The cities reportedly hit by Iraq are out of range of its artillery, indicating they may have been attacked from the air or by missiles. The Iraqi communique did not specify the means of the attacks, which it said occurred after midnight.

Iran's Tehran radio said 15 people were killed and 257 wounded in Nahavand and it said Iraqi planes also bombed Gilan-e Gharb, killing two people, and Dehloran, killing an undisclosed number of others.

No details were released on casualties in the other towns, and it was impossible for Western reporters to verify the claims.

Shipping sources in Bahrain, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the bulk carrier Dashaki had unloaded cargo at the Iranian port of Bandar Abbas and was heading toward Jubail, Saudi Arabia, when it was rocked by the explosion.

More than a score of ships in the Persian Gulf have been damaged by air strikes carried out by Iran and Iraq as part of their 44-month-old war. But most have been struck far north of the site where the Dashaki exploded.

Lloyds Intelligence Department, a department of the Lloyds insurance brokerage, said its agent in Dubai reported that the ship's master believed the vessel had hit a mine

But a shipping company executive in Bahrain said the "ship hit nothing. It could be a normal accident." Shipping sources in Dubai told The Associated Press that the ship's 27 crewmen had been forced to abandon the vessel and that a Saudi Arabian tugboat had rescued them.

They said the ship originated in Rosario, Argentina, and was to pick up cargo at Jubail.

Economic summit begins

LONDON - Leaders of seven major industrialized nations gathered here today for a three-day economic summit where the issues of war in the Persian Gulf and international politics will vie with financial concerns.

President Reagan returned to London Wednesday from commemorations in France of the 40th anniversary of D-Day. Joining him at the summit are Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Britain and leaders of Japan, France, West Germany, Italy and Canada.

The summit formally starts with a reception in 16th-century St. James's Palace, hosted by Mrs. Thatcher and the Duke of Kent. The heads of state and government then go to a "working dinner" at Mrs. Thatcher's residence at No. 10 Downing St.

Hart, Jackson press on

WASHINGTON - Democratic Party leaders are pressuring Gary Hart and the Rev. Jesse Jackson to give up the fight for the Democratic presidential nomination, a contest Walter F. Mondale says he already has won.

The issue now, the leaders say, is unifying the party to take on President Reagan in the fall campaign

But Hart and Jackson say they have come too far to give up before the July nominating convention. "It is not over," Hart says bluntly.

"The bottom line is my self-respect," Jackson declares. "It is clear I am the winner," Mondale says.

The Associated Press delegate count shows Mondale with 1,976.05, just over the 1,967 required for the nomination. Hart has 1,221.75 and Jackson

Leftists mock requests

SAN SALVADOR — Leftist rebels said they will stick by their demand for unconditional peace talks to end El Salvador's civil war and mocked the government's request that they lay down their weapons first.

In their first official response to President Jose Napoleon Duarte's inauguration speech last Friday, members of the leftists' political and diplomatic commission said his proposal for peace talks was "most absurd."

In other developments Wednesday, Duarte promised an investigation into the cases of missing and slain Salvadorans and the country's new attorney general pledged to probe the 1980 slaying of San Salvador Archbishop Oscar Arnulfo Romero.

The rebel commission includes members of the Democratic Revolutionary Front, an umbrella group of outlawed leftist parties, and the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front, or FMLN, the coalition of five guerrilla groups fighting to oust the government.

"Duarte has established the most absurd and politically least serious condition for dialogue, the laying down of arms by the FMLN," the commission said in a communique issued Wednesday in Costa Rica. "This ignores the fact that we are in war and that the FMLN is a real force that is defeating the army of 40,000 backed by the United

6 Haitians drown

MIAMI - A 30-foot sailboat capsized when scores of Haitians ran to one side of the vessel as Coast Guardsmen were checking for illegal immigrants, officials said. Six people died rescued and the search continued at sea today for

Survivors of Wednesday's accident estimated that 80 to 90 people had been on the wooden sailboat, which one Coast Guardsman called a 'typical Haitian refugee sailing vessel.'

