## Light Freeze Leaves No Damage

### Tomatoes, Alfalfa Show Leaf Curl

"If you don't like the weather, wait awhile and it'll change," is an old adage that certainly holds true in this part of the country. The month of May is providing almost any type of weather you might want . . . except rain.

### Greenbugs Hit Young Grain

### In This County

On May 20-21, county agents of Parmer and Bailey County worked with Dr. Don Rummel, area entomologist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, on a greenbug survey in young grain sorghum.

Several farms in north Bailey County disclosed greenbugs in light scattered infestations in about half the fields inspected. No economic infestations were found, but producers were urged to keep a close check on their grain sorghum.

Seeding grain sorghum can be seriously damaged by relatively small numbers of the insects per plant, said the Bailey County Agent, J.K. Adams. Though no economic infestations have been found to date, farmers are reminded that grain sorghum plants from emergence to six inches tall, with visible damage and with colonies on the leaves, should be sprayed to control greenbugs.

As of Friday, May 21, only .03 inch of rain had been recorded for May and the total for the year is 1.85, less than two inches. Last year, at the same time, the rainfall was behind, with 0.06 inches being recorded for May, 1970 and only 1.75 through the first five months of 1970. So far, this year for May becomes the low figure in the weather records for the past 50 years. In May, 1969, 1.42 was recorded; May, 1968, .70 and May, 1967, .35 was recorded. This compares with 1.85 in May, 1963; 2.43 in May, 1959 and 3.66 in May, 1949.

Temperature was low enough two nights within the past 10 days for persons to report frost and even some ice in Bailey County. On Thursday, May 13, a little ice was reported, and again on Tuesday, May 18.

Ruby Garner, who lives on West American Blvd, said she had ice in a water hose and a number of farmers reported slight damage to young crops. The average latest date for a freeze in Bailey County as reported by the National Weather Service is April 15, and the average earliest date for a freeze is October 23.

In May, 1969, the low average temperature was 52 degrees and the average high temperature was 92 degrees. The overall average for the month of May Con't on Page 2, Col. 6

## County Grants Subsidy Fee To Ambulance Banquet To Honor Tourist Personnel

During a special called meeting Tuesday of the Bailey County Commissioners Court, commissioners approved a temporary subsidy for Singleton-Ellis Funeral Home ambulance service. Approved was a subsidy of \$350 monthly and a joint meeting of the city and county officials will be held to perhaps raise the subsidy amount with assistance from the city officials.

Frank Ellis presented his budget and an accounting sheet showing that the ambulance in Muleshoe made 189 calls last year and expenses were above \$6,000, exclusive of labor. Ellis said he collected only slightly above \$3,100 and could not continue to operate the ambulance service without at least a temporary subsidy.

County Judge Glen Williams said the commissioners felt it was imperative to continue an ambulance service in this area, so the temporary subsidy was made until further arrangements were worked out to keep such service.

Also discussed during the meeting was a road matter, said Judge Williams, which concerned the projected opening of a county road. The commissioners met with a property owner who now lives in Lubbock to work out minor problems about the county road.

## Paving Survey For FM 1760 Is Underway

Paving of a road from Muleshoe across to Portales, N. M. is nearing reality, according to county officials.

Presently approximately eight miles is being surveyed on the Texas side in order to draw up easements and acquire rights-of-way for construction of the new road. Easements are expected to be drawn up by late summer.

County Judge Glen Williams said he had no recent information about what New Mexico is presently doing concerning the proposed new highway, but added he thought they were probably also in the same preliminary stages as Bailey County.

## St. Clair's Burglary Suspects Are Sought

One man is in jail at Lubbock charged with possession of stolen property and warrants have been issued for two other persons who have been charged in the April 11 burglary of St. Clair's Department Store in Muleshoe.

