Spring Skeleton ID'd as ex-patient

have identified human skeletal remains that were found June 20 on Interstate 20 east of Sweetwater as William M. Taylor, 35, a former patient at the Big Spring State Hospital.

Dallas pathologist Dr. M.G.S. Gilliland of the Institute of Forensic Science made the identification by matching Taylor's dental

ABILENE — Authorities here records with the skeleton's teeth, according to Nolan County Sheriff Jim Blackley.

Blackley said the identification was completed after his office fielded 35 calls from persons across the nation who said their relatives were missing.

One such call, from Noleen Buchalla of Abilene, concerned her brother, Taylor, who left Big Spring State Hospital on Dec. 17, 1982,

Autopsy reports show Taylor's cause of death to be "unexplained." However, Blackley said he believed the man died of exposure a few days after he "walked away" from the Career Village at the hospital.
"We were told he had become

disenchanted with work, and he

was an explosive type of person who'd just get mad and walk off," Blackley said Friday after speaking with hospital personnel.

Blackley, who said he does not suspect foul play in the case, said clothes found with the skeletal remains were the same garments Taylor was wearing when he left the hospital: two coats, two shirts

and a pair of pants.

Taylor had been a patient at several state hospitals since he was 6 years old; Blackley said.

A.K. Smith, superintendent of the Big Spring State Hospital, said Taylor was living at the Career Village, which houses "discharged patients not able to live independently in the community.'

House okays farm workers' insurance bill

AUSTIN - The Texas House gave tentative approval Friday night to a Senate-passed bill rewriting the state law that has left many farm and ranch workers without workers' compensation coverage.

In a 87-55 vote, the House backed the measure that would make the insurance coverage mandatory for most agricultural workers, including the poor migrant laborers who travel the state.

Larry Don Shaw, D-Big Spring, voted for the bill.

The bill faces another House vote before going to Gov. Mark White. The new law would extend man-

datory workers' compensation coverage to most farm and ranch workers for the first time in the 70 years of the program. Small family farms would be excluded from the mandatory coverage for its

State District Judge Harley Clark of Austin ruled in March that the exclusion of farm workers made the workers' compensation law unconstitutional.

House sponsor Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, said the measure - with its exemption for small farmers would prevent the courts from forcing on the state a "complete coverage" law.

Rep. Tom Uher, D-Bay City, spoke against the bill, saying it would be costly to farmers already facing a money crunch.

"That little guy who gets up and goes to work at sun-up ... is going to have to bear the brunt of those premiums," Uher said, calling the bill "one more straw on their backs."

The current law leaves out agricultural workers because lawmakers felt that kind of work See Workers page 2-A

House takes up education plan

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau AUSTIN - House lawmakers, facing a tangled web of parliamen-

tary restrictions, begin debate Saturday on a \$4.87 billion tax bill that could decide the fate of a comprehensive education reform package.

House-Senate conference committee, is expected to win final legislative approval over the

weekend. But lawmakers also face the ticklish task of funding the measure. The House - where all tax bills must originate - meets on tax plan then would head to the Senate for scrutiny.

House leaders, mindful that failure to tentatively approve a tax plan by midnight Saturday could delay implementation of the education reform measures a year, began counting their votes Friday.

House rules prohibit adoption in the last 72 hours of legislation that has not won tentative approval. The 30-day special session, called by Gov. Mark White to address education and highway im- ment services and repair charges. provements, ends at midnight Tuesday.

'Viva Cuba Libre!'

Cuban prisoners welcomed to U.S.

MIAMI (AP) - Twenty-six newly freed Cuban political prisoners were greeted by 200 relatives and friends Friday with screams of joy, embraces, a spontaneous chorus of their island's national anthem and a bellow of "Viva Cuba Libre!"