The search continued overnight for others who may have been lost in the Atlantic's 3-foot waves, aggravated by winds of 18 knots, said Lt. Jim Simpson of the U.S. Coast Guard operations

Six people drowned or died from injuries sustained in the accident, and 61 were rescued, Simpson said. The injured were treated aboard the cutter Hamilton, he said

Porn call draws more than kids

Remember the widespread parental rage over a dial-a-porn message being delivered by some New York City firm? Youngsters all across the country had heard about the message, and the phone number to be called, and were running up long-distance charges like mad — prompting the FCC to step in.

Well, it seems the kids aren't the only ones who like to be titilated by the suggestive remarks of heavy-breathing females. There are a lot of immature ding-a-lings working for the government.

Pentagon auditors estimated that in 1985 calls from employees of the Defense Department to dial-a-porn services will cost taxpayers about \$300,000.

The porn fling, according to a report by the House Armed Services Committee, is just one juicy bit of evidence that improper employee use of government phones has gotten out of hand.

Investigations prove that control over telephone usage is "lax or non-existent," the committee said. That's an understatement at best when federal workers can waste more than a quarter of a million in tax funds just for kicks. Many taxpayers would call that kind of nonserse an obscenity.

Selling sexual ills

If the Morton Salt girl were being invented today, she migh' wear hot pants, spike heels and a wanton look. American advertisers, never bashful about using sex to sell goods, are assaulting jaded sensibilities with images that are meant to titillate, but ought to shock.

Devotees of Hustler magazine aren't taken aback when they see a cover depicting a woman disappearing into a grinder and emerging as hamburger. But readers of the New York Times Sunday Magazine may not yet be inured to the sort of pictures spread across two full pages in an advertisement for Christian Dior on May 27.

On the right, a clean-cut man wearing an impeccable blue, pinstriped, double-breasted suit - and a black eye. On the left, a fashionable dressed woman with a wide smile and a brightly bruised forehead. The fun-loving caption is from (of all places) "Through the Looking Glass": "Let's fight till six and then have dinner, said Tweedledum

Given the boldness of advertisers in recent years, this ad may be seen more as changes of degrethan of kind. Sexual suggestiveness isn't exactly a stranger to the American consumer. Even barely pubescent teenagers have been turned into sex objects to sell consumer products (Calvin Klein jeans, Diet Pepsi). But Dior's images go beyond mere naughtiness into regions best left unexplored.

Apparently shoppers can no longer be enticed with muscular men and daringly clad women. Nowadays, it takes intimations of sexual violence. (Or, as in the previous Dior ad campaign, featuring the "three Diors," strong hints of incest.) Sadomasochism has emerged from the closet — a pioneering advance that shouldn't be greeted with equanimity.

In America today, censorship is largely a thing of the past, and the state is less inclined than ever to police the sexual behavior of consenting adults. That is as it should be. No one is harmed by the expression of ideas, however noxious. And responsibility for the consequences of voluntary intimacy belongs to the individual, not society.

But the fact that legality and morality are no longer synonymous is no reason to ignore mine civilized standards. In fact, it is all the more reason for those people still capable of being offended to make their feelings known and to advise the culpable that their breaches will not be rewarded.

Why is a little teasing about wifebattering more objectionable than using conventional sexual images to stimulate conventional sexual appetites? Because it trivializes conduct that lacerates the bodies and pysches of unwilling victims, and obliquely excuses those who inflict the wounds

What violent husband (or wife) could fail to feel satisfaction at Christian Dior's subliminal endorsement? The ad makes this kind of abuse something to be not merely tolerated, but positively celebrated. Instead of being seen as deeply shameful, which it is, sexual violence has become chic.

