Washington, Dec. 8,-The secre tary of war has transmitted to congress the report of the board of en gineers relative to the cost of repairs for the fortifications at Galveston, damaged in the September storm. The report estimates that it will cost \$568,000 to repair Fort San Jacinto, \$301,000 to repair Fort Crockett and \$123,000 to repair Fort Travis, an aggregate of \$992,000. The report states that it is possible that all the strike. In this case additional estimates are made as follows:




(Washington Letter.)

CHASED BY SLAVER.

Exciting Experiences of the Crew of a British Steamship.

The P. and O. steamer Egypt, which arrived at Plymouth recently, bad among her passengers those of the wreck of their vessel at Cape Guarda-ful. The Indra, bound from Java to Philadelphia with 8,500 tons of sugar, was wrecked on August 20, about 28 miles from Cape Guardaful in fine weather. The crew left in four boats, but the captain and second officer were soon picked up and the men conveyed to Aden. Twenty-three days later the remainder of the crew arrived there after extraordinary experiences. Two days after leaving the Indra they fell in with a Somali dhow which offered to conduct them to the shore to find fresh water. One of the native crew understood something of the language and gathered that the strangers intended making prisoners of the shipwrecked mariners and holding them for ransom or selling them into slavery. The Somalis had placed board and the towline was cut adrift. Hoisting sail, the two boats stood away, but were soon followed in pursuit by the Somalis, who were seen preparing their blow-darts and stones. The sailors' smaller craft was abandoned, its occupants being taken on the sailing boat, which now had thirty-nine people on board, with a diminished supply of water and food. In the darkness the Indra's crew effected their escape, but another eight days elapsed before a friendly village was reached on the Arabian coast. Meanwhile the water supply was limited to four tablespoonfuls a day, whilst the last seven days there was nothing to eat. The victims' sufferings were frightful. Several steamers were seen but signals were not regarded. Day after day in the fierce sunshine the Europeans, although longing for water to moisten their cracked lips, manfully kept up their spirits but the natives handed knives to one another, and would have induced each other to put an end to their troubles but for the influence of the officers. At last Barrali was reached, and during the twelve days spent ashore the food was of the scantiest description. though everything possible was done for the comfort of the men. One officer took off his coat and with it beat out the fire. The man was sent to Parkland hospital, where he died at 6 o'clock that morning. Soon after his arrival at the hospital two men were brought before him for identification. Then it was that the discovery was made that his eyes had been burned out. The man was Pate Bain, for many years constable at Garland, in this county. Bain was married.

Ere his death the tortured man made a statement to Assistant County Attorney H. F. Lively.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 5 .- With music and oratory, banners and bunting on every side, the International Live-Turpentine Poured on a Man in the stock exposition was formally opened Monday night. It was expected that Hon, R. W. Hall of Texas would deliver the address, but he announced at the eleventh hour that pressing business detained him at home, and in his absence President John W Springer of the National Livestock association spoke. He faced the audience of fully 17,000 people, and his flashes of wit at times caused a thunder of applause. It seemed as if Chicago had grown livestock crazy, for fully 8000 people were denied admittance to the exposition simply because the vast amphitheatre was crowded to suffocation and would hold no more people. The governors from six states were present, and representatives from as many foreign nations heard the address.

Mr. Springer said that the show was the greatest of its kind ever held in the world, and after paying a high tribute to the stockmen, he stated that he had the pleasure of shaking hands with a Texas cattleman who had but recently drawn his check for \$560,000 and put half a dozen Kentucky men out of business.

The reference was made to S. B. Burnett of Fort Worth, who some time ago bought the Louisville Land and Cattle company property.

Roswell Z. Herrick, vice president of the National Livestock bank, entertained several friends Monday night, including Hon. Mortimer Levering of Indiana, Hon. John W. Springer and Fred P. What the Board of Engineers Has to Recommend

RELATIVE TO REPAIRING INJURY

To the Property of the Government at th Island City and the Estimated Cost of the Same.

