"On the sides of it are small prickly spines, like little fish bones. One of its antennae has broke off, and it's got two little beady eyes.


"It's got spider legs, and at the tip of each one are suckers. It will stick to anything it touches, and it jumps like a

Club rides high in community

oft-spoken Arthur Palomino's eyes light up as he manages a faint smile and recalls ALSA's first memorable meeting in a friend's garage some five years ago.

ALSA, which began as a low-rider car club, is now known for its community service by the Big Spring's Northside residents. The club of some 13 members still sport low-rider cars as their trademark, but the direction of this all-Mexican

club has changed dramatically. Having a low-rider car used to be a prerequisite for membership, but the club currently only has three low-rider cars, Palomino said. ALSA uses the Northside Community Center for meetings.

ALSA members, who hail from all parts of the city, have worked closely with the Northside Community Center, Texas Little League, the Boy's Club of Big Spring and other civic organizations, Palomino said. ALSA has furnished trophies for tournaments and held fund raisers for the boy's club, a local boxing team and the Northside

"We work to help this community center most-

ly, but if anyone else asked us to help them, we would," said member Ben Garcia. "We think the community is more important now. We enjoy

The founder of the club, George Gutierrez, came from California five years ago and formed the club with community service in mind, Palomino said. Gutierrez is no longer a member of the club but still offers help, he said.

All the members have known each other since elementary school, said one member. The key to the club's survival has been the camaraderie among the members, Palomino said.

When the club was formed the members decided not to elect a president, wanting all the members to have a voice in the club.

"When we started no one had seen low riders before," said Garcia, "The police and some of the people thought we were going to cause trouble. But instead, we helped people.

'We did not want to burn our name, and we have been successful. We have never been in trouble.

The members must adhere to strict rules set by the club members, Garica said. All candidates must go through a four-week probationary period before they can be considered for membership. See ALSA page 2-A

Doggett vs. Gramm

Is labor vs. business

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Senate candidates Lloyd Doggett and Phil Gramm are splitting campaign money from political action committees down a narrow laborbusiness line.

Labor union political action committees, or PACs, contributed more than two-thirds of the PAC money received so far this year by Democrat Doggett, a state senator from Austin.

Corporate and industrysponsored PACs made up just about the same amount of the 1984 PAC contributions received by Republican Gramm, a congressman from College Station.

Conversely, Doggett reported no significant corporate donations, and Gramm listed only one contribution from a labor union. PACs accounted for about 12 per-

cent of Gramm's contributions and about 13 percent of Doggett's. Doggett is an attorney and 11-year veteran of the state Senate, representing a moderate-to-liberal

district that includes the Universi-

ty of Texas. Gramm, a former economics professor at Texas A&M University, first was elected to the U.S. House in 1978 as a Democrat. He switched parties last year, resigned his seat and won re-election as a Republican after the Democratic leadership bumped him from the ing President Reagan's economic

programs. Gramm easily won the Republican primary. Doggett defeated Lubbock Congressman Kent Hance in a runoff. They are seeking the seat being vacated by Republican John Tower, who is retiring.

According to campaign finance reports filed with the Federal Election Commission, Gramm was the leading money-raiser as of June 30, the end of the last reporting period, with \$3.3 million, of which about \$395,000 came from PACs.

Corporate or industry PACs gave about \$160,000 to Gramm, who has collected \$235,000 from PACs so far

PACs sometimes split donations between opposing candidates in the same race, but the only apparent shared contributor for Doggett and Gramm was the Freedom Fund, sponsored by the Houston law firm Fulbright and Jaworski, which gave each candidate \$2,000.

Inmates take 9 hostage

BOYDTON, Va. (AP) — Inmates armed with handmade knives took eight men and one woman hostage Saturday at the maximum-security Mecklenburg Correctional Center, site of the largest death row breakout in U.S. history in May, a prison spokesman said.

Two male guards who had been stabbed were released by midafternoon and were hospitalized in stable condition, while hostages still being held were reported safe Saturday night, officials said.

The inmates later issued 15 demands that included removal of present prison officials, "halt of unjust treatment ... for certain acts," "more fruit and less pork," and an end "to harrassment of death row prisoners.'

"Right now we have seven people held hostage in Building 5, six correctional officers and a food service worker," said Corrections Department spokesman Wayne Farrar.

"Two other officers were also taken hostage but were released because of injury. One guy had stab wounds around the head and the other had stab wounds around the head and abdomen and ap-parently had been beaten. They let them come down in the elevator,"

Showers dot state

Scattered showers and thunderstorms sprinkled much of the state Saturday, but the rain missed the central sections of the state and the Big Bend area.

Afternoon temperatures were dropped in areas that received rain as clouds and showers held readings mostly in the 80s over the Coastal Plains and East Texas.

A weak lower pressure system stretching along the Coastal Plains into Northeast Texas made rain a little more prevalent in those areas.

The rain was welcomed in most areas, but was causing some interruptions to the cotton harvest in the southern third of the state.

Southeast breezes were the rule with speeds generally 10 to 15 miles an hour. Temperatures in other parts of the state were in the

90s, except for the rain-drenched areas.

Guadalupe Pass in the Big Bend area had the coolest temperature Saturday afternoon at 66 degrees. Cotulla in South Texas recorded 98 degrees.

* Widely scattered thunderstorms were predicted for eastern portions of the state Sunday and Sunday night. Lows were expected to be in the 70s with highs in the

West Texas should have scattered thunderstorms with continued warm afternoons and mild nights. Lows Sunday will be near 65 in the Panhandle and mountains to 72 degrees in the southern sections. Highs Sunday and Monday will be in the 90s except near 100 in the Big Bend valleys.


