Oilmen protest fees on drilling

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau AUSTIN - Increased drilling permit fees could devastate an industry already overburdened with falling prices, oil and gas operators told members of the Senate Owners Association, compared the Finance Committee Thursday.

To raise state revenues, Gov. Mark White has recommended a completion fee based on various well depths ranging from \$250 for a well less than 2,500 feet in depth to \$8,000 for a well more than 10,000 feet in depth, said Tom Scott of Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's office.

These recommended increases will raise about \$48 million in revenues per year, Scott said.

Instead of a well completion fee, Sen. Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, recommended placing a 2-cent per barrel fee on oil produced which would raise about \$14 million per year. White's proposal would raise

more funds than needed to fund oil

and gas regulatory functions. Farabee said.

But James E. Russel of Abilene, representing the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty proposed fees to increased taxes.

"These fee suggestions are designed to impact disproportionately on the independent segment of the industry, since independents drill more than 85 percent of the wells in this state," Russell said.

Since January, drilling has dropped 20 percent and is expected to drop another 10 percent next month, he said.

"Texas producers are not in a position to look at higher taxes," Russel said.

Harry Phillips of the Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association said the oil and gas industry has gone from a recession to a depression since 1982.



The critics say the "marketoriented" program would immediately cut commodity prices, a blow that would fall hardest on the medium-sized operation that lawmakers like to call "the family

Those farms are not doing well: the Agriculture Department says that of 679,000 medium-sized operations, those that sell \$50,000 to \$500,000 worth of products each year and make up the backbone of commercial farming, one-third will suffer some financial difficulty this year. An estimated 64,000 are insol-

vent, or soon will be, because of high interest rates and plummeting values for their land and crops.

House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza, D-Texas, said current programs would work if they were properly administered.

'The so-called marketplace that they tâlk about, that can only be achieved in a complete vacuum, only in the laboratory," said de la Garza. He noted that all major industrialized countries subsidize their farmers, many at higher levels than the United States.

Few will dispute that farm programs, which have changed little since they began five decades ago, have achieved their social goals.

Agriculture Department figures show that in the early part of the 20th century, farmers were the poor cousins of city residents; their average income was one-third of the national average. Many were tenants, unable to afford to buy the land they farmed.

By 1984, farmers had largely achieved equality, earning an

average of \$31,000 - although much of it from off-farm sources. As farming became more financially rewarding, incentives to investment and production blossomed. Farms got bigger and crop

surpluses accumulated, depressing prices. Under price-support arrangements, the government bought much of the surplus. Government costs for subsidies and other programs to benefit farming climbed to a record four-year total of \$63 billion during Reagan's first term.

Of the 6.3 million farms in 1930, only 2.33 million remain. But on average, each of today's farmers produces eight times the amount his grandfather did.


That surplus is the heart of today's dilemma.

Proposed answers to the surpluses are nearly as numerous as the interests that make up the nation's diverse farm sector, and each has its own problems.

Reagan's answer, and that of many agribusiness lobbyists and commodity groups, is to increase exports. But economists note that much of the Third World - where the greatest potential for new sales lies — is suffering from recession and cash shortages. Export subsidies could help sell U.S. crops, but at the risk of starting a trade

war with other producer countries. Others would like to see American farmers forced to curb production, believing that would boost prices for all at a low cost to the government. Still others advocate subsidies for family-size farms, or a two-price system with high price supports for domestic consumption and lower prices on goods destined for export.

Sex education working

NEW YORK - A study of nations where teen age pregnancy runs about half or less the American rates suggests that emphasis on sex education and contraceptive services is part

The experiences of Canada, England, France, Sweden and the Netherlands suggest that making contraceptives and sex information more available could also reduce rates in the United States, concludes a study by the Alan Guttmacher Institute.

None of those countries has an official policy of discouraging sex among teen-agers, leaving that decision to parents, churches and the teenagers themselves, the study said. Instead, "the role of the government is essentially to address the problem of childbearing," Jeannie Rosoff, president of the institute, said Tuesday at a news conference.

Student loan crackdown

SAN DIEGO - Six people have been arrested on charges of fraudulently obtaining \$29,926 in student loans, and officials say scores more indictments are expected in Western states as part of a national crackdown.

Federal authorities on Tuesday announced the arrests of five Mexican nationals and one Gambian native stemming from loans made between September 1981 and January.