On Sunday, April 11, city officers were summoned to the department store where it was found that the glass front door had been broken and the store burglarized. Missing were at least 28 men's suits, both Botany 500 and Forester-Foster suits. Owner Irvin St. Clair said the suits known to be missing included four size 36; five size 37; 15 size 40 and four size 41. They were a mixed group of blue, black and brown.

City officers began an immediate investigation which culminated several days ago when one of the stolen suits was reported to have been recovered in Lubbock. Muleshoe City Officer Buddy Black and Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements went to Lubbock Tuesday to conduct an investigation, aided by Lubbock City and County officers.

## Narrow-Row Cotton Disease Loss Less

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth in a series of news articles on narrow-row cotton production.)

LUBBOCK--Initial research shows that cotton produced in narrow-rows may have the edge over cotton in conventional 40-inch rows as far as disease losses are concerned.

"Losses from both seedling diseases and Verticillium wilt may be minimized in narrow-row cotton production," believes Dr. Earl Minton, USDA plant pathologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

"Since narrow-row production is aimed at shortening the growing season, cotton can generally be planted a couple of weeks later than with the conventional method of production," he points out. "This allows for better environmental conditions at planting so that seed germination and seedling growth will be improved. A healthy, vigorous seedling is less susceptible to seedling disease. Also, a planting rate of four to six seed per foot of row will allow plants to be spaced further apart in the row. The wide spacing will reduce the spread of seedling disease from plant to plant."

## Plan Weed Control Program With Care

Growers in Bailey County are in the swing of planting, reports County Agricultural Agent J. K. Adams. Planting requires careful planning, and a weed control program should be planned just as carefully. Weeds rob a crop of water and nutrients and cost millions of dollars annually through reduced yields and quality, problems in harvesting and processing, and extra expenses in chemicals and cultivation.

An economical weed control program is made up of a combination of chemical use and timely cultivation, explains Adams. Herbicides cannot be expected to do the whole job alone. Several species of both annual and perennial (root-tyne) weeds complicate the job for the grower. Herbicides must be selected for the specific weed problems that are expected on a particular field.

In cotton, Treflan or Planavin do an excellent job on careless weeds, volunteer sorghum, watergrass and seedling Johnsongrass. These chemicals must be thoroughly incorporated with soil to be effective. In furrow-planted cotton on sandy soils, Treflan, Planavin and Dacthal are safe when applied pre-emerge in a band at planting. However, chemicals generally tend to leach in these

row. The wide spacing will reduce the spread of seedling disease from plant to plant."

Narrow-row production also features cotton plants that are short in stature with medium to light boll loads. Early maturing varieties that have shorter fruiting periods and less fruit per plant should reduce losses from Verticillium wilt, explains the pathologist.

In soils where wilt is a serious problem, Minton feels that narrow-row cotton can "get the jump" on the disease. "Wilt is usually mild during the summer months at which time narrow-row cotton is making rapid growth. The crop should therefore reach maturity before wilt sets in."

In narrow-row cotton studies last year, the incidence of Verticillium wilt was a key item under investigation. A highly susceptible cotton variety was planted in eight and 16-inch rows. Wilt infection increased as soil moisture levels were increased. However, increasing plant populations from 10,000 to 70,000 plants per acre or increasing the nitrogen application from 80 to 320 pounds per acre had little effect on the incidence of wilt.

light soils, causing crop injury and poor weed control.

There are several excellent preemerge chemicals for bed planting on fine sandy loam or heavier soils, adds Adams. Caparol, Karmex or Lasso have given consistent results when there is rainfall within a week to 10 days after application. These chemicals should be sprayed after planting, behind the covering drags. Light-weight tires or cable drags on the planter mix chemicals lightly in the upper one-fourth to one-half inch of soil. Cotoran is also an effective preemerge weed killer but can injure cotton on sandy soils.

Postemerge directed treatments such as Karmex, MSMA or Caparol are effective but must be selected for specific weed problems. Information on the use of these materials is available at the county Extension office, says Adams.

