Everyone is invited to come and enjoy a delicious breakfast and fellowship.

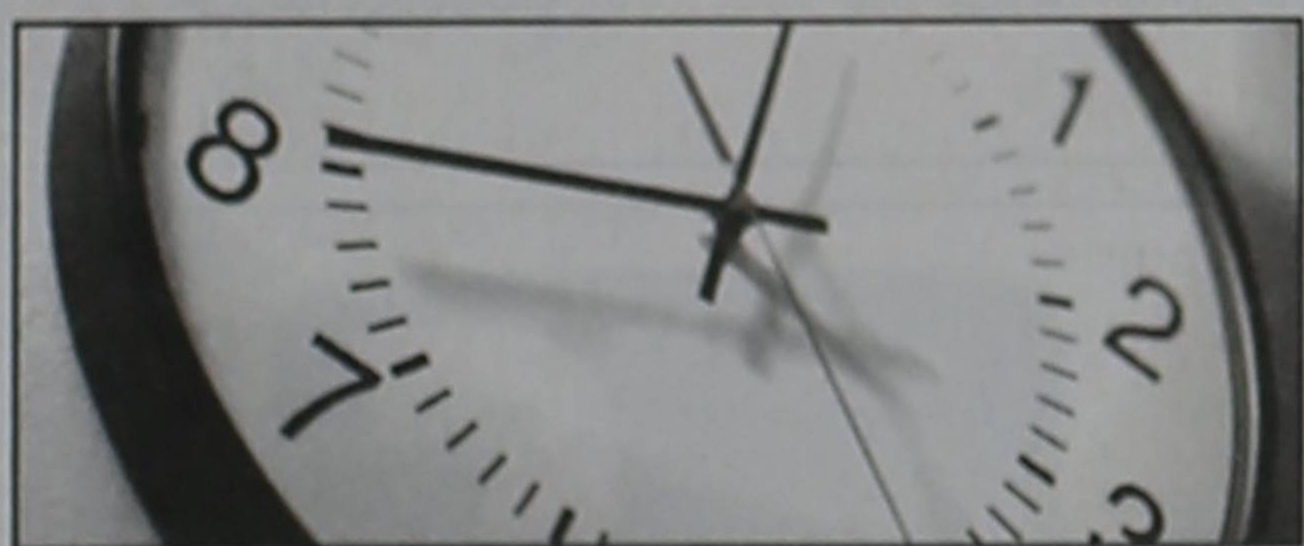
Friona ISD board election

Election results

According to Parmer County Tax Assessor Bobbie Pierson there are 4,293 registered voters in the county. After Tuesday's primary election, the County Clerk staff counted 896 ballots. Of those, 869 were Republican and 27 were Democrat ballots. That is a voter turnout of 20.87%.

In the only locally contested race, Steve Cockerham won the Precinct 2 County Commis-

