CORNERSTONE LAID

For a Monument to the Charge at Fredericksburg, Va.,

OF THE FAMOUS FIFTH CORPS.

President McKinley and a Number of Other Prominent Personages Present at the Ceremonial.

Fredericksburg, Va., May 27.—On the very ground over which the old fifth corps charged at Fredericksburg, President McKinley and his cabinet and Gen. Miles Friday witnessed the laying of the cornerstone in a shaft which will perpetuate in bronze and granite the heroism of the Army of the Potomac. It was an impressive ceremony, and rendered the more so by the fact that among the hundreds who witnessed the event were noted leaders of both the Federal and Confederate forces. The monument was the personal gift of Gen. Daniel Butterfield to the National Memorial association. Gen. Butterfield was present, but owing to ill health the committal of the monument to the secretary of war was made by Col. Hill, one of the veterans of the fifth corps. The visit of the president to Fredericksburg was primarily in honor of the annual reunion of the Army of the Potomac. The town was in gala dress and turned out en masse to receive the distinguished visitor. The president and his cabinet were welcomed at the courthouse, which was decorated with the national colors and the various corps flags of the Army of the Potomac. Welcoming speeches were made by prominent veterans of both sides of the civil war.

The oration of the day was then delivered by Gen. Daniel E. Sickels.

After a reception the presidential party drove to the National cemetery, where the foundation of the fifth corps monument had been laid. Suspended from a scaffold hung the cornerstone of the monument. Gen. Family Poisoned.

Bremond, Tex., May 27.—Mr. Ed White and family, who live in Pa's county, at dinner time Wednesday had some bread left from dinner, which was placed in the safe and used for supper. After eating the bread some of the family complained that the bread was bitter. Mr. White remarked it was perhaps the bitter milk. The other members of the family refused the bread. After supper the remnant of the bread was thrown to the dogs. Mr. White went to a school meeting, but soon returned very sick, finding all the family sick. All partook freely of lard. The family soon recovered, but Mr. White pulled through with difficulty. The dogs died. All is a mystery. The doctor reports all safe. The opinion prevails that poison was put in the bread during the evening.

Duel to the Death.

Panchita, Tex., May 27.—Emmet Coy, brother of the once famous ranger, Pantino Coy, and Bonifacio Perez, a merchant, fought a duel to the death at the old Lucas ranch, in Hidalgo county. It appears that ill-feeling had existed between these two men for some time, and notwithstanding the efforts of friends to reconcile them to each other, they could never become friends again. Perez went to a cowboy's camp of Gunter & Jones, of which Coy was a corporal, to collect some accounts, and these two men, without speaking to each other, walked off about 100 yards from the camp and began to shoot at each other. Both fell and were dead before any one could get to them. Coy was a bachelor and Perez leaves a wife and two little baby girls, besides several brothers.

Woman Wounded.

El Paso, Tex., May 27.—Mrs. R. E. Wrenn, 25 years old, wife of a prominent cattle buyer, was found dangerously wounded in her room at her residence here. She was wounded in the left side, near the heart, with a 38-caliber bullet, and the revolver used was found beside her bed. Physicians were quickly called and they announced the woman had little chance.

Sent Up for Life.

Welland, Ont., May 27.—Karl Dullman, residence unknown, John Walsa and John Nolin of Dublin, Ireland, but latterly of Washington, D. C., and Richmond, Va., were convicted of having attempted to wreck lock 24 of the Welland canal, and sentenced to imprisonment for life. They lowered two vessels filled with dynamite with fuses attached alongside the lock.

New Connection.

The extension of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois Road from Marion, Ill., to Thebes, to connect with the Cotton Belt, was completed some months ago, and will be in shape for fast passenger service May 15th.

On that day a new fast train between Chicago and Texas will be inaugurated. Preparations for this train have been under way for some months, and everything will be in readiness by May 15th. The south-bound train will leave Chicago about 3:00 p. m., and will reach the Arkansas State line about daylight the next morning; Pine Bluff will be reached shortly after noon, and Texarkana at night; Waco, Dallas and Fort Worth early the next morning.

The north bound train will leave Waco about 8:20 p. m., Fort Worth, 10:00 p. m., Dallas, 10:30 p. m., Texarkana, 7:45 a. m., Pine Bluff, 1:00 p. m., and will reach Chicago about noon the next day.

The new train will carry a sleeper from Waco to Chicago, and a through chair car from Fort Worth to Chicago, besides the regular equipment of coaches and baggage car.