In grain sorghum, there are a variety of soil-applied weed killers. Milogard (propazine) can be applied three to four weeks before planting and incorporated lightly with a rolling cultivator. After this, the sorghum must be bed-planted. Care must be used to avoid knocking soil off the top of the bed or the chemical will be lost.

At planting, Milogard can be applied alone or in combination with Herban (Herban 21P) or Lorox (Prolin or LOP 64). These chemicals are primarily effective on broadleaf weeds such as carelessweed, or morningglory. Some grass may be controlled or suppressed when higher rates are used, but cultivation will be needed, points out Adams. All of these preemerge treatments should be used with extreme caution on sandy soils and when the crop will be furrow-planted. Igran, a new herbicide, is available in limited amounts for use on sandy soils. The Herban 21P, LOP 64 or Prolin combinations will reduce chemical residues so weeds may develop late in the season.

If weeds develop after sorghum is up, Aatrex, Karmex, Banvel or 2,4-D can be used as post-emerge sprays. When applying 2,4-D near cotton, do not spray when the wind is greater than five miles per hour, in hot weather or with a spray pressure of more than 20 pounds per square inch (PSI). Banvel can be used more safely near cotton 10 to 25 days after cotton emerges. If Aatrex is used, only corn or sorghum can be grown on the same land next year.

during that year was 65.4 degrees.

In May, 1969, the low average temperature was 52 degrees and the average high temperature was 98 degrees with the average overall temperature being 64 degrees.

Bailey County Agent J.K. Adams said the small leaves tomatoes have curled back in some fields due to the unexpected cold and tender leaves on alfalfa have been damaged some.

He said it had not been determined how much of the damage was caused by cold weather and how much was sand damage. The county agent stated that much of the sand damage was from good cultural practice not being done in time and the sand blasting the young plants.

He did add that there are practically no dryland crops to be damaged as dryland farmers are still waiting for that

ing of a "This Is Your Life" program recalling some of her early experiences, with pictures and stories handed him by her friends and relatives.

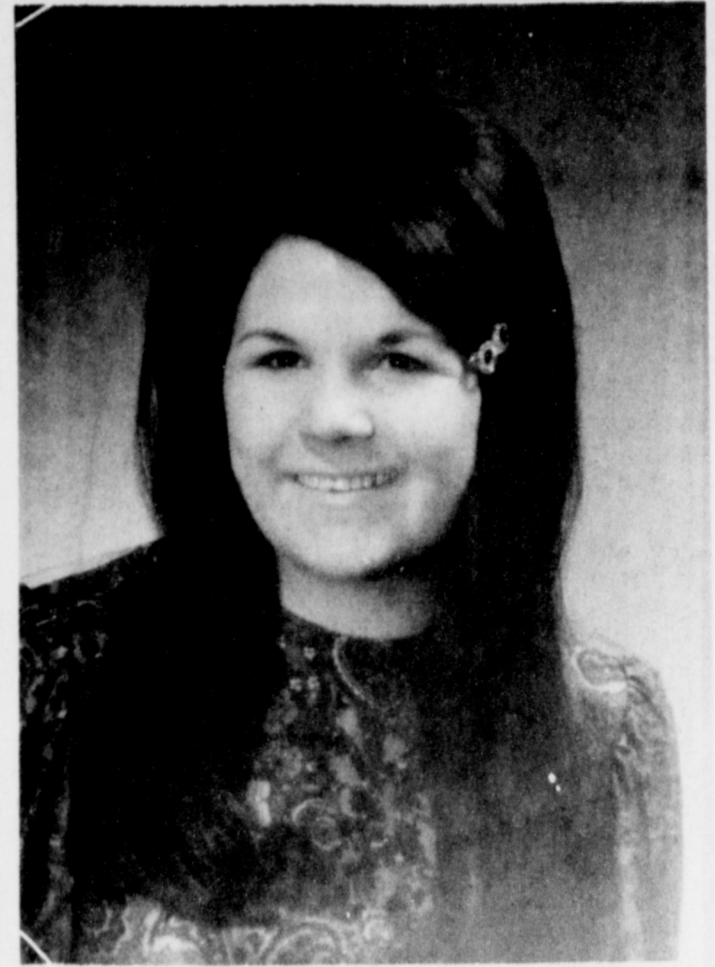
Wayland Ethridge ably reentered on the piano popular music dating back through the 1920's and down to present time. He then played and sang for her the song "I Believe".