Thunderstorms spattered a broad band from the Gulf Coast to the Great Lakes on Saturday, and one strong storm spawned a tornado in Indiana.


Showers and thunderstorms affected the Texas Gulf Coast and extended over the remainder of the Gulf Coast, the Tennessee Valley, the Ohio Valley and the

A tornado touched down in a field northwest of Indianapolis during the morning, the National Weather Service said.

The Indiana storms also brought heavy rain. The town of Sheridan, northeast of Indianapolis, got 21/2 inches of rain during a 3-hour period that caused some lowland flooding.

Elsewhere, showers and occasional thunderstorms also reached from northwestern Oklahoma across central Kansas and from the upper Plains into Minnesota.



Hijackers ask for asylum

TEHRAN - Three "Moslems from Lebanon" who hijacked an Air France jetliner to Tehran have asked for political asylum in Iran, the official Islamic Republic News Agency reported

The agency also quoted an Iranian foreign ministry official as saying that the hijackers, who are being detained in Iran, managed to smuggled submachine guns, grenades and other weapons onto the plane by putting them in their luggage.

Barbie's appeal denied

STRASBOURG - The European Commission on Human Rights has dismissed a complaint that Klaus Barbie's rights were violated when Bolivia turned the former Gestapo chief of Lyon, France, over to French authorities last year.

Barbie, a Bolivian citizen since 1957, was expelled from Bolivia in February 1983 and put on an airplane for Cayenne, French Guiana. The French took him into custody there and immediately flew him to France.

He now is in prison in Lyon awaiting trial on charges of crimes against humanity.

BANGKOK - A youth who had been denied free admission lobbed a hand grenade ito spectators at an open-air movie in Phetchabun province, killing five people and injuring 33, a provincial police chief said Saturday.



The real issues in police vote

Big Spring voters need to give careful thought to next Saturday's city charter election to decide whether the chief of police should be elected or appointed.

Voters need to look beyond the red herrings such as bumpy streets and water quality that have nothing to do with effective law enforcement. They need to ignore petty peeves and gripes about city government and personalities and consider what is beneficial to everyone in Big Spring.

Those who are pushing to have the chief elected are playing for any emotional response or negative reaction they can in order to hide the real reasons behind this election.

What are these hidden reasons?

1. This election is an attempt by those involved in the drug traffic in Howard County to gain control of the Big Spring Polie Department. If the measure passes, they can run their own candidate in a well-financed campaign.

2. They can think of no other way to get rid of Chief Rick Turner who has been responsible for putting a severe dent in

Many citizens will remember that when the Herald did a survey of Big Spring High School students last September, 45percent of the students admitted to at least experimenting with drugs. That is a lucrative market the drug dealers don't want to have cut off.

Turner has dedicated himself to cutting off the supply of drugs in the community, and he asked the FBI to conduct an investigation which has resulted in eight local residents pleading guilty to drug charges in the federal courts. Another local investigation has resulted in grand jury indictments against seven other suspects.

We must keep in mind, however, the comments just this week by U.S. District Court Judge Harold Woodward as he sentenced two of those people. Woodward said the government hasn't even scratched the network of drugs in Big Spring. "I am convinced this ring is still in existence," he said.

Those who followed the testimony in the Guy Talbot trial in federal court saw a sordid picture of the insidious workings of the drug traffic which has touched the lives of many families in this community.

Personalities probably should not be an issue in this election, but, like it or not, Rick Turner is an issue. He has made some mistakes, as he freely admits. He has some shortcomings in his public relations, because he is a man who says what he thinks. He has been critical of the local criminal justice system, which has not endeared him to some local politicians. He has been willing though to sit down and talk out differences with those who are willing to talk with him.

For his efforts to give Big Spring effective law enforcement and for his accomplishments in fighting the drug traffic in this area, every concerned citizen owes him appreciation and gratitude.

Is it any wonder the drug dealers want to get rid of him? Voters also should realize the pettiness behind this election. The petition to call for the election was started by two bail bond agents who objected to the chief's policy of protecting the city from lawsuits by holding drunks in jail until they were sober or until they were ordered released by a magistrate.

Of the people who signed the petition, at least 286 are persons who have been arrested in the past. Their arrests involved 867 misdemeanor and 79 felony offenses. Drugs were involved in 47 of the offenses. If one adds the family members of these people, this group with some gripe against the police represents nearly half of those who signed the petition.

Voters need to think about what kind of chief they might get when the only qualification in the proposed amendment is that a candidate has to have lived in Big Spring for only one year. What if there were only one candidate backed by the drug

Voters need to think about how effective law enforcement is likely to be when a chief must spend much of his time making sure he will be re-elected.

Those are the issues, not the emotional ploys and red herrings. Voters should not let themselves be sidetracked by pettiness and personal vendettas.

Our first concern should be effective law enforcement. Decisions to enforce the law should not be hampered by political temptations. Our chief must be a professional, not a politician.

We hope truly concerned citizens will vote "against" the charter amendment next Saturday.

An election alternative

I'm writing in regards to the upcoming election on the proposed charter amendment calling for an elected police chief

It seems like both sides are calling each other a special interest group. I feel you have a special interest group whenever a group of people ban together to gain support for their issues. However, it would seem that those against the proposed election of our police chief represent a broader base of interests and groups than those for the elected police

FROM WHAT I'VE been able to gather, the issue came up as the result of the new requirement that bail bondsmen — or bondpersons — be required to have a justice of the peace with them when posting bond on anyone arrested for driving while intoxicated. This procedure is pretty much in line with the "get tougher" attitude adopted by the state towards this problem earlier this year.