Presumably the pathological, if they looked hard enough, have always been able to find others who cater to pornographers. It's another thing entirely to be indulged by an establishment clothing manufacturer, by a leading newspaper and, implicitly, by the customers of both.

Those customers, at least, ought to object. That is not to suggest intervention by government: no one is forced to expose himself to this material. But those who are offended should refuse to expose themselves to it. Those institutions which hope to profit from the exploitation of perversion — the word fits - would be reminded that the marketplace can function to elevate morality as well as erode

Companies which defy minimal standards of decency should be confronted with the defiance of those people who strive to preserve them. A society which can mobilize legions on behalf of the snail darter surely can mobilize on behalf of its own morality.

Some companies which advertise, and some that invite advertising, plainly think that among those they hope to reach, there is no one left with a capacity for outrage. If the grotesqueries of Christian Dior pass unchallenged, they can congratulate themselves on being

GOP boosts incumbent coffers

WASHINGTON - The 17 Republican incumbents running for re-election to the Senate this year enjoy a little-known, gilt-edged advantage over their challengers. Thousands of dollars have been funneled into their personal publicity efforts in the form of "office expenses" paid by the National Republican Senatorial Committee.

The committee has been doling out money since 1978 from a fund called COMBO (Communications and Business Office Expenditures). The money, earmarked for "constituent communications," has been spent on a wide range of services, from videotape and photo processing to the purchase of

newspaper clipping services.
There's nothing underhanded about the COMBO program. The GOP committee's communications director, Ceci Cole, stressed that the committee, not the individual senator, controls the money and pays the bills. Indeed, it seems to be only lack of money that keeps the Democratic senatorial committee from offering similar largesse to its incumbents.

But for the privileg Republicans, the COMBO fund is a handy supplement to their government paid office funds. The money helps them keep their names and achievements before the folks back

My associate Tony Capaccio did a rundown of the money given by the fund during 1982-83 to the 17 Republicans running for reelection this year. He arrived at a total expenditure of \$331,588 - a

figure the committee called "in the ballpark.' Here are the recipients of COM-BO money: Charles Percy, Ill., \$32,498; Mark Hatfield, Ore., \$26,770: Pete Domenici, N.M., \$26,358; Roger Jepsen, Iowa, Rudy Boschwitz, \$25,264; Minn.. \$24,667: James McClure. jumped from \$5,647 in 1982 to \$12,436 in 1983. The bulk of the money went to pay for computer Warner got only \$2,503 from

COMBO in 1982, but \$12,873 in 1983. He used \$3,307 of the committee money for airline charter services, which his office said allowed him to maintain his 99 percent attendance record for Senate roll calls.

 Pressler's COMBO donation went from \$5,523 in 1982 to \$11,277 in 1983. He spent \$5,630 on photography during the two-year period - more than any of the other incumbents.

Another Republican beneficiary of COMBO generosity was Sen. John Tower of Texas who surprised his colleagues - and may have dismayed the COMBO money handlers — by announcing last year that he would not seek reelection. Tower got \$10,267 from the committee in 1982, and \$21,783 in 1983. A novel, if minor, expenditure from Tower's COMBO account was \$100 for his membership in the Texas Press Association, which allows him to keep in touch with editors of the state's 600-odd

newspapers.
CALLING ALL FINKS: William Harn, 62, of Las Vegas, Nev., takes care of a 70-year-old blind woman who gets Supplemental Security Income from the government. He was appalled at a notation on a letter he got from Social Security that warned: "If you are under 18 and your parents live with you and their wages went up or down, you must tell Social Security.

'This is what we fought World War II over," Harn said. "We're telling our children to inform on their parents." Social Security spokesman

WOMEN IN PRISON: In his

Corrections experts give credit to Federal Prisons Director Norman Carlson, whose determined effort to bring more minorities and women into his work force has inspired state officials to do likewise.

