Brown shooting case closed



A Friona man was acting in self-defense when he shot and killed 73-year-old Max Allen of Grady last summer, according to District Attorney Andrea Reeb.


Reeb announced Friday that a Curry County grand jury had recently cleared David Brown, 59, of any wrongdoing after listening to about three hours of testimony. Brown is a grain farmer who leased land from Allen. He told Curry County Sheriff's depu- said he tried to perform CPR on ties he and his son were working a milo field across from Allen's home last June when he was confronted by Allen, who was angry. Brown told deputies and the Clovis News Journal that Allen began chasing his tractor and throwing rocks. Brown said he and his son left and later discovered keys to one of the vehicles left in the field were missing.

Brown had called the sheriff's office and said Allen was inside the house and probably armed. Sometime after deputies left and while Brown and his son were spraying to kill weeds in the field, Brown said, Allen confronted them again. Undersheriff Wesley Waller said it appeared Allen was wrestling for control of Brown's rifle when Allen suffered a single and fatal gunshot wound.

Brown, a volunteer firefighter, Allen after summoning sheriff's deputies. Allen died at the scene. "The grand jury's function is to decide whether probable cause exists for a crime," Reeb said in a press release. "Due to the circumstances of this case, I felt the citizens of this county needed to hear all the evidence and decide whether this matter should go forward on murder charges. The grand jury decided the killing was in self-defense and this matter will now be closed."

Complicated farm bill will take homework by producers

they are back in school when they begin to deal with the new farm bill, because they certainly need to do their homework before going to sign up, according to one Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service economist.

Speaking recently in Amarillo, Dr. Joe Outlaw, co-director of the Agricultural and Food Policy Center at Texas A&M University and an AgriLife Extension economist in College Station, said the new farm bill repeals direct payments, counter-cyclical payments and Av- he said. erage Crop Revenue Election, or ACRE. Producers now must

> Producers are also going to have the opportunity to reallocate their base acres to crops planted on the farm at any time during the 2009 to 2012 crop. years. And, Outlaw said, all cotton base acres are now generic base acres.

"For the safety net to be the most effective, you really need to get your base as close as possible to what you are planting."

each year, Outlaw said. The generic base acres can be assigned to other covered commodities.

"You have to do your own homework," he said. "Don't get stuck with something that may or may not be good for you for the life of the bill."

If producers choose the price loss coverage option, or PLC as it is referred to in the farm bill, they have the opportunity to update their payment yields to 90 percent of the 2008-2012 crop year averages.

if they are going to choose the ARC, which covers losses in income for a commodity relative to a benchmark guarantee, or go the PLC route. And then there are more choices within each of those options.

For the 2014-2018 crop years, all producers on a farm must make a one-time, irrevocable election to obtain either price loss coverage under section 1116 on a commodity-by-commodity basis or agricultural risk coverage under section 1117. Price loss coverage is a set reference price and the payment is

"You can do part ARC and part PLC, unless you choose ARC individual," Outlaw said. "But the fine print is if the producer and the landowner can't come to a decision, then the farm will not be in the program for 2014, but you are automatically in the price loss program for 2015."

All decisions will need to be made on a crop-by-crop basis for each farm, he said.

Additionally, a new area-wide insurance program, a supplemental coverage option, will be would normally fall within their insurance deductible range.

"We are working on educational materials and tools to assist producers with all these decisions," Outlaw said.

The decision aide, once available, will help with the many decisions that must be made, he said. It will include a lot of information about the specific choices and about crop insurance.

Amendment XXVI-Passed by Congress March 23, 1971 and ratified July 1, 1971.

(Note: Amendment 14, Section 2, of the Constitution was modified by section 1 of the 26th Amendment.)



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costs is down, to its slowest rate in fifty years - two of the most promising developments for our middle class and our fiscal future in a long time.

Last month, after her first wellness visit under her new insurance plan, a woman from Colorado shared with me what that peace of mind meant to her. "After using my new insurance for the first time, you probably heard my sigh of relief from the White House," she wrote. "I felt like a human being again. I felt that I had value."

This is what's at stake any time anyone, out of some outdated obsession, pledges to repeal or undermine the Affordable Care Act. And that's why my administration will spend the fifth year of this law and beyond working to implement and improve on it.

Another gun raffle is being planned for the fall. The next Noon Lions meeting is Thursday April 3 at Headquarters Restaurant.







Madonnas of the Prairie exhibit at PPHM

In the mid-nineteenth century artists often depicted women as victims, passive observers, or merely passengers in the settlement of the American West. Some artists chose to portray Western women in the guise of a "Madonna" figure, based on Renaissance paintings of the Virgin Mary. Conversely, Western artists portrayed American Indian women more honestly, revealing the harshness of their lives of unceasing toil. Others described women in the West as beautiful objects to be admired, with no true role to play except to stand in the doorway or by the corral gate watching their men ride away.

As part of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's "Women of the West" series of six exhibitions that celebrate women of the west through art, artifacts and stories of the past, PPHM's Madonnas of the Prairie: Depictions of Women in the American West exhibition will open on Saturday, April 12, 2014 in the Foran Art Gallery and will continue through August 30, 2014. LifeSmarts Team qualifies for National



This year over 50 teams competed in the Texas competition and the top six teams were invited to the live competition.

The "Lifetime" team consisted of Gunnar Carranza, Marisol Posada, Kiana Lozoya, Julio Rocha and Celeste Flores-Rivas. 