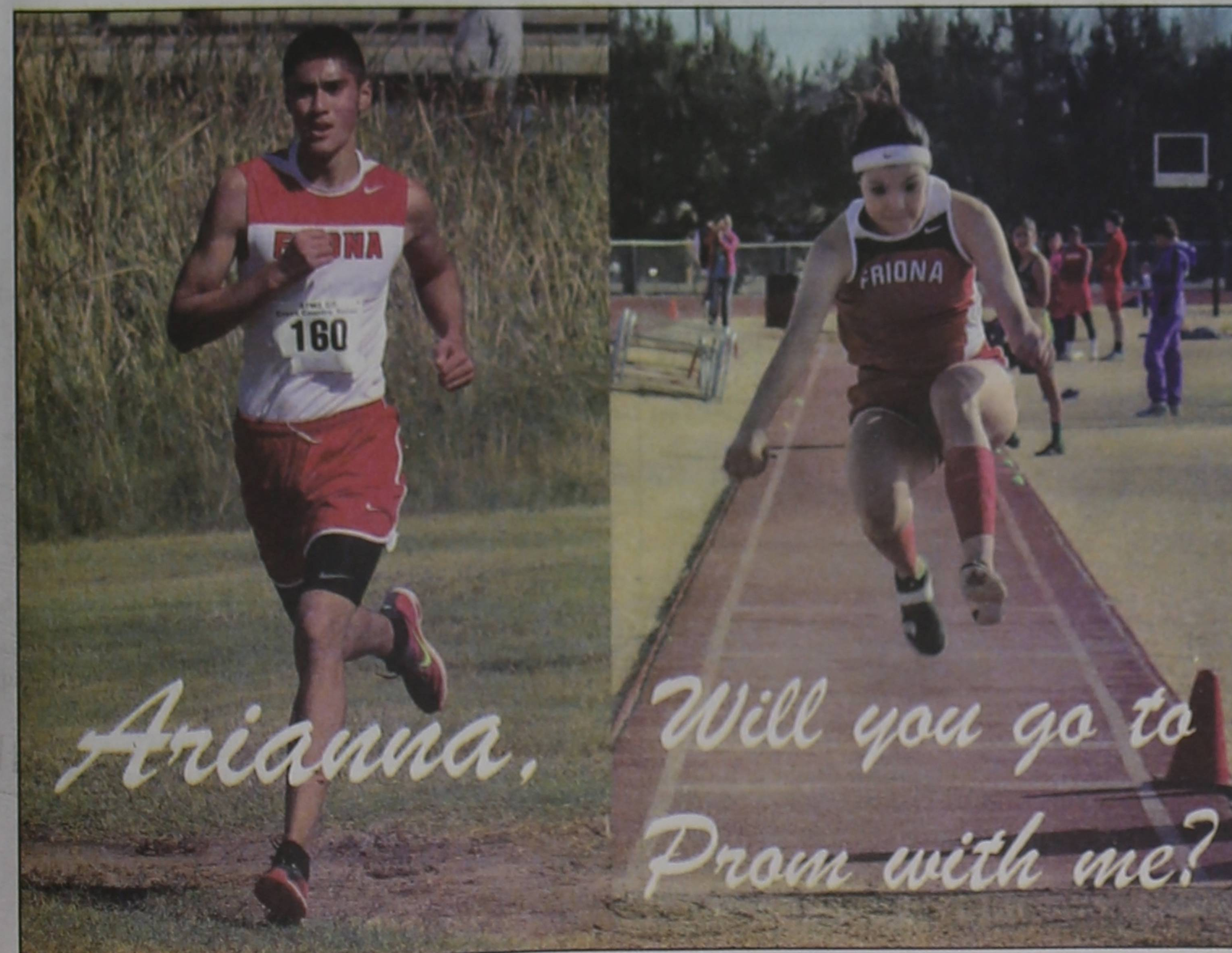
sioner race with 133 votes over Mitch Terry's 114. For state senator, Kel Seliger got 440 votes and Mike Cannon 331.

For U.S. Senate, John Cornyn received 60% of county votes, Congressman Randy Neugebauer received 81%, for governor, Greg Abbott 89%, for Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick 34% and David Dewhurst 31%.

For land office commissioner,

George P. Bush received 71% of the county vote, for comptroller, Glenn Hegar drew 53%, and for attorney general, Ken Paxton had 37% of the vote over his two competitors.

In the Democrat governor's race, 24 ballots were cast in the county with Wendy Davis and Ray Madrigal each received 12 votes, a 50/50 split, however, statewide Mrs. Davis was the clear winner.



Council will cancel election

The Friona city council will meet Monday March 10 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

The council terms of Martha Barker and Greg Lewellen and the Mayor's position are all expiring. Deadline for sign-up was Friday February 28. City manager Patricia Phipps said all three incumbents signed up for re-election and are unopposed so a general election will not be held.

The council seat now held by Nancy Davis is up for special election. She was appointed to the council to fill an unexpired term but must now run in a special election. The deadline to sign-up for the unexpired term special election is March

