Junior High schedules mailed

Friona Junior High Principal Mark Sundre announced this week that student schedules for returning 7th and 8th grade students will be mailed out this week. Please reference the message in the note included with the schedule.

Orientation for incoming 6th graders will be Thursday, August 21 at 10:00 a.m. in the junior high band hall. Student schedules will be given to the sixth graders at that time. All incoming 6th gradrs are encouraged to attend. Parents are welcome.

"Traffic will be an issue for a few months due to the work being done on Highway 60," stated Sundre. "We ask that you be patient and watch for students as you drop off and pickup your own children."

Students will not be allowed to cross Highway 60 within the construction zones between Summit and Washington.

School begins at 8:00 a.m. on Monday, August 25. Students are asked to bring their schedules the first day and are to report to the their breakfast rooms at 8:00 a.m. This includes 7th grade boys in athletics.


Important Hwy 60 Notice

Next week, on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, the Highway 60 construction crews will be pouring the cement. They will start at the west end of the construction and work east. They are asking local residents to avoid Highway 60 in the construction zone for the next couple of weeks if at all possible while they are pouring cement.

They anticipate pouring half of the construction area next week and continue with the other half the following week.

There will be a steady stream of cement trucks from the plant east of town. The Cleveland intersection at Friona Interbank will be closed off. Instead of a stop sign the Cleveland traffic light will blink yellow to keep traffic moving. There will be no access to Hwy 60 from Cleveland.

If at all possible please use alternate routes and avoid driving on Hwy 60 in the construction area.

Council seeks tax increase, approves expenditures

The Friona city council meetings are usually less than an hour but Monday's meeting extended to two hours. The agenda was heavy on financial matters, approving the 2014 fiscal budget, approving a property tax rate, and authorize the city manager to transfer funds for several ex-

penditures. The council met at 6:30 p.m. Monday with all members present, plus city manager Patricia Phipps, city attorney Slater Elza, and deputy city secretary Rosa Mendez.

After roll call, pledge of allegiance, and invocation, Chief Appraiser Jill Timms from the Parmer County Appraisal District reviewed property tax rates. After discussion the council approved an increase from 0.7942 to 0.7992 per \$100 valuation. Two public hearings were set for comments. See the notice in this Star.

> -- Discussions were held to provide health insurance to Prairie Acres employees. Based on calculations of the number of employees eligible the cost would be \$407.57 per month per employee with a \$5,000 deductible. The cost was estimated to be \$140,000 per year. No action was taken.

-- A proposal has been received to construct duplexes in the block between 6th and 7th and Ashland and Woodland, owned by the Friona Economic Development Corporation. The builder asked the city to provide water

and sewer taps and offer a tax abatement. City attorney Elza said he thought if might be illegal to provide such assistance.

-- A new radio control system for the north water well was approved at a cost of approximately \$40,000. City manager Phipps was authorized to purchase a new mower for the cemetery but she said they would probably wait and plan the cost into the next budget. She also stated that the sprinkler system at the cemetery had been repaired and they would be watering consistently

The meeting was adjourned at 8:14 p.m. The next council meeting is Monday September 8 at 6:30 p.m. at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

Commissioners approve tax rate increase

At their Tuesday August 12 meeting county commissioners approved a \$5,437,645 fiscal 2014 budget and a property tax increase from 0.4905 to 0.5296 per \$100 valuation. Required public hearings are set for August 25 and August 29 at 9:00 a.m. in commissioner's court.

-- No action was taken on a tax abatement request from

Philip Taylor who is proposing the construction of duplexes in Friona.

-- Purchase of a new road grader for Precinct 1 was approved.

-- John Gurley was approved as the County Safety Officer.

-- Elected officials and county employees were given a 3% salary increase and jailers were

given a 10% increase. Sheriff Geries said it is increasingly difficult to keep jail personnel because of competing salary levels.

- Sheriff Geries received a \$17,000 grant through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) to purchase computers for Sheriff's department patrol vehicles.

why not just walk on the sidewalk

Under what circumstance is it okay for a police officer to shoot an unarmed person?

There is no clear answer yes. to the question. A first reaction would be never. Yet a police officer in Ferguson, Missouri, shot an 18-yearold kid not once but several times. The teenager lay dead in the middle of the street. The city has explained its version of the incident and witnesses tell a different version.

They have yet to release the name or race of the policeman.

