Delayed Trains.

A few weeks ago, it will be remembered, some kindly-disposed individual with an eye to the accommodation of humanity began an agitation for the purpose of compelling railroads to run their passenger trains on schedule time. After a considerable discussion the matter was finally brought to the attention of the Railroad Commission of Texas which body, after hearing evidence (from the railroads) decided that the fault was chargeable entirely to outside connecting lines and that Texas lines could not be blamed. There the matter was permitted to drop. Just why the Railroad Commission arrogated to itself the prerogative of inconveniencing almost every man in Texas with a disposition to travel, just for the benefit of a few outsiders coming into the state is a little difficult to understand. The railroads have evidently interpreted that decision of the Commission to mean that they can run their passenger trains irregardless of published schedules, "any old way" to suit themselves and they are taking full advantage of that interpretation. The road which runs directly east and west through Dallas hasn't had a west-bound train on time in weeks. This road has a motto which reads, "No trouble to answer questions," but when an employe is asked about the arrival of a train he finds the question somewhat difficult to answer, always replying "it is reported about twenty-five minutes late." Those twenty-five minutes generally grow into hours before the train arrives. On two occasions lately this road has kept large audiences waiting for hours at the Dallas opera house on its delayed trains. It makes no difference to what inconvenience and annoyance the people of Texas are put, so long as a few passengers from other states make connection. This question of delayed trains is getting to be a serious one. The Railroad Commission should reconsider its action. It should make roads run their regular trains on schedule time and if the roads are so anxious to make outside connections they should run specials. The Commission should make this particular road, which has become such a great offender of late, change its time-worn, meaningless motto from "No trouble to answer questions" to "No trouble to run trains on time" and it should be made to live up to that motto.—Times-Herald.

About Charlie Ross.

A great many people are under the impression that the fate of Charlie Ross has never been revealed, but according to a statement recently made by Senator Plunkitt in the New York Legislature, this is a mistake. The facts as set forth by the New York Senator confirm the story published by the press long ago. However, as the Senator based his statement on knowledge obtained at first hand, the facts are interesting in their repetition. According to his statement, Charlie Ross was abducted by New York river thieves—a notorious ruffian named Mosher and his companion. The former hired the wagon in which the boy was placed, near his father's home in New York, and drove it to Philadelphia to destroy an important clew. The wagon was driven about thirty miles out of Philadelphia and was there abandoned. Mosher and his companion, accompanied by their victim, taking passage on the train for

New York. Fear kept the boy quiet. In New York he was placed by Mosher on a river craft and when the meshes began to tighten around the abductors the lad was weighted with iron and thrown overboard and drowned. Mosher was shot while committing a burglary in New York and tried to explain the abduction, but was able only to indicate that the detective theory of the case was correct. There is no longer any mystery about the celebrated case. Mr. Ross died fully convinced that his boy had been murdered. So says Senator Plunkitt.—Dallas News.

With us all Ways.

The fakes, like the poor, we have always with us, and the traps they set to catch the cash of the upwary are many and subtle. Persons who send money to a distant city in answer to a glowing advertisement and expect to get a big bargain may get what they anticipate, but the probability is that they will only get left. The only sure way to avoid being taken in by sharpers is to buy of reputable home dealers, men to whom you can go and kick like an army mule if the thing purchased is not as represented or there is any delay in delivering the goods. Those men have a reputation to sustain and cannot afford to cheat very much, and the money spent with them is put in circulation at home, whereas the cash that is sent away does no good locally and is likely to prove a dead loss to the sender.—Jamestown Daily Tribune.

Washington Letter.

From Our Regular Correspondent.
Mr. M. P. Morian, of Gracoville Minn. who is connected with the National Farmers' Alliance, was one of the witnesses before the Industrial Commission this week, his testimony dealing with the transportation of grain. He presented the Isthmian Canal question in a new phase by saying that he was opposed to the construction of the Nicaraguan Canal because it would make a short cut for foreign countries to invade our commercial field. He said that if it were constructed the cost should fall upon the commercial European nations, which he believed would get the greatest benefits from it. Illustrative of the talk on the River and Harbor bill in the House, Representative Capron, of R. I., tells this story of a bill carrying a big appropriation that passed the legislature of that state when he was a member. "One of the members said: 'Mr. Speaker, I should like to hear some explanation of this enormous expenditure. Not that I intend to oppose it. I think I shall vote for the bill. But we ought to be told what the money is for.' Thereupon a fat German member replied: 'Why should we explain? We had do votes. Dere is no need of explanation.' Whether the criticism alleging that the Revenue reduction bill was being purposely delayed in the Senate Finance Committee had any effect upon members of that committee cannot be positively stated, but the fact that the committee is now meeting daily for the consideration of the bill indicates an intention to report it to the Senate. It is quite certain, however, that it will be extensively amended by the committee.

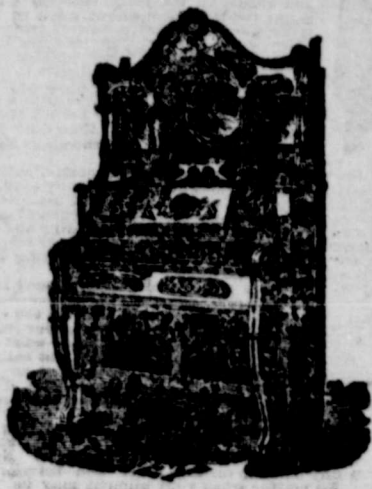