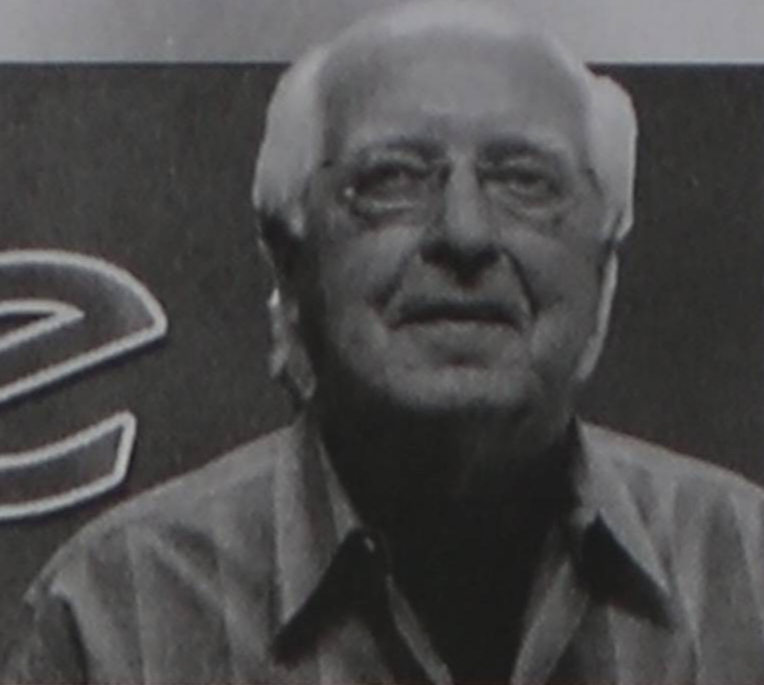
10 by 5:00 p.m. Mrs. Davis has signed up for the election and at this point is unopposed.

The council will officially cancel the election during Monday's meeting. However a school board election will be held in the council chambers May 10.

In other council business, the bid for sealcoating will be awarded, consider a negotiated settlement between the city and Atmos Energy regarding their intent to increase rates, approve tax roll exemptions for 2013, and consider approval of accounts payable and financial statements for February 2014. This is a tentative agenda and subject to change. The final meeting agenda is posted on the window of city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

the president's budget

This week I am pleased to offer President Obama as a guest columnist.

Our little newspaper gets emails and news releases from the White House. The President visited an elementary school in D.C. and decided it was a good place to give a speech about his proposed \$4 Trillion budget. Perhaps he should have allowed the elementary students to ask questions.

The president likes to talk a lot. Flowery rhetoric is an Obama trademark. I have printed the entire elementary school speech. It is long and I doubt many of you will read it all. Give it a try. Read as far as you can. It is your money he is talking about. I'll write something shorter next week. God bless America.

THE PRESIDENT: Good morning, everybody. I'm here at Powell Elementary School, and just had a chance to see some of the outstanding students here. And I thought it was appropriate for me to say a few words about the budget that I sent to Congress this morning -- because obviously the budget is not just about numbers, it's about our values and it's about our future, and how well we are laying the groundwork for those young children that I was with just a few moments ago to be able to succeed here in America. These kids may not be the most excited people in town on budget day, but my budget is designed with their generation and future generations in mind.

In my State of the Union address, I laid out an agenda to restore opportunity for all people -- to uphold the principle that no matter who you are, no matter

where you started, you can make it if you try here in America.

This opportunity agenda is built on four parts -- more good jobs and good wages; making sure that we're training workers with the skills they need to get those good jobs; guaranteeing every child access to a world-class education; and making sure that our economy is one in which hard work is rewarded.

The budget I sent Congress this morning lays out how we'll implement this agenda in a balanced and responsible way. It's a roadmap for creating jobs with good wages and expanding opportunity for all Americans. And at a time when our deficits have been cut in half, it allows us to meet our obligations to future generations without leaving them a mountain of debt. This budget adheres to the spending levels that both parties in both houses of Congress already agreed to. But it also builds on that progress with what we're calling an Opportunity, Growth and Security Initiative that invests in our economic priorities in a smart way that is fully paid for by making smart spending cuts and closing tax loopholes that right now only benefit the well-off and the well-connected.

I'll give you an example. Right now, our tax system provides benefits to wealthy individuals who save, even after they've amassed multimillion dollar retirement accounts. By closing that loophole, we can help create jobs and grow our economy, and expand opportunity without adding a dime to the deficit.

We know that the country that wins the race for

new technologies will win the race for new jobs, so this budget creates 45 high-tech manufacturing hubs where businesses and universities will partner to turn groundbreaking research into new industries and new jobs made in America.

We know -- and this is part of the reason why we're here today -- that education has to start at the earliest possible ages. So this budget expands access to the kind of high-quality preschool and other early learning programs to give all of our children the same kinds of opportunities that those wonderful children that we just saw are getting right here at Powell.

