Commissioners approve fund audit

County commissioners met Tuesday October 14. They authorized the County Auditor to conduct an audit of the county's drug seizure forfeiture fund as required by the Code of Criminal Procedure. In other business:

-- heard that Phase One of Mariah South LLC was sold to Mariah Dos LLC and the tax abatement agreement was reassigned to the new group.

-- heard update from Shana Fleming, County Agent, on the results of the Dairy Day last week at Del Rio Dairy. About 500 people attended.

-- approved a request from Windstream to place a buried fiber optic cable at the intersections of CR N and Hwy 60 and CR 28 and CR H.

-- approved flu shots for county elected officials and employees and their spouses.

-- approved transfer of \$2,524.64 from the County Attorney forfeiture fund to the Sheriff's office to purchase ticket writing equipment for Sheriff department vehicles.

-- reappointed Ronald Byrd to the Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corporation.

County Judge Trey Ellis said he had an interview scheduled next week for the County Extension Agent position formerly held by Benji Henderson.

Early voting starts Monday

Early voting for the November 4 general election starts Monday October 20 until Friday October 31. Voting is available daily at the County Clerk's office in the Farwell courthouse. Voters will need a voter registration and a photo ID.

Early voting in Friona at Interbank will be available October 21, 23, and 30. Early voting at the bank in Bovina will be October 24 and 30. All early voting is during business hours.

PMC participating in Ebola preparedness

Parmer Medical Center (PMC) is aware of the current cases of Ebola. PMC has been participating in conference calls and webinars with officials from the Texas Department of State Health Services and Centers for Disease Control (CDC). PMC also receives frequent alerts, updates, and guidelines for Ebola published by these agencies.

Symptoms of Ebola include but are not limited to: headache, fever greater than 101.5 degrees orally, weakness, muscle pain, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, or hemorrhage. These symptoms, along with a known exposure or a recent travel history to Libe-

ria, Sierra Leone, Guinea, and some parts of Nigeria in Western Africa, need to be evaluated. A recent travel history is defined as travel within the last 21 days.

Ebola is spread by direct contact with infected bodily fluids, such as blood, urine, feces, and sweat. Proper hand washing with soap and water for 20 seconds is essential to preventing the spread of any disease.

When caring for potential Ebola infected patients, the CDC recommends hospitals and health care workers wear gloves, gowns, and masks when caring for these patients. It is important to know that health care workers may

wear these same items when caring for patients with other potentially infectious illnesses to prevent further spread of the of the infection.

Parmer Medical Center is supporting the CDC and the Texas Department of State Health Services recommendation for all persons to get their flu shot this year. The signs and symptoms of Ebola can initially resemble that of the common flu. However, a travel history to the effected West African nations is the distinguishing factor.

Council approves Prairie Acres budget

The Friona city council met Tuesday October 14 with all members present.

Designation of the Friona Star as the city's official newspaper was renewed as per state law.

A resolution to appoint Robert Neelley, Eldon Reeb, Bill Stovell, and Robert Jones to the Friona Economic Development Corporation board was discussed but was postponed with no action taken.

A rate increase for XCEL Energy was approved as a negotiated settlement by municipalities across the state. Lt. Pedro Sanchez gave the Friona Police Department report. He said there were 197 traffic stops in September, 13 of them

for no driver license.

The council reviewed the city's accounts payable and monthly and quarterly financial statements. The bid on a 2002 city pickup was awarded to Richard Samaron for \$1,201.00.

The city manager was authorized to sign an agreement between Friona EMS and Parmer Medical Center for medical and transfer services. City manager Patricia Phipps told the council that Jeannie Martin is now the

EMS director. The city has two paramedics available with four people currently in training for their paramedic credentials but they will not complete the training until April.

On some runs to Amarillo hospitals that require a paramedic, PMC nurses have ridden in the ambulance when a paramedic is not available.

The Prairie Acres/Heritage Estates budget of \$2,654,492 was approved.

Local pharmacist Andy Alexander addressed the council in behalf of BizWize's continued relationship with Prairie Acres in supplying patient medications.

For more city business details see the Mayor's Minutes on page two. The next regular meeting of the city council will be Monday November 10 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

Cancer Coalition honored in Amarillo

The Parmer County Cancer Coalition was one of two organizations honored at a recent Breakfast of Champions/Breast Health Coalition at the Amarillo Civic Center. Comedian Diana Jordan, a breast cancer survivor, was the speaker.

The Parmer County Cancer Coalition helps neighbors, loved ones, and friends in their fight against cancer. The Coalition was founded in 2010 by Greg and Jamie

Lewellen to assist residents who are fighting cancer. Qualified residents are eligible for a \$500.00 grant to assist with expenses. Since is beginning the Coalition has provided grants to 70 Parmer County families.

The grant program is sustained through fundraising events such as the Pink Out t-shirt night October 24 at the Chieftain football game, hosting an annual golf tournament, plus individual and

business donations. The Coalition also donates to the American Cancer Society amounting to \$16,000 over the past four years.

The Coalition hosts an annual Survivor Dinner for Parmer County cancer survivors and their families. This year's dinner will be November 13 at the XIT Recreation Center in Bovina. Popular TV personality Ali Allison of Amarillo's Channel 10 will be the host and speaker.