Soviet Union buries Chernenko in hero's grave

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union buried Konstantin U. Chernenko in a hero's grave on Red Square today in an elaborate state funeral at which new leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev hailed Chernenko as a man of peace and a "faithful servant" of communism.

Gorbachev, the youngest Soviet leader in 60 years, scheduled a series of meetings with world leaders following the ceremony. In his eulogy, Gorbachev underlined two Soviet goals for the future - world peace and development of the nation's economy.

The coffin of Chernenko, the man who was the last in the line of Soviet leaders born under the Russian czars, was placed near the right end of a row of hero's graves between the Kremlin wall and the tomb of the nation's founder, Vladimir I. Lenin.

Artillery salvos thundered across Red Square, the Kremlin bells pealed into the still afternoon air on a bleak late winter day, and factory, ship and railroad whistles blew across the nation.

The expressions of grief at Chernenko's death were overshadowed by the swiftness and vigor of the transition to the 54-year-old Gorbachev's leadership.

In Washington, U.S. officials said President Reagan had sent Gorbachev a personal message proposing a superpower summit in the United States. Reagan said Monday he was "more than ready" to meet the new Soviet Communist Party leader.

U.S. Embassy spokesman Jaroslav Werner said Vice President George Bush would meet Gorbachev today and hold a news conference "hard on the heels" of

the session, set for 10 p.m. in Moscow (2 p.m. EST). Bush said he came to Moscow bearing "a message of peace" from Reagan, who he said "has no greater

nope and no greater goal" than peace with the Soviets. The British Embassy said Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher would meet with Gorbachev today, and French officials in Paris said that President Francois Mitterrand had also scheduled a session with the new Kremlin chief.

Gorbachev, wearing a gray Persian lamb hat and donning his gold-rimmed reading glasses, opened the funeral ceremony with a eulogy to the man who had served as Soviet leader for only 13 months when he died Sunday at age 73.

"At this hour of grief, Soviet men and women are paying their deep respects to a faithful servant of our party and people, a staunch champion of the ideals of communism," said Gorbachev, the youngest Soviet leader since Josef Stalin took control of the Communist Party after the death of Lenin in 1924.

Moments before the coffin was lowered into the freshly dug earth, Chernenko's widow, Anna, bid an emotional farewell to her husband. She stood by the side of his open coffin, stroking his forehead in grief and bending several times to press her cheek against his face and kiss him.

After two minutes, another woman gently took her arm and led Mrs. Chernenko away from the coffin. The 10 surviving members of the Politburo stood at

Whistle-blowers deserve reward

In moving to renew a government whistle-blower program that expired last September, Rep. Patricia Schroeder of Col orado has expanded it in an important way by including for the first time uniformed armed forces personnel. Rep. Schroeder's bill, which the House has already passed 413-1, provides for cash rewards for federal employees who reveal waste, fraud and mismanagement - awards of up to \$10,000 or 1 percent of the savings involved, whichever amount is smaller. She said she is confident that the program will save taxpayers from having to pay for such military extravagance as \$7,200 coffeepots.

Whether that is certain or not, the program is still worth continuing. During the five years after the program was approved in 1978, the General Accounting Office received more than 53,000 calls on its hot line and referred more than 10,600 allegations to federal investigative units. About 1,100 allegations were substantiated and millions of dollars in excessive spending were uncovered. Yet a three-year renewal bill was killed last year at the last minute when the Reagan administration, although it supported the program, objected to a plan to boost the power of the office to protect whistle-blowers.

That should not be allowed to happen again this year. Since whistle-blowing, as has been demonstrated many times, can be dangerous to an employee's job security, a strong employee protection system is essential. That is especially true for military personnel, who are more vulnerable than civilians to disciplinary retaliation from superiors. Yet their inclusion could pay off, given the potential for waste in the Pentagon's big budget.

U.S. looks for KO in exports' bout

WASHINGTON — In dealing with Japan, a two-term presidency comes in handy. For during the first term, an administration becomes exposed to the tricks, dodges, feints, delays and other bits of flimflam practiced by Tokyo in trade negotiations.

During the second term ... well, look what the Reagan administration has just done. In a sharp break with the past, it is asking the Japanese not to restrict exports to the U.S., but to let Americans sell more to Japan. That approach, while not assured of success, will at least force a showdown later this vear.

grounded in the condition of the global economy. The U.S. has led he world in recovery from the recession of 1980-82. Foreigners have rushed to invest in American securities. In effect, other nations are supplying about half the money required to pay for this country's federal deficit of \$200 billion. As a result the dollar has soared - up by some 40 percent against other currencies since 1980.

