## Eagle Scout Awards Presented To Two Scouts at Clyde Tuesday

Two Clyde High School sophomores were presented Eagle Scout awards Tuesday night at a regular meeting of the Clyde Lions Club, Scout troop sponsor. Morris Dan Callaway, 15, and Tommy Cook, 15, were given the awards by Homer E. Swofford, local insurance man, spokesman for the club.

Attending the 6:15 p. m. dinner were Henry McGinty and O. K. Reynolds, Southern District Scout executives, both of Abilene.

Before presenting the awards to the two boys, Swofford reminded them of the three new "R's", not the same as the three R's learned in school books. They were responsibility, respectability and reverence.

"These are the foundation of a citizen and of a man," he added.

"You are using Scouting as a tool to develop boys such as these," McGinty told the near 30 assembled Lions and visitors. Reynolds said the boys' parents, the local Scoutmaster and citizens of the town were responsible for the boys receiving the awards.

Morris Dan is the third member of his family to receive the Eagle award. His father, Ted Callaway, local Scoutmaster, is also an Eagle Scout, as well as his older brother, Jerry.

Morris is on the high school football squad and has been a Scout since 1954.

Tommy, first string quarterback with the Clyde Bulldogs as a freshman last year, has also been a Scout since 1954. He also lettered in baseball, basketball and was on the track team last year.

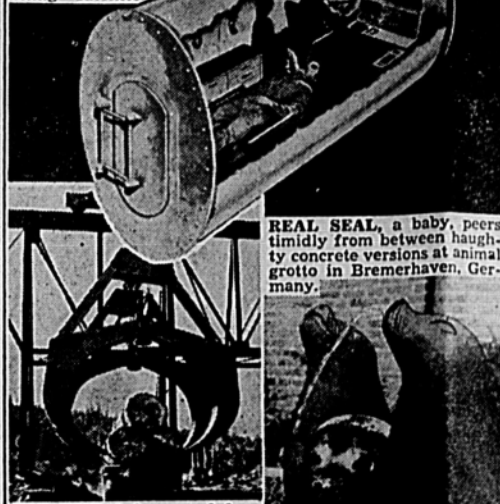

**About Your HEALTH**

"School days, school days. Good ol' golden rule days!" Here they come again, and if you're a wise parent you'll get ready ahead of time.

There is lots to do -- buy clothes, fit shoes -- and if your child is entering the first grade chances are you need a birth certificate copy.

School districts in Texas require that entering students be six years old before September 1. Otherwise they must wait until the following year.

The best means of proving your child's age and birth date is to have a certified copy of his birth certificate.

In many areas of Texas, copies are available from local registrars of vital statistics in health departments or county court houses.

You may also obtain a birth certificate copy from the Division of Vital Statistics of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin.

To do so, you must send one dollar requesting a copy. Be sure to include the child's name, date and place of birth and the parent's name.

It is important that parents take care of this chore as early as possible.

During August and September the Division of Vital Statistics is swamped with literally thousands of requests each week for birth certificate copies.

If you want to be sure your child has his birth certificate when school starts, request it now.

Rough estimates place the number of upcoming first graders at about 250,000. That makes for a lot of birth certificate copies.

In addition to birth certificates, it would be wise to check with your school district regarding any vaccinations that may be required.

It would be a good idea -- if you have not already done so -- to get your child started on his series of three Salk polio shots before school starts.

Also, a fourth shot or "booster" is generally recommended for added protection a minimum of one year after the initial series.