Besides Carlson's good example. the experts believe the states have been moved to action by the possibility of discrimination suits by qualified women, who for years have seen correctional jobs go exclusively to "good old boys" whose fathers and grandfathers worked as prison guards in rural communitites

Along with the gains, though, has come an unexpected backlash: Some choice management jobs in women's prisons (that used to go only to women) are now being taken by men under equalopportunity employment laws

Goodness won't get you to Heaven

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: What right does anyone have to say they are going to go to Heaven? I think only God knows if I am good enough to go there, and I get upset at people who are so cocky that they claim they definitely will get to Heaven. - P.A.

DEAR P.A.: I would be inclined to agree with you if going to Heaven depended on how good we were. In fact, some of Jesus' strongest comments were spoken against people who claimed they were better than everyone else, and therefore, believed God was going to reward them for their good deeds

But the truth is that going to Heaven does not depend on how good we are. Does that surprise you? The Bible, however, says there is a very good reason for this: no one - no matter how good he is or how much he tries to please God is good enough to measure up to God's standard. God is perfect and holy, and his standard is nothing short of perfection. If we are honest, we know that we are not perfect - far from it. "There is no one righteous, not even one' (Romans 3:10). That is why the Bible declares, "therefore no one will be declared righteous in his sight by observing the law" (Romans

No, we cannot save ourselves by our good works. If we could, we could be proud of how we are, but the truth is we are all condemned in God's eyes. Does that mean there is no hope? Not at all because God has opened up a different way for us to be saved. We can't save ourselves - but God can save us!

He has made it possible by sending his Son to be a perfect sacrifice for our sins. God has done for us what we could never do for ourselves. He offers salvation to us not as a reward for our good works, but as a free and gracious gift of his love through Christ.

Heaven when you die, by turning your life over to Jesus Christ and trusting him alone for your salvation. As long as you trust yourself and your own goodness, you will never have any hope of Heaven. But when you trust Christ, then you do have hope and security.



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

White wants no-growth budget for state in 1985

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Mark White Wednesday proposed a no-growth budget for the 1985 Legislature, allowing only 3 percent for inflation, which he said would avoid a second tax bill.

"Getting through the next session without a tax bill will require cooperation by a number of groups,' White told the first meeting of the House Appropriations Committee in the special session.

"It will not be easy to accomplish this goal, but with your commitment I am sure we can do it," White said. "And I believe that with your support this plan will make state government better and

White told the committee the proposals he has made to the special session for improvements in public education and highways, and the taxes to finance them, would leave \$200 million unspent at the

He estimated his revenue program would produce \$921 million more than needed the next three years for basic improvements in education and highways.

"The hardest part, of course, is asking the Legislature to leave unspent funds next year," White said. "But I ask you to consider the importance of leaving that \$200 million unspent — because we know we will need it. It's just common-sense planning."

White offered the committee his seven-point plan to finance state spending for 1986-87 without another tax bill in 1985.

Sooner senator pushes Bentsen for VP

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) -Oklahoma Sen. David Boren is making an "unauthorized endorsement" of Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen for vice president.

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Boren said Bentsen could help carry Texas in the November election, balancing against Vice President George Bush, a Texan.

"I'm very high on the idea of Senator Bentsen running," Boren said Tuesday. "I feel very strongly

The fourth person arrested, a 16-year-old boy, was transferred to the Juvenile Detention Center, police said.


Morales, 20, was shot about 1 a.m. Sunday after he had escorted a friend to a car outside his apartment building, according to police. Officers said a carload of young

Diagnosis not always easy

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: How soon after a person has had a heart attack can the doctor confirm it? If a person is rushed to the hospital, will an EKG tell THEN that the person has had one? I've heard it takes days. Please comment. -

The beginning of diagnosis of heart attack is the patient's description of pain, a suffocating chest pressure that may radiate to the throat, arms or back. The electrocardiogram changes typical of a heart attack aren't always obvious immediately at the hospital. That can occur as long as 24 hours later. Blood levels of certain enzymes

are important clues. These enzymes are certain proteins found inside heart muscle cells. When heart muscle tissue dies (which is

what happens in a heart attack) these enzymes get into the blood and can be measured. One of the muscle enzymes may rise to high levels in a day; another takes two to three days to reach a peak.