The rise of the dollar has priced American goods - from agriculture through steel to hightech — out of foreign markets. This country is not selling nearly enough merchandise abroad to pay back the foreigners for financing the budget deficit. Instead the U.S. is borrowing abroad, thus slipping deeply into the red, and accumulating interest charges that will burden Americans for many years to come.

Japan plays the major role in this global account. The Japanese are the biggest investors in this country — over \$25 billion last year. They also have the biggest trade surplus — more than \$30 billion last year.

Their products not only cut deeply into American markets in such industries as autos and steel and electronics. The Japanese have also been very slow to open up their own markets for American producers. Bitter hostility to Japan now colors the mood of American business. Sentiment for an-acrossthe-board surtax on all exports is widespread. The more so as the revenues would ease the federal deficit.

During similar crunches in the past, the Washington response was to press the Japanese to cut back exports competing with American industry. Thus in the 1960s the U.S. forced the Japanese to restrict textile exports. During the following decade, the Japanese were obliged the Los Angeles Times Syndicate.

Instead it is concentrating on opening up Japanese markets for American products. Hopes have been particularly high for a jump in U.S. exports of telephonic equipment and wood products.

Nobody is certain exactly what will happen now, but a rocky, testing time looms ahead. The Japanese have been dragging their feet on negotiations for opening markets for lumber and telephonic equipment. Last week Secretary of Commerce Malcolm Baldrige suspended the talks on the grounds that the Japanese were not getting attorneys who have lost their down to specifics.

Vets feel Stockman's sword

Here's what the OMB-VA health-care proposal would do:

 Vets 65 and older with disabilities not traceable to their military service would no longer be automatically eligible for free VA care in hospitals nursing homes. (They now are admitted regardless of their financial status.) Instead, those with incomes above a certain level would be required to pay the VA for at least a share of their medical expenses, on a sliding scale.

• The income level at which a vet would have to pay part of his medical expenses would be twice the maximum veterans' pension rate. So veterans with an income of \$15,000 to \$30,000 a year would have to pay up to one-half the VA medical cost (either personally or through insurance). The vet's share would rise to as high as 90 percent according to income.

• Except for emergency care and "extraordinary circumstances," veterans above the \$15,000 income Moreover, the restrictions level would not be eligible for any VA care until they benefit only a few U.S. producers, had paid a certain amount out of their own pockets.

Obviously hoping to muffle at least part of the anticipated outcry, the OMB-VA proposal exempts the following categories of veterans from having to share costs or establish financial need:

 Veterans with service-connected disabilities. Veterans with non-service-connected disabilities who have been deemed otherwise

Former prisoners-of-war.

 Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange, nuclear tests or the aftereffects of the atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

 Current VA pensioners and those who are now receiving free VA medical care.

 Veterans of World War I, the Mexican Border campaign and the Spanish-American War.

"The VA will not be the primary provider of care for veterans with incomes above (the) standard," the OMB letter states. "In most circumstances, these veterans would receive care, medical examinations and diagnoses in non-VA facilities, and would enter the VA after having received care

Council looks for justice in lawyers

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense ethical moorings constitute a critical element in the life support been warning that, without an system of organized crime agreement, they would not be able families, a presidential commission was told Monday.

In a report prepared for a symposium on legal ethics, staff members of the President's Commission on Organized Crime maintained that law enforcement authorities and bar associations attorneys" who violate the law and ethics in the course of their legal

'There is no reason to doubt that the overwhelming majority of defense counsel, including those who represent notorious defendants, conduct themselves in an ethical manner," the report said.

"However, our inquiries also confirmed the existence of a small group of attorneys who have become integral parts of criminal conspiracies, using their status as sworn officers of the court to advance the criminal purposes of these criminal organizations," it continued.

"It is clear that traditional organized crime and narcotics traffickers depend upon, and could not effectively operate without, these attorneys.

'However, our inquiries also confirmed the existence of a small group of attorneys who have become integral parts of criminal conspiracies, using their status as sworn officers of the court to advance the criminal purposes of these criminal organizations. Report on organized crime

The staff said its findings do not represent "the official views of the President's Commission on Organized Crime or any of its commissioners. It is a staff study prepared for the lawyer-ethics symposium, and should be regarded as a working document designed to present issues and provoke discussion and evaluation.

