City council will meet Tuesday

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Tuesday October 14 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. The meetings are usually on Mondays but this Monday is the Columbus Day holiday so the meeting was moved to Tuesday. All council meetings are open to the public.

Items considered at Tuesday's meeting will be:

- designate the Friona Star as the city's official newspaper. This is an annual state requirement to designate an official newspaper for publishing public and legal notices.

- appoint Robert Neeley, Eldon Reeb, Bill Stovell, and Robert Jones to serve on the Friona Economic Development Corporation board of directors.

- approve a settlement agreement with Xcel Energy regarding a change in electricity rates and receiving reimbursement of rate case expenses.

- hear departmental report from the Friona Police Department.

- award a bid for sale of a 2002 Chevrolet pickup.

- authorize the city manager to sign the business as-

sociate agreement between Friona EMS and Parmer Medical Center.

- consider action on the Prairie Acres/ Heritage Estates budget for 2014-2015.

- discuss and approve accounts payable, September financial statement, and quarterly financial statement ending September 30, 2014.

These items comprise the tentative agenda and are subject to change. The official agenda is required to be posted 72 hours prior to the meeting on the front window of city hall.

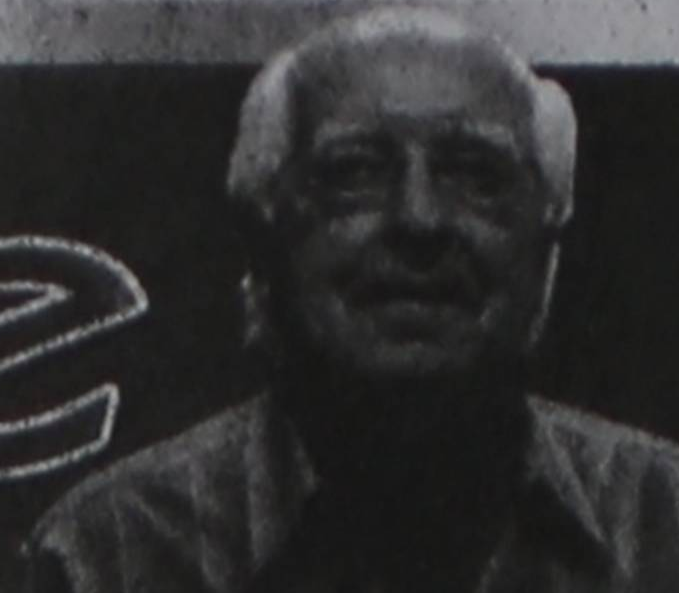

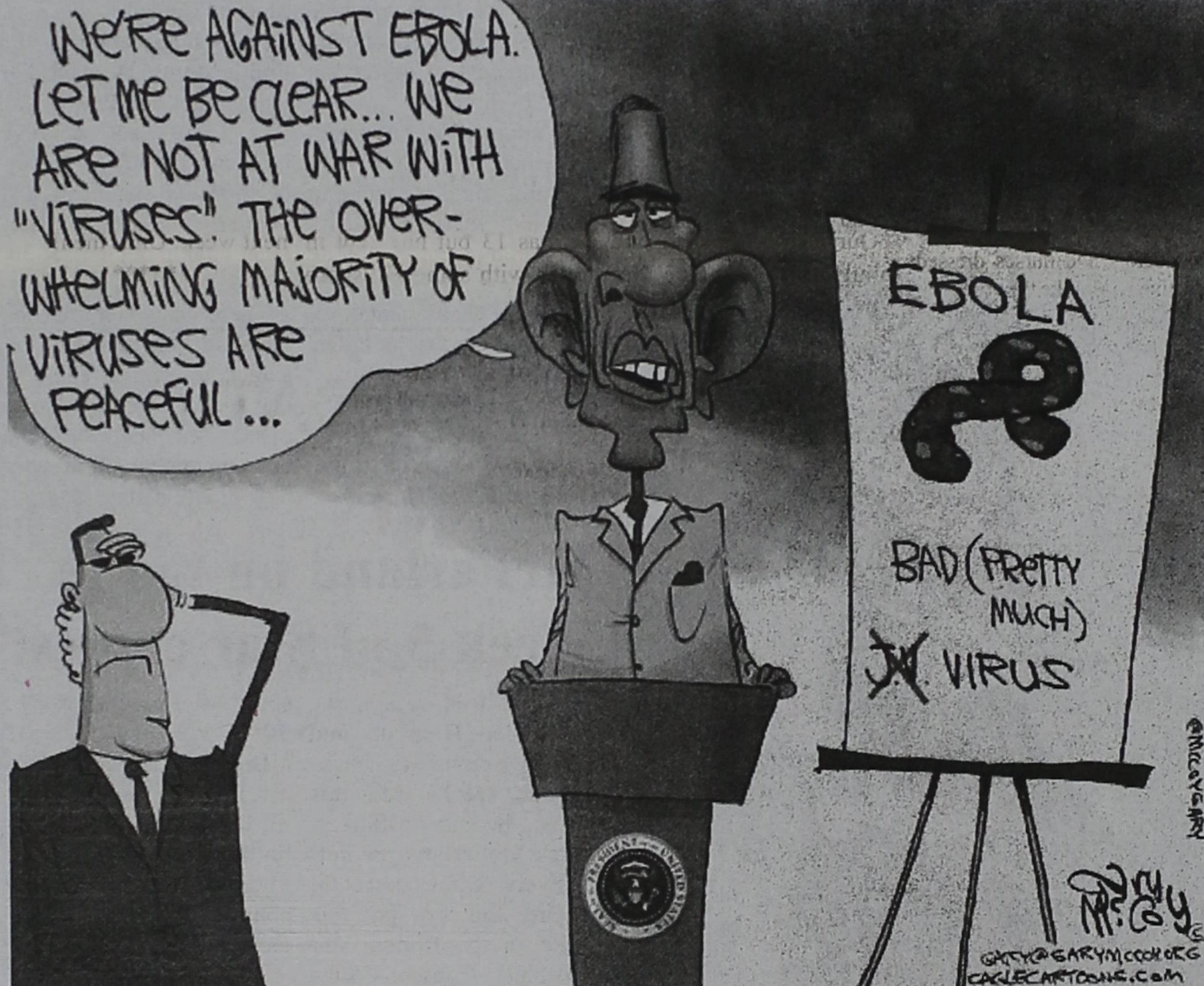

*Avoiding close contact, such as touching and shaking hands, with people who are sick, and

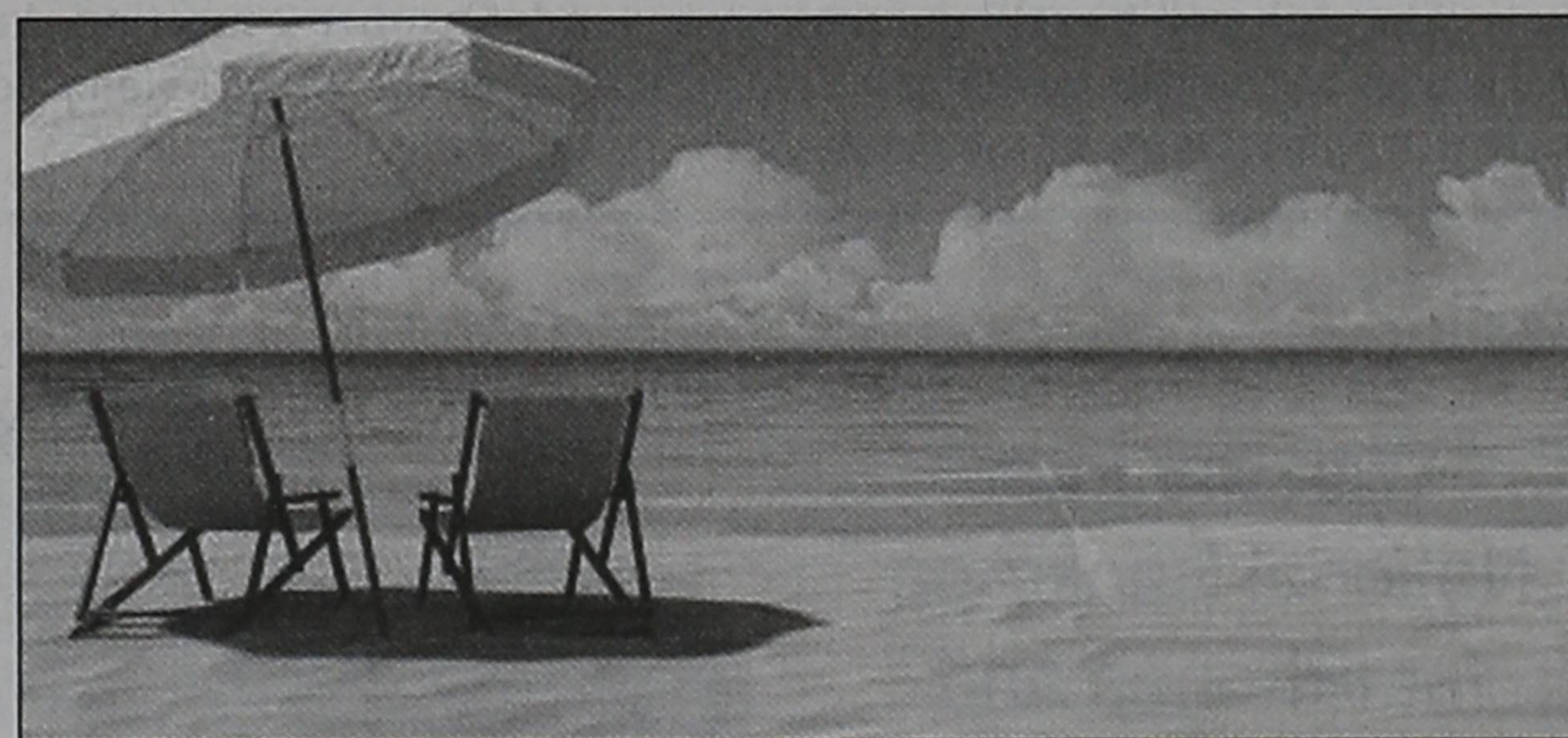
*Cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces.