It would seem however, that the bail bondsmen do not wish to go through this new procedure, saying they often find it hard — if not impossible — to find a justice of the peace at the late hours most such arrests are made. As a result, the majority of their clients must remain in jail until the following morntime. These bail bondsmen have protested, saying that some of their clients have lost their jobs as a result of this procedure. The question of why they were in the predicament in the first place has never been addressed.

Since these bail bundsmen have been unable to change the system to be more sympathetic to their needs, they are proposing an elected police chief, which raises my first two questions. First of all, if an elected police chief would be free of special interest groups, then why would the bail bondsmen want an elected police chief? Second, are we trying to change our law enforcement agency to be more responsive to the law violators and not those supporting the

So far, many things have been brought into the election issue. They've been trying to gain support by confusing and inflaming many voters with false statements. They tell undecided voters that they have the endorsement and support of a well known citizen...a citizen who has publicly announced that he

Vote against the proposed charter amendment Saturday, Aug. 11th.



Some reporters and wellmeaning people will insist on using Hispanic or Mexican-American to be courteous. However, John Doe, whom we'll assume is an Anglo, is not described as an Anglo-American.

The different uses of titles for nationalities can cause problems for a newspaper. Reporters describe a person from Mexico as a Mexican national. If he's an illegal alien from the same country, he is still a Mexican national. So why not call a Mexican from the United States a

To complicate matters even more, some government and law enforcement agencies classify Mexicans as "white". The newspaper has not received any complaints concerning that usage. Michael, whose whereabouts are unknown, would have added a twist and more flair to this explanation.

Undoubtedly, he would have said it was a topic that centered mainly around a person's priorities instead one's nationality.


Naturally, he only would be defining a subtlety of life.



Boy, 3, dies from parasite after swimming

DALLAS (AP) - A 3-year-old Irvin boy has died from a rare brain disease he contracted after swimming in Grapevine Lake.

Derek Leach died Friday from amoebic meningoencephalitis, a usually fatal disease caused by a parasite that is inhaled, doctors at Children's Medical Center said. The child and his parents, Angela

and Steve Leach, had been swimming in recent weeks at Lake Grapevine, where health authorities suspect he came in contact with the parasite.

Another Texas child, Ben Wright, 12, of Uvalde, contracted the same disease after swimming in the Frio Lake in South Central Texas. He was in critical condition at Methodist Hospital in San Antonio.

Health officials said the children's illness was caused by an amoeba which proliferates in calm, shallow water when the lake temperature rises. The illness occurs when the amoeba travels through the nose and sinus passages and into the brain, where it destroys brain tissue.

With 101-68 win over Spain

U.S. hoopsters stay unbeaten

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) -Michael Jordan carried the U.S. basketball team to a slim first-half lead over Spain on Saturday and his teammates then shook off their tenacious opponents for a 101-68 victory in the Olympics.

The victory was the fifth in a row for the unbeaten U.S. squad. The loss was Spain's first after four wins. Both teams move into Monday's quarterfinals.

Jordan, the North Carolina All-American, hit six of the Americans' last nine goals in the first half, including a 30-foot jumper at the buzzer, to give the United States a 46-41 lead at halftime.

He made the first U.S. goal of the second half, then limped off the court with an ankle injury with about 16 minutes remaining and the Americans leading only 51-48.

By the time he returned eight minutes later, Leon Wood, Chris Mullin and Sam Perkins had led a 15-2 streak that put the game out of reach, 66-50.

In later Group B games, Canada, 2-2, which already has clinched a berth, faced France, 0-4; Uruguay,

1-3, met China, 1-3, with a berth at

In Group A, Brazil, 1-3, played West Germany, 1-3, with the winner advancing, and 1980 Olympic champion Yugoslavia, 4-0, faced Italy, 4-0. In an earlier Group A contest, Australia, 3-2, already in the quarterfinals, thumped winless Egypt 94-78.

The 6-foot-5 Jordan finished as the Americans' leading scorer with 24 points, including 11 of 14 field goals and his last nine shots.

Mullin scored 12 of his 16 points in the second half. Patrick Ewing added 15 points and nine rebounds Leon Wood had 12 points and 12 assists and Sam Perkins 11 points and 11 rebounds.

The Americans hit 56 percent from the field to Spain's 50 percent and dominated the boards, outrebounding the Spaniards 44-16.

Juan Antonio San Epifanio topped Spain with 17 points. Andres Jimenez added 14, while Fernando Martin, one of Spain's top guns, was limited to six points.

Retton puts on amazing performance for all-around gold



A JUBILANT MARY RETTON

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The door cracked open ever so slightly, but that was all Mary Lou Retton needed.

The 1-foot-9, 95-pound powderkeg of gymnastics that one columnist described as "Charlie 'Iustle on the balance beam" was about to go for

With only two apparatus events remaining in Friday night's all-around finals, Retton trailed Romanian star Ecaterina Szabo and realized it would take a pair of perfect scores in the floor exercises and vault to wipe out the deficit.

Szaw, who had started the night with a perfect 10 on the balance beam, settled for a 9.90 in the vault and Retton headed for the floor exercise mat like a piranha smelling blood.

Retton, who would say later she thrives on that kind of pressure, put on a flawless display of backflips and somersaults, then put the Romanian star away with a high-flying, solid-landing vault that got a

unanimous 10 from the judges. "I knew I had it, I could tell on the run I was going to stick it," said Retton, short in stature but never in confidence.