President Reagan signed an executive order in July 1983 creating the commission, whose purpose is to "make a full and complete national and region-by-region analysis of organized crime." Its final report is due on March 1, 1986.

The report submitted to members of the commission and top Justice Department and law enforcement officials Monday served as the linchpin for discussion of lawyer ethics, organized family for more than 10 years, crime and ethical standards of the American Bar Association.

During the commission's meeting, government prosecutors, defense attorneys and bar association spokesmen engaged in a lively debate on the question of how far lawyers can go in defending their

Judge Irving R. Kaufman of the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New York and chairman of the crime commission, said, "What the staff is saying is so ... They (renegade lawyers) do contaminate the process of criminal

But Albert J. Krieger, a Miami defense attorney, said: "I've represented notorious figures coast to coast and border to border, and I've got to say I've never experienced any of the things you describe."

Defense attorney Joseph Balliro Boston also maintained that the problem is not pervasive. "If it's 99 apples in a barrel of apples, you may want to throw the barrel out. If it's only one of the 100, you may want to fish around in the barrel so as not bruise the others," he said.

The findings, based in part on the commission staff's interview of an unidentified lawyer who represented members of a Mafia

were released as law enforcement agencies continue to make headway in the quest to put mob figures in jail.

Earlier this month, federal authorities rounded up the reputed chiefs of New York's five Mafia families and charged them in a federal indictment with being the "ruling body" of a criminal enterprise that deals in murder, labor racketeering and extortion.

"This is a bad day, probably the worst ever, for the Mafia," said U.S. Attorney Rudolph Guiliani. Never before, he said, had a federal indictment charged so many reputed organized crime

Guliani said the Mafia could be destroyed within five years, but he also said that new leaders, and dangerous new gangs, could revitalize organized crime.

In fiscal 1984, federal law enforcement authorities obtained nearly 2,200 organized-crime convictions, up nearly two-thirds from the previous year. FBI spokesman Manuel Marquez said known Mafia figures were convicted in Buffalo. N.Y.; Chicago, Kansas City, Mo.; Milwaukee, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and New York.

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) - Investigators were scheduled to renew their probe today into the fiery crash of a C-130 military transport plane that killed

six of the eight people aboard.

The plane, which was dropping sand bags in a routine low-altitude mission, burst into flames and virtually disintegrated after it crashed Tuesday morning in Central Texas, officials said.

The two survivors were taken to Darnall Army Community Hospital, where they were in stable condition late Tuesday night, said Fort Hood spokeswoman Mary Mueller.

Ms. Mueller said the victims' identities would not be released until this morning so that their relatives could be notified.

Investigators from Dyess and Bergstrom Air Force bases arrived on the scene Tuesday afternoon and were to resume poring over what one firefighter called "the mangled mess" today, Ms. Mueller said. An eyewitness, Anita Nichols of Gatesville, said the 60-person-capacity C-130E Hercules was flying in formation with two other planes when it crashed about 11:15 a.m.

"One of them just kept getting lower and lower and lower," she said. "I thought, 'Oh my gosh, there's no landing place there.' All of a sudden, he went down and the whole thing burst into flames.

"He wasn't flying with the others," said William Farrar, a Gatesville police sergeant who lives near the crash site. "He was flying kind of erratic."

The plane was on a low-level mission from Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene to Fort Hood, simulating drops of supplies at altitudes between 800 feet and 1,500 feet, said Fort Hood spokesman.





ject him with lethal drugs. "We had trouble trying to find a good vein," Texas Department of Corrections spokesman Charles Brown said of the repeated tries by technicians.

Morin, a multiple killer put to death today for the slaying of a 21-year-old San Antonio woman, "admitted that he had ruined his veins by shooting up with dope," the prison system said in a statement chronicling the execution.

Ironically, the 37-year-old Morin had asked for months that he be put to death and had requested that his attorneys cease any attempts to obtain for him a stay.

But when the appointed time arrived, it was nearly an hour from the moment the operation began

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — Con- until the time he was pronounced victed killer Stephen Peter Morin dead. In recent Texas executions, the operation has gone very quickly, lasting only a few minutes.

The drifter from Rhode Island entered the death chamber at 12:02 a.m. and the first injection carrying a saline solution was attempted two minutes later.