This sounds pretty clear cut, but it isn't in real-life situations. There may never be the classical EKG changes and the enzyme levels may not rise at all. Then the doctor has to rely on sound judgment to say whether the person actually did have a heart attack. Or he may have to establish diagnosis through more sophisticated tests, like heart scans using radioactive isotopes. One such test will show dead heart muscle in the first few hours; another takes from two to five days. The answer to your question is that it may take some days to be

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sure if a person has had a heart attack when some of the key clues are missing.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: What is the significance of bright red urine after one has eaten beets? Is this a danger signal? — S.H.

It has no significance. It's a perfectly benign occurrence. It's just that your body metabolizes beets differently. Most people do not get this color in their urine. But it's nothing to worry about.



BRYAN (AP) - A 16-year-old Bryan High School student, one of nine survivors of the sinking of a British tall ship 78 miles off the coast of Bermuda, said he could do nothing but watch in horror as the ship dragged crewmates under in

"The ship capsized over and water just poured into the hull. Water was everywhere," Cliff McMillan said in a telephone interview from Bermuda with the Bryan-College Station Eagle.

British sailing ship that went down in a gust of wind Sunday, was participating in a race from Bermuda to Nova Scotia. One person was dead and 18 others were reported missing after it capsized.

"There were still some people in their bunks. They were trapped; they never knew what hit them. As the boat tipped over, water was coming in the galley. I could pull myself out, but it was real hard because of the force of the water," McMillan said.

"People started popping up all

over. We saw a life raft and grabbed it, and everyone climbed in. By about 10 seconds the boat was halfway on its side. By about 30 seconds it was half under. By about 45 seconds, it was gone.

'There was nothing more anyone else could have done.'

McMillan said some survivors saw sharks. "You could feel something hitting the bottom of the raft. We didn't really know if it was them, or if it was just a piece of wood," he said.

McMillan was sailing on the Mar-

ques for a month as a crewman in

"I was on watch from midnight till 4 a.m.," he said in the interview Tuesday. "At 4:10 a.m. they called for all hands on deck. I was waiting downstairs in the galley

The wind, which had been blowing about 35 knots, suddenly gusted to about 60 knots, he said.

"It was just like a hurricane whipped up," he said.

McMillan was able to get out of the ship and reach a dinghy, which he clung to and kept free of lines.

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
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Texans opposing immigration bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Support for a long-awaited immigration bill ranges from slim to none among Texas House members, whose reasons for opposing it often are diametrically opposed.

Some fear it would create "Big Brother," others say it would give American jobs to foreigners, and still others fear it would create

discrimination against Hispanics. "We do need some type of immigration bill," said Rep. Solomon Ortiz, D-Brownsville. "We can no longer operate with open borders."

But Ortiz, like several others in the Texas delegation, does not believe the "humongous" bill currently under consideration goes to the root of the illegal immigration problem - economic distress in other countries, especially Mexico.

For years, Congress has grappled with the complicated issue of illegal immigration.

The bill, the House Judiciary Committee said in its report, seeks "to close the back door on illegal immigration so that the front door on legal immigration may remain

Most opponents of the current attempt, nicknamed Simpson-Mazzoli after its Senate and House sponsors, label their opposition in similar short-hand — "amnesty" and "employer sanctions." The House version of the bill

would allow illegal aliens who have been in the United States continuously since Jan. 1, 1982, to apply for legal status. This, says the committee report

on the bill, is the alternative to "attempting mass deportations" or simply ignoring the estimated six million illegal aliens living in the United States.

The bill would make hiring illegal aliens against the law for the first time, establishing an escalating series of fines, leading up to a jail term.