So Retton had the gold medal. On the first day of her reign as gymnastic's queen she eluded journalists eager for her every word and two fans from the world of politics.

Print journalists and the Unites States Olympic Commit-tee media staff tried repeatedly to contact Retton for an interview. Then the USOC, apparently tired of answering urgent requests, displayed a large redlettered sign in front of their Main Press Center office that stated, "No, we were not able to reach Mary Lou Retton today. Neither were President Ronald Reagan or the governor of West Virginia."

The sign came down quickly though, after an Associated Press photographer took a picture of it.

A relative unknown on the international scene until she beat Soviet star Natalia Yurchenko in a meet at New York just 18 months ago, also has changed the sport's game plan.

While pixie and poetry in motion on the floor exercises, she becomes a fullback on the vault.

Bela Karolyi, the former Romanian national coach who has tutored Retton for two years, says no one - not even Nadia Comaneci — compares to Mary Lou.

"Nadia was a great champion

but Mary Lou is better," said Karolyi. "There isn't a woman gymnast in the world who can do that vault like Mary Lou."

'Her vault is twice as long as anybody else's,'' says Karolyi. American Coach Don Peters agrees with Karolyi's assessment of the teen ager from Fairmont, W.Va.

"She's the most powerful in-dividual that's ever been in the sport," Peters said.

Karolyi, who defected to the U.S. in 1981 after guiding Romania's women gymnast to international stardom, couldn't contain himself after Retton's win - viewing it as further proof of his contribution to the American gymnastic program.

"We did it in two years. In Romania I work 13 years to get Nadia to be Olympic champion but this is the biggest personal satisfaction of my life.'

And while Retton is a bullish performer on the vault and high bar, she also knows how to, as she puts it, "play to the crowd."

Karolyi says that too makes her better than Nadia

When Nadia performed she could not look up at the crowd," said Karolyi. "But Mary Lou, she is more liberal. She communicates with the crowd." That she competed in the Olympics at all is testimony to Retton's toughness

Less than six weeks before the start of the Games, Retton had to undergo surgery to repair cartilage that had torn loose in her right knee. The doctor who performed the surgery told her to forget about Los Angeles.

"I tell you a story you will like," Karolyi tells journalists and then proceeds to detail how Retton refused to quit dreaming.

"The day after the surgery we went down to the gym. We didn't do double backs or somersaults that day, but the next day she was on a bicycle," said Karolyi. "She worked like a madman, sweating, going, going, pushing herself."

"Within a week she was tumbling again and her recovery was so good the doctors said it was a medical miracle," he said.

"She is the new idol of the sport," says Karolyi. "Everyone is going to out and look for short, graceful and powerful kids."

Olympic Games' ballyhooed drug detection system resulted Saturday in the first disqualification of an athlete when a weightlifter from Lebanon was banned for taking a

The medical commission of the International Olympic Committee disqualified Mahmoud Tarha, 22, who finished fourth last Sunday in the 114-pound weightlifting category.

Because he did not win a medal, and because he has finished competing in the Games, the disqualification has little direct effect on Tarha.

However, the International Weightlifting Federation could take further action against him. IWF secretary general Tamas Ajan said he would have no comment until the federation issues a statement Saturday night.

One of the athletes was U.S. weightlifter Jeff Michels, whose final appeal was rejected at the Olympics last week, preventing him from participating in the Games.

In earlier drug-related developments at the Olympics, two Canadian weightlifters were sent home by the Canadian Weightlifting Federation after results of tests made in Canada indicated they had been using steroids before the Olympics.

On Thursday, a Japanese masseur was banned from the Olympics for 12 years for giving a forbidden herbal drug to a member of the Japanese volleyball team. The IOC said the player took the drug unknowingly, and he was not named or punished.

But there would be no money without his immense talent.

Lewis dominates three events and is an odds-on favorite to capture four track and field gold medals in LA. That would equal the feat of Owens in the Berlin Games

He likes the comparison to Owens, and insists money is not his

"Money has nothing to do with it because if you can become the type of person Jesse Owens was, you're respected by all and regardless of whether you have money or not, you're going to be taken care of,"

He is expected to win in the 100 meters, 200 meters and as the anchor of the 400-meter relay team. But his most spectacular event is the long jump, where he is closing in on Bob Beamon's 16-year-old world record effort of 29 feet, 21/2 inches, a mark once thought unbeatable

The pressure is tremendous and the media spotlight glaring for an athlete barely 23 years old. His pic-

ture graces the covers of the pre-Olympic issues of Time and Newsweek - even Gentleman's Quarterly.

But throughout the press buildup leading to his Olympic effort, Lewis has shrugged off the

"It doesn't bother me," he said. "If I wanted to move to Alaska where nobody would see me for six months, I could.'

"If I run the best I can and try my hardest and get four gold medals, or four bronze, or not a medal at all, then I can't see failure in me because all I compete for is for the love of the sport, for myself, and the people around me, and, of course, for my country in this par-

ticular competition. All the glory goes to God.

Lewis does not do things in a small way. He works three days a week as a sportscaster on a Houston television station. He has a record, "Go For The Gold," released to coincide with the Games he intends to dominate. He

is taking acting classes and aspires middle.' to a career in movies and television, the heart and soul of this city.

Lewis' name has often been linked to Owens'. He was the first since Owens to win national titles in the long jump and 100 meters in the same year. And he has done it twice. Last year, he won three gold medals at the first World Track and Field Championships in Helsinki.

His 19.75-second clocking in the 200 last year was .03 seconds off the world mark, and he would have broken the record if he hadn't run the last 10 meters with his arms held high. But Lewis is a showman who does things his way.