At least five more attempts were nade to locate appropriate wins in his arms and even legs before the technicians succeeded. A medical technician finally inserted the intravenous needle in Morin's right arm at 12:44 a.m.

Then with 22 witnesses crowded into the death chamber, Morin, who converted to Christianity during the abduction of a woman in 1981, recited about a three-minute

"Lord Jesus, I commit my soul to you. I praise you and I thank you," he said.

He made a kissing motion to one of the witnesses, closed his eyes, took a deep breath and died

"It was a prayer of a person that was not afraid to die," Texas At-torney General Jim Mattox, who witnessed the execution, said. "I have witnessed several of these. And despite the time it took to find a vein, this was the least violent.

Judge nutritional advice first

in many popular magazines.

"Most people wouldn't think of experimenting with their health, yet that's just what happens when they indiscriminately follow the advice given in many of these stories," says nutritionist Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

A recent study by the American Council on Science and Health indicates the accuracy of information in magazine nutrition stories range from 20 to 95 percent.

"Unfortunately, the ACSH study also shows that some magazines with the most nutrition coverage are often the least reliable," says Cooksey, a specialist with the Texas A & M University

Agricultural Extension Service. Readers need to make their own judgements about the accuracy

Buy two, get one

COLLEGE STATION - Advice and usefulness of nutrition advice, on nutrition has become almost as she says. First consider whether common as advice to the lovelorn the article makes inaccurate

> claims that certain foods or nutrients have special benefits.

"Particular foods or nutrients may have special features, but eating any one food in excess will lead only to an imbalanced diet," says the specialist.

"A variety of foods from the four basic food groups of protein foods, breads and cereals, dairy products and fruits and vegetables is the only known way to achieve a healthful diet," she said.

Next, consider the credentials of the person who writes or acts as the source of the article, she said. Unless the author is a registered dietitian or "R.D.", holds an academic degree in nutrition or is a medical doctor with special training in nutrition, he or she is unlikely to have a thorough knowledge of the subject.

In many cases, she says, the nutrition advice from unqualified authors - especially celebrities is simply personal testimony that may have no basis in fact.

'Also determine whether any weight-loss diet featured in an article is safe, sensible and effective,' she says. "A weight loss diet should be designed for gradual weight reduction, including a balanced diet and exercise, and not promote the purchase of pills, products or special diet foods."

Finally, ask yourself if the information seems to be scientifically sound and factual. Even without a scientific background themselves, readers can not whether the author is associated with respected institutions or programs, she says. They can also be on guard for stories based on a single research study and sensationalized for public consumption.

Vitamin C as cure researched

Vitamin C has been hailed as a cure for everything from cancer to the common cold, and the latest scientific research indicates some of these claims are at least partially valid.

While vitamin C has a wide range of health applications, according to an article in Redbook, scientists advise against taking it in megadoses. Here is a

rundown of recent findings.

The common cold: Nobel Prize-winning chemist Dr. Linus Pauling in 1970 suggested colds could be prevented and even cured by taking megadoses of

vitamin C supplements daily. Recent studies show less dramatic results - on much lower doses.

Small scale studies in England and at the College of Medicine of the University of Florida in Gainesville indicated that drinking orange juice

could help ward off colds and reduce cold symptoms. "While studies done with large population groups have not shown any significant effect of C on cold prevention, the vitamin seems to help at least a certain subset of the per-Greene of Vanderbilt University School of Medicine

in Nashville, who has done a comprehensive review of the studies of C's risks and benefits. Cancer: The National Research Council reviewed all existing studies on diet and cancer in 1983 and concluded that vitamins A and C and the mineral selenium may help protect against cancer. People

who regularly ate high-C foods had lower rates of several forms of cancer. Tests in which people were given C supplements, however, proved either negative or inconclusive. The anti-cancer effects of diet may involve more than vitamins. Experts offer little hope that C will

cure cancer once it develops.

Heart disease: Supporters of C claim studies conducted abroad show increased C lowers fat levels in the bloodstream and prevents and reverses the buildup of fatty deposits in the artries. U.S. heart specialists are skeptical.

'The evidence is just not conclusive,' said an American Heart Association spokesperson, who added, "We know of no proven connection between higher-than-recommended amounts of C and the prevention of heart disease.

Gum disease; Animal experiments at the University of Texas Nealth Science Center in Houston indicate vitamia C deficiency increases susceptibility to gum disesse, but no one yet knows how much C humans need for healthy gums.

