City council agenda for Monday meeting

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday April 14 at 6:30 p.m. in the council chambers, 619 Main St. The tentative agenda appears to be brief. The final agenda is posted, by law, 72 hours prior to the meeting on the front window at city hall.

The council will approve a resolution to cancel the special election seat on the council. Nancy Davis is unopposed to fill the seat.

They will review the city's investment policy, discuss and approve accounts payable and financial statements, hear a report from Police Chief Frank Mooney, and authorize city manager Patricia Phipps to seek bids for re-roofing Prairie Acres and Heritage Estates and to participate in the nursing facility upper payment program.

Cancer Coalition 'Walk for a Cure'

The Parmer County Cancer Coalition (PCCC) will get back to basics with a "Walk for a Cure", Saturday June 7, 8 a.m. to 12 noon at the Friona high school track. The event will be similar to the former Relay for Life that were held in years past. All funds stay in Parmer County providing grant money to Parmer County residents undergoing cancer treatments.

There will be some distinct changes from the 'Relay' format. Walking for cancer is the goal and focus to raise money to assist our cancer patients. This will be an individual event rather than teams. The cost to participate is by donation. The amount is up to the participant.

Each participant will be walking 'In Memory of' or "Honoring" a person in their life who is or has been fighting cancer. The Coalition board is still in the process of finalizing certain details, but they would like for everyone to SAVE THE DATE, Saturday June 7.

There will be t-shirts available for sale the day of the event provided by the PCCC. They encourage organizations to raise funds or have money-making events at the track during the Walk for a Cure.

Because the event will be held during the daytime, the luminaria sales will be replaced with a "Ribbon Awareness" insert to the Friona Star. Details are still being worked out but the ribbon cost and purchase forms should soon be available. Watch the Friona Star for further information.

The Walk will begin with the familiar survivor lap and caregiver second lap, then followed by all walkers joining in to walk in support of cancer research through PCCC. It will be a morning of fun and fellowship so plan to bring blankets, lawn chairs, and awnings. The stands will be available to sit in but do not provide much shade for resting between laps.

The walkers who donate as a participant will be provided recognition where they will put the names of the loved ones they are walking for. This is also a detail that has not been finalized. All businesses who donate to the event will be recognized throughout the Walk.

PCCC donates 25% of all funds raised to the American Cancer Society. Other fund raisers PCCC supports are "Flush Out Cancer" which is currently through mid-April, and the Pudge Kendrick Golf Tournament which will be held June 21-22 at the Dimmitt Country Club. If you are interested in playing in this tournament you can call Greg Lewellen at the Kendrick Oil offices.

Make your plans to join the Walk for a Cure on June 7. The board suggests you might want to create your own t-shirt with your memorials or other fun decorative ideas to make it a fun day as the community celebrates and remembers our cancer survivors and fighters.

Entry forms and ribbon awareness forms will be published when details are finalized. You can sign up the day of the walk also. DID YOU KNOW?

The Titles of Nobility Amendment was proposed in 1810.

Text of the Amendment:

If any citizen of the United States shall accept, claim, receive or retain, any title of nobility or honour, or shall without the consent of Congress, accept and retain any present, pension, office or emolument of any kind whatever, from any emperor, king, prince or foreign power, such person shall cease to be a citizen of the United States, and shall be incapable of holding any office of trust or profit under them, or either of them.

This amendment can still be ratified by the states, as the Congress did not impose a ratification time limit. It has not been ratified by three-fourths of the states and thus is not part of the Constitution....Mary Johnston

"A 9-month-old little boy was arrested for attempted murder"

I almost dropped my coffee cup when I heard that announced on the news. Fox News and CBS were reporting that a nine-month-old Pakistani boy was being charged, with 30 others, with attempted murder.

Muhammad Mosa Khan, the toddler, was being charged with threatening police and interfering in state affairs. He and his 'co-conspirators' were booked following a raid to catch suspected gas thieves in the city of Lahore.

Little Muhammad was accused of trying to kill security officers by throwing stones at them. (How bad could that have hurt?) This all stemmed from a protest against electricity shortages.