He had an unmeasured jump estimated at 30-2 at the 1982 National Sports Festival, but was called for a foul. He has the secondfastest time ever in the 100 meters at sea level, 9.97 seconds.

Track and field came naturally for Lewis. His parents are girls' track coaches at rival high schools in Willingboro, N.J. His mother, Evelyn, was the first

of her Alabama family to go to college and was a hurdler at the 1951 Pan American Games. His father, Bill, was a half-miler

and captain of the football team at Tuskegee Institute.

His older brother Mackie held a county record at 220 yards. Another older brother, Cleve, earned all-state soccer honors in high school and was all-New England at Brandeis University.

His younger sister, Carol Lewis, is a long jumper on the U.S. Olympic team

Carl Lewis wasn't an immediate athletic success. He usually was the last person picked in neighborhood basketball games. He started running track at age 7.

"I didn't stand out, but I wasn't the worst, either," he said. "I was just right there smack in the

But at age 15, Lewis, who had been short for his age, began to

In a year, he lowered his 100-yard dash time from 10.6 to 9.3 seconds. He long-jumped 25 feet and began

to dominate his sport. 'As I got older into high school I started to realize I had talent to do something," he said. "Then in my junior year, I realized I could

become the best in the world." The fame and Lewis' confident attitude has caused some rumblings among his track and field peers.

Women priests

Episcopal 'secret' 10 years old

By The Associated Press Ten years ago, 11 women cloaked

in white robes forced their way into an institution that for centuries was reserved for men in black. The "irregular" ordination of the

first women Episcopal priests in July 1974 was planned as a secret ceremony for a small group of women determined to take their rightful place at the altar.

After opponents threatened to expose their act of defiance, the women, who ranged in age from 27 to 79, sought their own publicity.

On a sweltering summer day, 2,000 people filled the Church of the Advocate in Philadelphia for what became a rallying point for women committed to cracking the male hold on a highly traditional faith. It took more than two years

before the Episcopal Church grudgingly accepted the ordination and women were officially allowed into the clerical ranks.

In the past eight years, about 500 more women have been ordained priests, but women still account for only about 5 percent of Episcopal Church clergy. Although women have been eligible to become bishops since 1977, none has been

Janet Vetter, deputy news director for the 3.1 million-member Protestant Episcopal Church, which has its headquarters in New York, said no church-sanctioned services are planned to mark the 10th anniversary of the controversial ordination.

'It's not a deliberate slight," she said. "(The ordination) wasn't an official act of the church and it isn't being recognized as an official

But some of the original 11, who are staging their own commemorative services today in Philadelphia, Rochester, N.Y., and Syracuse, N.Y., say the church's refusal to celebrate those trailblazing, "irregular" ordinations is evidence that women are still far from equal in the Episcopal Church.

"There's a notion abroad that if we just forget those of us who were ordained on that date, then maybe the church could save a little face. It's too late for that," said the Rev. Betty Bone Schiess, 61, of Syracuse, who is active in feminist organizations after losing a federal lawsuit to force the church to give her a parish.

What culminated in Philadelphia 10 years ago on the feast day of saints Mary and Martha actually started several years earlier in scattered parishes around the country, where the women's movement had begun to take hold.

Bibles banned from convention kits

DALLAS (AP) — A national Jewish leader's protest to the White House has ended plans to include a New Testament Bible in the 5,000 welcome kits to be given delegates and alternates to the Republican National Convention.

Hyman Bookbinder, a spokesman for the American Jewish Committee in Washington, said Friday that he was so troubled at the plans to include the Bible that he asked an assistant to President Reagan to investigate.

"All this is part of a general effort to formally christianize America, and that's not what our Founding Fathers wanted this country to be," Bookbinder said. "I expect they (Republicans) will realize the possible political consequences.

Republican Host Committee Chairman Fred Meyer said late Friday that the Bibles would not be in the delegate welcome kits, which are now being put together for free distribution to delegates coming to the con-

vention Aug. 20-23.

The kits contain more than 40 items, ranging from a can of chili to red-white-and-blue

"I was not aware of it (until Friday)," Meyer said. "We are an ecumenical

Meyer said the people in charge of finding gifts for the packets "just hadn't checked with the boss yet ... the head of the Republican Host Committee."

However, in a previous interview before it was announced the delegates wouldn't be receiving the Bibles, Meyer said he didn't understand the criticism of Jewish leaders. the Dallas Times Herald reported Saturday.

"I'm a little surprised at that (of the the delegate packets) the information we sent out on our calendar of events about the 'Jewish Life in America' exhibit at the Dallas Public Library.'

Dorothy Herkimer, the Host Committee member in charge of the delegate packets, said Friday that the Bible was to be in the canvas tote bag delivered to delegates and

Liberty One — a non-denominational Christian group in Dallas - offered to donate the New Testament Bibles, Mrs. Herkimer said. "That's what we need more of," she said of

But Bookbinder said the American Jewish Committee opposes the mixing of religion and politics. He said the Reagan administration's record on that issue has not been good, especially in the areas of school prayer and the policy of "equal access," in which religious organizations can meet on public

Scalpers have reportedly been asking up to \$700 for front-row seats and getting several hundred dollars for the \$30

Some of the fans dressed like Michael Jackson, wearing his trademarks - sequined gloves and white socks with spangles with black shoes.

At the front of the line, 60-year-old Jenette Rosenberg of Parsippany, N.J., said she was a Michael Jackson fan 'How can I keep up with the young, if I don't keep up with everything?" She was to be joined by her three children - 26, 32 and 36

Government fighting stigma over birth control

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Sara Lopez says she had her first baby when she was 20 and another one "every year and a month" until she had 12 children. Now, she tells her daughters four children is enough.