Iron-deficiency anemia: Vitamin C facilitates iron absorption, so moderate amounts in the diet help prevent iron-deficiency anemia. More than 500 milligrams daily, however, actually interferes with iron sosorption.

Vitamin C also may help speed hearing of oral herpes and pressure sores in the bedridden and may help treat at least one problem related to male

Experts advise against taking megadoses of C. 'Anyone who eats a variety of foods and whose

daily calorie intake is sufficient is getting enough vitamin C," said Dr. Artemis Simopoulos, chairman of the Nutrition Coordinating Committee of the National Institutes of Health. Vanderbilt's Greene

Much larger doses, Redbook warned, may cause abdominal pain, digestive distress and headache.

It is sometimes used to end the problem.

Tumor size, prolactin levels, and general health of the patient dic-And can a woman later take estrogen for the menopause? Will that cause a tumor? Please explain about the treatments for this, i.e. X-rays, bromocriptine. I had to have surgery for mine. My belief is that understanding one's problem is half the battle won! - Mrs. W.P.

Prolactin is a hormone produced by the pituitary gland. It stimulates breast milk secretion. Prolactin production normally is carefully controlled by this gland and hormones of other glands. One of the things that can throw off this control is growth of a tumor of the pituitary gland, one that itself produces the prolactin.

Some years ago, reports suggested that the birth control pill was associated with this kind of pituitary tumor. However, laterstudies failed to confirm these suspicions.

You also ask about estrogen medicine itself. Estrogen will raise prolactin levels in the blood, but it will not cause the tumor. In fact, many other drugs will raise prolactin levels — amoxapine, cimetidine, methyldopa phenothiazines — but do not cause the tumor. Emotional stress may act the same way.

Students migrate to beaches

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND (AP) - The population in this coastal community has increased by several thousand rowdy college students looking for fun and officials say that, for the most part, they are behaving themselves

Some 50,000 people began converging on this South Texas island last weekend, trading books for fun in the sun.

"The kids are behaving pretty good," a police dispatcher, who declined to give her name, said Monday. "They're not going to go out and kill each other.

"They have a little too much to drink and fall out of cars. They're a little wild but they're not bad kids," she added.

The population in this Rio Grande Valley community normally is around 1,000, but during spring break, area hotels and condominiums are filled to capacity.

Most of the approximately 50,000 temporary residents this week are college and some high school students on spring break.

The police official said daily arrest figures are not available since many other agencies also are making arrests.

"We haven't made that many arrests," she said.

Authorities said that the majority of arrests would be for public intoxication, disorderly conduct, driving while intoxicated and speeding. Officers from different agencies will be working about 12 hours per day to keep order in the area,

authorities have said. On Sunday, about 35,000 swimsuit-clad partygoers journeyed to Isla Blanca Beach to hear Stevie Ray Vaughan and Double Trouble, Joe King Carrasco and the Crowns.

There was some bottle- and beer can-throwing incidents, but no major injuries were reported.

Traffic was snarled for several nours after the concert as traffic was backed up on the causeway both going to and leaving South Padre Island.

March usually signals the end of winter in South Texas and more than 100,000 people are expected to visit the island during the month and add \$4 million to the area's economy, much to the delight of merchants.

"There has been an economic impact to Padre in regards to spring break," said Port Isabel-South Padre Island Chamber of Commerce spokeswoman Kathie Hawkinson.

And business people seemed to echo that observation as lines stretched outside several restaurants for those wanting to get inside.

The police dispatcher said things have been somewhat hectic and it's only beginning.

Nurses slate diabetes tests

To help detect diabetes - the third leading cause of death in this country - in its early stages, the Texas Nurse's Association will offer a free screening March 21 at The Medicine Shoppe at 1001

Appointments are not necessary. The screening will be available at the pharmacy between 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

According to the National Commission on Diabetes, the disease afflicts 10 million Americans and the number of disconced cases is rapidly increasing. With early detection and treatment the disease can be controlled; without treatment, it can reduce the average life expectancy of a victim

Those planning to be tested should eat a balanced meal, low in cugar and high in carboh about two hours prior to testing. A sandwich, french fries, a piece of pie and a glass of milk would be ideal, according to spokesman for

the tests. Known diabetics cannot be screened through the program because of possible complications, according to a pharmacy spokesman.

Although the test is not diagnostic, it is a strong indicator of potential diabetes. Anyone who has a positive reading will be urged to visit a doctor for a complete