**DROUGHT ASSISTANCE REPORT**

Only three weeks ago, I discussed drought assistance in my Report to Texas; but this topic is of such an urgent matter to Texas farmers and ranchers, and in turn to the economy of our entire State, that I am again devoting my report to an updating of that crucial situation.

The federal government has taken a number of significant steps in order to ease agricultural conditions in Texas in an effort to assist farmers and ranchers who are suffering the serious effects of the persisting drought.

But I believe more assistance must be made available and I

have been working to insure maximum federal assistance. I have discussed the urgent need for more assistance with the Secretary of Agriculture and with the President himself. Both have given me their assurances that they wish to render all the assistance which is legally possible. We are now involved in the technical operations which hopefully will lead to a full measure of assistance which will be consistent with the severity of the drought as it persists.

As I said, the Administration has already provided a significant level of assistance.

Some 235 Texas counties have been designated as areas in which farmers and ranchers suffering the adverse effects of drought may apply for emergency low-interest loans from the Farmers Home Administration. These loans may be used to enable continued operations through the middle of next year.

In 62 Texas counties, farmers are eligible to share in \$2 million which has been released to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee to help farmers take conservation measures designed to reduce wind erosion of parched lands.

Permission has been granted for grazing or haying on feed grain, wheat and cotton acreages diverted or set aside under the Cropland Adjustment Program in 125 Texas counties.

And in 81 Texas counties, farmers and ranchers may obtain Commodity Credit Corporation-owned feed grain at significantly reduced prices. In these same 81 counties, ranchers are eligible for federal assistance in the transportation of hay.

Now I would like to turn to some of the additional actions I believe can and should be taken to increase the level of federal assistance.

Since my last report on drought assistance, I have introduced in the Senate, and Congressman Bob Price of Pampa has introduced in the House, legislation which would enable the Agriculture Secretary to:

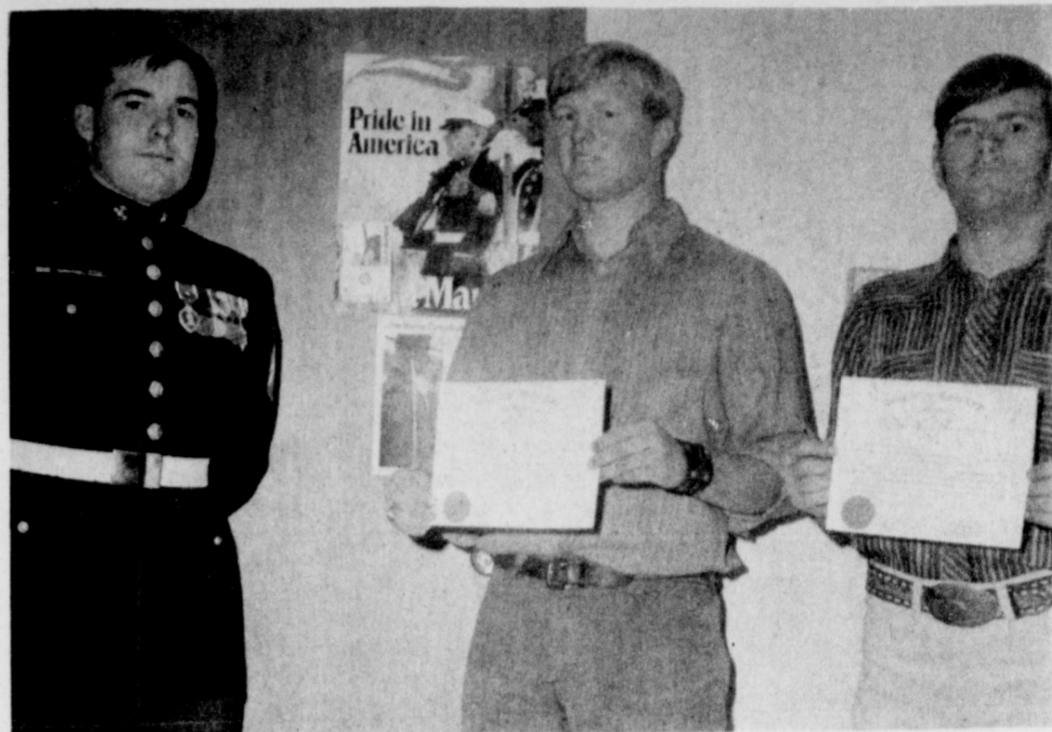
- First, make available to affected farmers and ranchers any farm commodity or product owned or controlled by the Commodity Credit Corporation;
- Second, make available assistance to unemployed farm workers up to the current level of state unemployment insurance;
- And third, provide up to \$2500 forgiveness on emergency Farmers Home Administration loans.