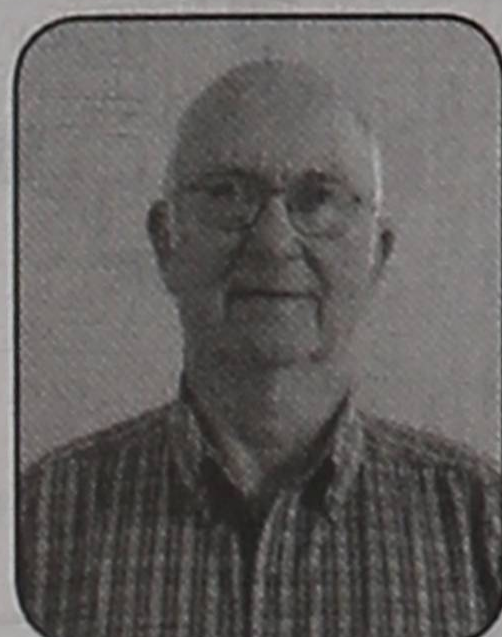

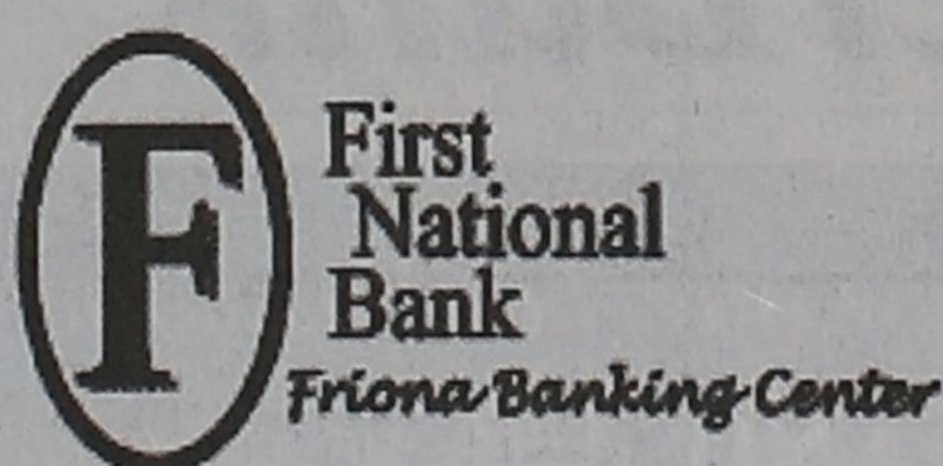
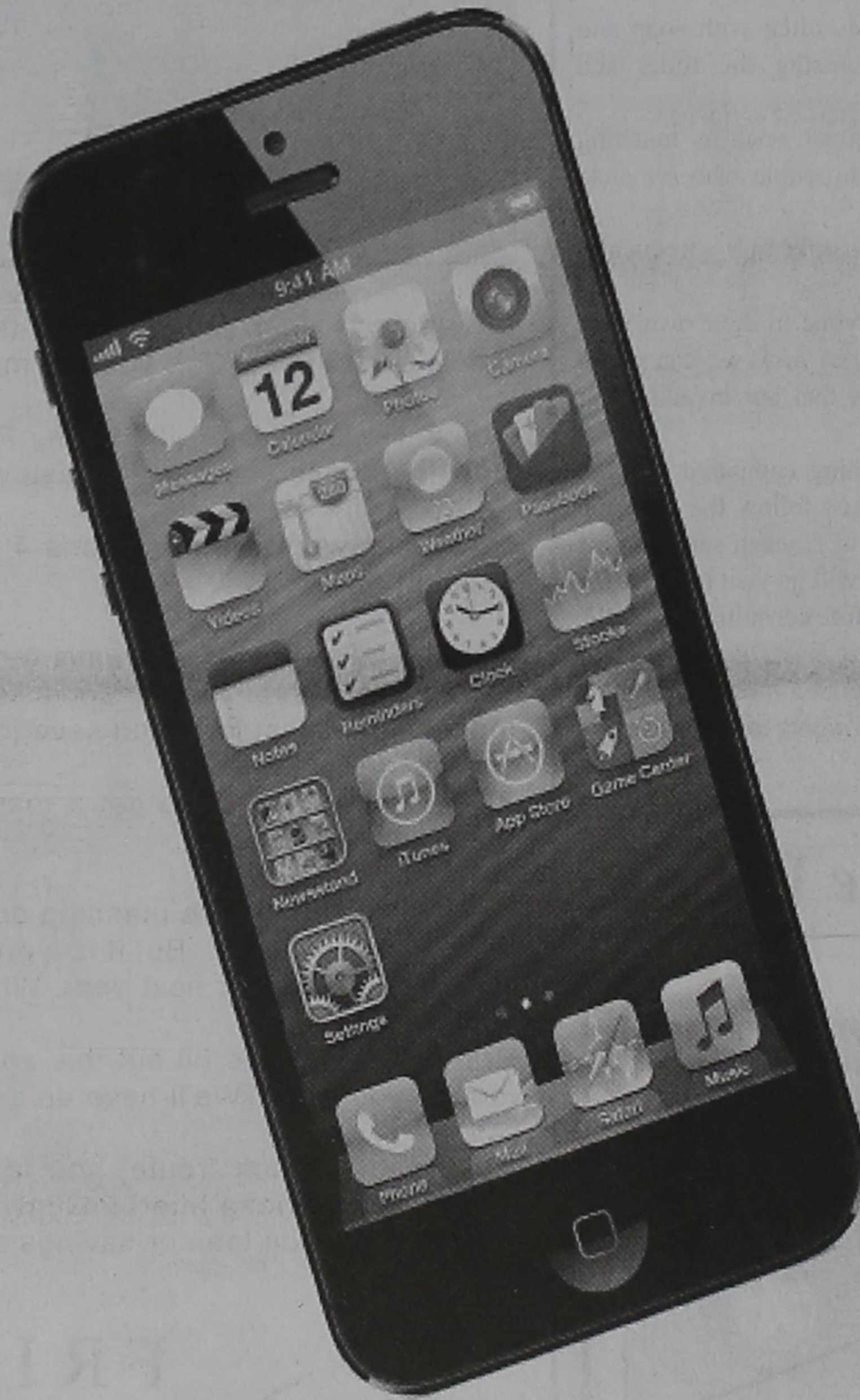