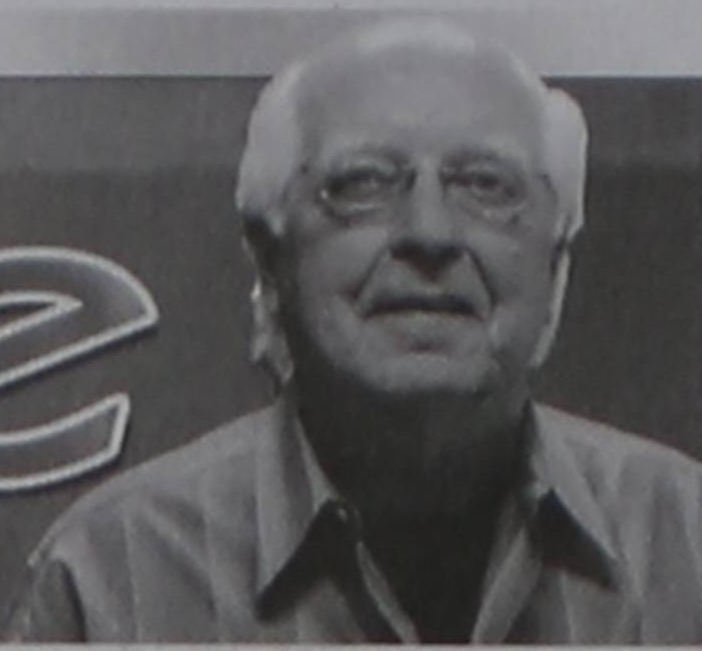

That is not what I'm writing about this week but you can expect to read more here about Hillary in the months and years ahead. Hypocrisy among the political aristocracy is amazing.

Last weekend my brother, sister, and I went back in time. We spent the weekend driving around our old hometown of Hillsboro, Texas. I've been back for a couple of reunions but Rick had not been back since 1984 when our grandmother Brown died. Had he stayed in Hillsboro this would have been his 40th class reunion.

He and our sister Gena and brother-in-law Don met a lot of former classmates. I didn't find one single classmate from 1957 but it was not our reunion year.

My youngest daughter Megan drove down from Denton and spent a couple of days with us. It was the first time she had visited her daddy's hometown and I enjoyed the show and tell. We took photos and told stories.

To be honest it was a bit creepy to visit. The streets are not in good shape. Many of the old homes are run down and falling down. Homes we lived in still stand except one that has been torn down along with most of the homes on

the block.

My old high school building is boarded up with a historical marker in front. It does not look nearly as big as it did when we went to school. Visiting the old school, walking up the front steps that are now crumbling, brought a flood of those long ago sounds and images of fellow classmates.

When I was growing up in Hillsboro, I-35 had not been built. Today it bypasses Hillsboro on the east side but back then the I-35 area was farmland where we hunted rabbits. The big Outlet Mall along I-35 is now almost a ghost town. Many stores have

closed. We reckoned the economy and online shopping was the main cause.

We walked around downtown Hillsboro where I played as a kid while mother worked in the beauty shop on Franklin Street. We visited the Hill County courthouse, always the centerpiece of Hillsboro, it was gutted by an electrical fire on New Year's Eve 1993. It is now rebuilt and restored to its original grandeur.

My Papa Carr's Sinclair Service Station on Waco Street is now a small Mexican Restaurant. In the 1940s and 50s I spent many hours in Papa's station. I thought I

was helping but probably he was being tolerant of my getting in the way. He always smelled like gasoline.

We visited the cemetery where my daddy and grandparents are buried. It is out on a hill by the city park. Believe it is called Ridge Park Cemetery. It was a lifetime ago when I last visited.

We enjoyed our time together as much as visiting the town. Rick and I both agreed this was probably the last time we will ever visit.

Hillsboro is not the same town we remember. But then nothing ever stays the same.

All we have left are the memories.

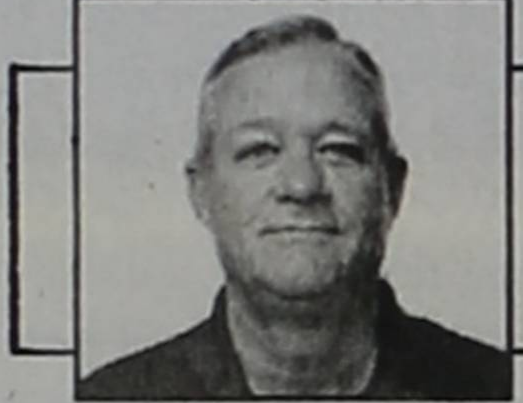
The Turner family believes in the impact that a little bit of time, effort and support can have on communities as a whole.

Mayor's Minutes

September 30, 2014 was the end of a successful year for the city of Friona. Revenues were slightly increased but expenses were down. The new budget for 2014-2015 was approved and October 1, 2014 started a new year. On September 30, we took the opportunity to recognize all city employees by serving them a very nice meal for lunch. It was a small token of our appreciation for their dedicated efforts this past year. We look forward to another successful year.

Highway construction continues to make very good progress. The completion date should be at the end of this month. It will be nice to get the highway opened back up. Duinick has done an excellent job and we appreciate their diligence and hard work.

The Public Works employees continue to focus on Reeve Lake by trimming and removing dead limbs from the trees. The pond area is looking very good. There are plans to install a gate at the south end of the pond to keep vehicles and 4-wheelers from driving through this area. The city will be installing a sprinkler system around the playground equipment on the southwest side and need to keep the traffic out of this area. The city has purchased two new riding lawn mowers to replace the old ones. There is a lot of mowing on a weekly basis and good equipment is needed to keep up with this task.

