It is therefore the order, judgment and decree of this Court that the sale of intoxicating Liquors be and the same are hereby absolutely prohibited within the bounds of said Justice Precinct No. 5, Callahan County, Texas, until such time as the qualified voters therein may by a legal election held for that purpose by a majority vote decide otherwise.

SPECIAL SESSION OVER

The Lawmakers Finish the Appropriation Measure.

THE HOUSE RECEDES

Tells to the Demand of the Senate and the Measure is Passed—A Wedding Takes Place in the House of Representatives.

Austin, Oct. 2.—The second special session of the Twenty-seventh legislature came to an end at 7:30 o'clock last night very quietly and tamely. The senate in the morning promptly refused to grant an adjournment conference on the general appropriation bill. Before the house went to Monday it received from its position of Monday and adopted the report of the conference committee. The bill was knocked off until 7:30 in the evening, to allow the sprawling clock time to enroll the bill. Both branches of the legislature met then for the first time since the adjournment and adjourned sine die.

The total of this appropriation bill is \$7,242,683, as compared with \$4,800,000, the total of the bill passed by the Twenty-sixth legislature. Each legislature, however, made appropriations for bills other than the general appropriation bill. When these are taken into consideration the total appropriation of the Twenty-seventh legislature is \$10,000,000, a difference is amply accounted for by the increase in Confederate pensions, the creation of a new normal school and the increased expense of the general land sales occasioned by the opening of land in settlement.

It is not thought that the governor will keep the bill more than a week. He has known in a general way for the last six months exactly what the bill would be. He therefore knows pretty well what he will do with the bill. The state government has been going along without appropriations since Aug. 31, and it is believed that the secretary of state early next month so that the boys can get their September pay.

The governor has not yet indicated what he intends doing with the general investigation resolution. He can take ten days from adjournment of the legislature to act on it. Should he approve it it will not become effective until 90 days after adjournment of the legislature, or in December. The committee could not be expected to meet then.