The bill contains other proposed reforms of immigration policy, including streamlining the asylum process and allowing seasonal workers to enter the country legal-

ly for a certain period of time. Some of the bill's opponents have sought last-minute hearings on a substitute measure, a move that

would effectively kill immigration legislation this Congress. Some observers say the procedural battle masks an attempt to avoid voting on a touchy issue in an elec-

tion year. Texas' representatives, however, are largely in favor of getting on with a vote, though ideological opponents of the measure fear it will pass and would prefer to block it for that reason.

Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill is firmly on record for bringing the bill to the House floor this week. About 100 amendments have been filed. The bill, in slightly different form, was passed 76-18 by the

Senate last year. Texas Sens. Lloyd Bentsen, a Democrat, and John Tower, a Republican, split their votes.

Tower opposed both the amnesty provisions and employer sanctions. Bentsen disagreed

"The key to this bill is employer sanctions," he said. "Nothing else is going to work. As long as our employers are able to hire illegal aliens, illegal immigration is going to continue. Anyone who believes otherwise is deluding himself."

Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-San Antonio, contends the current bill will not solve a problem he says is more one of emigration away from poverty, not immigration to a job. 'Any substantial, wholesale changes in the immigration act

would be a mistake," he says. Gonzalez proposes instead a joint U.S.-Mexico economic development program aimed at the

"push" rather than the "pull."
"Whether you pass Simpson-Mazzoli or some other proposal or the substitute, they can all be adopted and you're not going to address the fundamental question," Gonzalez said.

The Senate has passed the immigration bill twice, but the House has not acted on it. In the early taining employer sanctions, but the Senate did not act on it.

Sen. Tati Santiesteban, D-El Paso and chairman of the subcommittee on educational quality, said his panel would review issues ranging from extracurricular activitiies to testing and promotion requirements.

Bitter lessons

Reagan talks peace at Normandy ceremony

OMAHA BEACH, France (AP) - President Reagan, in a pilgrimage to the Normandy beaches on the 40th anniversary of the D-Day invasion, said Wednesday America stands willing to "wipe from the face of the Earth the terrible weapons man now has in his hands.'

At a ceremony atop cliffs scaled by U.S. Rangers at the dawn of the great Allied invasion, Reagan spoke of the "bitter lessons" of World War II and declared, "I tell you from my heart that we in the United States do not want war.'

Reagan spoke from Pointe du Hoc, a spike of land that juts into the English Channel where 225 U.S. Rangers assaulted the 130-foot cliffs at dawn on D-

At that point, the Rangers silenced a battery of six long-range German guns. The losses were heavy only 90 of the 225 Rangers could still carry arms after two days of fighting.

The lonely point of land was the first of three American invasion sites Reagan visited with his wife Nancy. It lies between the two famous beaches — Omaha and Utah — where 50,000 men from the U.S. First Army attacked along the crescent-shaped

Standing before a rough-hewn granite obelisk on the cliff's edge commemorating the Rangers' exploits, Reagan recalled the "great reconciliation" between the vanguished and the victors after the

"In truth, there is no reconciliation we would welcome more than a reconciliation with the Soviet Union, so together, we can lessen the risks of war, now and forever," he said, striking the theme he set for the day of solemn memory and celebration of

"We want to wipe from the face of the Earth the terrible weapons man now has in his hands. I tell you we are ready to seize that beachhead." the president said in his remarks. "But we wait for some sign from the Soviet Union that they are willing to move forward, that they share our desire for love and peace, that they will give up the ways of conquest.'

In an interview with Walter Cronkite of CBS News after his speech, Reagan said his common sense makes him optimistic that the United States and Soviet Union will resume their arms control talks that broke off in December.

"We're so used to thinking that they're always in the midst of some kind of devious plan," Reagan said. "I just don't think they have any answers right now, and they're sort of hunkered down, trying to

Speaking to 62 of the Army Rangers who scaled the cliffs that stormy day 40 years ago to silence the Nazis' big guns, Reagan said, "These are heroes who helped end a war.'