Some of those in the waiting crowd included people released earlier from Cuban prisons and wearing black and white T-shirts with an enormous letter "P" on the

The new arrivals were released Wednesday in Havana to the Rev. Jesse Jackson, who also obtained freedom for 22 U.S. citizens held in Cuban prisons

A bus carried the ex-prisoners from an Air Florida plane to the crowd gathered on a satellite field of Miami International Airport. Several of the welcomers hoisted

a huge sign lettered in bright orange: "Sturmio. Welcome to Miami." It greeted Esturmio Mesa, a 54-year-old farmer from Guantanamo, Cuba, imprisoned

The crowd surged forward as the bus approached and even police on motorcycles were unable to clear a path for the vehicle swarmed aboard, screaming and crying, hugging and kissing.

Jesus Santana Alvarez, 51, one of the first off the bus, said he was sentenced to 20 years but was held an extra eight months. He doesn't

He obviously was glad to be out of prison, but added: "I have so many family members and friends in Cuba.

There was a tight cluster of people around each of the former captives, and the T-shirted exprisoners darted from one new arrival to another asking for news of those still behind bars.

Social workers from the United States Catholic Conference stood by, ready to arrange lodging for those without relatives in Miami. However, they didn't expect their services to be needed in the crush of friends and relatives

White-haired Jose Otero, 63, was pushed to a waiting car by his wife Dalia, who warded off reporters angrily. He had been in a punishment cell since 1978 for refusing government indoctrination. He said his bed was of stone, his toilet a hole in the floor and shutters over the bars kept out light.

Said a broadly smiling Waldo Munoz, "I am happy to be in the land of liberty.'

Weather

Rains pound state

Heavy rains pounded northern and southern sections of Texas Friday as temperatures dropped by 10 to 15 degrees in many areas of the state.

The mercury in Tyler dipped to 76 degrees Friday afternoon when a rainshower passed over, the National Weather Service said. Highs reached the upper 90s in some southern sections of the state.

Widely scattered showers and thunderstorms covered Northeast Texas during most of the day. Heavy thunderstorms were reported over the Gulf

Winds were variable around the state at 5 to 10 mph. In the lower coast, southerly winds were at 10 to 15 Mostly cloudy conditions prevailed across the

southern half of the state while partly cloudy skies covered the northern half. For the weekend, the weather service called for

partly cloudy skies over most of the state through Sunday with widely scattered afternoon thunderstorms. Lows are expected to be in the 70s, with highs in the 90s in the north and some 100-degree readings in the Rio Grande Valley and along the coast.

The Northwest shivered in unseasonably cool temperatures Friday, while thunderstorms stretched from the Gulf of Mexico to the northern Appalachians, dumping about three-quarters of an inch of hail in


Cool, rainy weather moved across the Northwest, and overnight frost warnings were posted for the Yakima Valley in south-central Washington.


Some street flooding was reported in Newcomerstown, Ohio, where the National Weather Service said hail from an afternoon severe thunderstorm amounted to three-quarters of an inch.

The thunderstorms moved through parts of South Carolina, bringing locally heavy rain. Thunderstorms also were scattered from the Gulf coast to the Carolinas, while showers and thunderstorms were widely scattered through the northern and central Appalachians, and from southwest Arizona to southeast California.

was less dangerous than industrial work. But the increased use of made farm and ranch work more dangerous, statistics show.

In 1979, the nation recorded about 3,500 agriculture workrelated deaths. Another 190,000 disabling injuries also occurred. according to the National Safety Council. The House approved a similar

measure last year, but it died in the Senate when Amarillo Sen. Bill Sarpalius' filibuster ran out the clock. Sarpalius was a co-sponsor of the Senate bill approved Thursday.

The bill also died during a June special session last year, a defeat that caused Gov. Mark White, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis to appoint a 25-member committee to negotiate a compromise.

Most seasonal, or temporary,

farm workers would be covered by the bill when it goes into effect Jan. Coverage of most full-time farm workers would be phased in by 1991. The measure excludes from

coverage seasonal employees of farmers with a gross annual payroll of less than \$25,000 a year. Crew leaders would be primarily responsible for providing the in-surance coverage. But the farmer who hired a worker would be responsible of the crew leader failed to get the required coverage.

To qualify for the coverage, seasonal workers would have to work on a truck farm, orchard or vineyard, or work for an employer whose annual payroll exceeds specified levels. The 1985 level would be \$25,000.