Cotton Belt parlor cafe cars will serve meals on the Cotton Belt, and C. & E. I. dining cars will serve meals on that line. In each case the meals will be served on the European plan at reasonable prices.

The schedule is so arranged that a passenger arriving in Chicago on this train can, within an hour or two after his arrival, catch a train on any one of a dozen different roads and continue his journey in any direction he may desire. It will be especially convenient for persons who want to reach the summer resorts of the lake region tributary to Chicago, without any loss of time, as nearly all of these resorts can be reached the same afternoon or evening.

Much travel which has heretofore gone over other routes will now use the new line, because of the natural advantages it offers.

Strange Habits of Birds.

"Birds have mighty queer habits," remarked the keeper out at the Zoo, as he coaxed a sick parrot to swallow a piece of bread mixed with pepper.

"I don't mean especially the rare birds, such as you see here, but our own birds. Take for instance the way they go south in the winter. They always go to the same place—that is, the different kinds do. The swallows all go to Central America and the southern part of Mexico. They like it pretty warm. Along about this time of year they begin to appear in the southern states, but they seldom get up here until about the middle or latter part of April.

"The robins don't care for such warm climate, and very few of them get as far south as Mexico. Their migratory instinct doesn't seem very strong and their attachment for one locality is so great that sometimes, when we have an open winter, they will stay and brave it out."

SAYS DEMOCRATS

Are Causing the Labor Troubles in City of St. Louis.

STEPHENS' STRONG STATEMENT.

The Missouri Executive Asserts that Certain St. Louis Politicians Are Very Much Interested in Affair.

St. Louis, Mo., May 26.—The rioting and bloodshed of Wednesday in the street car strike gave way Thursday to comparative peace and quiet. Thursday night, however, the status of affairs suddenly veered and a repetition of Wednesday's events was witnessed.

At 9 o'clock Thursday night a car, presumably filled with imported men, left the Union station for the railway sheds in the far western section of the city. When the car reached the intersection of Park and Compton avenues it was stopped by a tremendous mob of strike sympathizers, who made a hostile demonstration. As soon as the car was halted the men on board opened on the crowd with a regular fusillade. John S. Harding, a striking motorman, was hit by a bullet and will probably die. Donald Watts, another striking motorman, received a serious bullet wound, and a bystander, name unknown, was slightly wounded.

Gov. Stephens, who is in the city, talked freely of the strike situation. He said:

"I am satisfied that the trouble along the street-car lines and the whole spirit of anarchy which I find prevails so largely in the city of St. Louis at present is being fomented and extended by the machinations of a certain coterie of Democratic politicians who hope by their course to in some manner make gains in the approaching party primaries. This element is sending speakers to meetings held to express sympathy for the strikers all over the city, and if not counseling disorder, it is at least materially encouraging it.

"These persons are responsible for the many effigies of myself and the police authorities which I find dangling from poles and trolley lines on many of the streets. It is as a result of their movements that I have received many letters threatening my life should I continue my duty and provide officers to keep the peace.

"I desire to say further that if, as governor of Missouri, with all the power vested in that office for the purpose, I can put an end to the disgraceful conditions that prevail in St. Louis, I shall employ every iota of that power.

"The riot and disorder of every unlawful kind must cease."

Will Defend It.

Cape Town, May 26.—President Kruger, it is announced here, has issued a proclamation saying he will defend Sohanensburg and call upon all Boers to fight to the bitter end.

Wholesale Grocers.

Charleston, S. C., May 26.—The ninth annual convention of the Southern Wholesale Grocers' association opened here Thursday. Every southern state was represented. The most important matter at Thursday's session was the election of a president, and after a spirited debate, lasting for more than an hour, a committee composed of member from every trade center was appointed to nominate a president. J. A. Van Hoose of Birmingham, Ala., was chosen.

Political Killing.

Rising Sun, Ind., May 26.—Edward Carver killed William Patterson in a political quarrel at the Republican primary at Florence.

Henry Wilson, a boatman, was drowned in Galveston bay.

The Queen's Birthday.

London, May 26.—Under the stimulus of the relief of Mafeking and Lord Roberts' rapid and successful progress, the queen's birthday has been celebrated throughout the empire with unique and almost unprecedented rejoicing. Twofold nature of the celebrations gave the occasion unusual brilliancy. In London and in the provincial towns there was a tri-color eruption. Every private house was decorated with miniature union jacks, and a picturesque carnival procession a mile long of cars emblematic of the war paraded the northern suburbs of London. Torchlight processions and reviews in the garrison towns, etc., were witnessed throughout the country. The school children had a holiday, and at most places there was a partial suspension of business.