by all her children, fifteen grandchildren and thirteen great-grandchildren.

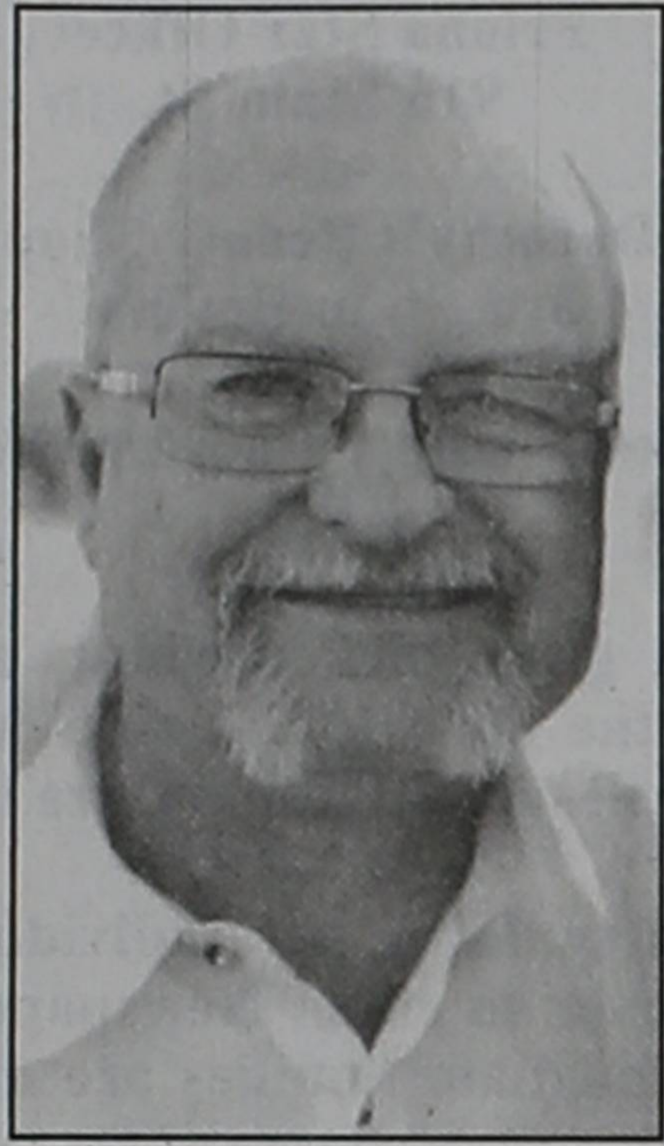

Finally, with Elisha's death we see an enduring testimony of the Lord's power. God has given you life to impact people today, but please live in such a way that when you are dead and gone, your life will continue to impact people for tomorrow and eternity.

