**A Big Deal.**

What follows is taken from two of the great English Dailies, The Telegraph and Mercury, anent the Morgan-Leland purchases and shows that Britain fully appreciates the importance of the United States as a factor in the commercial world. This is what the Telegraph says: Mr. Pierpont Morgan proposes to acquire an appreciable percentage of the total quantity of British shipping by a stroke of the pen at a cost of £1,750,000. The sum seems large, relative to the old-world ideas we have not yet shaken off. But that is precisely our weakness. To the promoters of the billion dollar trust, based upon something like a capital of £230,000,000, what are a couple of million sterling, more or less? They become drops in the bucket; and that is the point of view which must enable us to realize, as we have not yet done, the enormous measure of the forces with which we have now to reckon where American competition is concerned. We are asked, indeed, to take comfort from the statement that there is no present intention to interfere with the British register of the Leyland vessels, or to withdraw them outright from the Union Jack. We shall be exceedingly foolish to be lulled, so far as our national interests are concerned, by any argument of that sort. . . . America has superseded our agriculture beaten our coal output, left us far and away behind in the production of iron and steel, passed us at last in the total volume of exports. She has only commenced her final onslaught upon our carrying trade, and with these beginnings we may wonder if such things are done in the day?

MERCURY.

The American Government will doubtless welcome a purchase which will materially diminish the difficulty of military operations in the Philippines and elsewhere; but we cannot afford to lose any portion of our supply of transports. The whole question is worthy of being carefully pondered over in all its bearings, and it would be a piece of deplorable levity to dismiss Mr. Pierpont Morgan's clever and audacious move as simply the purchase of a number of second-hand steamers. There is something mortifying in the thought that the acquisition of so important a part of our shipping is, in the eyes of this financial magnate, only a chapter of a larger scheme with which we are not concerned. But there is also a warning to set our house in order. These American millionaires, who have enticed into their service Mr. Clinton Dawkins, the ablest financial adviser whom the Government of India ever had, and who have by this step put their affairs on an equality with the interests of the millions of our Indian Empire, are dangerous people.

Robert J. Aitken has been chosen as the sculptor for the American navy monument to be erected in San Francisco. It is to cost \$45,000, and the larger part of this amount has been subscribed, Claus Spreckels contributing \$10,000, and John W. Mackay and Mayor J. D. Phelan, of San Francisco, \$5,000 each. President McKinley is expected to break ground for the monument during his visit to the city.

"If I am killed," said a young soldier to General Sheridan, just before the battle, "tell my mother that I kept my promise." ### Found a Forgotten Grave

On close inspection he found inscribed on it: "Capt. J. H. Green, Captain of the Thirtieth Texas Cavalry. Died June 4, 1863." None of the older persons are now living who were living there at the date indicated by the inscription on the gravestone. A. D. Lewis, manager of Dr. Miller's ranch, says, however, that he remembers hearing his father, now dead, speak of Capt. Green dying on the retreat from Fort Smith when that place fell into the hands of the Federal forces, and of his being buried where the grave was found. There may be scattered in Texas or somewhere else relatives of the lonely sleeper, or perhaps some of his comrades, who would give much to know where he lies buried in order that they might remove the remains or put an inclosure around the grave.—News.