Mrs. Lopez, 53, reflects changing attitudes that have helped to slow population growth dramatically in Mexico.

An economic crisis, Mexico's worst in 50 years, and an extensive government family planning program also have figured in dropping the annual population growth rate from 3.5 percent in 1970 to 2.4 percent, according to government figures.

Although Mexico was a late starter in promoting

family planning, its rapid progress in controlling the birth rate is one of the reasons it was chosen to host the 1984 U.N. International Conference on Population, said Joop Alberts, deputy representative of the U.N. Fund for Population Activities office here.

The week-long conference, the first in 10 years, begins Monday in Mexico City.

Mexico's official goal is a population growth rate

of 1 percent in the year 2000, what it was at the start of this century. Average growth for industrialized

countries is less than 1 percent.

If the projections hold, today's population of 77 million Mexicans will grow to 100 million in 2000. If the population continued to grow at the 1970 rate, the figure would have been 140 million, almost double the current population.

"At the family level there is an improvement in health, in the maternal and infant mortality rates" when the growth rate in controlled, said Sergio Correu, a family planning official with the Social Securi-

"When we reach 1 percent the impact will be felt in better distribution of the population, jobs, enough school space, social security, health services," he

The steady current of migrants to the cities is perhaps the most visible evidence of population



Baby Gibbons arrives from Korea

Lifestyle Writer Along with two other couples, Keith and Sharna Gibbons were anxiously waited for American Airlines flight #347 to land at Dallas/Fort Worth Airport, July 13. Onboard were three Korean infants, including the Gibbons' eight-month-old daughter, Brenna Jeanne (Kim Jeong Joo) from

When the plane landed, the three couples had to wait for all the other passengers to disembark before the babies were brought off. "Everyone on the plane knew we were the babies' parents," said Gibbons. "Businessmen coming off the plane would smile and say 'The babies are coming.' Ladies who came off the flight asked which baby was whose and said they got to hold them."

"People kept coming off the plane. I thought they would never quit coming," Mrs. Gibbons said.

As the Gibbons and the other couples were presented their babies for the first time, people stood by to watch the event. "It was obvious they had places to go, but they stopped to watch because they knew what was

TO GET TO HER new parents, Brenna flew from Korea to Chicago to Dallas. "She has traveled more than me," Gibbons laughed. Brenna will remain a Korean citizen for six months when the adoption will be final.

'The flight was a long way. She was really fussy and tired,' Gibbons said. "She had a hard adjustment. She was very insecure and not very trusting. However, she is a very happy child and has been well taken care of. She was really attached to her foster mother. However, she went right for Sharna, just like she knew she was her mother." On Tuesday evening, Brenna began to accept the Gibbons.

"Every day we can see a lot of adjustments in her. She still likes to stay up late and sleep late. The first day she didn't want to go to sleep. I couldn't put her down without her fussing," Mrs. Gibbons said. "It was 4 a.m. the first day before she went to sleep. Each night she goes to bed a

"I'm just crazy about her," Gibbons said as he and Brenna sat in the midst of baby toys. "She plays by herself and can crawl real well. She also smiles a lot more now. She is pretty sweet. We are so proud of her. We think she is really special."

Brenna was abandoned Feb. 29 at an orphanage. "When she was left at the orphanage, she was wrapped up in a blanket with a piece of paper with only her birthdate on it," Gibbons said. The only information the Gibbons have on Brenna before Feb. 29 is she was born Nov. 24, 1983. They received social history reports about Brenna while she was in a Korean foster home. Brenna's blood relatives were given the opportunity to come and claim her before she was put in a foster home.

"We assume that she was with her biological mother for the first three months (who) then realized she couldn't take care of her," said Gibons. "To me, that's the ultimate in love. Somebody loved her enough to realize they couldn't take care of her and gave her up so someone could give her what she deserves," Mrs. Gibbons said.

THE GIBBONS STARTED thinking about adopting a baby last Christmas. "We were having a struggle as to whether to have biological children or to adopt," Gibbons said. "We waited to start a family until we were in a place where we would stay a while. And Big Spring is nice enough that we really want to stay.'

"We decided we wanted a family and started checking on adoption and Korean adoption," Mrs. Gibbons said. The Gibbons will have been married seven years Aug. 6. Gibbons is the pastor of College Heights Christian Church, while Mrs. Gibbons is an elementary teacher.

The Gibbons chose not to adopt an American baby "because they will get a good home. Foriegn babies need a chance,'' they said. "Every child needs an opportunity; deserves an opportunity. We understand Koreans don't adopt very many babies. Abandoned babies aren't special in Korea. It's such a common thing."

At Christmas, the couple were watching "Good Morning, America". A stewardess who escorted Amerasian and Korean children to the United States was telling the children's plight and the need for people to adopt these children. While they were watching the show, Sharna leaned over and asked Keith, "What do you think?"

"He wasn't too hot on the idea. But every time he made a phone call he got a little more interested," Mrs. Gibbons said.

'We called the Lutheran Social Services in Midland. They gave me the names of four agencies that dealt with adopting Korean babies," Gibbons said. "The three other agencies recommended Dillon (Children's Service. Inc.) because we lived in Texas and they are registered to handle

THE GIBBONS' interest in Asian adoption began about three years ago. "We had friends in New Mexico who had adopted a little Vietnamese girl," said Gibbons. "We were really interested in her."