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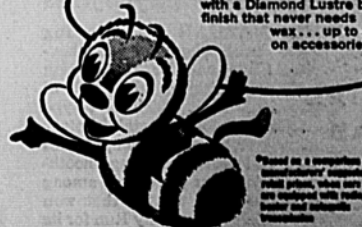

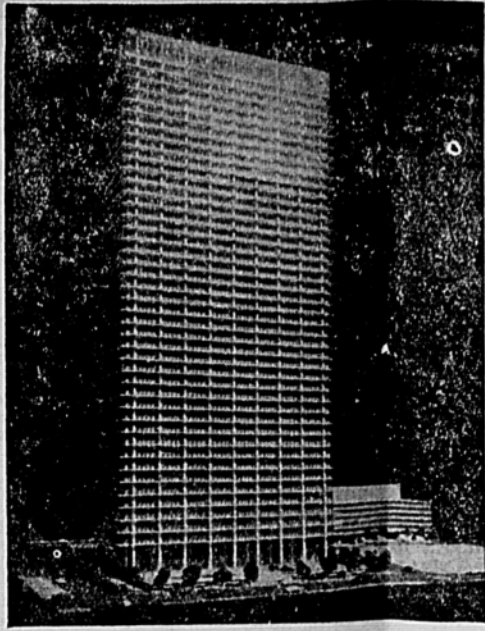

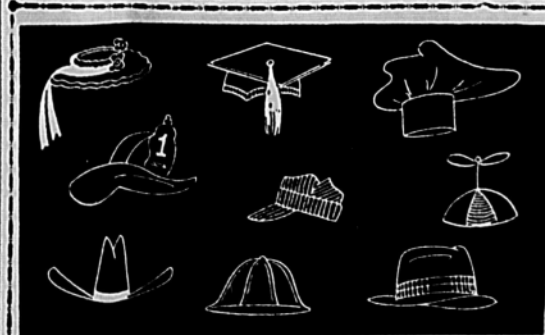

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## Water Safety Act Effective Aug. 11

The phenomenal growth of interest in motorboating and other water sports, during the past few years, has brought about a concentration of statewide problems that were, heretofore, little more than a nuisance with only occasional dire results.

Today, however, the leading problem has been one of how to foster accident prevention with a minimum of regulations and a maximum of protection and freedom for all water sport enthusiasts, i. e., fisherman, swimmer, skiers and just plain pleasure craft operators.

Texas' new Water Safety Act is the first statewide attempt to promote safety in water sports by broad legislative means.

In brief, the Water Safety Act hits at the problem in three general ways: By specifying minimum safety equipment and operation (Part I); Providing penalties for unsafe operation, or non-compliance with the Act, and a means of enforcement (Part II); Finally, by making provisions for boat identification through a numbering system.

A condensed explanation of this system is the duty of Part III.

On August 11, of this year, the Texas Highway Department will begin administering all provisions of the Act. However, boat owners have a March 31, 1960 deadline to make application for a Certificate of Numbers (registration). The deadline for dealers and manufacturers is April 1, 1960, after which time each boat manufactured and sold must be complete with numbers.

The act requires that the number painted upon or attached to the hull be of block characteristics of good proportion, not less than three inches in height, and read from left to right. The number must be displayed on each side of the bow and kept in a legible condition. Each Texas number will carry the prefix: TX Classification and Fees

Each of the following classes of boats will be registered for three year period for the fees shown:

Class A: Less than 16 feet in length, \$1.00.  
Class 1: 16 feet and over and less than 26 feet in length, \$5.00.  
Class 2: 26 feet or over and less than 40 feet in length, \$10.  
Class 3: 40 feet and over in length, \$12.50.

All motorboats of 10 horsepower or under are exempt from the numbering provisions of the Act. Although it should be pointed out to boat owners in this category that the Certificate of Number system offers good, inexpensive means of positive identification for proof of ownership purposes.

Applications must be made on a form approved by the Texas Highway Department and be accompanied with the proper fee. Upon receipt of the application, the Department will maintain a record and issue him a Certificate of Number stating the number awarded the motorboat and name and address of the owner.

If the owner transfers any or all of his interest in a motorboat registered in his name, or if the boat is abandoned or destroyed, he must notify the Department, within a reasonable time and surrender his Certificate of Number.