The Volunteer Fire Department was called out seven times in September. One grass fire, a hay fire, an old school bus engine caught on fire, a gas leak and three wrecks. It is great to have such dedicated people in this city that volunteer their time to handle such emergencies.

The city pumped 15,881,000 gallons of water, sold 17,601,000 gallons of water and billed \$79,502.12. The city sold 2,000,000 gallons of water less this month compared to last month. Rainfall has limited water usage, but this is a good thing.

Judge Campbell had 117 new cases in September. There were 73 cases that were trial by judge with a guilty verdict and five new juvenile cases filed. The total fines collected were \$17,439.27.

Chief Jimenez and the police department responded to 282 calls. There were 27 arrests made, 83 citations issued, 98 warnings issued and a total of 197 stops. The police department is tracking the miles traveled by each officer during the month of September. There were 3030 total miles traveled protecting our city. It is great to have a full staff of officers once again. The arrests made were: 13-no driver's license, 3-local warrants, 2-driving while license invalid, 2-public intoxication, 1-driving while intoxicated, 2-assault cases, 1-tampering with a witness, 1-indecent exposure and 1-possession less than 2 ounces.

EMS made a total of twelve runs in September: 5-911 calls, 1-transfer and 6-runs with no transfer. The EMS collected \$12,910.56 in payments for September. The city is doing much better now that we hired another company to handle the billing and collecting for EMS.

Lastly, I have been elected to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC), serving a two year term, beginning January 2015. The PRPC is a great organization that assists local governments in planning, developing and implementing programs designated to improve the general health, safety and welfare of the citizens in the Texas Panhandle. The PRPC supports and helps fund 12 different programs, one program being Emergency Preparedness. Emily Nolte, a PRPC representative, met with members from the City of Friona and Bovina, Volunteer Fire Department from Rhea, Bovina, and Friona as well as representatives from Parmer County Hospital and representatives from the County to organize and develop a plan for Emergency Preparedness for Parmer County. This team will meet again in November to elect officers, discuss and write by-laws along with writing a plan of action that can be implemented in case of an emergency. John Gurley is leading the efforts of this team and thank him for his efforts in the implementation of this program in Parmer County.