There were pictures of the boy being fingerprinted in a Pakistani police station. He was having difficulty holding his bottle much less throwing stones. He is out on bail and has a hearing on April 12.

What is this world coming to? I know that meanness can start young but that young. Really?

He is just a cute, adorable little boy that was in the wrong place at the wrong time.

The judge was even so gra-

cious as to tell the bailiff to take down the boys' statement.

At nine months, what could that statement have consisted of? Dada, Mama, BaBa, or whatever the Pakistani equivalent is.

What were you doing at 9-months old? What were your children or grandchildren doing at 9-months old?

Being jailed at 9-months will be on that little boy's record for the rest of his life. Gives a completely new meaning to a 'permanent' record.

Who is going to testify for or against little Muhammad? And on the outside chance that he is convicted of attempted murder where will they send him? Do they have childcare in prison? Will he have his own cell or will he have to share with a prison hardened two-year old?

I am just flabbergasted.

I can see it now, gangs of toddlers knocking over convenience stores for formula and diapers. Gangs of little ones wandering the sidewalks because they can't cross the street alone. This could become a very serious issue.

How long of a sentence do

you give a toddler for committing a crime? Do you educate them as rehabilitation into society? Are they taught how to make teething rings for kids on the outside because license plates are too dangerous?

I have met some children that are 'holy' terrors but I never thought of arresting them.

In other words, would you rather have gold or God, money or The Messiah, silver or The Spirit, jewels or Jesus?



The Myth of Multi-tasking!

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month

Most of us incorrectly assure ourselves that we can multi-task! After all, we can walk and chew gum at the same time! Right? When we stop and think about those activities - chewing gum and walking, we have to admit that walking is one of those things we do that requires very little brain power; in fact, it's subconscious and nearly automatic. Unlike walking and chewing gum, both driving and using a cell phone require higher cognitive thinking. Your brain simply cannot perform two higher cognitive tasks at the same time. Instead, it must switch between the tasks, and that's where we get into problems! With technology at their fingertips, drivers are constantly faced with distractions, such as talking or texting, which places their safety and that of others at serious risk.

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is launching the Talk. Text. Crash. campaign to raise awareness of the dangers associated with distracted driving and to encourage Texans to put down their cell phones while driv-

Distracted driving is becoming increasingly common and dangerous, causing traffic crashes and fatalities. "The statistics in Texas are sobering," said John Barton, TxDOT deputy executive director. "One in five traffic crashes in Texas is caused by a distracted driver, and last year 459 people were killed as a result." In 2013, the number of Texas crashes involving distracted driving totaled 94,943, up 4 percent from the previous year.

Drivers can be distracted by conversing with other passengers, eating, smoking, manipulating dashboard controls, reaching for something in the vehicle, and talking or texting on a cell phone. Among the many distractions drivers face on the road, cell phone use is one of the most common and a major cause of distracted driving traffic accidents and fatalities.

While distractions affect drivers of all ages, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has found that hand-held cell phone use is highest among 16- to 24-year-olds. This age group has the largest

were distracted. In Texas, 46 percent of urban teens and 52 percent of rural teens talk on a cell phone while driving, and nearly the same percentage text while driving. (Texas A&M Transportation Institute).

Text messaging is particularly dangerous. New research conducted last year by the Texas A&M Transportation Institute showed reaction times double when drivers are distracted by text messaging. Additionally, sending or receiving a text takes a driver's eyes away from the road for an average of 4.6 seconds. At 55 mph, that's the equivalent of driving the length of a football field while blindfolded.

The Talk. Text. Crash. campaign aims to reduce distracted driving, not only for National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, but throughout the year. Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent, Shana Fleming reminds drivers to put away their cell phones and wait until they arrive at their destination to use their phone. Although cell phone use is the most easily recognized distraction, all invehicle distractions are unsafe and can cause crashes or fatalities. Keep your eyes proportion of drivers who on the road and arrive alive!

Swine virus topic of April 29 seminar

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Pork Producers Association are joining forces to educate producers in the Texas Panhandle about a threat to the swine industry.

Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea Virus or PEDv, as it is known in the industry, is a disease occurring only in pigs and is caused by a coronavirus, according to the Texas Pork Producers Association. It produces acute and severe outbreaks of diarrhea, which rapidly transmits among all ages of pigs.

A seminar titled "What is PEDv and how does it affect you?" will be held at 5:30 p.m. April 29 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center, 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd., Amarillo.

"This program should be very useful to our producers in Texas," said Nathan Carr, AgriLife Extension agriculture

and natural resources agent in Potter County. As we think about the commercial industry, it is located primarily up in the Texas Panhandle. Also, the show pig projects have quite a few breeders in the Panhandle and South Plains.

"The program should be very useful to all of them as they think about their operations and the health and biosecurity to them," Carr said.

The meal, sponsored by Lindner Feed and Milling Inc., will begin at 5:30 p.m. and immediately be followed by the program, he said.

Irrigation assessment program reinstated

After a four-year absence, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 (HPWD) is bringing back its irrigation assessment program for the 2014 growing season.

Under the program, producers volunteer to have their center pivot or drip irrigation system evaluated by HPWD staff. Several times during the growing season, water wells are metered with an ultrasonic flow meter to determine the total gallon per minute flow at each pivot or drip irrigation

The total hours that water

system is also monitored. The pumping hours and the gallon per minute flow data are then calculated to obtain the total gallons of water pumped during a typical 2,000-hour irrigation season.

"As drought continues on the Panhandle-South Plains region, it is important for producers to know exactly how much groundwater is pumped during an irrigation season," said HPWD Manager Jason Coleman, P.E.

"Because of this, the HPWD Board of Directors and staff felt it was important to rein-

flows through each irrigation state the irrigation assessment program to give producers insight into the amount of water being applied to their crops," Coleman said.

> As an extra service to the producers participating in the amounts and pumping data. irrigation assessment program, district staff will take water quality samples at each siteincluding total dissolved solids and water pH.

Furthermore, water level measurements for each site are also taken at the beginning and end of the season.

"It's important to understand water chemistry as it impacts the efficient use of supplemental nutrients applied to crops," he said.

All information gathered by district staff will be entered into a database. At the end of the irrigation season, the total hours are obtained and a final

pumping average is calculated from data obtained throughout the season.

Producers receive a report of all information gathered from their site, including irrigation

"We encourage interested agricultural producers to participate in the program," Coleman said. "It helps them understand how much water they use each year, and it also helps the Water District in future water planning efforts where accurate irrigation pumping information must be considered. The program is free and all participants remain anonymous," he added.



Pyramids

Ancient history, geometry, geography? How do pyramids fit into fitness? Pyramid training encompasses many different forms, but simply put, you start at the base progressing to a high point or the top, and then if you choose, regress back to the base. You can choose one exercise and begin with a light weight then progressively add weight to each set as you move up the pyramid. The pyramid is a popular technique for the bench press. For example, one might begin set one with 135 pounds for 12 reps (135 x 12), set two--150 x 10, set three--165 x 8, set four--180 x 6, set 5—195 x 4 and set 6—210 x 2.

I like to use pyramids to break up the monotony of a work-

You can design a pyramid however you want and use more than one during a workout. You can incorporate several different types of exercises in one pyramid even adding cardio intervals between weight sets.

Decide what exercises you want to do according to what your goals are, and then decide how "tall" you want your pyramid to be. So say you are working on your upper body, and you pick biceps curls, lateral raises, triceps extensions and pushups.

You could begin your pyramid with 10 pushups, 15 lateral raises, 20 triceps extensions and 25 biceps curls then go back down the pyramid with 20 triceps extensions, 15 lateral raises, and finish with 10 pushups. Add cardio intervals (60 seconds of jump roping) between each set for a little spice or choose all cardio exercises for a cardio workout. FYI-heavier weights and low reps will build muscle. When you've got the correct weight, the last two reps should be very difficult and require an almost max effort. When those last two reps become easier, add weight. If you are looking to tone, use lighter weights and do more reps.