Dairy/farm bill meetings Oct. 24

By Kay Ledbetter

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will conduct two educational programs on the 2014 farm bill's dairy provisions Oct. 24 in Hereford and Hartley. The first meeting will be from 9 a.m.-noon in the office for Deaf Smith County, 903 14th St. in Hereford; and the second will be from 2-5 p.m. in the Hartley Community Building, 815 Central Ave. Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist at Amarillo and meeting coordinator, said the meetings are free and open to the public. Dr. Dave Anderson, AgriLife Extension economist-livestock marketing from College Station, and Kelly Adkins and Beth Batenhorst, U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency district directors, will be the programs' main speakers. Adkins and Batenhorst will discuss the dairy provisions in the farm bill. Anderson will provide analysis of the Margin Protection Program

options and demonstrate the decision aid tool developed to help dairy producers understand their choices and make informed decisions. "The Dairy Margin Protection Program is the centerpiece of the farm bill with respect to dairy," Amosson said. "It is a new and unique safety net program meant to provide dairy producers with indemnity payments when a composite U.S. dairy margin falls below the margin coverage levels the producer chooses on an annual basis. "In my opinion, the choice to enroll is a no-brainer for dairy producers," he said. "The real questions center around enrollment details and determining the level of protection, and these are the issues that will be addressed in these meetings." Sign-up for the Margin Protection Program is currently underway, with a final date to enroll of Nov. 28. For more information, contact Amosson at Amarillo at 806-677-5600 or samosson@tamu.edu.

