Soil Conservation District News . .

Much grain sorghum stubble is now on the land which has not been plowed since harvest. This stubble makes an excellent seedbed in which to plant grass-es. The stubble should be left standing and not plowed prior to seeding of grasses.

When sorghum is grown when sorgnum is grown strictly as a litter crop in which to seed grasses, the sorghum should be drilled or planted in close spaced rows. The sorghum should be mowed or shredded prior to frost to prevent the maturing of a seed crop.

Shredding to leave stubble six to eight inches in height is preferred over mowing.

A grass drill or planter with disc openers should be used when seeding in a dead cover of

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

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
