

of its own. I found it to be impossible to slow down and use more than one pen to sign my name. Surely presidents must practice several times before the official signing.

Since schools do not teach cursive writing any longer, future presidents may not even use pens to sign laws. Printing their name should make it easier to use multiple pens. You should try this sometime. If you don't have twelve pens use one pen and lay it down and pick it up twelve times.

I finally blurted out "The HM-MMfighters". After a bout of laughter I was told that it was okay to say the word because it was part of the movie title. It didn't matter to me. I knew I couldn't say H-E-double hockey sticks.

If two adults were talking in a normal voice and suddenly went to whispering that meant something bad was happening to someone.

I can't help but think that if as a society, if we would go back to the old ways our kids wouldn't have to grow up so fast.

We live in a world where it is okay to insert a dirty word into everyday conversation.

If you are like me, you probably don't think theft is a huge problem, or at least you don't think it is a huge problem until someone steals from you. For example, when someone stole my tailgate off a pickup I used to drive, I realized that theft is a problem.

Statistically, theft is a massive problem costing businesses and individuals millions of dollars each year in our country. For example, one of the local convenience store managers estimated they lose \$700-\$800 per month due to theft. A local police officer estimated that half of their calls deal with theft in some form or fashion, and the Bureau of Justice statistics says 7% of people in the US were victims of identity theft in 2012.

God condemns theft in the eighth commandment because theft reveals a heart uncommitted to His provision, His design for private property, and a false conception of stewardship.

In fact, Satan is called a thief in John 10:10, coming to "steal and kill and destroy."

The deception of theft in any form is that you can have an abundance of things by taking what is not rightfully yours. Accepting such a deception can lead to prison, hurting others, and an eternity without Christ.

The truth of God is that when you follow Him through a relationship with Jesus Christ, you will have what you need and you are to be a steward of it, because in receiving Christ you have far more than you deserve.

Love Your Heart

So we hear time after time, exercise is good for your heart. Your heart is about the size of your fist, and beats about 100,000 times a day. It pumps 2,000 gallons of blood through 60,000 miles of blood vessels in your body. Those are some incredible numbers for a pump that size! What is the training effect—the good—of exercise for your heart?

Endurance training (aka cardio) increases the size of your heart. This increase may occur from an increase in the size of the heart cavities (the atria and the ventricles) as well as from an increase in the size of the walls of the heart. The result is greater cardiac output with each heartbeat. The larger cavities allow for more blood to be pumped with each heartbeat. The thicker walls (muscles) of the heart allow for increased contractility meaning a greater emptying of the ventricles each time the heart beats. Bottom line is your heart is

more efficient and doesn't have to pump (beat) as much. You are lessening the "miles" on the odometer-your heart doesn't have to work as hard because it is stronger. The average heart beats 70 times per minute. So for example, if you lower your heart rate to 60 bpm, that's a savings of 13,000 beats a day.

Increased capillarization is another benefit of exercise. You can "grow" new capillaries. As your muscle fibers increase in size from exercise, new capillaries form to increase the capabilities of getting oxygen and nutrients to those larger muscle fibers and to carry away the metabolic wastes. Increased capillarization also occurs in the heart. Why is that important? It can reduce the possibility of cardiac disease and heart attacks. And, in the event of a heart attack, there are more capillaries to get blood to the heart muscle lessening the damage. Show your heart some love... Exercise!

Next week we flip this coin to see Imitation when it is good.



Tips for Copper Theft Prevention

As the price of copper has increased, so has copper theft. While trying to make a quick dollar by stealing copper, thieves risk their own lives and cause dangerous and expensive damage. Common targets for copper thieves are farming equipment, air conditioners, vacant buildings, construction sites and electric utility properties, including substations and power poles.

Deaf Smith Electric crews recently discovered a pad mount transformer, located at the old Caviness packing plant, had been completely stripped of all copper and other transformer parts. Thieves using a pry bar or some other device opened the energized transformer putting themselves in great danger. The thieves also vandalized the supply lines going into the building by pulling a plastic conduit down with a chain, causing an electrical arc on the building. An investigation is ongoing at this

copper theft by reporting suspicious activity near any of these locations.

"Copper theft from electric utilities is particularly hazardous to thieves. It is also an inconvenience to those who rely
on electricity," says Member
Services Manager Steve Horrell.

"All items in electric systems are
important. Copper theft leaves
electric systems vulnerable to
fires, explosions and power outages."

Unfortunately, you could be a victim of copper theft, even if thieves never step foot on your property. Copper thieves have caused power outages at businesses and homes, shut down traffic lights, and forced hospitals to run on backup generators. In the worst cases, copper thefts have caused fires and explosions that have taken innocent lives.

Deaf Smith Electric suggests the following tips to stay safe and help stop copper theft:

· Never enter or touch equip-

ment inside a substation; stay away from power lines and anything touching a power line.

• If you notice anything unusual with electric facilities, such as an open substation gate, open equipment, hanging wire, etc., contact your electric utility immediately.

• If you see suspicious activities near electric facilities, including power poles call emergency services or your local utility. Do not intervene. Allow officials to handle the situation.

 If you work in construction, or have a farm operation, store copper securely, especially overnight. Don't leave any type of cutting tool laying around.

 Install motion-sensor lights on the outside of your house and business to deter possible thieves.