From a lady in Midland, the Gibbons learned of a Big Spring couple (John and Debbie Bingham) had adopted a Korean girl five years ago. 'They have been extremely helpful and very supportive. They are really interested in what we are doing," Gibbons said.

The Binghams helped prepare the Gibbons for what to expect, the Gib-

bons said. "There's lots and lots of paperwork." The Gibbons filled out a pre-application, an application, a home study guide, and naturalization and immigration papers. The Gibbons also had to go to Abilene to sign seven notarized documents in triplicates. They were required to send in pictures of themselves and their house.

"They want to make sure it it is the right home (for the baby)," Gibbons said. "I have no objection to their questions. All they want to do is make sure the baby get the love and care she needs and deserves.'

Requirements for adopting a Korean child include that a couple must be married for three years; have a high school diploma or GED; be in good mental and physical health; wife can't be pregnant or get pregnant; cannot have more than five children; must be a Christian home; and both parents must be between the ages of 25 and 40. The couple must be United States citizens living in the U.S. and have a stable income. The couple must have a minimum of \$15,000 life insurance on the husband, and a health insurance company has to guarentee to cover the child.

The Gibbons' adoption went quicker than most adoptions. "Every step of the adoption has been exciting," Mrs. Gibbons said. "We were told to be patient. That it would be a long process, but everything was so fast. We were expecting a year to two years before we could get our baby."

"WE REALLY LEFT it (the adoption) in God's hands," Gibbons said.

Every step of it was his doing." "We were told it would be six to eight weeks before our application was accepted. It was two days. We were told it would be several weeks to

months before a baby was selected for us. It was two days. After the Gibbons found out what baby had been chosen for them, they had a choice to take her or not take her. "There was no question as to whether or not we would accept her.

While Brenna was in Korea, the Gibbons received two pictures of her.

Brenna was required to have a visa and a passport. The Gibbons received Brenna's Visa July 9. "Usually it takes a long time between receiving the Visa and the baby's arrival," Mrs. Gibbons

said. "We found out Wednesday morning (July 11) she was coming (July

from Seoul, Korea. The Gibbons received their daughter July 13 through an adoption agency.

Gibbons went to work that Wednesday and flipped on his answering machine. On the machine was a call from the adoption agency, so he returned it. "The lady said, 'Your daughter is arriving Friday.' The thing that struck home was 'your daughter'. She was really ours," Gibbons

After he got more information on Brenna's arrival, Gibbons called his wife. "He was so excited, he couldn't even talk," she said. They picked Brenna up in Fort Worth two days later.

'We've kept a record of everything we've done," the Gibbons said. "And are seriously thinking about adopting another child after Brenna is older, but we aren't sure yet. It's just up to the Lord.'

The Gibbons' family, church and friends have been supportive of the adoption, the Gibbons said. "Our folks have been on cloud nine." Both sets of grandparents visited Brenna this month.

Mrs. Gibbons was given baby showers by her co-workers at Moss Elementary and by the ladies of College Heights Christian Church.

BECAUSE BRENNA is of Asian descendant, the Gibbons think their daughter may have to deal with other people's prejudices. "Undoubtly there will be some prejudices. We will have to deal with that, but we will be prepared to deal with that. We will have to prepare her to deal with that as she gets older.

"Unfornuately, we won't be there to protect her from prejudice. Hopefully the day will come when people are accepted for themselves and not their races," Gibbons said.

When Brenna gets older, the Gibbons plan to tell her of her heritage. "We want to be totally honest and open with her as to why we adopted her," Gibbons said. "We feel it is important for her to know about

As Brenna grows up, the Gibbons have dreams for her. "I just want her to grow up and to fulfill whatever dreams and ambitions she has to the best of her ability," Gibbons said. "We want her to be the best person she can be, and for her to know other people are important and for God to be

We want to be the best parents possible and to give her the best," the Gibbons said. "We are very lucky to have her."

Glickman looks for edged weapons at army surplus stores, gun shows, garage sales and flea markets. "I look any place I think they may be," he said.

"People may go to garage sales and find a Civil War bayonet for \$3. I found one," Glickman said. The reason Glickman can get a bargain is because "people don't know what they have.

"It's surprising that knives and bayonets will survive in the condition they do. Because I collect, I get some stuff in super nice shape," Glickman said. "They are so good

you think they are fake. 'Some (bayonets) are 100 to 200 years old that look like they were made yesterday. But you do have to be careful though not to get a fake," Glickman warns

"One (bayonet) that I show is an 1887 Hospital Corp knife. I've had it for a long time. I've shown it to museum curators and specialists. Half say it is fake, half say it is good," Glickman said. "I'm pretty sure it is a correct one. I also have a 1849 rifle knife that is just as

Glickman enjoys collecting edged weapons and learning their history. "It's a lot of fun and has a lot of historical interest to me. I've always like history and liked to read history books," he said. "If bayonets could talk they could tell

Markings on the edged weapons give hints to their past, Glickman explains. "Some bayonets are so well marked that you can actually tell when they were issued and to what company. And by writing to arsenals sometimes you can even find out who it was issued to."

Some bayonets are issued several times, such as a British bayonet Glickman has that was issued in World War I and again in World War II. Another collector's item he owns is a Czechoslovakian 1933 conversion bayonet that was captured in war by the Germans and reissued to German home

GLICKMAN DOES OWN some edged weapons which he can not identify. "I have a number of edged weapons from the Civil War that I have never identified and may never identify. That's what drives you crazy.'

For example, "I have one bayonet that is three feet long. Lots of people have told me things about it, but it has never been authenticated," Glickman said.