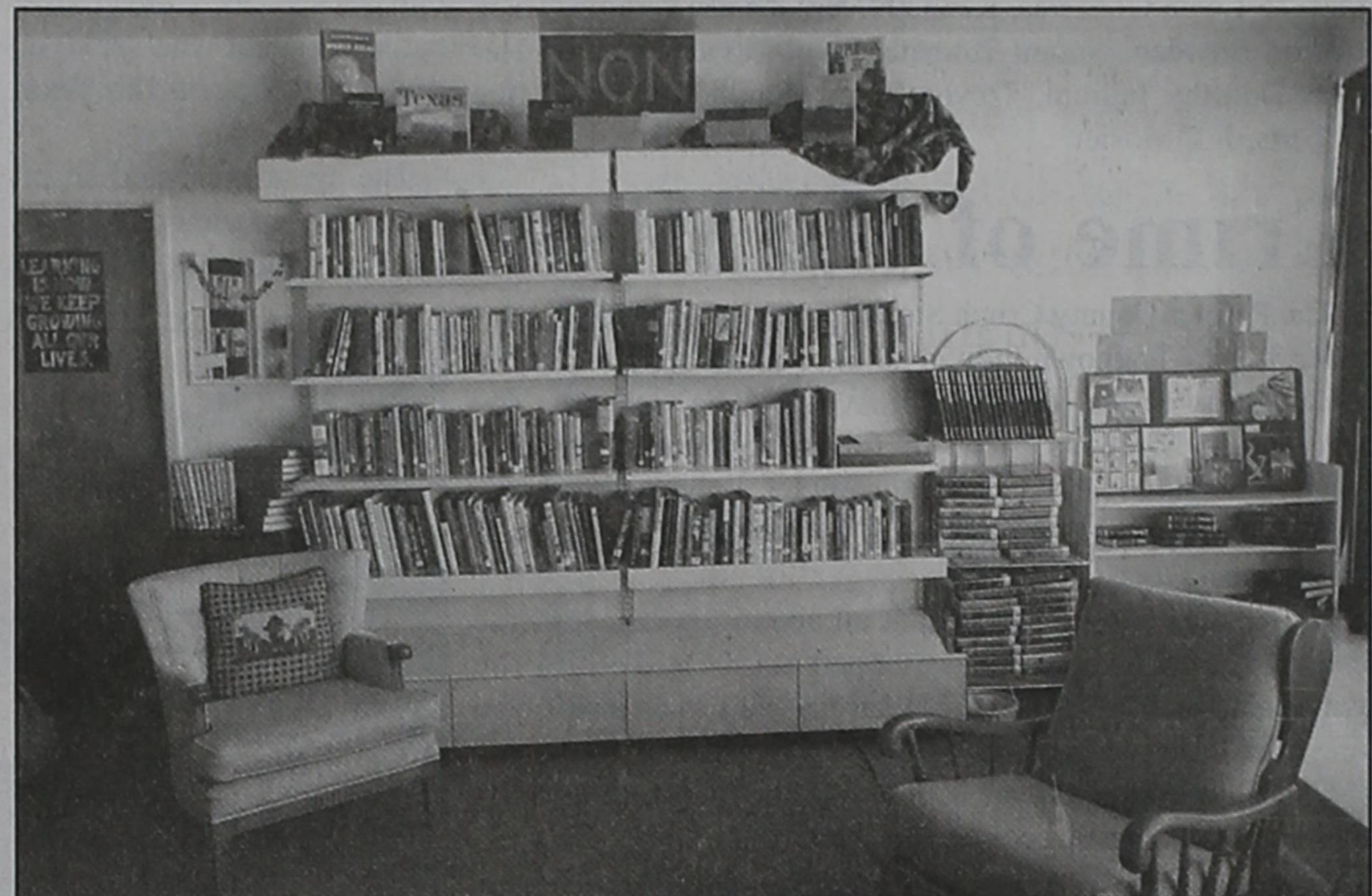

You may think this is commonplace but there was a feeling of concern that washed over everyone on that field. That feeling was replaced with relief when the player was helped up and to the sideline.

On Friday evening before the game started, I stood back and watched as the flag corps played a rousing game of Red Rover. I was surprised they even knew the game but they played with such abandon. Other band members were even asking to join in on the

fun. They were not bothering anyone and instead of being on their cell phones ignoring each other, they were interacting with a childhood game.

I had a conversation with one of our players before the action started and I was once again pleasantly surprised by how respectful and articulate he explained why he would not be playing that night.

One of the managers was on crutches and had nothing but smiles and laughs for everyone that came into her circle, even me.

I have been on sidelines before that my only goal was to get that one photo for the paper and leave. I wanted to leave quickly not because I had somewhere else to be but because the students were rude and offensive. Their language would have made a sailor blush and their behavior was such that would have made the most hardened criminal in prison stand in awe.

I have been on other sidelines that were sprinkled with offensive students but for the most part the students were 'good' kids.

I understand that kids can be apprehensive around adults but that road goes both ways. I am apprehensive anytime I have to be around teenagers. I am never sure what to talk to them about but I have

found that if you have a question they will answer it and a conversation is started.

When I read stories in the newspaper about schools canceling their football season due to hazing I wonder what happened to those people that makes them so much different from what we have here? Is it because we are a small community? Is it that we raise our kids' right? On the other hand, is it just a few bad apples?

How do some communities luck out and have a generation of kids that know right from wrong and others do not?

All children start out innocent and as that innocence is shed, these children learn the ropes of navigating being a grownup.

A recent study stated that if we want children that are not obese we need to spend longer than 20 minutes at the dinner table each night with all the family members in attendance in a positive atmosphere. Maybe sitting down to dinner each night has many more attributes, which include raising good kids into great adults.

Maybe whatever Friona is doing right could be bottled or written and given to other communities for an inspiration to raise kids we are proud to call our own.

