

Farm Bill Educational meetings scheduled

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will be providing an extensive farm bill educational effort in upcoming months, said agency experts in Amarillo.

While sign-up for the new farm bill program is still months away, the educational process to help producers understand the complexity of the new legislation, including new programs and options, is increasing in the High Plains, said Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist.

"Our AgriLife Extension county agents are currently attending educational seminars to become more familiar with general farm program provisions," Amosson said. "They also are learning about the Texas A&M Agricultural and Food Policy Center's decision-aid software, which will be available at a later date to assist with producer

sign-up decisions." Beginning July 10 and continuing through Aug. 20, a series of county-level public meetings lasting abouttwo hours each will be held across the Panhandle, said DeDe Jones, AgriLife Extension risk management program specialist. The meetings

will explain general farm program provisions and provide a decision-aid demonstration.

The meetings are free and will offer instruction from Amosson or Jones, as well as the AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources county agents.

Both Amosson and Jones will lead a second round of county meetings tentatively scheduled for October and November to provide further details and guidelines before the sign-up period begins.

Two views on the Hobby Lobby decision.

Today's decision is a victory against Obamacare's unprecedented overreach into our daily lives and the Administration's disregard for the freedom of religion that Americans cherish. All Texans and Americans have the right to practice their religious beliefs without obstruction from the federal government, and today's decision by the Supreme Court affirms that Obamacare does not trump those fundamental rights.

I am disappointed and deeply concerned by the Supreme Court's decision today in the case of Burwell v. Hobby Lobby. Thanks to the Affordable Care Act, millions of Americans have gained access to preventative services without out-of-pocket costs, including birth control. However, this decision takes money out of the pockets of women and their families and allows for-profit employers to deny access to certain health care benefits based on their personal beliefs. Nearly sixty percent of women who use birth control do so for more than just family planning.

It is no surprise that Republicans have sided against women on this issue as they have consistently opposed a woman's right to make her own health care decisions. Republicans have also blocked the Paycheck Fairness Act, which would bring us closer to the promise of equal pay for women. 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

There was a bit of a wind that evening and one of the many glowing embers was carried in the direction of his new car and landed on the roof. Back to 1974 or 1975. Once we got comfortable

Turn It Up!

Ok. Motivation is probably the hardest part about exercise. We know we need to do it. It's the "Just Do It" part that trips us up. I like to exercise, but some days the "want to" just isn't there. Enter my secret weapon - music. Loud, bumpin', get your heart pumpin' music. Try it. You'll see what I mean. Why does it work? The human body is wired for music. There is a term for it, and it's called entrainment. (Ironic that that word includes "train," huh?) Anyway, entrainment is getting with the beat of the music. Tapping your toe, moving with the dominant beat. We just naturally want to follow a beat. And it can positively affect our mood-good stuff for that motivation problem!

Costas Karageorghis, Ph.D. is one of the world's leaders on music and exercise. He states that music is like a legal drug for athletes because it can reduce the perception of effort significantly and increase endurance by as much as 15 percent. Through over twenty years of research, he has identified three primary things about music and how it can possibly influence exercise performance: 1) the tendency to move in time with music or the beat; 2) the tendency of music to increase arousal (the desire to move instead of sit); and 3) the tendency of music to distract the exerciser from discomfort that might be related to exercise.

What makes Zumba fun? The saucy, fun music. Can you sit still when you hear "Gangnam Style"? Oh yeah...what about "The Eye of the Tiger"? Here we go--turn it up!!!


God's Judgment and Protection
