iantly round the wagons, sprouting from the seed that dropped fertilized by the life-blood of gallant men. So long in most places
had grown the grass that it mercifully shrouded the dead, whom four long months to-morrow we have left unburied.
As one strayed aimlessly about,
one stumbled one stumbled in the grass over skeletons that rattled to the touch. Here lay a corpse with a bayonet jammed into the mouth up to the socket, transfixing the head and
