Willie Ellen was born October 6, 1919 to William Fidel and Sarah Teague Cogdill in Lone Wolf, Oklahoma. Willie's dad was a farmer and her mother had been a schoolteacher before she married. Willie had an older sister Helen who was about 2 years older.

The family came to Texas in 1929 with Willie and Helen in the back seat of their touring car and their setting hen [nest and all] between them. Eventually, the fainily bought a place southeast of Friona, but they had lived in various places including the old Hay Hook Ranch House. Willie told me that she and Helen would get up on a chair to look through the bullet hole that was in the front door.

The Hay Hook place was just north of the old Syndicate Hotel when it was still in its original setting in the country.

**PUBLIC NOTICE** 

**Proposition Number 1** 

(SJR 1) SJR 1 would authorize the transfer of certain money from the general revenue fund to the state highway fund and the economic stabilization fund. Money transferred to the state highway fund may be used solely for the construction, maintenance and acquisition of rights-of-way for public roadways.

The proposed amendment will

appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the use and dedication of certain money transferred to the state highway fund to assist in the completion of transportation construction, maintenance, and rehabilitation projects, not to include toll roads."





growing up" a spanking was customary when did a simple spanking become a story for the nachildren did something wrong.

We were not sent to the corner for a 'time out' to think about our offense. Justice was swiftly handed out and without fear of the law busting down the door to take our parents away and charged with child abuse.

I had a grandmother that believed that a child that was not acting right was sent outside to the willow tree for a 'switch'. If said child came back with a really short willow branch they were sent back out to get a longer one. To me that long walk back to the tree was the worst torture.

I have had many friends tell tales about being sent for a belt. They found out that thin belts hurt almost as bad as thick belts.

I don't consider the spankings I received as abuse.

Before I had my children the movement was towards empowering the child and taking parenting away from the parent. Time outs were starting to be talked about.

My sons received a few spankings in their life. I knew not to spank to excess but I always feared that if someone felt so inclined they could call the authorities and have our lives turned inside out.

In the school system, spankings given by a teacher or a principal were phased out and Alternative classrooms were initiated.

Having been on the receiving end of a spank-

ing from the principal, I can say was not my favorite moment in life but I can say I probably deserved the swat I received and I learned from the experience to not repeat the offense.

I am not taking Minnesota Vikings Adrian Peterson's side on this debate. Maybe he did it. Maybe he didn't. I don't know and neither does the media.

He mentioned using a switch from a tree to swat his child and that he was done the same way when he was growing up. It doesn't make it right

but it happened. There has been a breakdown of sorts in society. Children must learn the difference between right and wrong but we have become so afraid that the authorities will arrest us if we discipline

our children. Adults need to learn right from wrong. If a 'time-out' has not worked and taking something away doesn't deter the behavior what is the next

Beating a child means you are teaching them fear. THERE is a difference between spanking

and beating. That principal spanking I spoke about earlier left a mark. In fact, it left a welt then a bruise. It

was just one swat. Did he abuse his authority? Did he mean to leave a mark? Or was he simply doing his job and handing out discipline as he saw fit?

That line between discipline and abuse gets thinner by the day. What happens when that line is completely erased?





#### Election Identification Certificates available

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans in advance of the upcoming November election that Election Identification Certificates (EIC) are available year-round at all Texas driver license offices for individuals in need of proper identification required to vote in elections in Texas. Additional locations to apply for an EIC will be announced in the near future.

The 2014 general election in Texas is November 4, with early voting from Oct. 20 - 31. The last day to register to vote in the 2014 election is Monday, Oct. 6.