We know that while not all of today's good jobs are going to require a four-year college degree, more and more of them are going to require some form of higher education or specialized training. So this budget expands apprenticeships to connect more ready-to-work Americans with ready-to-be-filled jobs. And we know that future generations will continue to deal with the effects of a warming planet, so this budget proposes a smarter way to address the costs of wildfires. And it includes over \$1 billion in new funding for new technologies to help communities prepare for a changing climate today, and set up incentives to build smarter and more resilient infrastructure.

We also know that the most effective and historically bipartisan ways to reduce poverty and help hardworking families pull themselves up is the earned income tax credit. Right now, it helps about half of all parents in America at some point in their lives.

This budget gives millions more workers the opportunity to take advantage of the tax credit. And it pays for it by closing loopholes like the ones that let wealthy individuals classify themselves as a small business to avoid paying their fair share of taxes.

This budget will also continue to put our fiscal house in order over the long-term -- not by putting the burden on folks who can least afford it, but by reforming our tax code and our immigration system and building on the progress that we've made to reduce health care costs under the Affordable Care Act. And it puts our debt on a downward path as a share of our total economy, which independent experts have set as a critical target for fiscal responsibility.

As I said at the outset, our budget is about choices. It's about our values. As a country, we've got to make a decision if we're going to protect tax breaks for the wealthiest Americans, or if we're going to make smart investments necessary to create jobs and grow our economy, and expand opportunity for every American. At a time when our deficits are falling at the fastest rate in 60 years, we've got to decide if we're going to keep squeezing the middle class, or if we're going to continue to reduce the deficits responsibly, while taking steps to grow and strengthen the middle class.

The American people have made clear time and again which approach they prefer. That's the approach that my budget offers. That's why I'm going to fight for it this year and in the years to come as President. Thank you very much, everybody.

DID YOU KNOW?

AMENDMENT XXIII

Passed by Congress June 16, 1960 and ratified March 29, 1961.

Section 1.

The district constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of this amendment.

Are you confused? This amendment grants Washington, D.C. 3 electors to the Electoral College. Do you know what the Electoral College is?

