





Water Safety Act Effective Aug. 11

In breif, the Water Safety Act. hits at the problem in three gen-oral ways: By specifing mini-mum safety equipment and op-oration (Part I); Providing pen-olities for unsafe operation, or non-compliance with the Act, and a means of enforcement (Part II); Finally by making (Part II); Finally, by making provisions for boat identification through a numbering system.

A condensed explanation of this system is the duty of Part III.

On August 11, of this year, the Texas Highway Department will begin administering all provi-sions of the Act. However, boat of