The Rangers were the vanguard of an invasion force of 156,205 Allied troops, including 73,000 Americans. On the first day, more than 10,000 Allied troops were killed, wounded or missing.

On D-Day, high seas swamped landing boats, and driving rain obscured the invaders' vision, helping to conceal their intentions from the enemy but making their assault through smoke and fire even more difficult. Reagan, with calm seas and a bright but cloudy sky for a backdrop Wednesday, unveiled a plaque with the names of the Rangers killed in the

"I wish my husband had been here to see all of this," said Margaret Rudder of Bryan, Texas, widow of Lt. Col. James Earl Rudder who led the assault. Then Reagan walked along the narrow, winding path among the bomb craters and shattered German blockhouses, stopping to inspect one of the Nazi strongholds

Offshore, the nuclear-powered aircraft carrier U.S.S. Eisenhower stood silhouetted against the horizon of the English Channel, a gray symbol of the massive armada of 5,000 ships and landing craft assembled there 40 years ago.

Reagan honors Gen. Roosevelt

OMAHA BEACH France (AP) - President Reagan Wednesday paused at the grave of Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., a president's son who was reprimanded by General George Patton's military police for his favorite combat uniform of "carpet slippers, a woolen cap and a cane."

Nancy Reagan placed a bank of flowers before the

simple white cross.

Brig. Gen. Roosevelt was probably one of the oldest old soldiers to land on Normandy beach. A "surplus brigadier," the 57-year-old son of President Teddy Roosevelt persuaded the commander of the U.S. 4th Division to let him go ashore and "steady the

He is credited with making the vital decision to switch some of the landings from Red Beach, where infantrymen were being slaughtered in a murderous cross fire, to Green Beach. It took the Germans three hours to shift their entrenched big guns, and by that time the assault wave was moving inland toward Ste. Mere Eglise to join up with the paratroopers.

Roosevelt, a Medal of Honor winner who also fought in World War I, died of a heart attack a month after D-Day. He is buried next to his brother, Quentin, a pilot killed in World War I, and the only occupant of the American cemetery overlooking Omaha Beach whose remains were transferred from another military burial ground so the brothers could

Teddy Jr. had fought with the U.S. 1st Division all through Africa and Sicily. Veterans of the Big Red One returning for the 40th anniversary of the landings remember him affectionately as a kindly, offbeat officer who had great rapport with the ordinary G.I. and a low tolerance for protocol on the

"In Sicily," recalled Harold Geary of Copiague, N.Y., who was a sergeant in the combat engineers with the 1st Division, "Patton's M.P.s gave him a ticket for not wearing a helmet. He was in his usual uniform of carpet slippers, a woolen cap and a cane. That's why Patton got rid of him. He was always lousing up the parade dress picture.'

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Others remembered that "a gold flask of the best Scotch was a permanent part of his battle kit."

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
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Soviet peace-niks detained

MOSCOW (AP) — Police guards were placed at the apartments of eight members of an unofficial peace group Wednesday to prevent them from circulating a petition urging a U.S.-Soviet summit, a group member said.

The group member, who spoke on the condition he not be identified, told Western reporters by telephone that the eight Muscovites were not being allowed to leave their homes.

After the police guards were put in place, three other group members went to a Moscow prosecutor's office to complain and seek permission to collect signatures for their petition, the caller said.

Such permission was denied, and one of the three, Nikolai Kramov, prisoned or sent into exile.

was detained for three hours, the peace group member said. Kramov was later returned to his apartment and placed under police guard, the caller said.

On Saturday, Kramov and another group member, Aleksei Luznikov, were detained by police for several hours after collecting some 300 signatures on a petition, group members have said.

The caller said Wednesday that the organization, known as "The Group for Establishing Trust Between the U.S.S.R. and the U.S.A.," would continue its activities.