In the Senate, my bill has been referred to the Committee on Agriculture and Forestry. I have asked the chairman of that committee to expedite action on this legislation and he has responded that he will do so.

In addition, I have urged the Agriculture Secretary to take several more steps which would provide increased assistance to drought-affected Texas farmers and ranchers.

For one thing, I have told the Secretary that the requirement that farmers and ranchers applying for assistance sign a

so-called "Pauper's Oath" should be deleted. I have examined this matter, and I believe that it is inaccurate to characterize the requirement as a "Pauper's Oath". In applying for assistance, a farmer is required to file a financial statement, but I have been assured by the Department that this statement need not show that an applicant is poor. It need only indicate that the drought has caused economic hardship in the applicant's continued farm or ranch operations. Regardless of this technicality, however, I have urged that this requirement be removed.

The legal provision may be satisfied, in my opinion, by a simple statement from the applicant certifying that he has the drought and that he desires assistance.

I have also told the Secretary that all penalties should be removed which discourage farmers and ranchers from grazing livestock on irrigated set aside acreages. These penalties have already been removed for non-irrigated lands and I believe the Secretary's action should extend to irrigated lands as well.

These are some of the ac-

tions that I have taken. I encourage Texas farmers and ranchers to contact my office if they are encountering any difficulty in receiving available assistance or if they can recommend any additional specific assistance which they require, which is either not being done under existing law or which might require additional legislative authority.

# Governor Refuses Tax Bill As Given

AUSTIN, Tex.--Gov. Preston Smith surprised Texas lawmakers by announcing he would veto the \$900 million tax bill passed by the House and Senate unless they "cut out the fat."

He contended that this measure provided \$300 million more than was needed.

After an anxious 24 hours, a compromise began to emerge; and the House and Senate satisfied the Governor by knocking out a \$287 million gasoline tax raise (two cents on the gallon). Smith found that feature the "most repulsive" in the giant revenue-raising measure.

Governor said he would sign the bill without the gasoline tax increase.

With this problem once more hopefully resolved lawmakers turned to a hurry-up job of completing major mandatory duties and hundreds of minor ones before the May 31 adjournment date.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes expressed confidence that the tough congressional and legislative redistricting job can be accomplished in two weeks.

Other pending business, given high priority by federal court action invalidating state laws, includes passage of a new voter registration act and lowering political filing fees.

Legislators plan to add other revenue with a \$40 million mixed drink tax, \$22 million additional gallonage levy on liquor and wine and a \$3 million increase in out-of-state college tuition.