To sleep or not to sleep

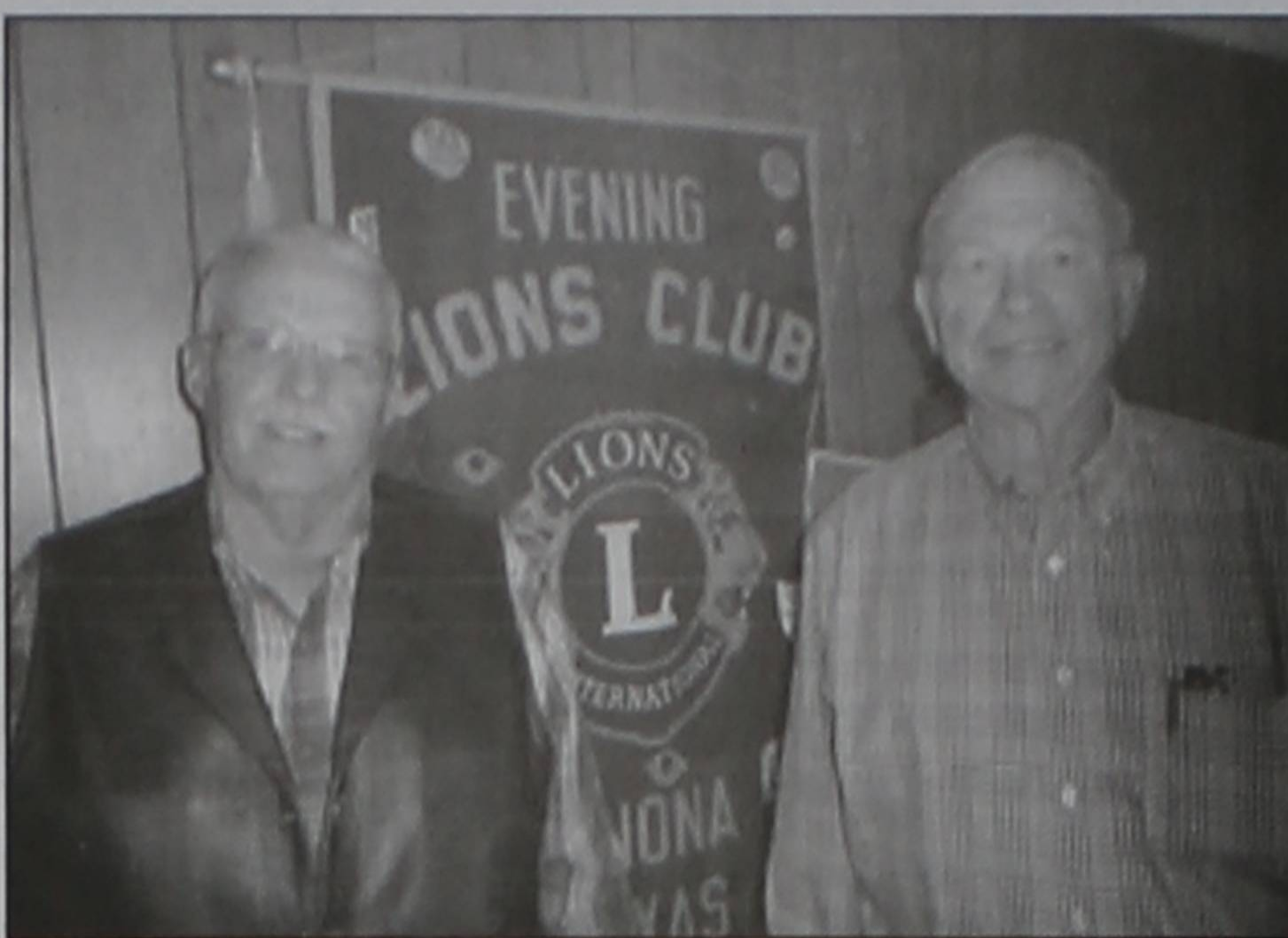

He said Friona currently has 27 volunteer firemen and \$2.5 million in fire equipment. It costs over \$4,000 to equip each fireman with protective gear. Lt. Taylor has 30 years of service in the fire department.

One of the many activities we enjoyed out at Pop's farm was riding horses. We had several of various sizes to accommodate various cousins. My dad was the head honcho of the horse operation and so when we wanted to ride we went to the farm with him. He would call the horses from the pasture and if it had been a while since we had collected them, certain grooming exercises were in order.

It was important to brush them down because you sure didn't want a cocklebur anywhere near where the saddle or cinch will be positioned. She married Herman White, a Lazbuddie area farmer, who preceded her in death, as did her only brother Buddy and her parents Jeff and Jewel.

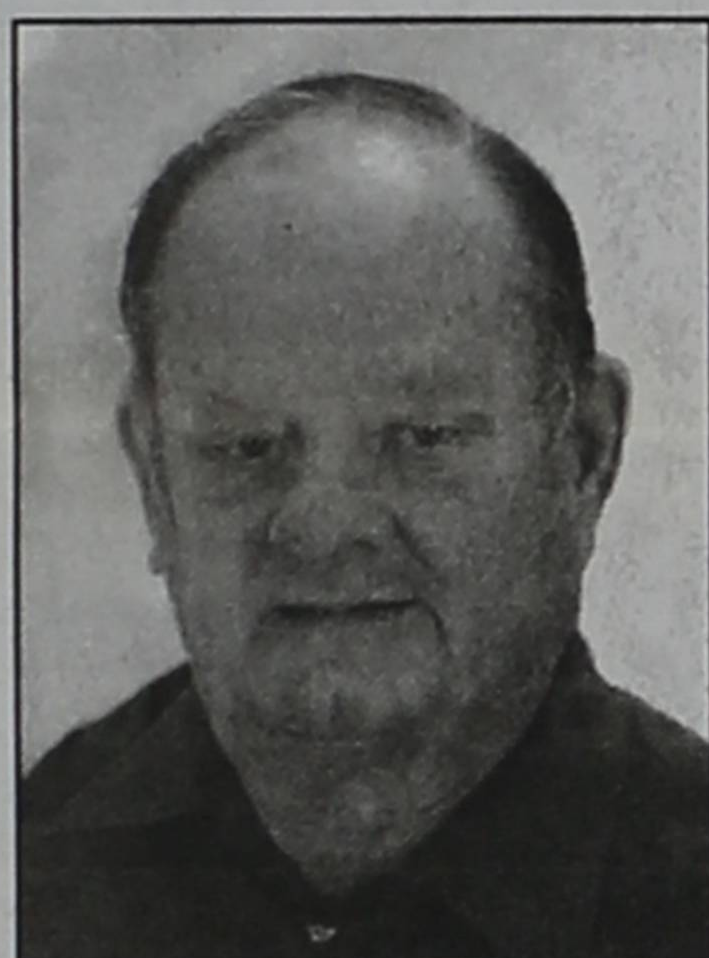
She is survived by her niece, Melanie of Clarendon and many longtime friends.