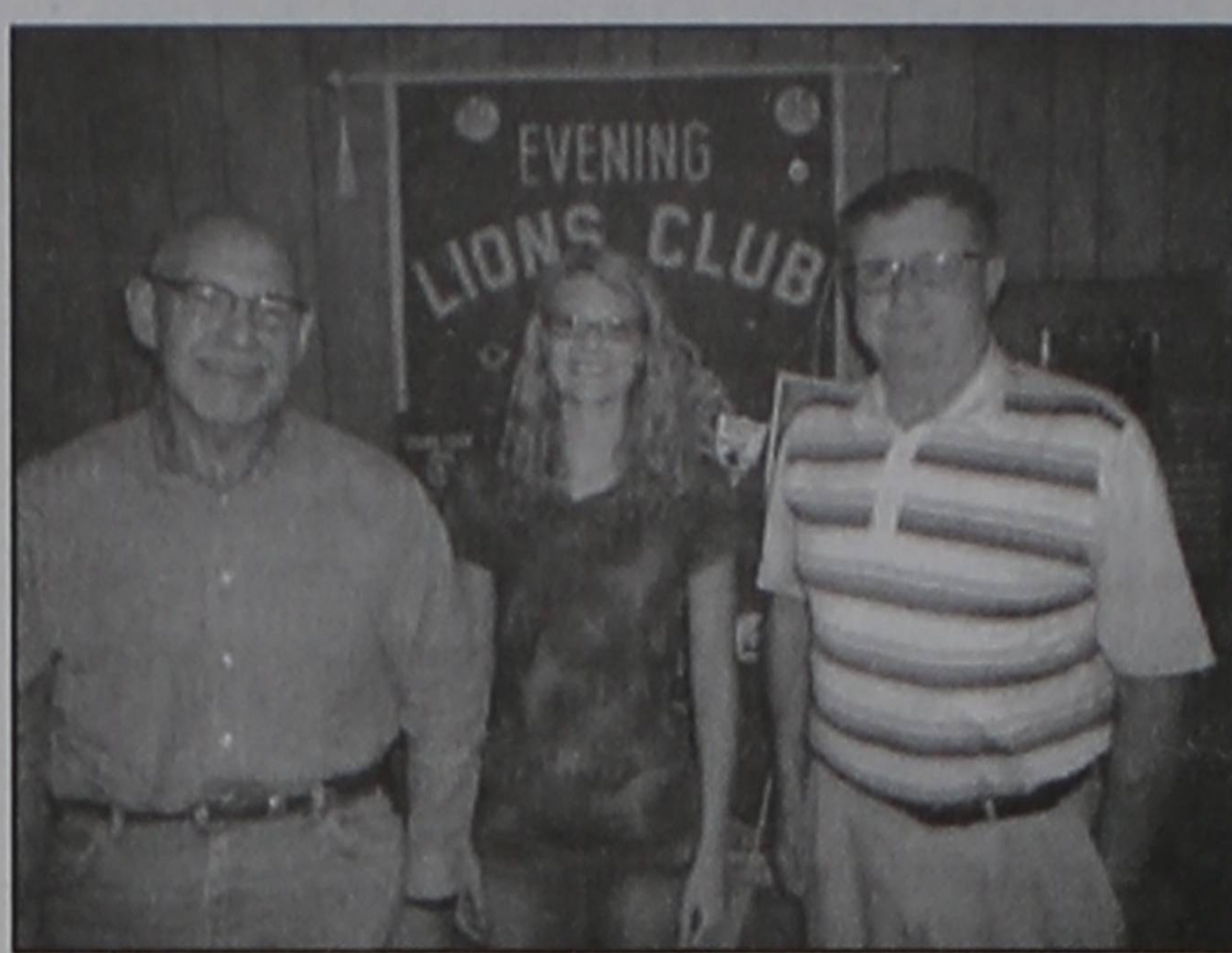

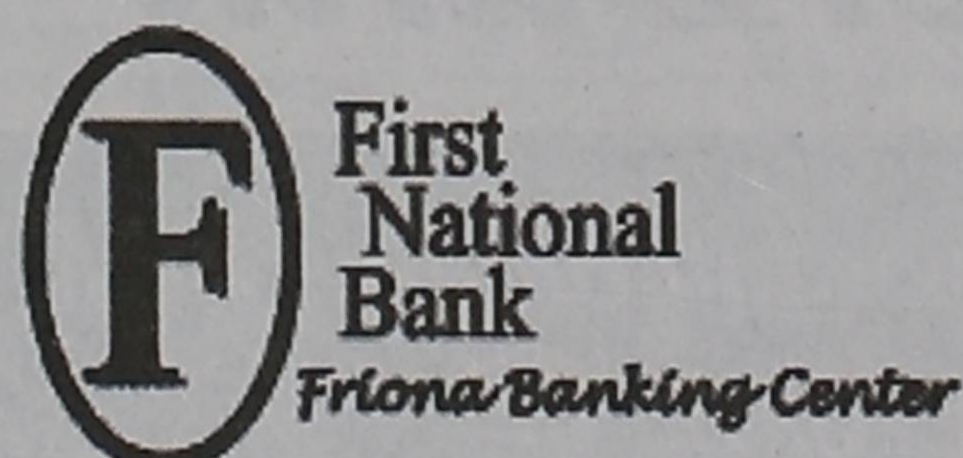

Growing dairy industry spotlighted at recent Southwest Dairy Day

Drought might have hurt the dairy industry in the Panhandle over the past few years, but a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist said signs are indicating the industry is growing once more.

Dr. Ellen Jordan, AgriLife Extension dairy specialist in Dallas, said the growth of the dairy industry in the Panhandle was spotlighted when more than 500 people turned out for the Southwest Dairy Day at the Del Rio Dairy south of Friona on Wednesday, October 8.

"We had a number of very rough years with the drought in 2011 and 2012, and producers kind of held their own," Jordan said. "Now we are beginning to see a little growth again in our industry. We aren't seeing so many new farms go in, but some of the dairies that are here have expanded a little bit."

She said the region has received some rain since May, and as a result, milk production has increased. That added milk production has prompted recent talk about putting a processing plant in Canyon.

"In addition to seeing an increase in the number of dairy cows in this region, we are processing the milk in this region, so we are keeping additional jobs in this area for economic development," Jordan said. "And those are pretty high-paying jobs."

She said the industry has grown from about 20,000 cows in 2001 to the current number of about 285,000 cows in the Panhandle.

"So roughly two-thirds of the entire state's milk production is here in the Panhandle," Jordan said.

In 2013, according to the Dallas Milk Marketer Administration, Castro County was the top milk producer, with 128.4 million gallons of milk from approximately 43,200 dairy cows. Other Panhandle counties in the top 12 were Parmer, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Hartley, Moore, Bailey, Hale and Dallam.

One of the newer dairies was the host for the Southwest Dairy Day, the Del Rio Dairy, owned by the Rocky and Liz Gingg family. The Ginggs moved to the Panhandle in 2006 and now have

3,800 milking cows, raise 3,380 acres of crops and have 45 employees.

Tours throughout the dairy included the milking parlor, Saudi-style barns, a special needs facility, heifer pens and commodity barns.

Attendees also were able to view the dairy's composting operation and a manure application calibration demonstration, Jordan said.

"Composting is an area some of our producers are getting into so they can haul less water when they are hauling the manure out to their fields," she said.

Water is an important commodity on a dairy and about half the water that is pumped from the dairy is captured and reused to irrigate field crops, Jordan said.

Dairy producers also were provided an update on the latest technology in the industry, with vendors displaying everything from tractors to teat dippers, she said.

"This event allows producers to look at a wide variety of equipment in one setting and determine what technology to adopt and put on their farm," Jordan said.

Nov. 15 deadline approaching

The deadline is nearing for Pasture, Rangeland and Forage Insurance, designed to provide livestock and hay producers protection against acreage losses, said DeDe Jones, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service risk management specialist in Amarillo.