Lawmakers, already have started a quick-time march to

meet the adjournment deadline. Most of the bills introduced since the opening-day last January will clear during the next 10 days.

**U. S. TO HELP MAKE RAIN**--Federal aid through weather modification experiments aimed at bringing rain for bone dry areas of Texas has been promised, Governor Smith announced.

Operational details of a cloud-seeding project will be coordinated with the U. S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Reclamation of the Interior Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Smith said he is hopeful that this step may bring President Nixon to realize the "tragic extent of the drought disaster in Texas." He pointed out that half of the wheat crop already has been lost to drought and that agricultural production income loss would be more than half a billion dollars if the drought were broken immediately.

**LAND BONDS SOLD**--Veterans Land Board sold \$23.5 million in bonds to continue financing the veterans land program of low interest, long-term farm-ranch loans.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale will enable another 3,000 Texas veterans to get loans under the revived program.

Bonds were sold just under the constitutional interest rate ceiling -- at 4.4992 percent. Ceiling is 4.5 percent. Buyers

included the Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Bankers Trust Company, Northern Trust Company, Chase Manhattan Bank N. Y., Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company, First National Bank in Dallas and 41 others.

Armstrong said that there were three other bids of \$30 million in bonds offered for sale. Buyers represented all areas of the country.

**AIRPORT GRANT RECEIVED**--Federal Aviation Administration approved a \$419,974 grant to Texas for a comprehensive study of future airport development needs.

Funds, together with \$209,987 in state money, will be used to develop an airport systems plan for Texas. Grant seeks development of a plan that can be used to forecast regional and statewide demands for air transportation.

**COURTS SPEAK**--State Supreme Court in a Potter County case held that signing by an injured person of a release settling a damage claim is valid only for that person and no other involved in the dispute.

High Court told four contractors for San Antonio's HemisFair '68 that they couldn't collect on deferred payment certificates and unsold tickets which they received for partial payment of their services.

Firms sued City of San Antonio, San Antonio Fair Inc. and San Antonio Urban Renewal Agency.

Austin District Judge Herman Jones enjoined the sale of historical (1755-1846) documents, "The Laredo Archives," to which the state lays claim. Value is estimated at from \$350,000 to \$1 million.

One who kills with a weapon not generally classed as deadly must be permitted to testify as to intent, Court of Criminal Appeals ruled.

Third Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the 1968 Railroad Commission turn-down of an application by Southern Pacific Transportation Company to transfer the company railroad agency from El Paso to Edinburg.

**AG OPINIONS**--Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held that the Parks and Wildlife Commission and similar state agencies can be increased in size by adding new members without abolishing present boards.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

\* A school board may contract with a teacher whose first cousin has been elected to the board but has not taken oath. Contract remains valid after the relative qualifies for office.

\* A pupil promoted to a high school grade not taught in the home district can transfer to any other accredited high school, and the resident district must pay the receiving district's legally-imposed high school tuition fee.

\* Houston Independent School District has the option of selecting procedures available to it in establishing a junior college district.

\* A bill to permit an individual to petition for leave to file quo warranto proceedings without the suit being brought by the state attorney general, district or county attorney is unconstitutional.

\* Monthly salary of state employees whose salary is budgeted on an annual basis is determined by dividing the annual figure by 12. Opinion also sets a standard method of de-

termining weekly or hourly pay for such employees.

\* Money collected as admission fees and concessions profits at state properties may be spent for maintenance and repair of property.

\* A notary public can legally use a rubber stamp seal and India ink.

\* County employees are entitled to retain jury fees for jury service.

**APPOINTMENTS, RESIGNATIONS**--Governor Smith named 18th District Judge John A. James Jr. of Cleburne to the 10th Court of Civil Appeals. He succeeds the late Judge Frank Wilson.

Smith picked Ralph F. Block of Houston to serve on the Battleship Texas Commission, replacing C. H. Coffield of Houston who resigned.