Glickman has met several people through his hobby. "You end up meeting people from all over the world. I have people writing me from France, Canada, England. We trade things. Sometimes things are available in the U.S. that aren't available over there." In the United States, communist weapons are highly prized because they are hard to get, Glickman said.

"I know a man in Kentucky that has four warehouses full (of military items). He is one of the biggest military dealers around," Glickman said.

CHLORINE MYTHS Contrary to popular belief, "green hair," which affects some blond pool swimmers, is not caused by chlorine. It comes from the copper ions that are released from corroding copperpipes in the pool. What the chlorine does is make hair more porous, allowing the copper ions to penetrate. The solution is to wash and condition hair after swimming. This will remove the chlorine and protect hair against copper build-up. If hair has already taken on a greenish cast, consideration should be given to having it trimmed. Most of the copper ions adhere to the ends which are typically porous. Another alternative is to discuss with your hairdresser the idea of using a non-peroxide strawberry rinse. The pale red shade may just neutralize the green, disguising the brassy



WHY VOTE "FOR"

THE CITY CHARTER AMENDMENT ON AUGUST 11TH, 1984?

The issue is very basic — whether we, the people being governed and paying the bills, want to elect a Chief of Police, or continue with a chief hired by and responsible only to the City

The "reasons" contained in the political pamphlet entitled "Keep Politics Out of Law Enforcement," distributed by the Citizens' Group to keep an appointed chief, are an insult to the intelligence of the city electorate. We are entrusted with electing presidents, governors, congressmen, on down. It is a trust we have earned and are entitled to keep and exercise. Elections are democracy in action.

Electing a Police Chief is a new and progressive idea. Certainly it is worth a try. At the end of two years, if the system is not working for Big Spring, rest assured the City Council can and will, on its own motion (without the necessity of a petition) call another election.

This is not an issue of personality differences. The present Chief of Police is qualified to run for office if he chooses to do so.

We have had six different chiefs in the last nine years, under the present appointive system. Beginning with Vance Chisam, who left in 1975, we have had Sherrill Farmer, Stanley Bogard, Elwood Hohertz, Bob Dugan, and Rick Turner. This indicates the present system is not working. An elective chief could offer continuity in office and give our local police officers more job security. All citizens would benefit from this.

Under the present system the chief position is more one of a "company man" responsible to the "company" than the citizens. We need a change.

In the last two years more than thirty professional police officers, with a cumulative total of over 200 years of experience on the Big Spring police force, have left or been terminated. Experience in the police officer is the key.

Brownwood has always had an elected chief — since before its home rule charter in the 1940s. Since then, from time to time the city council has called for charter amendment elections to change the chief position to appointive. It has always failed. The last time the council proposed such an amendment, about 1980, the voters voted 6 to 1 to keep the chief elective. This indicates the elective system works for the citizens of Brownwood. Why not try it in Big Spring???

It is not true, as the pamphlet indicates, that a "qualified" person would be "unpopular," or that a "popular" person would be "unqualified." The voting citizens are capable of and deserve a chance to elect a qualified and capable individual to the office of Chief of Police. Voters are better judges of what they want and need in this highly paid and powerful office.

Please vote "FOR" the amendment on August 11th — and remember that every vote counts. Let your voice be heard.

The government of the City of Big Spring, like that of most Texas cities, is similar to the organization of most business corporations. There is a board of directors - the mayor as chairman of the board and the city councilmen as directors elected by the stockholders, in this case the citizens of Big

The council, in turn, hires a chief executive officer manager - who is responsible to the council for the entire government of the city. The city manager then hires a management team --the department heads - whom he holds responsible for the efficient and economical functioning of each department.

Now comes a group of dissident citizens, motivated by their own special interests, who want to break this chain of responsibility. They want one of the department heads - the chief of police - to be elected by the stockholders.

On the surface, this sounds like a fairty reasonable, democratic idea, but a little thought reveals a number of very serious problems

First, the position of police chief is a very demanding one, and it must be filled by the individual most capable and qualified by experience and training. Sometimes this means hiring a person from outside the local area. If the election proposal were adopted the only requirement for holding this important office would be that the candidate would have lived in Big Spring for one year. The position would change from the "best qualified" applicant to the "most popular" candidate.

A second problem is that the term of office would be for two years. If an unqualified or incapable individual were elected as police chief, it would be another two years before he or she could be replaced. If a chief abused the power of his office, the voters would be helpless to do anything about it until the next election. Recall is not the answer; this special interest election already is costing the taxpayers of Big Spring some \$5,000: A third serious problem is that an elected chief of police would

be most responsive to those groups that provided funds and the votes to get him elected. This would give special interest groups the upper hand over the average Jane or John Doe. Another question involves how internal problems in the police

department are solved. Now the chief must answer to the city manager who can step in and straighten out any problems. An elected chief would have no direct super son and would pretty much be able to do as he or she chooses. Even our elected city council would be powerless to deal with any mess

The most important question, however, is the matter of effective law enforcement. A police chief must make sometimes tough aecisions for the benefit of the entire community. He must not be constantly wondering if an action will have an effect at the polls. Members of the U.S. Congress continually bemoan the fact that with a two-year term they spend as much time trying get re-elected as they do concentrating on the duties of their

Decisions to enforce the law must not be tainted or influenced by a fear of voters. The chief must not be prey to those political temptations, especially near election time.

Personal peeves or animosity against the present chief or some other individual are poor reasons to saddle the citizens of Big Spring with bad public law for many years to come.

"A dog's normal body temperature is 101.5 to 102.2 degrees Fahrenheit. A dog can withstand a body temperature of 107-108 degrees Fahrenheit for only a very short time before suffering irreparable brain damage-or
