
SHOT BY A POSSE.

Washington, Sept. 23 .- The United States government has deided upon its policy relative to the Chinese situation, and its position communicated to the powers.



McArthur Communicates the Particulars the Anthorities at Washington and Estimates the Filipino Loss.

Washington, Sept. 22 .- A dis. patch has been received from Gen. MacArthur, which confirms the report cabled to the Associated Press from Manila regarding the activity of the insurgents. The blank spaces are words which could not be deciphered. The dispatch is as follows:



Houston, Tex., Sept. 21.-Gov. Joseph D.
