Mayor's Friona water update

I want to communicate this message to the citizens of Friona.

The first of February the City of Friona drained the 1,000,000 gallon water tank northeast of Friona. The tank needed repairs, a new top, sand-blasting inside and out, and new paint. The project was contracted out and was to be completed in late March.

Even though the project is not yet completed, city engineers, the radio control company, and our city crew have bypassed the tank and are still using the north well field to supply the town with water.

If all goes smoothly, the tank will be back in service by May 20. We do not have a water shortage at this time but we may ask you later to slow down on your lawn watering. We will keep everyone informed about the situation in the coming weeks and want to thank everyone in advance if we need help later.

Council agenda for Monday meeting

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday May 12 at 619 Main St. at 6:30 p.m. All council meetings are open to the public.

The tentative agenda appears to be brief with 11 items to consider in regular session. The first three items are roll call, invocation and pledge of allegiance, and hear public comments. Time is allowed for any member of the public to make comments to the council.

Other matters on the agenda are:

- swear in mayor and council members declared elected for 2014/2015.
- elect a mayor pro-tem.
- consider and approve minutes of April council meetings.
- authorize city manager to bid land lease on city land west of Crockett Ave, (the west well field).
- approve accounts payable and financial statements.
- hear police department report.
- award bid for re-roofing Prairie Acres and Heritage Estates.

The council will go into closed session for the annual evaluation of the municipal court judge, including salary, benefits, discipline, termination, promotion, or reclassification. After the executive session the council will reconvene into regular session and consider action, if any, on the executive session discussion.

The agenda noted above is subject to change. The final official meeting agenda is posted on the front window at city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

Click It or Ticket campaign begins May 19

While 9 out of 10 Texans buckle up, too many drivers and passengers continue to risk injury or death by not using seat belts. According to the Texas Department of Transportation, in 2013, of all people killed in vehicles in Texas, nearly half were reported as not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Pickup trucks are so popular in Texas, but almost half of our pickup truck drivers killed in crashes were not wearing a seat belt.

After so many years of having seat belts standard in vehicles, it would seem that buckling your seat belt before driving off would be second nature. Fortunately, most of us do buckle up, but some, especially pickup truck drivers and their passengers, depend on their bigger pickup truck to protect them in a crash. Yet, pickup trucks are twice as likely to rollover than passenger cars, and pickup truck crashes can be especially serious – even deadly – due to their tendency to roll over and for unbelted occupants to be thrown from the vehicle.

Unbuckled passengers can also be deadly to others in the vehicle. Most people are not aware of the dangers posed by unbuckled backseat passengers. In a crash, they can become projectiles that are tossed around inside the vehicle, injuring or killing those in the front seat. Riders in the back seat who use lap and shoulder belts are 44% more likely to survive in a crash than unrestrained occupants in passenger cars, and 73% more likely to survive in passenger vans and SUVs.

According to the National

Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), young adults are dying at a disproportionate rate because they are not wearing their seat belts. Sixty-two percent of 18- to 34-year-old passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes were not wearing their seat belts.

When the Click It or Ticket campaign began in 2002, just 76 percent of Texans used seat belts. Today, over 90 percent of Texans buckle up. Also, since the campaign began over a decade ago, NHTSA estimated in 2012 (the most recent data available) that the Click It or Ticket campaign in Texas has resulted in almost 3,700 fewer traffic deaths and pre-

vented more than 50,000 serious injuries.

Here's another good reason to buckle up – it's the law! Unbelted drivers and adult passengers can face fines and court costs of up to \$200. Children younger than 8 years old must be in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Fines issued to drivers for unrestrained children in their vehicle can be as high as \$250 plus court costs.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent Shana Fleming and the Bovina Shattered Dreams Committees reminds drivers that the campaign this year is scheduled for May 19-June 1, which includes Memo-

rial Day weekend. During this time, extra law enforcement representatives will be on the roads enforcing the seat belt and child restraint laws in an effort to save lives. Those officers are not out to write tickets but instead want to help prevent the needless tragedy from motor vehicles accidents. Remember to buckle up and save your life – not just during Click It or Ticket, but every day of the year!

Fleming and the Bovina School District will have a Mock Crash on Thursday, May 15 at 10 a.m. in the parking lot behind Bovina Schools. A Mock Memorial will be held on Friday, May 16 at 9:30 a.m. in the Bovina Auditorium.

Thank you for one of the last lessons you taught me. "Eat dessert first!" I now know what that means. Life is too short, have some fun because there is too much seriousness in life.


Mom, please forgive me if I have left something out. Just know that I miss you and think of you every day. Thank you for being my guardian angel.



The music stopped on Friday, April 25, 2014 in Fresno, CA for Reaford "Ray" Shirley, 88 of Selma, California, formerly of Friona. Graveside services were held at 10:00 A.M. Friday, May 2, 2014 at the Friona Cemetery with Joel Brown, officiating. Burial followed under the direction of Blackwell-Mullins Funeral Home of Friona.

Reaford was born on June 9, 1925 in Vinson, Oklahoma to Jesse & Merler Sewel Shirley. He was the youngest of six brothers and four sisters.

He spent his youth raised on farms in the panhandle area of Texas and Oklahoma. While he never had a prestigious formal education, he was extensively educated in the vastly tougher school of life - becoming a mentor to many electricians and musicians.

While Reaford was a pretty good judge of musical talent and character, he sometimes missed the mark as revealed in the time that he told a bandleader that a "long haired" youngster named Vince Gill was probably not go-

ing to go very far in music.

Reaford's musical accomplishments are like his family, in that there are too many to list individually.

He was preceded in death by his parents, all nine of his siblings, his wife Shirley, and his son Bobby.

How Do You Know?

You need to know "how hard to go" when you cardio. Remember that cardiovascular (cardiorespiratory) endurance is the most important fitness component. This is your body's ability to deliver oxygen and fuel to your muscles. Improving your cardiovascular fitness level is like morphing from VW Bug to a Corvette.

So how do you know? Heart rate. Your heart rate tells all. It's an easy and fast measurement. To benefit from your cardio exercise, you need to be working in the 60-85% range of your maximum heart rate. Your maximum heart rate is 220 minus your age. If you are 50-years-old your maximum heart rate (MHR) is 170 beats per minute. Multiply your MHR by .60 and by .85 to get your target heart rate range. The target heart rate range tells you "how hard to go." In our example of a 50-year-old, the low end of the range would be 102 beats per minute (170 x .60) and the high end would be 145 beats per minute (170 x .85).

So when this individual is doing a cardio workout (walking, jogging, running, swimming, cycling, elliptical, aerobics, stair climber), his/her heart should be beating between 102 and 145 beats per minute. Moderate intensity activity is 60-70% of your MHR; vigorous intensity activity is 70-85% of your MHR.

Take your pulse. Take your pulse halfway through your workout using your index and middle fingers either at your carotid artery (neck) or your radial artery (wrist). You can count the number of beats for six seconds and multiply by 10 to get beats per minute. Are you working hard enough? Your number should be at least within the low range of 60%. Are you working too hard, 85%+? Don't go over that high end too often unless you are conditioned and have been exercising regularly. You are pushing too hard.

While strolling isn't a bad thing, it's not going to improve your fitness level. Use your heart rate and know when to push the gas pedal to go from putt-putting along to v-vrooom!







Sanchez, of Midland, representing Rival Boxing Club in the 95 lb. Intermediate (13-14) Novice division.






The SonShine School class from First Baptist Church also came for their annual visit this week.

turned out to be great since they had hatched their own butterflies during their classes this year as one of their projects.




