

#### RESULT OF LAST SATURDAY'S PRIMARY.

The Lucky Candidates who Received the County's Endorsement for Office in the Primary Election Held Last Saturday—Miller Wins for Representative.

The primary election Saturday resulted in bringing a large number of people to town than has been here on any previous Saturday for several months. The vote polled was larger at every box in the county than was expected. The chief interest outside of the county, centered in the race for district Judge between P. D. Sanders and H. R. Jones, though not a little excitement was created over the contest between W. J. Miller and L. H. McCrea for the county's endorsement for representative. In the county the principal fights were made in the sheriff and assessor's race. A strong pull was made by Judge Grisham's friends to carry the county for him for district attorney and the effort resulted in a nice complimentary vote but the county gave a handsome majority to Cullen C. Higgins, her favorite man for the place. As will be seen by referring to our tabulated statement in another column H. R. Jones carried the county for district judge by 56 majority, and W. J. Miller for representative by 12 majority. Tom Elza for assessor ran 11 votes ahead of Crump his nearest competitor. Suits' majority over Kutch for sheriff was 17. The other candidates were without opposition and carried, practically the solid vote of the primary.

#### PROHIBITION PARTY.

The prohibition party held their State convention in Dallas last week and nominated Geo. W. Carroll of Beaumont for Governor and Arthur A. Everts of Dallas for Lieutenant governor.

The Socialistic party has put out a full state ticket, naming for governor, W. W. Freeman of Del Rio and A. E. Martin of Bonham for Lieutenant governor.

The prohibition party declare in their platform that the sale of intoxicating liquors is the mother of all crimes and our greatest national waste and weakness.

#### REGULATIONS FOR POST OFFICE.

Regulations for Post Office.

The following regulations at Washington will be of interest to the public generally and especially to those residing on or near the mail route:

Any person living on or near the route and not within the corporate limits of any town or within 80 rods of any postoffice, who desires his mail deposited at a given point on the line of the route by the carrier may provide and erect a suitable box or crane on the roadside, located in such manner as to be reached as conveniently as practicable by the carrier without dismounting from the vehicle or horse, and such person shall file with the postmaster at the post office to which his mail is addressed (which shall be one of the two postoffices on the route on either side of and next to the box or crane) a request in writing for the delivery of his mail to the carrier for deposit at the designated point, at the risk of the addressee. The bag or satchel above described, as well as the box or crane, must be provided by the person for whose use it is intended without expense to the department.

It shall be the duty of the postmaster at any such post office, upon a written order from any person living on or near the route to deliver to the mail carrier for that route any mail matter—placed in the respective satchels, where such are used, the mail for the person to whom such satchels belong—with instructions as to the proper mail box or crane at which said mail matter shall be deposited; but registered mail shall not be so delivered unless expressly requested by the addressee in his written order. No mail matter so delivered to the carrier shall be carried past another post office on the route before being deposited into a mail box or hung on a crane or post.

The carrier on the route will be required to receive from any postmaster on the route any mail matter or private mail satchel that may be entrusted to him outside of the usual mail bag, and shall carry such mail matter or private mail satchel to and deposit it into the proper mail box

it on the proper mail box placed on the line of the route for this purpose; such satchel carrier to be without the addressee. All mail carries must be of proper character and of sufficient weight to properly handle the mail along the route.

The department does not prefer a particular design of satchel to be used for this service, but the person providing either should see that it is of such character as to afford ample protection to the mail. If there is a lock attached to the box, a key is not to be held by the carrier, as he is expected to deposit the mail without the necessity of unlocking the box. The box or crane should be so located on the roadside that the carrier can deposit the mail without leaving his vehicle or horse, and yet not where it will obstruct public travel.

The carrier is not required to collect mail from the boxes, but there is no objection to doing so if it does not interfere with his making the schedule time. The law provides that every carrier of the mail shall receive any mail matter presented to him if properly prepared by stamps, and deliver the same for mailing at the next post office which he arrives, but that no fees shall be allowed him therefor.

He is an attractive speaker and we were glad to have the opportunity to hear him.

#### MEASURES FOR PROPOSED LEGISLATION.

Would Abolish Absolute Lease and Place the School Land Market for Sale to Settlers Only—Action of Commissioner Condemned

The convention which nominated W. P. Sebastian for Senator declared in favor of abolition of the absolute lease, and that the public lands be put upon the market for sale to actual settlers and that present leases be given a reasonable time in which to move improvements after sale made. That hereafter all leases be made subject to the act.

The platform declares again any validating act and condemns the recent action of the Commissioner of the General Land Office in raising the price of land three dollars per acre.

As regards the quarantine line it favors the passage of clean cattle at all seasons of the year and that cattle be allowed to pass without inspection for a period of not less than 30 days, more than 60 days, beginning November 15.

These are the questions which most concern the people of West Texas and indeed all other portions of the state, as the handling of the public lands directly affects the public school fund. The measures for proposed legislation are clearly enunciated in the platform adopted by the convention and we hope to see every one of them carried out.

#### MILLER CARRIED SCURRY.

In the primary election held in Scurry county Saturday, W. J. Miller carried the county for representative after a very warm fight. The result in Scurry virtually insures the nomination of Mr. Miller as the Democratic standard bearer, and it is probable he will receive the honor without further contest. Mr. Miller's views on public issues are well known to the people of the district. He favors the maintenance of the state quarantine line with proper modifications, and believes that land should be protected to the end of the term.—Colorado Stockman.

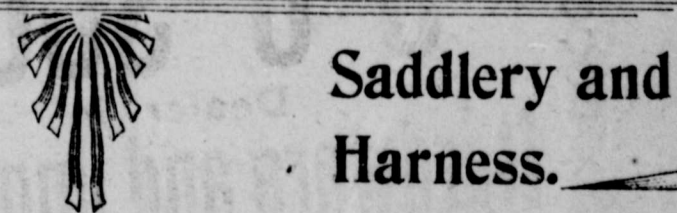