Governor accepted the resignation of Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin from the State Banking Board.

**BANK BILLS PROPOSED**--A series of bills to prevent recurrence of such failures as that experienced by the Sharpstown State Bank and to strengthen the state's powers over the banking industry were introduced in the Senate by the General Investigating Committee.

One of the key measures gives the banking commissioner expanded authority to order "problem banks" to correct shortcomings without actually closing them. Another bill would prevent insider dealings by officers and directors of insurance companies.

**SHORT SNORTS**  
An increase in state unemployment benefits from \$45 to about \$77 a week has been approved by the Senate, but the proposal is heading for conference committee. House approved a \$60 figure.

Both House and Senate committees have advanced a bill to provide for 100 percent state financing of the minimum foundation school program.

Texas Aeronautics Commission turned down requests by Braniff and Texas International Airways to reopen a case against the Southwest Airlines' authority to fly between San Antonio, Houston and Dallas/Fort Worth.

Governor Smith has signed a bill to provide for more flexibility in student loan programs.

President Nixon and Vice President Agnew will attend the dedication of the Lyndon B. Johnson Library here May 22.

# Soil Conservation Top Two Essays

## First Place

Texas is a land of many natural resources such as soil, water, plants, animals, minerals and air. It also has an abundance of wood for lumber uses. We can preserve and protect our soil by proper plowing and sowing to prevent erosion from both water and wind. In the southern part of the state, water is an erosion problem, and in the western and Panhandle section of the state wind is an erosion problem. We can preserve and protect our water by eliminating water pollution, being careful of the waste products we dump into lakes and rivers. We can also protect it by blocking drainage areas.

We can preserve and protect the natural resource of plants by applying insecticides, but by being sure we apply the right kind and amount of insecticides, and by supplying enough water, fertilizer, and protection when

We should protect coal and oil because they are among the world's leading fuels. These two vital minerals must be preserved because they may be used up quickly. Many metals have an importance in the lives of people. Mines furnish many jobs for men. Many metals are essential for the production of steel. Light materials make light steel used in the jet age.

# Crystal City Schools Have TCTA Sanction

"The teaching conditions in the schools of Crystal City, Texas, are so deplorable that it is impossible for the teachers to render effective professional service," said Oather Raynes, President of the 45,000-member Texas Classroom Teachers Association.

"Therefore, after an investigation of the conditions, made at the request of Crystal City TCTA members, the Board of Directors of TCTA has voted to invoke sanctions against the Crystal City Independent School District," said Raynes.

When sanctions are invoked, it serves notice to all interested

teachers that Crystal City is not a desirable place of employment and all teachers should refrain from taking jobs there. Teacher placement offices are urged not to direct prospective teachers to apply for teaching positions in the Crystal City Schools.

Teachers already in the Crystal City system who wish to relocate will be aided in finding other positions by the Texas Classroom Teachers Association.

A full report of the conditions that exist in the school system has been made to the Texas Education Agency with the recommendations that an accreditation visit be conducted by the TEA. Reports of the unsatisfactory conditions will also be filed with other accrediting agencies.

# National Guard Raise Okayed

AUSTIN--Gov. Preston Smith has signed into law a bill raising the minimum pay a National Guardsman may receive while on state active duty.

The law applies to only the first four low-ranking pay grades, according to Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, Texas adjutant general.

According to the bill, as authored by Rep. John Traeger of Seguin, the minimum pay is set at the per diem rate paid state employees for travel. This is now \$14 a day, he indicated.

The per diem rate increases to \$16 daily effective in September.

Traeger, a colonel in the Guard and commander of the 11th Transportation Group, said the law would pitch the level of pay so Guardsmen wouldn't take too large a financial beating while on state active duty. State active duty includes aiding in civil disorders or natural disasters.

The law affects only those Guardsmen who rank below the pay grade of sergeant. Sergeants and officers are paid more than \$16 a day under normal military pay scales.
