## Agent Orange

## U.S. black mark

The herbicide Agent Orange was sprayed from U.S. aircraft over Vietnam from March 1965 until June 1970 .
It was used as a weapon - to defoliate the jungle, to uncover the hiding places of the enemy and to destroy the enemy's crops. In those five years, more than 11.3 million gallons of Agent
Orange were dumped over jungles, forests, rice padies and Orange were dumped over jungles, forests, rice paddies and
rivers. Areas near U.S. military bases often were sprayed more than once.
It is estimated that the total amount of Agent Orange used over Vietnam contained about 350 pounds of a toxic contaminant called dioxin. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agen cy describes dioxin as "one of the most perplexing and potentially dangerous chemicals ever to pollute the environment.'
Now, 14 years later, thousands of Vietnam veterans blame their health problems, and the health problems of their offspr ings, on exposure to the dioxin contained in Agent Orange. A class action suit was filed by a group of veterans in 1979 against seven chemical companies that manufactured Agent Orange for the government. The day the trial was to begin, an out-of-court settlement was reached. The chemical companies claims to 16,000 plaintiff veterans and their children. First awards for damages are not expected to be made until 1986 . Trongly believe they who served in Vietnam rightly or Orange. A total of 138,000 of them have registered their health problem concerns with the Agent Orange Projects Office o Many veterans complain that the
Many problems. Only after Congress has turned a deaf ear 1981, over the VA's objections, have veterans become eligible for disability benefits linked to toxic herbicides. Since then, 20,000 veterans who believe they have been made ill by Agent Orange have been treated in VA health-care facilities and thousands of other have received care as outpatients. Most scientists agree that humans suffer short-term
disorders from exposure to dioxin. These include nervous disorders from exposure to dioxin. These include nervous disfiguring acne appearing on the face, back and neck.
The long-term effects of dioxin are still disputed. At the cur rent time, federal agencies are conducting 65 studies on Agent Orange. The matter is sure to be a continuing controversy.

What the government must do is continue Agent Orange research and to provide the best and most comprehensive and the physical aftereffects of exposure.