As is always the case there seems to be many versions of what happened. Two teen boys, both black, were walking in the middle of a street. A police car stopped and told them to get on the sidewalk. I'm pretty sure the boys mouthed off to the officer but I wasn't there so I don't know.

Allegedly the officer got irritated, a scuffle ensued, and he shot the boy more than once. Wouldn't it have been a better solution if the boys had just got on the sidewalk? Hindsight says

The 2010 census says Ferguson, Missouri, is 67% black out of a population of 22,000. The police force has about 57 officers. Three of them are black. In a peaceful world none of these statistics should keep folks from living in harmony.

Rev. Al Sharpton have come to Ferguson and accused the police of racial profiling. The boys were walking in the street and were told to walk on the sidewalk. How is that racial profiling? I'm pretty sure if two white or brown boys were walking in the street they would have been told to get on the sidewalk. But then again maybe not.

In order to show their respect to the deceased young man, a bunch of mourners got together and expressed their sympathy by looting and damaging at least 12 businesses, including burn-

ing down a Quik Trip convenience store. The three

employees ran for their lives. A Shoe Carnival was looted. Guess the mourners needed some shoes to wear to the funeral. A Hibberts Sports store was razed. Lot of good looting stuff in there. The next night some local citizens armed themselves and stood in front of several businesses in case Black activists like the looters came back. They

didn't. If I were the Quik Trip people I would tear down what is left of the building, remove the gas pumps, dig up the gas tanks, and not

rebuild the store.

Looters are never part of the community. They are low level thieves that take advantage of tragic circumstances to steal stuff. A few of them get caught. Most don't.

Looting is not about police brutality or racial profiling or protesting for a dead young man. It is simply about stealing from citizens that employ citizens and try to make a living. Granted they may be angry at somebody but looting is not about anger or righteousness. Looting does not improve any situation.

Wouldn't it be better to just walk on the sidewalk?

Mayor's Minutes

On Monday, August 4, Sheriff Randy Geries and the Sheriff's Department had two search warrants issued for two homes in Friona resulting in 5 arrests, 4 male and 1 female. During the searches, the Sheriff's Department found cocaine and marijuana. Sheriff Geries could not give any specific details on this matter due to an ongoing investigation. Once the investigation is complete, Sheriff Randy Geries will be able to give a more detailed description of this incident. Look for this article in the Friona lected. We were blessed with some good rain in July. However, it did slow down the highway construction a little. The plan is to complete the construction by the end of October according to the Texas Department of Transportation.

Chief Jimenez and the Police Department were busy in the month of July. There were a total of 126 stops. There were 34 citations issued and 69 warnings. There were 14 arrests, six for no drivers' license, two for assault, one for suspended drivers license, three for drugs and two for warrants. The end of August, Officer Andrew Aguirre will have completed his academy training and will be joining the Friona Police Department full time. Also, Officer Jesus San Miguel will be rejoining the Friona Police Department by late August.

I had an opportunity to visit with Darla Bracken discussing the Library and it is amazing to me the involvement from the community with the Library. There were 1516 patrons that vis-

ited the Library in the month of July. More amazing, there were 3,277 hits on the Library's website where people were either ordering books, searching for books or just going to the site to look at pictures or read the articles. There were 1,105 books checked out of the Library in July.

The EMS had a total of 14 runs. There were seven-911 calls, five-transfers and two-no transfers. There was \$8,830.84 col-

the fires were inside the city limits and three fires were outside the city limits.

The city pumped 21,494,400 gallons of water, sold 19,994,000 gallons of water and billed \$77,979.63.

The swimming pool collected \$2,905.00 in July. There were a total of 205 adults and 306 children that visited the pool. A big thanks to Kendall Kimbrough and all of the lifeguards for their work and keeping the children safe while they spent their time at the pool. The city collected more money this year compared to years past.

Judge Campbell was busy in July. There were fifty-six new cases and thirty-one were trial by Judge. Only three cases were dismissed. The court collected \$8,310.77. The city keeps \$5,647.43 and remits \$2,663.44 to the state.

Prairie Acres and Heritage Estates are doing very well. Currently, there are 40 residents living at Prairie Acres and 13

residents living at Heritage Estates.

Lipham Asphalt and Paving, the contractor hired by the city to seal coat several blocks, will begin this week with the seal coat process. Ron Carr placed a map of the city in last week's paper illustrating the areas of the city that will receive the seal coating. The city will seal coat different areas each year to keep our streets in better condition.