The west end of London was illuminated brilliantly and thousands of people crowded the streets wearing patriotic flags.

In the house of commons the government leader, A. J. Balfour, announced that Lord Salisbury would consider a proposal to appoint a national thanksgiving day, with a suitable form of prayer, in acknowledgment of God's vouchsafing victory to the British arms.

Among the incidents of the day was the presentation by William Waldorf Astor to the town of Maldenhead of a polished five-pounder to be placed in the park. The weapon was drawn to the park in the presence of 5000 people, where it was formally accepted by the mayor on behalf of the town, after which a royal salute was fired.

President McKinley sent a congratulatory message and the queen graciously replied.

Large Failure.

New York, May 26.—Price, McCormick & Co., one of the largest brokerage houses in the city, failed Thursday, with liabilities estimated at \$13,000,000. The firm is a member of the Stock, Cotton and Produce exchanges, and of the Chicago Stock exchange and has branch offices in about thirty cities throughout the United States. The failure is ascribed to the fact that the firm was long on cotton in the face of a fast falling market. A notice on the doors of the offices of the company referred all inquiries to Wm. J. Currie and Wm. M. Cromwell, assignees. Mr. Cromwell said late Thursday afternoon that it was impossible to make any statement at that hour concerning the condition of the firm, as its business is very extended and covers several branch agencies. The total liabilities, he said, are about 13,000,000, nearly all of which was secured.

Dynamite Used.

Louis, May 26.—At an early hour an attempt was made to blow up a street car on the Spaulding avenue car line with dynamite. Two heavy explosions were heard, but so far as known nobody was injured.

An explosion set a business house on fire at Denison, Tex., and it was destroyed.

Big Woman Dropped Dead.

Houston, Tex., May 26.—The largest woman in Harris county and probably in the state, Annie Brown (colored), dropped dead at her home on San Felipe street, in this city, of heart trouble. Her normal weight was 417 pounds, but this had been reduced by sickness to.

The Peninsula bank at Williamsburg, was entered by robbers, the safe blown open and about \$10,000 in money taken. There is no clew to the robbers.

On the 24th, at Dallas, Tex., the marriage bonds were dissolved between twenty persons and ten others sought Hymen's happiness.

The 3-year-old son of D. Stephenson, colored, was beheaded to death at Kosse, Tex.

Machinist to Kill Rats.

Rat traps by the hundred thousand will be manufactured here, says the Worcester, Mass., Telegram, as a starting order, as soon as Calvin C. Bowen, of Los Angeles, Cal., can make a contract with one of four large Worcester concerns which are to bid for the order.

The trap is of wood, steel and springs. A strong spring is curled around a shaft and the shaft is supported between two upright steel bands.

The trap is baited by placing cheese in a receptacle which the rat is bound to locate. The rat presses his nose against the bait, nibbles it a bit and that's the finish of that particular rat. A lever is released, the steel spring expands, a strong band of bronzed steel wire swoops around and hits the rat.

The force of the blow is so great that the hungry rodent is knocked against two sharp, steel spikes set in place directly where his eyes will be as he nibbles the bait.

Then the force of the fatal spring will throw the defunct rat four or five feet out of the trap, and it is automatically set for another tragedy.

One wind of the trap means that it is loaded for ten rats, as the spring will expand with force enough to swing the whacker ten times.

Democratic Primary.

The democratic convention of precinct No. 1 met in the courthouse at Snyder, May 26th at 2:30 p. m. for the purpose of electing delegates to the county convention to be held at Snyder June 2.

Organization was effected by electing D. Nation chairman and Dr. Sed A. Harris secretary.

On motion the chair appointed a committee on resolutions, composed of Dr. A. O. Scarborough, H. B. Patterson and W. B. Stanfield. The committee retired and on motion legislative candidates, W. J. Miller and W. L. Grogan were invited to address the convention. Each gentleman responded in a thirty minute speech.

Secretary Harris being called away the chair appointed O. R. Buchanan to fill his place.

Committee on resolutions reports as follows:

Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the Convention: We your committee on platform and resolutions beg leave to submit the following as our report:

1st Be it resolved by the Democracy of precinct No. 1 of Scurry county in convention assembled, that we declare anew our allegiance to the time-honored principals of Democracy as promulgated in the Chicago platform and announce our earnest and continued opposition to trusts and imperialism, and hereby pledge ourselves to the support of that foremost and unequal champion of pure Democracy, and as we believe, the ablest defender of Democratic faith, W. J. Bryan.