Farm and ranch workers who are not migrant or seasonal would be covered if their employers' annual payroll exceeds \$75,000. In 1988 that minimum goes to \$50,000.

1985-86 school year. Tuition increases would continue throughout the 1980s until students would pay about \$19 an hour - or about 15 percent of the cost of their education.

"Everybody wants out of it," Lewis said, calling it a case of "Don't tax me, tax the man behind that tree. House and Senate leaders hope to

have the tax work completed by midnight Monday, or in time to begin collecting the increased revenues at the start of the state's Oct. 1 tax quarter.

There are, however, a host of problems. The Texas Senate, displeased with the House tax product, could substitute its own tax plan and force a House-Senate conference committee to hammer out the differences.

House rules prohibit action on joint conference committee tax reports in less than 48 hours unless two-thirds of the members vote to suspend that restriction.

And state Sen. John Leedom, R-

Dallas, did not rule out the possiblity Friday that he or other conservative senators would try to block the tax bill and education reform package by with a last-minute

filibuster.

Several House members said redesigning the House tax plan to include an across-the-board hike, half- or full-cent state sales tax increase would make the bill more palatable to the Senate and avoid a conference committee.

The education reform package expected to win final legislative approval this weekend closely resembles reforms urged by the Select Committee on Public Education chaired by Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot. The changes include:

 Abolishing the state's 27-member elected State Board of Education in favor of a 15-member appointed board that would revert to an elected panel beginning in

 Increasing teacher salaries, including a minimum \$1,700 annual salary increase for all teachers and a career ladder to reward outstanding public educators.

Imposing teacher competency

· Reducing teacher-student

 Prohibiting students from participating in extracurricular activities if any class grade falls below 70.

2 killed in blast; 7 missing

BUENOS AIRES (AP) - An explosion and dockside fire destroyed the 20,000-ton oil tanker, killing at least two crewmen and forcing temporary evacuation of hundreds of residents of a nearby slum. Six people people were reported missing.

Hector Fiorioli, president of State Petroleum Deposits, the national oil company that owned the tanker Perito Moreno, said the bodies of two crewmen had been found and that a child, believed to be the son of a crewman, was among six people missing.

Undersecretary of Maritime Transport Pedro Casado Bianco, summoned by President Raul Alfonsin to explain the origin of the huge blaze Thursday night, told reporters the fire was started by "a workman lighting a blowtorch."

"I really don't know how such carelessness can be explained," said Casado Bianco following his interview with the president.

Witnesses said the blaze began with a large explo-

sion aboard the 17-year-old Spanish-built tanker, which was unloading a cargo of crude oil at a petroleum storage area, about three miles from downtown Buenos Aires. The first explosion was followed by several smaller blasts.

'It was a series of explosions," said Rodolfo Dagnino, 38, one of three crewmen who said they survived by leaping into the water. "The biggest was right in the middle of the ship. I was on deck and the whole area became an inferno. I jumped into the water and swam to shore.

Flames up to 90 feet high destroyed the vessel within 90 minutes despite the efforts of an estimated 500 firefighters.

The firefighters temporarily evacuated several hundred residents from a nearby shantytown,

Several nearby ships and a tugboat were struck by debris from the tanker, but were moved away from the blaze, firefighters said.





The cost of raising a child

If it seems to you that everything from your children's braces to their school supplies are becoming more expensive, you're right. The latest figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Family Economics Research Group show that the cost of raising children is rising.

The yearly cost of raising a child from birth to age 18 at a moderate cost level, is now estimated at \$90,794 for urban children and \$91,199 for rural nonfarm children. The cost diffrence is due mainly to transportation expenses for rural non-farm children.

Many of the costs of raising a child are "hidden" in regular family expenses. The USDA research calculated costs for food at home; school lunches; food away from home; clothing; housing (including shelter, fuel, utilities, household operations, furnishings and equipment); medical care; education; transportation; and miscellaneous expenses for recreation, personal care and other items.

As any parent of a teenager knows just from look ing in the refrigerator, children cost more as they get older. For example, the annual cost for an urban oneyear-old is \$4,593; for a six-year-old \$4,773; and for a 16-17 year old, \$6,024. The costs are slightly higher for rural non-farm children.