The 2015 sign-up and acreage reporting deadline for this U.S. Department of Agriculture Risk Management Agency program is Nov. 15, and notices of premiums due will be sent by July 1, 2015, Jones said.

"Insurance is a critical component in producers' risk management portfolios during periods of drought or uncertainty," she said. "This policy benefited many cattle producers around the Panhandle in 2011 and 2012 due to the low rainfall conditions. Even though 2014 is off to a much better start, having this insurance may still be worth considering."

Payment is not determined by individual damages, but rather area losses based on a grid system, Jones explained. Producers can select any portion of acres to insure, but they must also choose a minimum of two, two-month intervals or a maximum of six two-month intervals per year to insure.

Coverage levels between 70 and 90 percent are available, she said. Once coverage is selected, the producer chooses a productivity factor between 60 and 150 percent. The productivity factor is a percentage of the established county base value for forage.

The base value is a standard rate published by the Risk Management Agency for each county. It is calculated based on the estimated per-acre cost of grazing, Jones said. For example, Hansford County's value is \$8.11 per acre.

She said Texas uses a rainfall index to determine the insurance coverage. The rainfall index uses National Oceanic and Atmospheric Climate Prediction Center data and a 12-by-12 mile grid system.

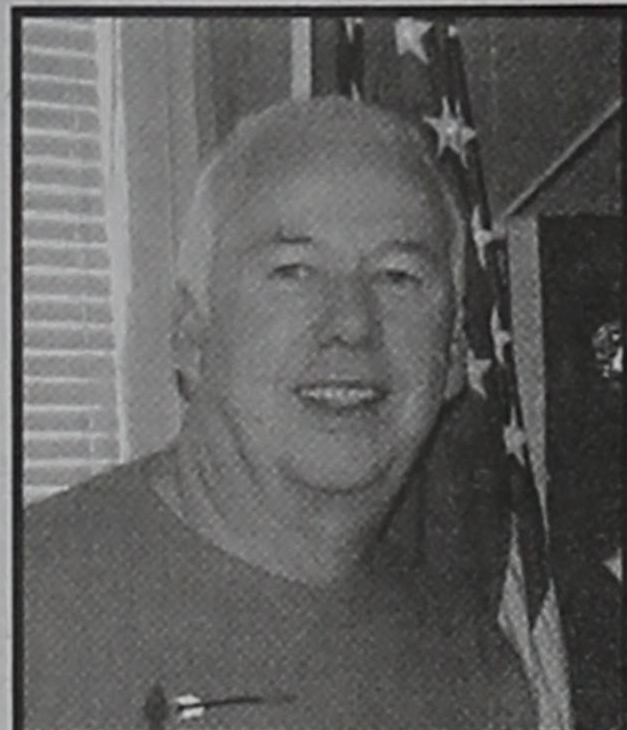

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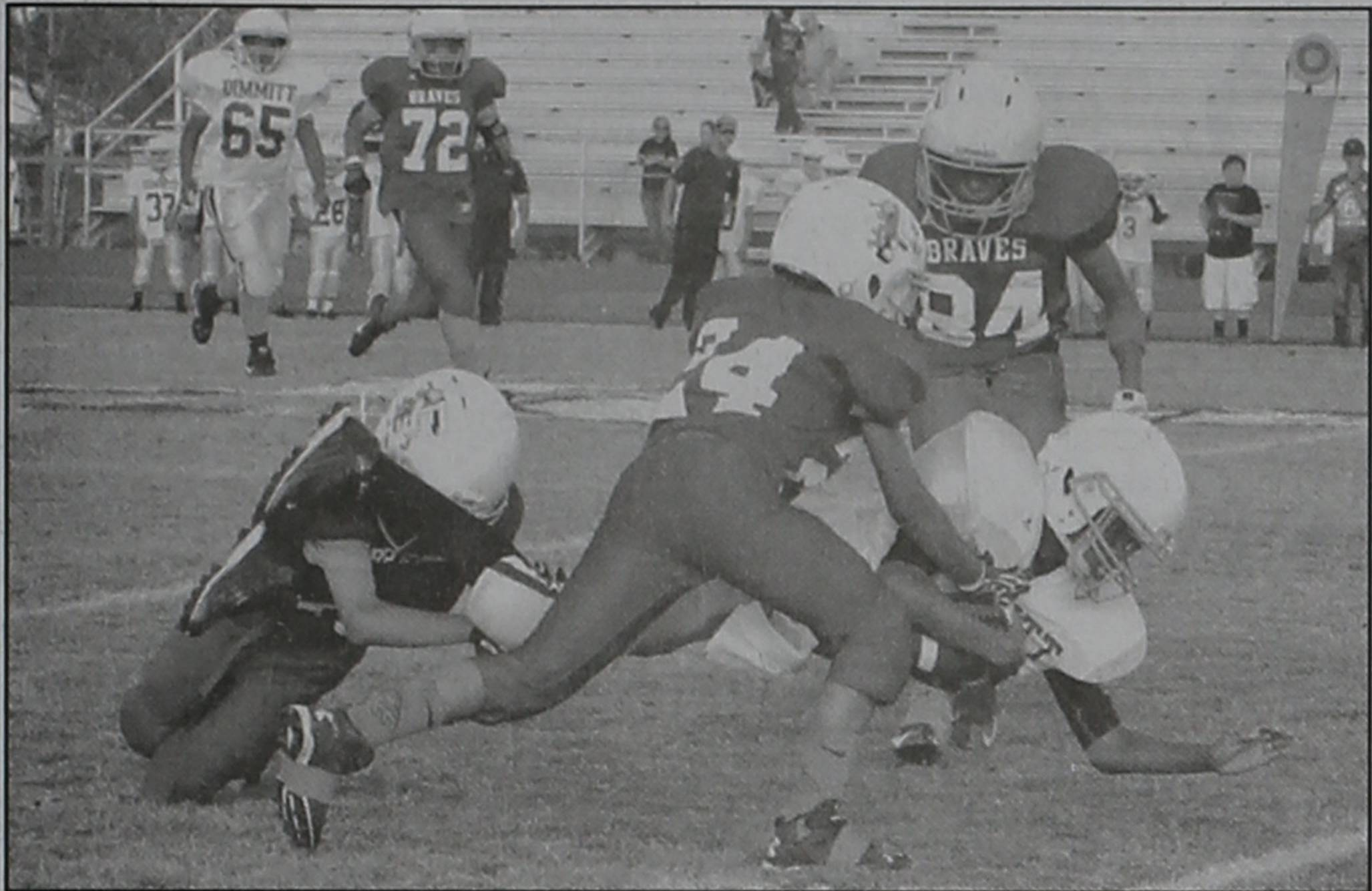
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Chiefs smash Dimmitt 53-0