Washington, Dec. 8.-The secre tary of war has transmitted to congress the report of the board of engineers relative to the cost of repairs for the fortifications at Galveston, damaged in the September storm. The report estimates that it will cost \$568,000 to repair Fort San Jacinto, \$301,000 to repair Fort Crockett and \$123,000 to repair Fort Travis, an aggregate of \$992,000. The report states that it is possible that all the batteries will sustain additional damage before the work of restoration can be undertaken and that probably Fort Crockett may become a total wreck.

In this case additional estimates are made as follows:

Fort San Jacinto \$20,000, Fort Crockett \$158,000 and Fort Travis \$60,000; a total of \$238,000. As the additional estimates will be made necessary by the time the work can be commenced, the estimate for the restoration of the forts aggregates \$1,230,000. The importance of immediate action is strongly urged as the damage to the foundation piling under the concrete is rapidly progressing. This protection can be obtained by filling sand around these piles as a cost \$15,000 for the several batteries requiring this protection. Dolphin of the Order of Railway Telegraphers. This action came not unexpected, in view of the circumstances surrounding the efforts of General Manager Polk and other Santa Fe officials and the grievance committee of the telegraphers to agree upon a settlement of the trouble growing out of the demand of the operators for the adoption of new rules and wage scale on the line. It was announced that negotiations were at a standstill and that there was no prospect of an amicable settlement of the differences between

the railroad and the employes. President Dolphin stated that he had received an absolute refusal from Vice President Baer of the Santa Fe to arbitrate, and this settled the matter and he ordered an immediate strike. President Dolphin went on to say that the Santa Fe officials had presented a schedule of wages which proposed the reduction of salaries under the old scale of about \$130 a month; that the telegraphers through their committee had offered Thursday, to reduce the demand for ten hours consecutive rest out of every twenty-four to eight hours rest, but that all these propositions were rejected by the company. RETURN OF A CIVIL WAR RELIC

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

itish Steamship. and O. steamer Egypt, which at Plymouth recently, had g her passengers those of the ew of the British steamer Indra, who so long missing after the wreck of their vessel at Cape Guardafui. The Indra, bound from Java to Philadelphia with 8,500 tons of sugar, was wrecked on August 20, about 28 miles from Cape Guardafui in fine weather. The crew left in four boats, but the captain and second officer were soon picked up and the men conveyed to Aden. Twenty-three days later the remainder of the crew arrived there after extraordinary experiences. Two days after leaving the Indra they fell in with a Somali dhow which offered to conduct them to the shore to find fresh water. One of the native crew understood something of the language and gathered that the strangers intended making prisoners of the shipwrecked mariners and holding them for ransom or selling them into slavery. The Somalis had placed an armed man in one of the boats, but during the night he was thrown overboard and the towline was cut adrift. Hoisting sail, the two boats stood away, but were soon followed in pursuit by the Somalis, who were seen preparing their blow-darts and stones. The sailors' smaller craft was abandoned, its occupants being taken on the sailing boat, which now had thirty-nine people on board, with diminished supply of water and food. In the darkness the Indra's crew effected their escape, but another eight days elapsed before a friendly village was reached on the Arabian coast. Meanwhile the water supply was limited to four tablespoonfuls a day, whilst the last seven days there was nothing to eat. The victims' sufferings were frightful. Several steamers were seen but signals were not regarded. Day after day in the fierce sunshine the Europeans, although longing for water to moisten their cracked lips, manfully kept up their spirits, but the natives handed knives to one another, and would have induced each other to put an end to their troubles but for the influence of the officers. At last Barrali was reached, and during the twelve days spent ashore the food was of the scantiest description,



For her and her children she asks no narrow policies, no Chinese walls, but she looks with palpitating heart toward the boundless orient as an outlet for her great staples; she wants the Nicaraguan canal, connecting the eastern and western oceans. She asks for the open door-and wide open one-for a market for 11, 000,000 bales of cotton, which she can see in the distant future, to convert into clothing for the nations."

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 5 .- With music and oratory, banners and bunting on every side, the International Live-Turpentine Poured on a Man in the stock exposition was formally opened Monday night. It was expected that Hon. R. W. Hall of Texas would deliver the address, but he announced at the eleventh hour that pressing business detained him at home, and in his absence President John W. Springer of the National Livestock association spoke. He faced the audience of fully 17,000 people, and his flashes of wit at times caused a thunder of applause.