A person who buys a motorboat that has been previously registered under this Act, must make application to the Department for a transfer of Certificate of Number. The application must be accompanied by proof of evidence or ownership,

name, address and \$1.00 transfer fee. Owner must also notify the Department of any change in address.

**Dealers-Manufacturers**

All new boats manufactured for sale in Texas after April 1, 1960, must carry a manufacturer's serial number stamped on or laminated into the structure of a boat before the owner can obtain a Certificate of Number.

The Act makes special provisions for dealers and manufacturers in the use of boats for demonstration purposes and for selling boats with a temporary facsimile Certificate of Number. The 3-year fee for a dealer or manufacturer is \$25.00.

**Excess Funds**

Sportsmen will be pleased to learn that excess funds accrued from boat registration fees, above administrative costs, must be used for purchasing access ways to public waters, boat ramps and for their maintenance.

## About Your Health

There is a new killer in our midst! Actually it isn't so new. There have been deaths from this cause for a few years now.

The tragic thing about this new killer is he strikes at infants and toddling children — the ones that can't protect themselves!

This killer comes in several forms. He appears as a crib sheet, pillow case, bib, and worst of all, a TOY.

However, this killer is easily recognized by grown ups. It is the clear plastic that is used for so many purposes these days. Take shirts. Bags made out of this plastic are just perfect for protecting the shirt from dust and at the same time displaying the product.

But when are such plastic materials used as crib sheets? Last year in Texas, three infants, eight, seven, and five months old suffocated because they accidentally pulled the plastic sheet over their face.

A month later a plastic sheet claimed another victim. And still another month later a five month old infant playing with a plastic bag pulled it over her head and suffocated.

**As It Looks From Here...**

One of the strangest lobbies appeared in Washington this week. The representatives of this lobby have periodically visited the Capitol for the past several years.

They are a group of Amish bishops and ministers who ask help from Congressmen to be freed from Federal Old Age and Survivors' Insurance and Social Security.

The Amish, a group of the Mennonite religious faith, are opposed to participation in the program because of their beliefs. In their habits and mode of conduct they remain much as they were in the 17th Century.

It's a Paradox that two hours of driving from the hustle and bustle of the nation's Capital will bring one to great communities of these people. Along the roads leading through the area where they live are signs posted, "Slow - Watch for Horse-drawn Vehicles."

When an agent of the FBI before the war, it was my privilege to know some of these folks in Indiana and Ohio. Visiting them, the first thing I noticed was the fine barns, good stock, immaculate premises, and well built houses.

Although few conveniences -- no rugs on the floors, no telephones or radio, and, today, no television aerials on the houses, everything was always spotlessly clean, always the very best of substantial food.

Their clothing is severe -- dark clothes, some homespun; low-crowned, broad-brimmed hats for the men -- long black dresses, gray or black bonnets for the women.

In some of the smaller towns and villages no one drives his automobile on the town square on Saturday afternoon for fear of scaring the horses, even if there is a parking place.

The long-bearded men are serious but friendly. They are a patient, hard-working and independent people, but they want no part of child welfare, old age assistance, social security, or any other Government assistance. They are protesting for having been brought under the law's provisions.

They have their own matchless social security system through family unity and community self-sufficiency.

It is strange that two hours away from the Pentagon, where is discussed daily intercontinental missiles, nuclear powered submarines, airplanes, and trips to the moon, one may see the 17th Century.

In striking contrast may perhaps suggest an analogy in that these independent and self-sufficient people, whom we call backward, are so near the progressiveness of all the new things which have come about in these recent years, including numerous types of Government aid to people.

While most of us struggle for better things of life, called "a higher standard of living," which means all the gadgets for conveniences, many of us have seemingly lost a lot of what the Amish retain as a part of their religious living. Our concern for the "better things" becomes an obsession, which gives us little time for anything else. The concern for security alone has a tendency to level and stereotype all people -- as to what we do, think, eat, wear, where we live, how we raise our family, and

the kind of Government we have.