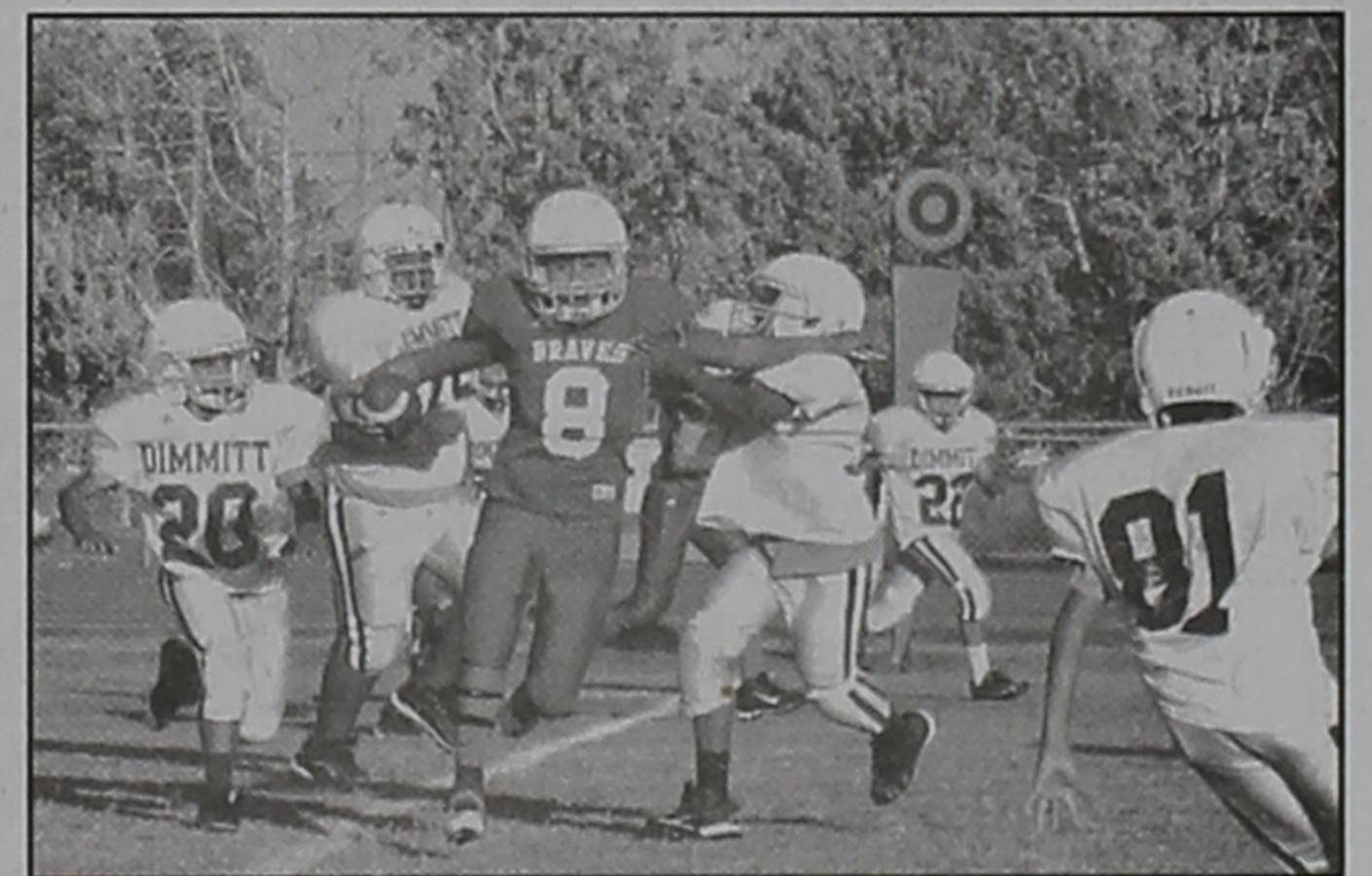

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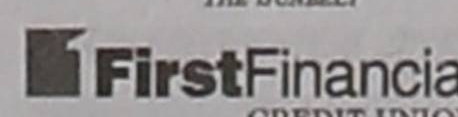
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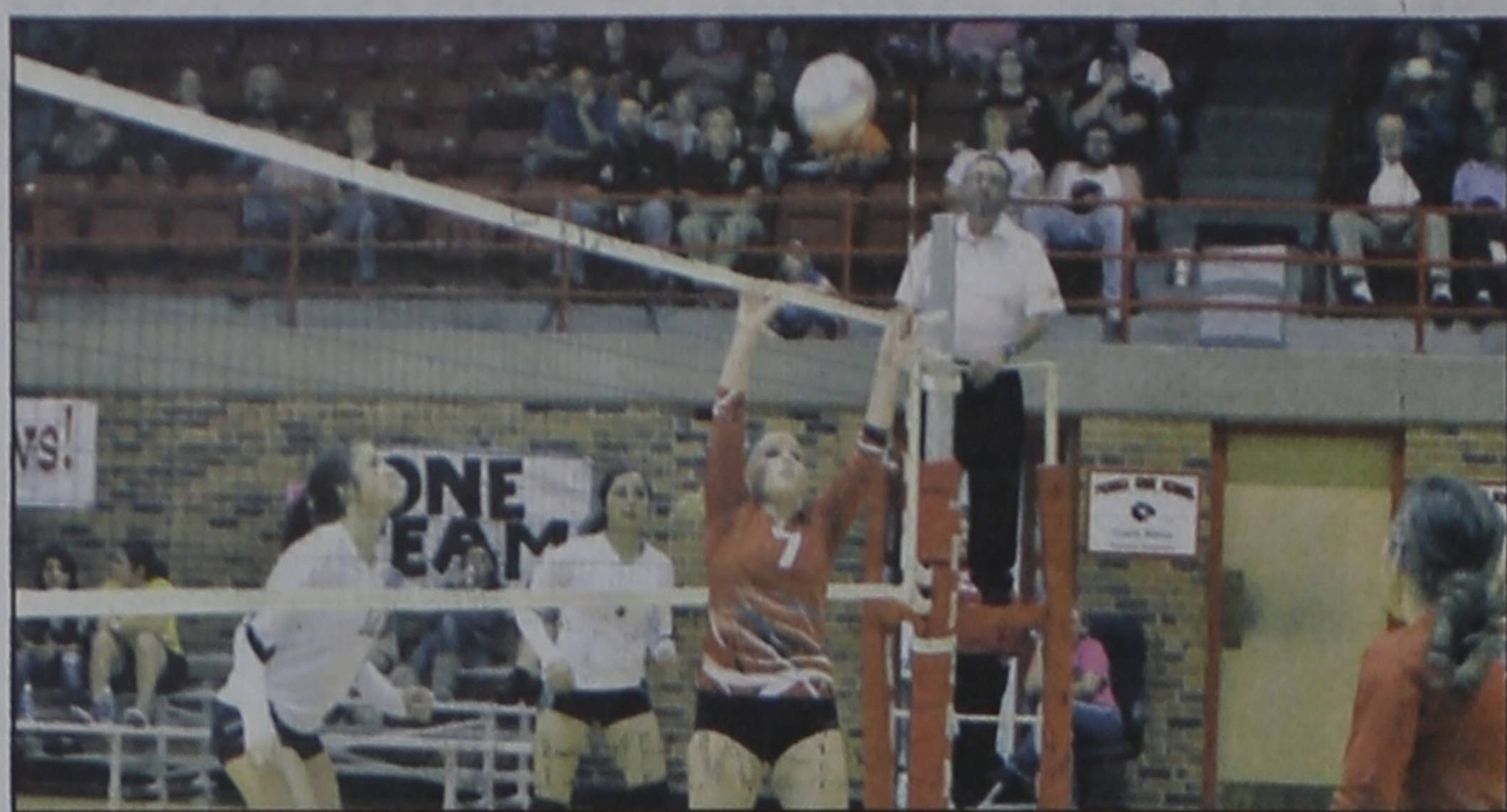

County tax receipts down 4.97%

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that state sales tax revenue in September was \$2.17 billion, up 7.9 percent compared to September 2013.

"Significant growth in sales tax revenues occurred across all major economic sectors, reflecting strength in both business and consumer spending," Combs said. "The gains were led by remittances from the oil and natural gas-related and manufacturing sectors, as well as from restaurants and retail trade."

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in August.

Parmer County will receive a net payment of \$48,358, which is a decrease of -4.97 percent from the payment in the 2013 comparable period in which the county received \$50,887. To-date payments total \$551,022, which is an increase of 5.39 percent

over the 2013 payments of \$522,806. Bovina will receive a payment of \$9,686, which is an increase of 14.49 percent as compared to the 2013 payment \$8,460. To-date Bovina has received \$103,442, which is an increase of 9.11 percent from the 2013 payments of \$94,805. Farwell will receive a payment of \$8,982, which is a decrease of -11.85 percent as compared to the 2013 payment of \$10,190. To-date Farwell has received \$101,720, which is an increase of 6.09 percent over the 2013 payments of \$95,875. Friona will receive a payment of \$29,699, which is a decrease of -7.90 percent as compared to the 2013 payment of \$32,238. To-date Friona has received \$345,860, which is an increase of 4.13 percent over the 2013 payments of \$332,127.
