Text of the Amendment:
If any citizen of the United States shall accept, claim, receive or retain, any title of nobility or honour, or shall without the consent of Congress, accept and retain any present, pension, office or emolument of any kind whatever, from any emperor, king, prince or foreign power, such person shall cease to be a citizen of the United States, and shall be incapable of holding any office of trust or profit under them, or either of them.

transmits among all ages of pigs. pigs.
A seminar titled "What is PEDV and how does it affect you?" will be held at $5: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. April 29 at the Texas A\&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center, 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd., Amarillo.

 Distracted driving is be oming increasingly common and dangerous, causing "Theffic crashes and fatalities The statistics in Texas are sobering," said John Barton, TxDOT deputy executive director. "One in five traffic crashes in Texas is caused by a distracted driver, and last year 459 people were killed as a result." In 2013 the number of Texas crashes involving distracted driving totaled 94,943 , up 4 percent from the previous year. Drivers can be distracted by conversing with other passengers, eating, smoking, manipulating dashboard controls, reaching for something in the vehicle, and talking or texting on a cell phone. Among the many distractions drivers face on the road, cell phone use is one of the most common and a major cause of distracted driving traffic accidents and fatalities.
While distractions af fect drivers of all ages, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has Safety Administration has und that hand-held cell 6- to 24 -year-olds. This age group has the largest age group has the largest 46 percent of urban teens and 52 percent of rural teen driving a driving, and nearly the same percentage text while driv ing. (Texas A\&M Transportation Institute).
Text messaging is par ticularly dangerous. New research conducted last year by the Texas A\&M Trans portation Institute showed reaction times double when drivers are distracted by text messaging. Additionally sending or receiving a text takes a driver's eyes away from the road for an average of 4.6 seconds. At 55 mph , hat's the equivalent of driv ing the length of a footbal field while blindfolded. The Talk. Text. quality samples at each sitequality samples at each site-

"It's important to understand water chemistry as it impacts the efficient use of supplemental nutrients applied to crops, he said.

## Pyramids

Ancient history, geometry, geography? How do pyramids fit into fitness? Pyramid training encompasses many different forms, but simply put, you start at the base progressing to a high point or the top, and then if you choose, regress back to the base. You can choose one exercise and begin with a light weight then progressively add weight to each set as you move up the pyramid. The pyramid is a popular technique for the bench press. For example, one might begin set one with 135 pounds for 12 reps $(135 \times 12)$, set two--150 $\times 10$, set three--1 I like to use pyramids to break up the monotony of a workout like to use pyran
You can design a pyramid however you want and use more than one during a workout. You can incorporate several different types of exercises in one pyramid even adding cardio intervals between weight sets.
Decide what exercises you want to do according to what your goals are, and then decide how "tall" you want your pyramid to be. So say you are working on your upper body, and you pick biceps curls, lateral raises, triceps extensions and pushups. You could begin your pyramid with 10 pushups, 15 lateral raises, 20 triceps extensions and 25 biceps curls then go back down the pyramid with 20 triceps extensions, 15 lateral raises, and finish with 10 pushups. Add cardio intervals ( 60 seconds of jump roping) between each set for a little spice or choose and lando cxercises for a cardo workoul. F'heavicr weighs and low reps whe tha should be very difficult he ceavire weigh, add weight. If you are looking to tone, use lighter weights and do more reps.