Most residents already have an acceptable form of photo identification needed for voting and will not need or qualify for an EIC. If an applicant already has any of the following documents, they are not eligible to receive an EIC:

\*Texas driver license - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

\*Texas personal identification card - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

\*U.S. passport book or card unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

\*Texas concealed handgun license - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

\*U.S. Military identification with photo - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

\*U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo

To apply for an EIC, applicants may visit a driver license office and complete an Application for Texas Election Certificate (DL-14C). (For the Spanish language version of the EIC application, see http://www.dps. texas.gov/internetforms/forms/ DL-14CS.pdf)

To qualify for an EIC, an applicant must:

\*Bring documentation to verify U.S. citizenship and Identity

\*Be eligible to vote in Texas (Bring a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application through the Texas Department of Public Safety)

\*Be a Texas resident \*Be 17 years and 10 months

or older

To avoid delays or complications, DPS urges potential applicants to make sure they have the necessary documentation before

arriving at the office.

The EIC receipt an individual receives will include their photo and can be used for voting until the permanent card is delivered by mail.

The EIC is free of charge to qualifying applicants and is valid for six years. There is no expiration date for an EIC for citizens 70 years of age or older. The EIC can only be used for the purpose of voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification.

#### August tax receipts show slight increase

Texas Comptroller Susan tions totaling \$627.8 million, up Combs stated that state sales tax revenue in August was \$2.57 billion, up 7.5 percent compared to August 2013.

"The latest monthly gains were led by remittances from the oil and natural gas, wholesale trade, and retail trade sectors," Combs said. "Fiscal year 2014 ended with total collections at \$27.27 billion, up 5.5 percent over the previous year. Growth in both business and consumer spending fostered the gains for the year."

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their September local sales tax alloca-

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in July.


Parmer County will receive a net payment of \$52,551, which is an increase of 0.36 percent from the payment in the 2013 comparable period in which the county received \$52,362. To-date payments total \$502,664, which is an increase of 6.51 percent over the 2013 payments of \$471,919.

Bovina will receive a payment of \$9,144, which is a decrease of -10.56 percent as compared to the 2013 payment \$10,224. To-date Bovina has received

\$93,756, which is an increase of 8.58 percent from the 2013 payments of \$86,345.

Farwell will receive a payment of \$11,164, which is an increase of 30.59 percent as compared to the 2013 payment of \$8,548. To-date Farwell has received \$92,738, which is an increase of 8.23 percent over the 2013 payments of \$85,685.

Friona will receive a payment of \$32,244, which is a decrease of -4.00 percent as compared to the 2013 payment of \$33,591. To-date Friona has received \$316,170, which is an increase of 5.42 percent over the 2013 payments of \$299,889.

### TxDOT offering free child safety seat check

As part of national Child Passenger Safety Week, Sept. 14-20, the Texas Department of Transportation reminds drivers that free, year-round child safety seat checks are available at the agency's 25 statewide district offices. Available by appointment, the safety checks are conducted by certified technicians who can determine if your child is properly buckled into an ageand size-appropriate safety

seat. "The law in Texas requires all children younger than 8-years-old, unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches, to be in a child safety seat whenever they ride in a passenger vehicle," said John Barton, Tx-DOT deputy executive director. "If they're not, the driver will be ticketed or fined. For the safety of your child and for your own peace of mind, we strongly encourage you to take advantage of these free safety seat checks."

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates roughly 3 out of 4 child safety seats are not used correctly. Common child safety seat mistakes include installing the seat too loosely, putting the harness straps through the wrong slots, leaving harness straps too loose, positioning the chest clip incorrectly and

using the wrong seat belt path. A recently released study by the Texas A&M Transportation Institute reports nearly 40 percent of children riding in Texas vehicles are either improperly buckled or not buckled at all. The study, conducted in the spring of 2014, observed more than 13,500 Texas children across 14 cities. Of the

children observed, 61 percent were properly buckled into a safety seat while 25 percent were not. Another 14 percent of children in Texas vehicles were not buckled at all.

TxDOT encourages drivers to always refer to their specific child safety seat manufacturer's manual for instructions on how to install the safety seat. Read the vehicle owner's manual to find information on the proper placement of the safety seat and for proper use of the seat belt or LATCH sys-

Drivers can find the location of the nearest TxDOT child safety seat specialist by texting the word "seat" and their ZIP code to 876526. Drivers also can visit www.SaveMe-WithASeat.com to find out what type of safety seat their children need.






