Starts a Movement for Solution of Chinese Puzzle

AND EXPECTS OTHER NATIONS

To Back Her Up in the Undertaking. Though Some of the Powers are Rather Slow in Preparing.

Washington, Sept. 2 .- The Rus sian note relative to the withdrawal of Russia from China and the United States' response thereto, were made public Friday by the state department after the cabine had fully considered the exper so doing.

the history of diplomatic exchange a cle move by which the United government has again assumed the lead in prescribing the policy of powers respecting the Chinese trou ble. This was accomplished by the state department availing itself of the Rusian note to address to the powers an inquiry as to their policies, an answer to which can scarcely be avoided.

Various meanings may be placed upon the statments of the two principals to this correspondence. Thus on the one hand it may be noted that while Russia announces a purpose to withdraw her troops from China, still, as to the occupying force at Newchwang, a condition is attached that almost negatives the proposition as to that point. Respecting our own attitude, it appears that while believing the best course to pursue is to remain in Pekin, our government is still willing to withdraw. Perhaps this means that if there is to be separate action by the powers in China, the United States proposes to deal with the situation with a free hand.

It may be noted in connection with our withdrawal statement that whereas Russia proposed to withdraw from China, our offer is to withdraw only from Pekin. A significant fact in this connection is that Gen. Chaffee, who is well advised of the situation, having several days ago been directed to prepare for just such an emergency as that precipitated by the Russian action, continues his preparations for wintering the American troops in China. Inded, unless the men are afloat and out of the Pei Ho within the next six weeks, they are likely to remain in China per force, being icebound. Gen. Chaffee was further advised of the developments in the situation, a compendous statement of the points in the Russo-American correspondence being cabled to him for his guidance. As bearing further on the prospects of the future, it may be noted that the war department has not considered the question of the evacuation of China.

Washington Speaks.

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 2.—The 'Afro-American council concluded its session Friday, the last feature being an address by Booker T. Washington, who was received with great applause. He confined his remarks almost entirely to educational suggestions for the betterment and uplifting of the race.

Philadelphia was chosen as the next place of meeting, the convention to be held in August of 1901.