ed his accounting degree.

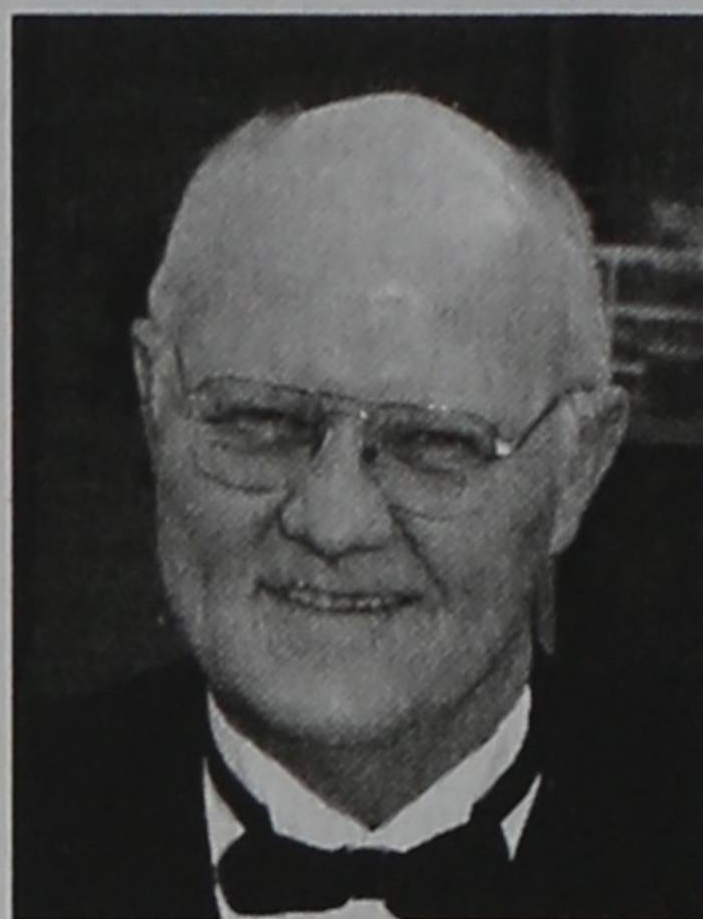

Leroy was born December 13, 1945 in Clovis, New Mexico to Ralph and Marie Cox. He lived first in Texico and then Lazbuddie, Texas.

Leroy grew up with lots of room to run, play, and work on the ranch and was known to be ornery. As a child, he once put his preschool-aged future wife on a Shetland pony and let it run. His children grew up hearing about when he pressed a dime against the roof of his mouth and it got stuck, when he rolled down a hill inside corrugation piping, when he rolled his sister's hair up into a giant knot on a hairbrush, and many other mischievous tales.

At age 11, he accepted Jesus as his savior and was baptized.

After graduating from Lazbuddie High School, he served in the United States Army and then several years in the Air Force Reserves Medical Service. From his service experiences, he retained an impressive commanding voice and a cunning interest in handling medical issues, from removing stitches to treating tick bites. He then lived on the family farm/ranch for a few years before he moved to Canyon and received a bachelor's degree from West Texas State University.

After being stranded in a vehicle in a snowstorm with only his mother's chocolate chip cookies to eat, he retained a serious affection for such cookies for the rest of his life.

On December 2, 1977, he and Terri Lynn Wilson were married at the chapel of the First Baptist Church in Amarillo. Having known each other since childhood, their first date consisted of prairie dog hunting. They settled in Amarillo, where Terri was teaching school and Leroy was employed first in investments and later with a

savings and loan.