I want to compliment the construction crew that is working on our Hwy 60 improvement. I drive through or around the construction every day and the men have been very efficient and orderly it seems. The large piles of dirt and concrete are hauled away quickly and the work area is orderly. This week they are laying the re-

bar for the cement pouring to begin. The entire project has been less disruptive than many thought in the beginning.

I'm mentioning this here and on the front page because it is important. The highway construction crew will begin to pour the cement next week on Tuesday-Wednesday-Thursday. The cement trucks will be traveling on Hwy 60 from the cement plant at the east city limits. They are asking local residents to avoid driving on Hwy 60 during that time if at all possible.

The intersection at Cleveland by Friona Interbank will be closed to traffic and the traffic light will be blinking yellow. You will not be able to access Hwy 60 from southbound Cleveland. They need to keep the cement trucks moving and pouring.

They told the city they were pouring half of the project next week and will pour the rest the next week. It is a big job, there will be a lot of cement trucks, so your cooperation in avoiding Hwy 60 through the con-

struction zone will be appreciated by all.

This is the time of year when the city, county, school district, and hospital district begin working on the next fiscal budget which is from October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015. You have seen notices of tax rates in the Star. This week there are notices from the city and county about public hearings on proposed tax increases. The increases are small but if you want to discuss them you can appear at one of the public hearings.

Water Board adopts Rules and Management Plan

At their regularly scheduled August board been to protect water rights while instituting remeeting, the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 (HPWD) approved water conservation rules and a 10-year amended Management Plan outlining locally controlled goals and activities of the district.

"West Texans have always pulled together to find solutions when issues arise. We're proud to said. see our city and rural constituents all working together to make the best use of water in our aquifers," said HPWD Board President Lynn Tate of Amarillo.

New rules were developed over an 18-month period during which water users were encouraged to offer input.


"We visited with several hundred individuals

A gentler time?

Every day the news brings us a closer look at life outside our tiny community and I am thankful to live in a town that is relatively excluded from the madness that has a death grip on the rest of the world.

This last weekend it seems like Missouri has become a battlefield once again. They dealt with the Civil War and the battles that ensued on their lands. Now the battle is between the police and the citizens. I know there is more to this story but will we ever hear it all?

There is a way of thinking that we should find a focal point to keep our stress levels in check. That focal point should be a time in our lives that we felt safe and protected.

I was working on mine this last weekend and came up with the following:

I am six or seven years old and I am staying with my Grandma and Grandpa Hefner at their home on Birch Street in Muleshoe.

The windows are all open because there is a gentle breeze blowing outside. The curtains are fluttering while I play in the floor of the South bedroom.

The South bedroom is the guest room and usually where my naps were taken.

I loved that room. It was cozy and welcoming. The bed was covered with a white chenille bedspread that when you took your nap would leave little red spots on your skin.

This was also the room where I would get lost in thought and not hear my grandmother calling me to lunch.

"Dane Jane, where are you?" After three or four times of calling for me she would come looking for me and I would be playing with my dolls and in my own little world.

She never got mad at me when she would call unless I was not where she thought I was supposed to be.

But back then I could go most anywhere without anyone kidnapping me or something worse. It was a gentler time.

Anyway, this room was my favorite because it never changed. I knew not to go into my grandparents room because that was their room with their stuff.

The bathrooms at grandma's house always smelled of Dove soap. That smell still takes me back to their house.

At grandma's house at Christmas I knew there was always going to be a silver, aluminum tree with a tri-colored light that shown on it from Thanksgiving until the day after Christmas.

Grandma's kitchen always smelled of home cooked meals and desserts. Her chocolate sheet cakes and turkey and dressing were the best.

When I got older and mom needed something from grandma I would jump on my bicycle and ride the two blocks to their house. Nothing ever happened to me.

I think my point this week is that we as a society need to not be so hysterical about situations. The people in Missouri may have a valid point to be upset but does that give them the right to loot and pillage? Does it give them the right to riot and harm

their fellow man? It isn't just people of Missouri that need to rethink their actions. There are people being killed overseas because of their religious beliefs. Is that right?

I know it may sound pretty childish but "Why can't we just get along?"

Pork and Slaw Sandwiches

Cooking Light Slow Cooker Tonight, Oxmoor House 2012

Pulled pork is an instant classic and slow-cooking it is simply genius. Use packaged cabbage and carrot coleslaw to shave off prep time.

