## The real issues in police vote

Big Spring voters need to give careful thought to next Saturday's city charter election to decide whether the chief of police should be elected or appointed. Voters need to look beyond the red herrings such as bumpy
streets and water quality that have nothing to do with effec tive law enforcement They need to ignore petty with effec tive law enforcement. They need to ignore petty peeves and
gripes about city government and personalities and consider what is beneficial to everyone in Big Spring
Those who are pushing to have the chief elected are playing for any emotional response or negative reaction they can in order to hide the real reasons behind this election
What are these hidden reasons?

What are these hidden reasons?

1. This election is an attempt by
traffic in Howard County to gain control of the in the drug Polie Department. If the measure passes, they can run their own candidate in a well-financed campaign.
2. They can think of no other way to get rid of Chief Rick Turner who has been responsible for putting a severe dent in their operations.
Many citizens will remember that when the Herald did a
survey of Big Spring High School students last September survey of Big Spring High School students last September
45 percent of the students admitted to at least experimenting with drugs. That is a lucrative market the drug dealers don't want to have cut off.
Turner has dedicated himself to cutting off the supply of
drugs in the community, and he drugs in the community, and he asked the FBI to conduct an investigation which has resulted in eight local residents pleading guilty to drug charges in the federal courts. Another
local investigation has resulted in grand jury indictments against seven other suspects.
We must keep in mind, however, the comments just this week by U.S. District Court Judge Harold Woodward as he sentenced two of those people. Woodward said the government hasn't even scratched the network of drugs in Big Spring. "I am convinced this ring is still in existence," he said. federal court saw a sordid picture of the insidious workings of the drug traffic which has touched the lives of many families in this community.
Personalities probably should not be an issue in this election, but, like it or not, Rick Turner is an issue. He has made some mistakes, as he freely admits. He has some shortcomings in his public relations, because he is a man who says what system, which has not endeared him to some local politicians. He has been willing though to sit down and talk out differences with those who are willing to talk with him
For his efforts to give Big Spring effective law enforcement and for his accomplishments in fighting the drug traffic in this area, every concerned citizen owes him appreciation and gratitude.
Is it any wonder the drug dealers want to get rid of him? The petition to call for the election was started by two bail bond agents who objected to the chief's policy of protecting the city from lawsuits by holding drunks in jail until they were sober or until they were ordered released by a magistrate.
Of the people who signed the petition, at least 286 are perOf the people who signed the petition, at least 286 are persons who have been arrested in the past. Their arrests involvvolved in 47 of the offenses. If one adds the family members of these people, this group with some gripe against the police represents nearly half of those who signed the petition.
Voters need to think about what kind of chief they might get when the only qualification in the proposed amendment is that a candidate has to have lived in Big Spring for only one year.
What if there were only one candidate backed by the drug What if there
underground?
underground? likely to be when a chief must spend much of his time making sure he will be re-elected.
Those are the issues, not the emotional ploys and red herr ings. Voters should not let themselves be sidetracked by petiness and personal vendettas.
Our first concern should be effective law enforcement. Decisions to enforce the law should not be hampered by political
temptations. Our chief must be a professional, not a politician. We hope truly concerned citizens will vote "against" the harter amendment next Saturday.

it must be filled by the individual most capable and qualified by experience and training. Sometimes this means hiring a person from outside the local area. II the election proposal were adopted the only requirement for holding this important office would be The position would change from the "best qualified" applican to the "most popular" candidate.
A second problem is that the term of office would be for two
years. If an unqualified or incapable individual were elected as police chief it would be another two years before he or she couls police clief, it would be another two years before he or she could
be replaced. If a chief abused the power of his office, the voters would be helpless to do anything about it until the next elec tion. Recall is not the answer; this special interest election already is costing the taxpayers of Big Spring some $\$ 5.000$. e most responsive to those groups that provided funds and the votes to get him elected. This would give special interest group the upper hand over the average Jane or John Doe.
Another question involves how internal problems in the police depanment are solved. Now the chief must answer to the city
manager who can step in and straighten out any problems. An