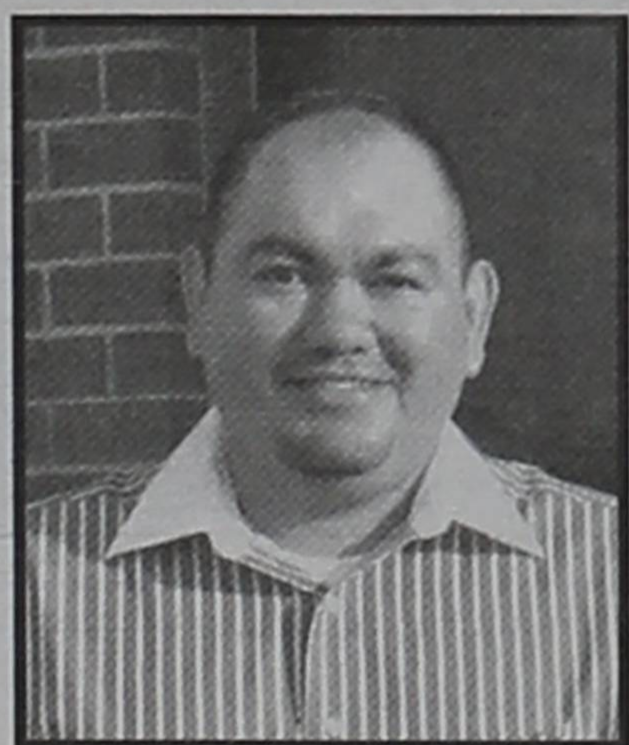

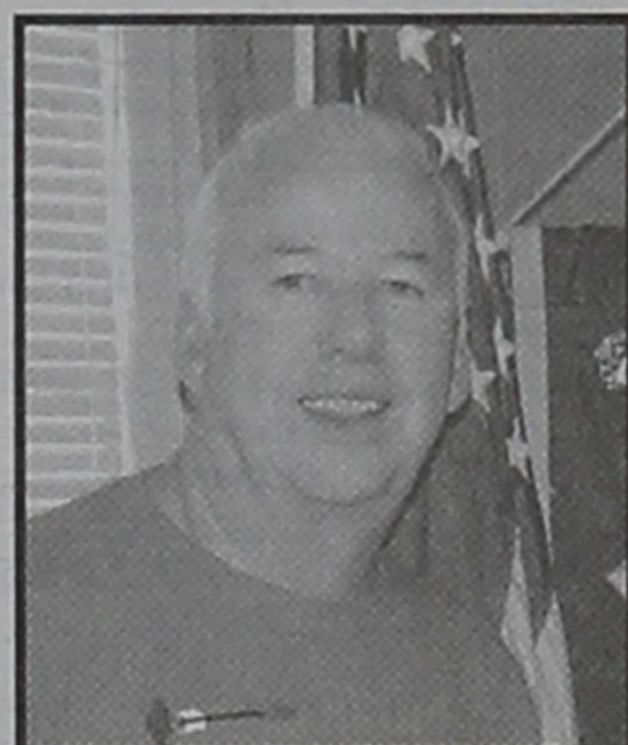