The cost of raising children is certainly no indicator of their worth - which is invaluable. But it can help parents plan their family budget and financial future

PROTECTING YOUR CHILDREN

Each year over 50,000 children are either kidnapped or simply wander off by themselves. National efforts are being made to help parents become more

alert to how this occurs.

A nonprofit agency called Child Find has been established to locate missing children. Child Find estimates that only 5,000 of these missing children are found alive and reunited with their families each year. Many are murdered or are never found.

Parents need to be alert to possible situations that could lead to a kidnapping. Here are some suggestions for parents:

• Do you leave your child alone in a car, store or other public places. Know where your child is at all

• Teach your children how to use the telephone and make sure they know your number, including the area code. Children should also know how to dial the police for an emergency

Fingerprint your child and keep the prints for identification purposes.

 Develop a secret code or secret word that only you and your child can use, especially in case of emergency or danger.

• Tell your child never to go with a stranger Encourage your neighbors to participate in a neighborhood self-help program. Establish a safe home where children can go for help if they are pursued by a stranger while playing outdoors or going to

Parents can take preventative measures by teaching their children to be aware of dangerous situations and to say "no." If more parents taken the time to help their children understand what possible dangers exist, perhaps the alarming number of missing children can be reduced.

Drip irrigation combats weather

A drip irrigation system can be the answer to growing plenty of quality vegetables during dry weather. Such system applies water to the soil at the center of the row with great precision and economy. It's possible to reduce water usage in a garden by

more than 50 percent with a well designed system. Drip irrigation involves a system of plastic pipes with tiny openings called "emmitters" which deliver water, drop by drop, into the soil at the base of plants along the row. The water soaks in immediately when the rate of irrigation is adjusted correctly. No water is wasted because there is neither flooding nor

Home garden drip systems operate at low pressure 4 to 10 pounds per square inch of tubing. Most gardeners quickly learn how often and how long to operate their drip systems to satisfy their plants' water needs. Even when a drip system is on, the middles between rows are dry enough to walk on, permitting harvesting and other garden work during irrigation. On the other hand, sprinkler and furrow

irrigated gardens are too wet to walk in for a day or two after each irrigation.

Drip-irrigation plants are more productive, and water is not sprayed over the leaves as with

sprinkler irrigation, thus reducing disease problems. Soil is not waterlogged as with furrow irrigation, so more oxygen is available to plant roots at all times. The entire soil surface can be mulched without interfering with irrigation; this stops moisture loss by evaporation.

At the current rates for city water, savings in water cost alone can pay for a drip system in less than two growing seasons. A homeowner using furrow irrigation on a 1,000 square foot garden twice weekly for a month in midsummer applies about 10,000 gallons of water. That amount could be cut in half with a drip irrigation system. Thus, over a full season of gardening, water savings can be

Drip irrigation system costgs vary widely but are reasonable for home the gardener. A system last for 4 to 10 years, depending on its care.

Stroke affects man's speech, recall

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: We are care of the Big Spring Herald, going through the trying experience of living with stroke - my husband's. He had one several weeks ago. His "rehab" period in the hospita! is over and he is back home with us. He is relatively young, 54, and the most difficult part of it is communication. His speech is still slurred and he cannot come up with words he needs. It is frustrating, especially since he was such an articulate person before. We cannot understand why he has such a time recalling words and things. Maybe you have few words to help us and others like us. Mrs. R.O.

Stroke is a complex event, but you don't have to understand the intricate details of how the brain is affected. Let me use the example of speech. This is the main communication disruption for the stroke victim.

Often, continued speech therapy can help immensely. Speech difficulty is compounded by the loss of vocabulary. The brain has two separate capacities in this regard, that of retaining information and of recalling that information. The stroke victim's basic problem is of recall. Restoring this recall function takes time, and improvement usually comes in bits and snatches. Recall for recent information is usually more difficult than that for the less immediate kind.

The ultimate extent of recovery in all areas depends on the severity of the stroke. The victim faces the added burden of the misunderstanding of those around him. The family's most important function is patience, support and dedication to progress. Many fine publications are available from hospitals. Ask for them.
