The Anarchists.

The problems of dealing with the anarchists of the country are very grave and difficult ones. While the enactment of a law making it a high crime to give expression to anarchistic teachings seems to be the sentiment of many yet such a law would carry with it many dangers. The custom which has prevailed in England of dealing with such dangerous characters who seek to bring disorder and confusion to governments might be tried in this country with good effect. The criminal was subjected to a certain number of lashes on the naked body which were given with force sufficient to cut into the flesh and then dipped into a briny solution of salt and water. When the wounds made by such punishment had healed, which some times took a year the victim was again compelled to undergo the same kind of treatment. This was often done for three or four times and not infrequently was the convicted person executed after undergoing all these tortures.

Better Mail Service.

During the past few weeks the daily mail has failed to reach us several times owing to the train being late at Colorado and the time allotted to the carrier to make the trip between that place and Snyder and return not being sufficient for him to wait until the train came in. Such will likely be the case more frequently during the winter months than now, while the roads are good. A number of our business men have spoken to us regarding the matter and it seems to be the prevailing opinion among them that the only way to remedy the defect and insure us a daily mail is for the carrier to leave Snyder instead of Colorado each morning making the round trip every day. It appears to us that this would be more satisfactory to the traveling public besides the benefits above mentioned. We mention these matters for the consideration of our readers as every one feels the need of our getting mail regularly.

A New Discovery

Wilkes Merrill has made a very important discovery relative to the treatment of cattle that have eaten cane. Wilkes cut some of the succulent plant and fed it to one of his cows and in a short time the animal was down and almost dead. He made a strong solution of salt and warm water which he gave the cow and in about ten minutes repeated the dose which was all that was necessary to recovery. He says the animal would have been dead in ten minutes had he not drenched with the brine. Such an easy and simple remedy is worth consideration and we see no reason why, if it should succeed in this case that it would not in others. We give this for the benefit of our readers as we have heard of quite a number of cattle dying from the eating of cane.

The Passing of the Hog.

We do not mean to say that the hog has had his day. On the contrary his day is just coming and the more we have of them and the nearer we keep them to our homes the better, provided they are kept in the right place.

We refer to the notice in another column which forbids their running at liberty upon the streets. Every one will agree that we have a hog law and that it is nothing but right that it be enforced. The trespassing of stock upon the premises of another sometimes leads to serious difficulties and besides if we have a law whether it suits us or not it ought to be kept. It is unjust to require one man to keep his stock in an enclosure while his neighbor's roam about at liberty.