The couple welcomed a daughter, Carrie, in 1980 and a son, Clint, in 1983.

In 1984, the family moved to Friona and started a successful business, Hometown Hardware. Leroy taught his children invaluable customer service skills from very young ages as he taught them to wait on customers, stock shelves, design displays, make change, and run the cash register. He threaded pipe, mixed paint, cut glass, invented solutions to problems, keyed locks, and picked up an impressive amount of hardware-related Spanish. Many will fondly remember the Dum-Dum lollipops that he handed out to children who came into the store. Clint enjoyed spending time working on a dune buggy and a tractor with him and learning other tricks of the trade. He and Clint also shared an appreciation for firearms.

Leroy retained his humorous streak as an adult, finding particular delight in blonde jokes, gag gifts, and Aggie jokes. He referred to his children and grandchildren by pet nicknames. Being colorblind, he loved pointing out rabbits and other wildlife in fields when no one else could see them. When Carlyn was in high school, he delighted in jumping out to scare her from around corners, dissolving into an infectious laugh.

When the store had been freshly painted, it was vandalized with spray paint graffiti overnight. Thanks to his consistent early-morning arrival at work, he painted over the graffiti before sunrise and it never saw the light of day; he laughed about what the "artist" must have thought for weeks.

Leroy placed a very high value on the academic progress of his children, and held them to lofty standards. He wanted his children to be capable--to marry out of free choice, and not out of need. When the kids were teenagers, he made it clear to them that if they were ever "in a tight," they were free to make up any lie or excuse necessary regarding him in order to get back to a safe and responsible situation. He wanted to be "the heavy" whenever he was needed. Every day, he told his daughter she was pretty, but he did not allow her to drive until she could change her own tire.

Leroy's granddaughters brought him great joy. Two refer to him as "Grandpa Ore," for his tendency to arrive with Oreos or M&Ms at most appearances. His family enjoyed watching his eyes sparkle as he watched the grandchildren play.

Three years ago, Leroy retired and sold Hometown Hardware. He became an excellent knitter's helper, serving as a great ball-winder for his wife Terri and taking interest in her passion for fiber arts. In December 2012, construction on their new home was completed and they made the much-anticipated move to Amarillo to be close to their children and grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 35 years, Terri Cox, in June; and his parents, Ralph and Marie Cox.

Survivors include his daughter Carrie and husband Travis Zinck of Amarillo; son Clint and wife Amber Cox of Amarillo; three granddaughters, Aze Lynn Zinck, Mayzie Zinck, and Mikaelah Cox of Amarillo; one grandson, Parker Sturgess of Amarillo; his brother R.H. and wife Sandra Cox of Amarillo; his sister Patsy Cox Shankles and husband Gary of Lubbock; and many extended family members.

Ice, snow don't stop tour

Despite snow and ice on Sunday, Bruce Fleming managed to show two Polish visitors around Friona and the area. Slawomir Marek Jurak and Tadeusz Solarski toured grain elevators, a cotton gin, shuttle uploading facilities, equipment dealers and local farms.

Jurak is the head of an Experimental Station in Kepa of the IUNG (Institute of Soil Science, Fertilizing and Plant Cultivation), conducting research on cultivation of 27 different crop species.

Solarski is a farmer with a PhD in agricultural science. He has 8,000 acres of land growing corn and soybeans. He is the owner

of an agricultural services company. Solarski is a member of the board of the Polish Association of Cereals Producers.

Jurak and Solarski are part of a Polish Agriculture Ambassadors group touring Texas in order to enhance international leadership and to foster a global understanding of agriculture.

"It was interesting to me to learn that Solarski sold all his corn to U.S. based Cargill and his soybeans to U.S. based Smithfield Foods," stated Fleming.

Fleming said that Solarski noted that in Poland

they wait for the rain to stop before they plant, while here we pray for rain so we can start planting.

"Both gentlemen were impressed with the size of trucks on our highways, and the large amount of goods and commodities carried by the railroads," said Fleming. "In Poland, the trains are all passenger trains and trucks are about half the size of ours."

Fleming learned that his guests were fascinated by the U.S. news coverage over the Russian and U.S. tensions regarding Ukraine. Poland shares a border with Ukraine.