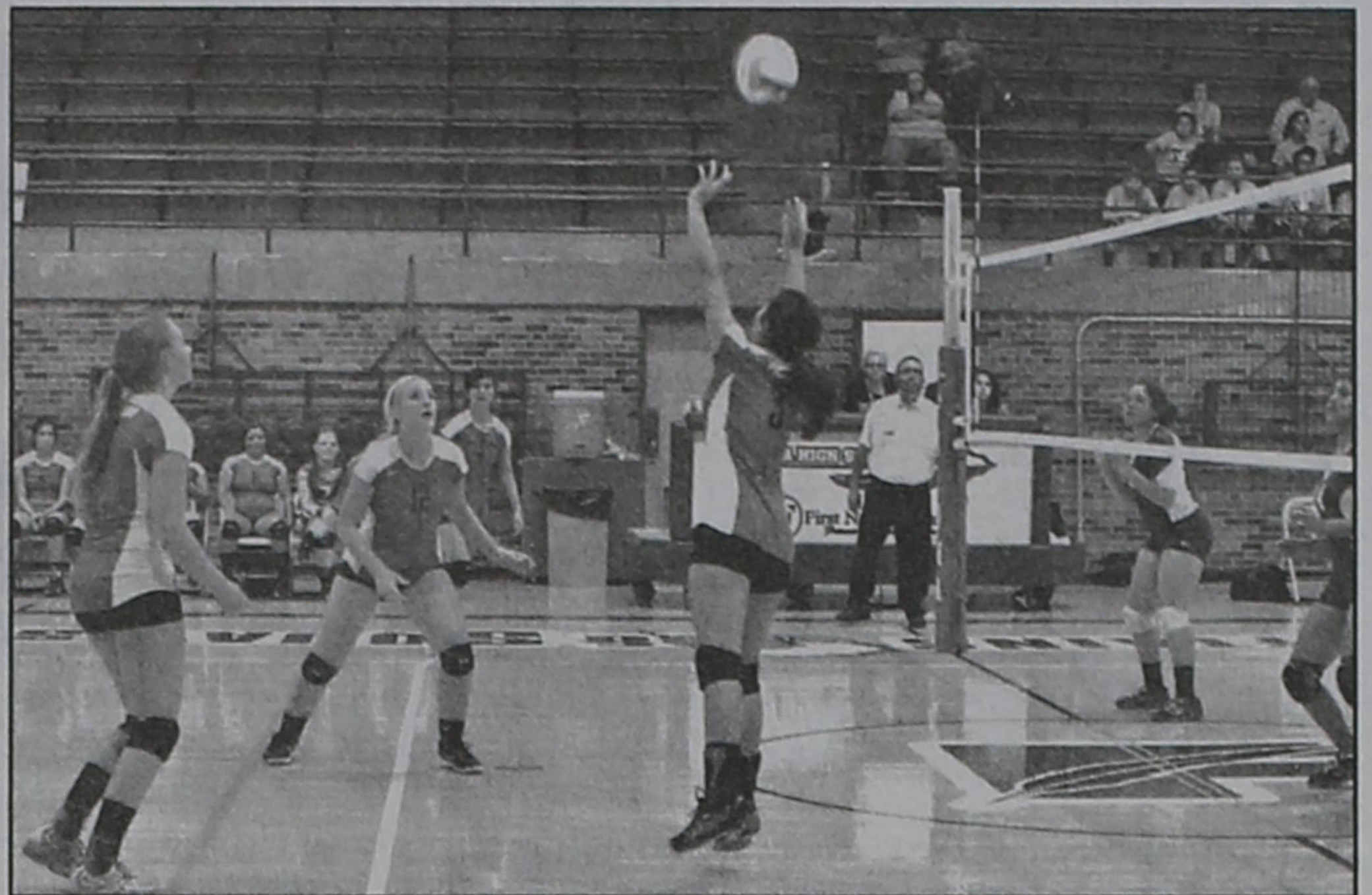

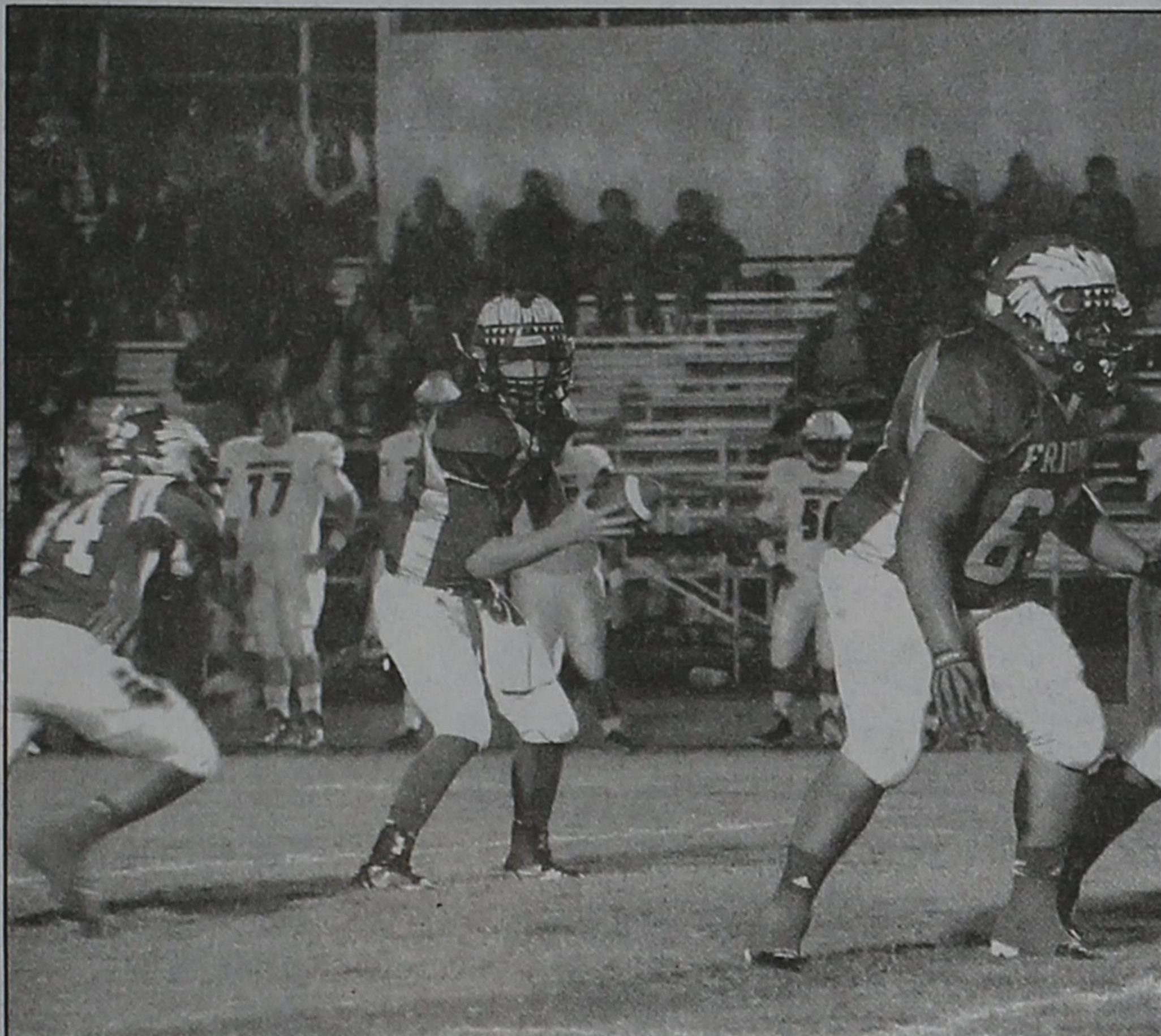

