

Five Distinct Psychic Stages in Human Life

Five psychic stages in the development of a person from birth to approximately the nineteenth year are reported by Dr. Charlotte Buhler, Austrian psychologist, on the basis of concrete experiments.

During the first year, she found the children she studied were engaged in trying to comprehend iso lated objects in the world around them. The second stage, from two to four years, marks the beginning of understanding of relationships between objects, and of reasoning During the third stage, from five to eight years, the child is engaged in doing things for the sake of doing them and generally is very objecive in its attitude.

This changes abruptly in the fourth stage, between nine and thireen years. Both boys and girls come extremely subjective, lose ental contact with the outside world, and are very sensitive. 