2nd Resolved, That it is the sense of this convention that the late Lease line should be retained as far west as the lands demanded for actual settlement, and that our delegates are hereby instructed to vote for the proposition in county convention that will allow all counties in this district to determine for themselves whether or not they shall be placed east of said Absolute Lease line, and our delegates are expressly instructed to vote that this county shall be placed east of said line, or in the Agricultural district.

3rd Be it further resolved, That

our sympathy is extended to the gallant Boers in their struggle for civil and political liberty, and that our delegates to the county convention, to select delegates to the Congressional convention be and are hereby instructed to prepare and report a resolution that will bind the next congressional nominee from this district to use every legitimate means to have the United States intervene in an amicable way to prevent further bloodshed in the South African war.

4th Be it further resolved, That whereas, The appointing power (Gov. Sayers) in selecting our fellow citizen, Hon. A. C. Wilmeth, District Attorney of the 39th Judicial District of Texas, has illustrated the wisdom of that policy which aims at putting of "the right man in the right place." Therefore be it Resolved, that we fully and warmly approve said appointment, and whereas the term for which he has been appointed will expire in November next, and whereas he is a candidate for said office, therefore be it Resolved, that it is the sense of this convention that in consideration of the faithful and fearless manner in which he has so ably discharged his duties as a public officer he should have the support of the Democracy of the entire district, therefore be it Resolved, that our delegates to the county convention to meet in Snyder on Saturday the second day of June next be and are hereby instructed to vote for him for district Attorney, First last and all the time.

5th Be it further Resolved that the following named parties be and are elected delegates to the county democratic convention to meet at the court house in the town of Snyder, to wit:

Dave Nation, Joe Strayhorn, Luke Howell, I. W. Wasson, Tom Pruitt, C. R. Buchanan, Jeff Isaacs, Dr. Leslie, J. H. Cole, O. P. Wolf, Dr. S. D. Beltes and W. T. Baze.

On motion the resolutions were adopted by sections. First, second and third sections were adopted by a rising vote, and fourth by ballot and on motion was made unanimous. Fifth and last section was adopted unanimously.

All the officers of the present state Administration were endorsed for re-election except the land commissioner and comptroller.

R. M. Love was endorsed for comptroller and M. E. Grass for land Commissioner.

Delegates to the county convention were instructed to support W. L. Grogan for the legislature.

D. Nation was elected precinct chairman for the ensuing two years.

The county convention meets at Snyder next Saturday, June 2nd, at 2 p. m. All democrats are invited to attend but of course none but duly accredited precinct delegates will be entitled to a vote in the proceedings of the convention.

The Twelfth Census.

Friday the first day of June begins the enumeration of the twelfth census of the United States. On that day nearly fifty-five thousand enumerators will take the field. It has been the purpose of the bureau for this census to make the census work more comprehensive, of a wider range and extending more into particulars, than any previously taken but still to simplify the tabulation work to be done by the canvassers.

The enumerators will carry a population schedule upon which will be written the name of each and every person, young or old, great or small, also the relation of that person to a family, the date of his birth, his age, place of birth, place of birth of his parents, his citizenship, occupation, education etc., etc.

A second schedule refers to agriculture in all its phases; the number of acres harvested of all the various crops, the value of the same, the garden products and their value; fruit trees, vines etc., their number and value of products; poultry and eggs, number and value; livestock of all kinds, listed according to age in four classes, less than one year, ones, twos, threes and over. Milk and butter, bees and honey etc., are to be noted and valued. Those living on farms should take some thought of the value of farm products consumed at home for Uncle Sam wants to know about this too.

Besides other schedules, general and special, there is to be a record made of all deaths for the year ending June 1st, 1900; also a special enumeration made of all persons deaf, dumb or blind.

This census enumeration is for statistical purposes purely and the enumerators are under oath not to divulge the simplest matter pertaining to the work they have done, not even to tell the number of persons they enumerated in a certain district or up to a certain date. Census statistics are inviolable and cannot be used for any purpose whatever than that for which the government intends them—statistics and then only in compiled form with other items of the same nature.

Messrs. B. L. Crump and C. R. Buchanan are the enumerators for Scurry county. Think about the information you have to render and be ready to give these gentlemen prompt and accurate replies to the interrogatories which Uncle Sam will propound to you through them.

Mr. Crump has justice precincts 1, 2 and 6. Mr. Buchanan has 3, 4 and 5, which are you in?