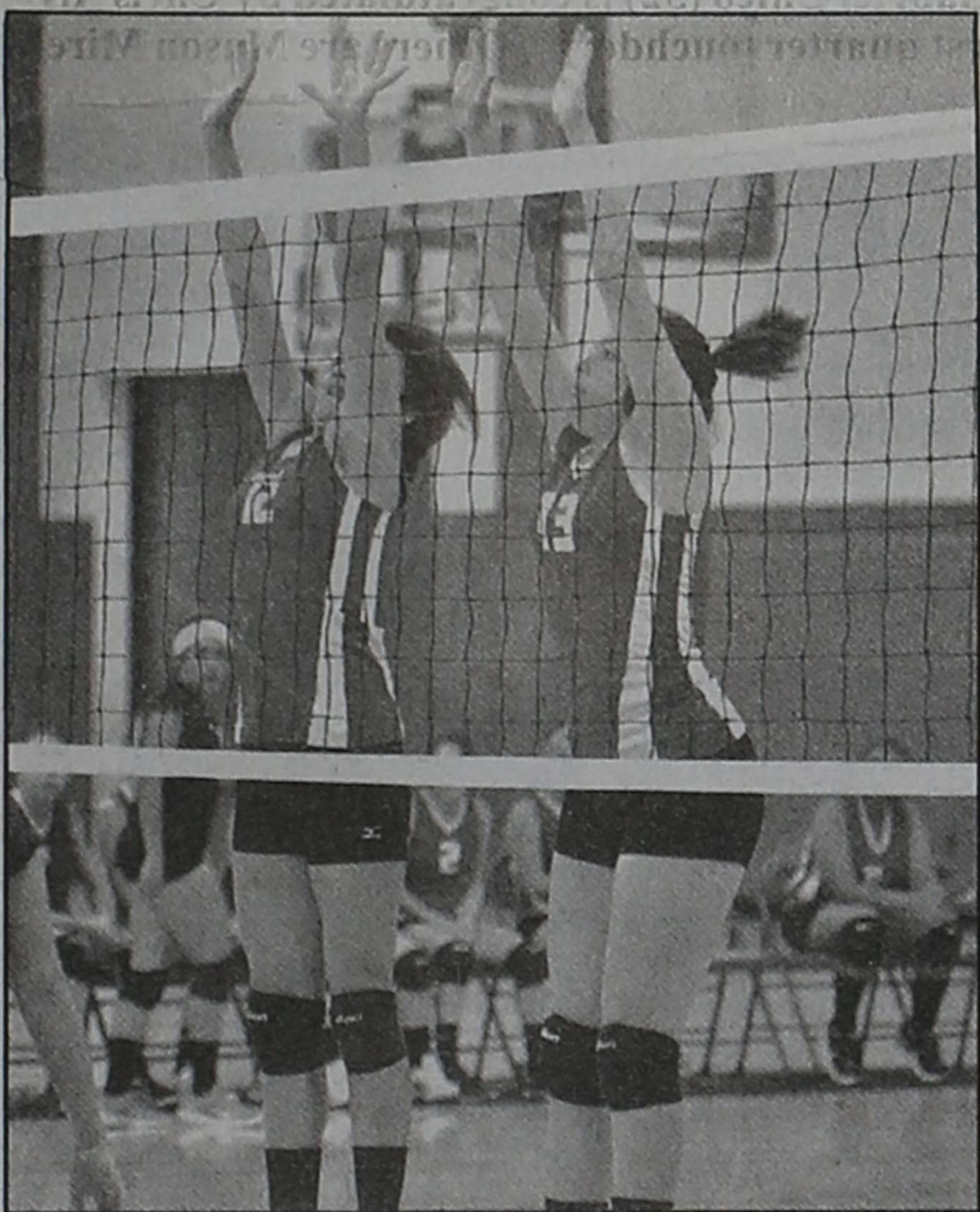

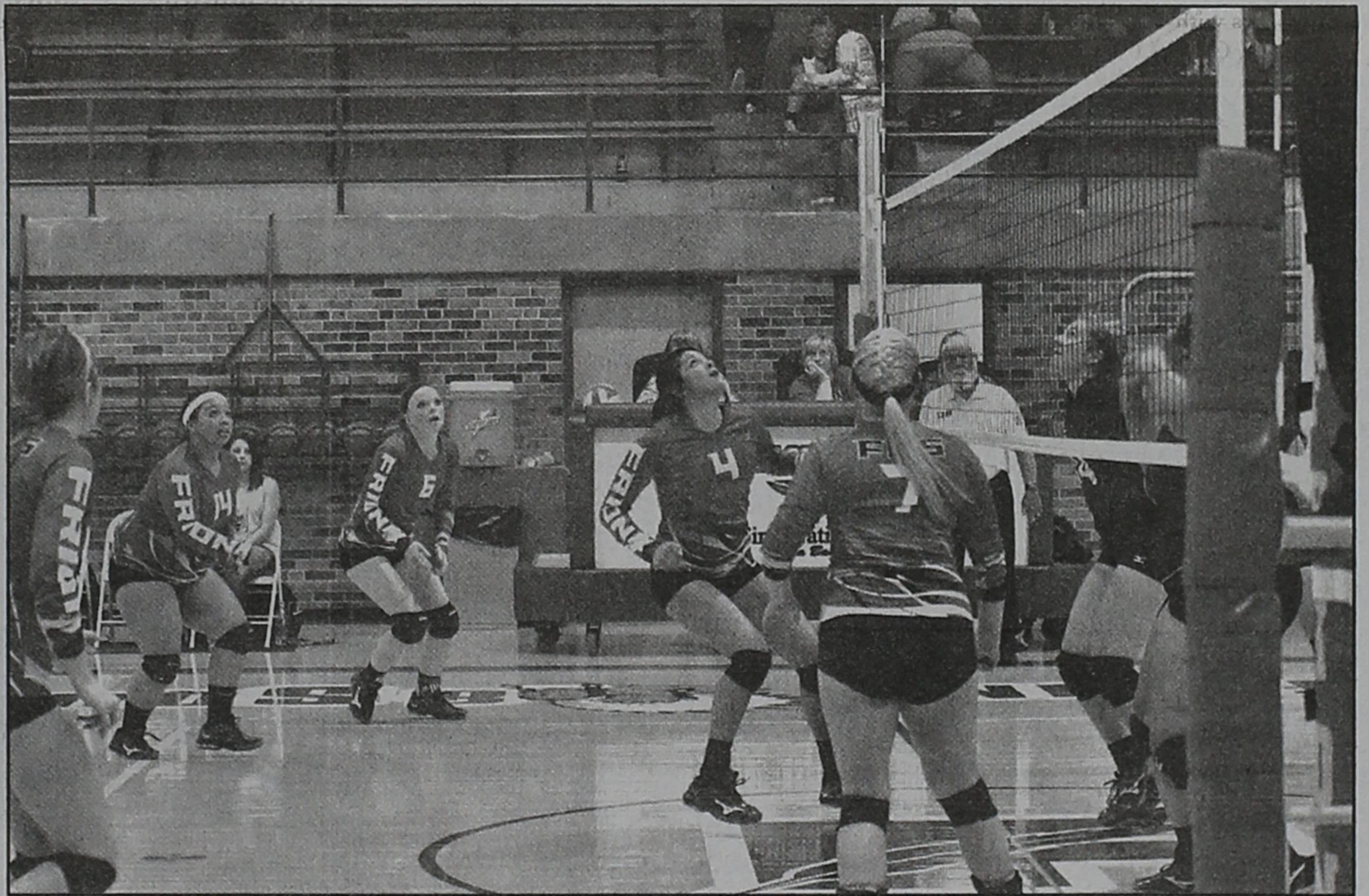