Ingredients

- 1 (3-pound) boneless pork loin roast, trimmed
- 1 cup water
- 1 3/4 cups barbecue sauce
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons hot sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 1/2 cups packaged cabbage-and-carrot coleslaw
- 1/4 cup canola mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 15 (2-ounce) hamburger buns

Preparation

1. Place pork and 1 cup water in a 3- to 4-quart electric slow cooker. Cover and cook on LOW for 7 hours or until meat is tender.


2. Drain pork, discarding cooking liquid. Return pork to slow cooker; shred with 2 forks. Stir in barbecue sauce and next 3 ingredients (through pepper). Cover and cook on LOW for 1 hour.

3. Combine coleslaw and next 4 ingredients (through salt) in a bowl; toss well. Place about 1/3 cup pork mixture and about 2 tablespoons slaw on bottom half of each bun; cover with bun tops.

Quick Tip: Using packaged cabbage-and-carrot coleslaw shaves time off the prep. Long gone are the days when you'd have to shred your own.

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
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
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
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The Plight of the Playas...

Have you noticed that the playas are back?

So many of us who have lived here a long time have been telling people about the playas or lakes when they would ask, what lakes?! The playa lakes play such an important role in the recharging of the Ogallala Aquifer.

As a FCCLA project in 2004 our local Friona ISD students studied the playas and in particular, Reeve Lake. Their research showed that playas or 'dry lakes' are temporary wetlands which provide many benefits to the area ecosystems and the water cycle.

Reeve Lake is a modified playa meaning that it has been tant to the function of the pla-

altered from its original state by humans.

Playas are temporary wetlands providing food and shelter for birds and habitat as photographs from our very own Dr. Gary Cash have so very well documented. They help to recharge the aquifer and provide habitat for plants and animals while also serving as major refueling points along migration routes. With their distinctive underlying clay soil, they provide a filter for water returning to the aquifer.

Playas, the Spanish word for beaches, cover a wide area but

are never very deep. The dry periods are as impor-

yas as is the collecting of fresh water because the clay layer develops huge cracks which act as channels for the water. In fact, the first collected water is the most likely to be part of the recharge due to the cracks in the clay soil; thereafter, the cracks close and seal the bottom of the

Sometimes called pans, playas are naturally low-lying areas that collect water from rainfall or irrigation run-off and can become collection points for salt then they become salt pans or salinas.

If a playa becomes threatened pesticides or sedimentation other methods.

from runoff, they may no longer function and are then called fossil playas.

Conservation is critical and is everyone's responsibility.

The largest concentration of playa lakes in the world is in the Panhandle of Texas and Eastern New Mexico where approximately 22,000 are located.

The Ogallala Aquifer, the largest aguifer in the world, lies under parts of 8 states.

Rex Bracken attended a reception held August 5, 2014 on the front lawn of the Thomas E. Creek Veteran's Hospital honoring area Purple Heart recipients. The Veteran's Hospital sponsored the appreciation ceremony.

Bracken, one of the 32 invited veterans present, received his Purple Heart in Vietnam in March 1967 as the result of a shrapnel wound received while in combat in the U.S. Army.

"This first ever event for our area is being held in conjunction with National Purple Heart Appreciation Day August 7," announced Andrew M. Welch, Director of the Amarillo VA. "We plan to do this annually...", he stated as he welcomed the recipients and guests to the reception.

Amarillo Mayor, Paul Harpole, issued a proclamation in honor of this commemoration. U.S. Congressman, Mac Thornberry, sent his Deputy Director Paul Simpson, to join in congratulating and expressing the nation's gratitude to all those present.

Potter County Commissioner, Leon Church, served as the guest speaker and presented a very inspiring message about the veterans in his life who have been his heroes and the sacrifices families of veterans have made... "something you cannot realize until you become one of those families."

The Amarillo VA Auxiliary served refreshments of decorated cookies and fresh fruit punch and presented fans commemorating their 75th anniversary in 2015.

Local VA employees, including a Purple Heart recipient, led the Pledge of Allegiance and sang our national anthem as part of the ceremony.

The Purple Heart Medal is "one of the most recognized and respected medals awarded to members of the U.S. armed forces." Introduced as the "Badge of Military Merit" by General George Washington in 1782, the Purple Heart is the nation's oldest military award and was originally a heart-shaped form made of purple cloth. It has been awarded continually since April 5, 1917 after a long period of absence.