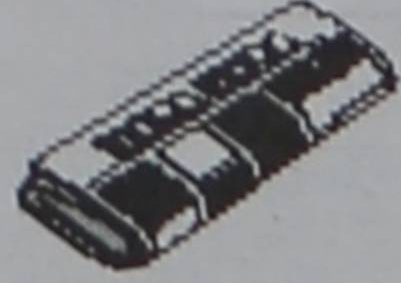

Girls' Powerlifting competes at regionals

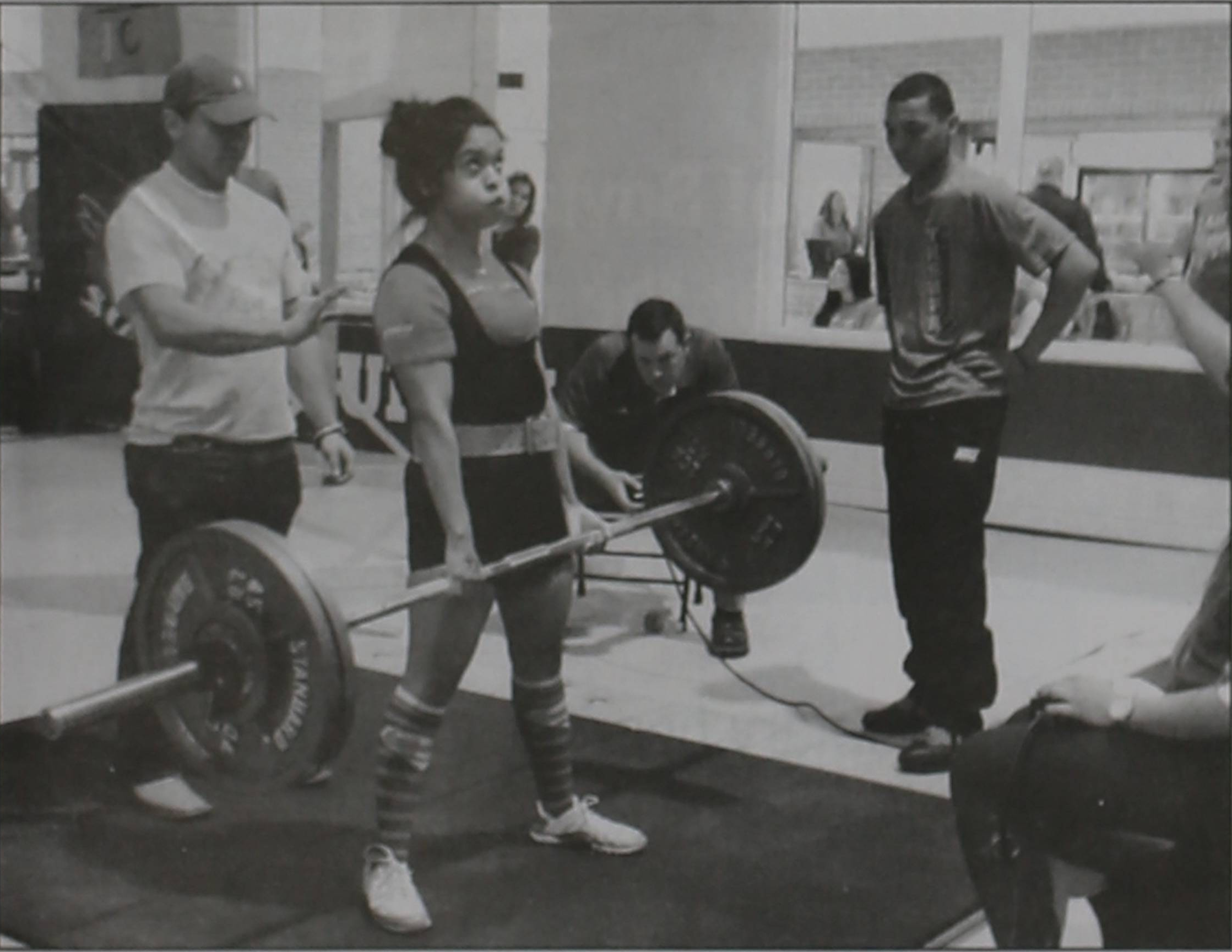
The Friona High School Girls' Powerlifting team participated in the regional meet held in Mertzon on February 28.