The group, which operates without official sanction, was founded in June 1982. Its members have complained of harassment by authorities and some have been im-

NBA series tied with Celtics win

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) -'It's turning into the series everyone said it was going to be,' said Los Angeles Lakers Coach Pat Riley

The National Basketball Association title showdown between historic rivals Los Angeles and Boston, which briefly appeared in danger of being dominated by the Lakers, is "turning out" to be wellplayed, spirited, aggressive - and

The Celtics, written off by some after a 33-point loss Sunday that gave Los Angeles a 2-1 edge in the best-of-seven series, stormed back to tie the playoffs with a dramatic 129-125 overtime victory Wednesday night at the Lakers' Forum.

"I think it just shows the character of our team," said the Celtics' Larry Bird, whose 29 points included a 15-foot fallaway jumper that snapped a 123-123 tie

with 16 seconds left in overtime. "No matter how far down we are, until we lose that fourth game, we're still in it," said Bird, who also had a game-high 21 rebounds.

After Bird's basket, which he fired in over the Lakers' Magic Johnson, James Worthy of Los Angeles was fouled and made one of two free throws. The Celtics' Dennis Johnson retaliated by sink ing two free throws to put Boston up 127-124 with 10 seconds remaining.

M.L. Carr then clinched the victory, the Celtics' second overtime win of the series, by stealing Worthy's inbounds pass and dunking the ball to make it 129-124 with seven seconds left

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar led the Lakers with 32 points, but he fouled out with 16 seconds left in regulation. Despite the fact that Worthy pumped in 10 of his 30 points in the five-minute overtime, the absence of Abdul-Jabbar gave Boston an

"It was a very happy time for me when Kareem fouled out," said Boston Coach K.C. Jones. "But then when I saw what Worthy was doing in overtime. I regretted that Kareem was out.

Five consecutive points by the Celtics in the final 39 seconds of regulation forced the overtime. A three-point play by Boston center Robert Parish, who had 25 points, and then two free throws by Bird with 16 seconds left knotted the game at 113

Jones praised the play of Dennis Johnson, who was coming off two poor games. Johnson scored eight of his 22 points in overtime Wednesday.

"D.J. had a game that helped pull us out of this thing," said Jones, whose club faces the Lakers in Game 5 Friday night in Boston. The way they (the Laker defenders) were all over Larry, it made it difficult for him to get shots and D.J. took up the slack."

The Celtics appeared to lure the Lakers, who prefer to fast break and play finesse basketball, into their more physical style of play.

Heated words were exchanged on a couple of occasions, including once between the usually mild mannered Abdul-Jabbar and Bird, and a scuffle broke out during the third quarter after Boston's Kevin McHale and Gerald Henderson both sailed into Los Angeles' Kurt Rambis as he was driving for a

'Boston's whole strategy was to throw us off our game by turning it in a rough-and-tumble contest,' said Worthy. "At times that's exactly what they did and it affected our concentration.'

And it also led to a lot of fouls, including the six by Abdul-Jabbar, who rarely fouls out of games

"We just came out more ag-gressive," said Bird. "We weren't really looking for a fight. Some tempers flared, but it wasn't that

Of the exchange with Abdul-Jabbar, which came after Bird had fouled the Laker center, Bird said: 'The elbows he was throwing were coming pretty close. I caught an elbow once before and wound up in the hospital, and I wasn't going to let him get away with it.

Most of the players on both sides downplayed the roughness, including Rambis, who crashed to the floor when McHale and Hender son sandwiched him.

"It was a good, aggressive play," said the Laker forward. "I'd have done the same to them.

Boston trailed 68-58 at halftime, and Jones seemed to be worried that the Lakers, who've lost in seven previous series finals with the Celtics, were going to end that dominance. Asked what he told his club at the break, Jones smiled and joked: "Call in the hounds and put out the fire, the hunt's over.
