InterBank tours Eastern Canada

"Fall has always been my favorite season. It is the time when everything bursts with its last beauty, as if nature had been saving up all year for the grand finale." Lauren DeStefano

Boy, did we hit it right! The colors of the leaves on the trees that make up the forests were spectacular as was the total experience of Eastern Canada. Twenty-six customers and friends of Friona InterBank made this trip of Sept 28-Oct 5 even better.

We landed in Montreal, in the province of Quebec, which is the second largest French speaking city in the world. We learned and used these French words: Bonjour-hello, Au revoir-good bye, S'il vous plat-please, Merci (beaucoup) -Thank you (very much) and Excusez-moi-Excuse me.

We stayed two nights in this island city of two million, and learned about its early beginnings as immigrants came to this part of the new world in 1642, of course, the people of the First Nations were here long before that.

Montreal was named after Ville Marie de Montreal and Mount Royal, a hill at its center. It is now the commercial capital of Canada. The early French Canadians were given a choice by Great Britain to pledge allegiance to the British Crown or they would be deported back to France. The great Dispersion happened in 1755 and from then on through today, those people who were sent away have returned looking for their families.

Montreal sits on the St. Lawrence River and has the busiest container port in North America.

This city averages about seven feet of snow and the ground stays white for approximately 13 weeks.

In the summer though, it is lovely and even prettier in the fall which is why we chose this time of year to visit.

Our city tour took us among other places, to Old Montreal, where we walked on cobblestoned streets lined with buildings dating from the 17th-19th centuries, grand old French restaurants, museums and the river front. We saw street performers and many tourists and drove by the Olympic stadium. We rode on the subway and visited the "underground" which stretches 20 miles beneath the city. It is well lit with every store that you would want to shop and/or eat in and you would never know that you were below the earth and below several buildings including Christ's Church Cathedral.

The next day, we traveled by coach through the beautiful Quebec countryside heading for Quebec City, the capital and the "walled city". Quebec means "where the river narrows".

On our way we saw fields of corn, dairies, and those gorgeous maple trees. We learned that the Sugar Maple leaves turned red and the Silver Maple turned yellow. Quebec is the single largest producer of maple products. One morning we ate breakfast at the Sugar Shack and had maple syrup



on our pancakes, maple syrup in the baked beans and on top of our biscuits. The owners of this establishment also made maple taffy, maple butter, and all other kinds of products using the maple sap. Most of us bought something to take home here. We ate very well on this trip!

After another city tour, some of our free time was spent in Old Quebec City, a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Samuel de Champlain founded Quebec City in 1608 and of course we saw his statue and many others. We visited the Chateau Frontenac, a very grand historic hotel which is generally recognized as the most photographed hotel in the world. There is an approximate 3 mile rock wall circling Old Town making Quebec City the only fortified city remaining in the Americas north of Mexico. The British built this wall to protect their garrison from invading forces. It is called the Citidal and was built in 1820-1850. If you are there at 10 a.m. in the summer, you can witness the changing of the guard.

While in this area, we visited a copper museum, many churches, learned about summer kitchens which are small buildings not attached to the house used for kitchens in the early days and now used for cold storage or probably storage of any kind. We traveled a short distance on the oldest highway in Canada, which was narrow and build for carriages. This highway runs from Montreal to Quebec City. Along this drive we were told about the Canadian Shield and saw many geological formations including several water falls.

We were then on our way to Ottawa Ontario, the financial capital of Canada. Ottawa is an Algonquin word meaning "to barter or trade". We ate a Beaver Tail there and it was

delicious. Ask us about it.

We learned that during WWII, the princess of Holland was visiting Ottawa and began experiencing labor pains. She didn't want her baby to be born a Canadian citizen so asked that soil be brought from Holland so her child would be born on Holland's soil. It was done just in time as her baby arrived shortly after and is a citizen of The Netherlands as the princess wanted. The princess was so grateful to the people of Ottawa that every year since she has sent a gift of 20,000 tulip bulbs.

Toronto Ontario was our last destination with Niagara Falls as our main focus. Ontario means "sparkling waters" and has 60% of the world's fresh water supply and the second largest land mass next to Quebec.

We took a short cruise on Lake Ontario and saw the 1000 islands of the salad dressing fame. To be an is-

land, there must be at least one tree and three shrubs. We saw several islands that fit the description and more that were much larger. Most of these islands are privately owned for around \$10 million.

Niagara Falls was just as powerful and breathtaking as we had hoped. You could hear its mighty roar from a distance. We all wore pink plastic capes with hoods and they were needed.

As we were on the Canadian side our cruise boat was the Hornblower. It was a damp day even without the falls, but we didn't seem to notice as we were so happy to experience this wonder. What a great way to end our trip.

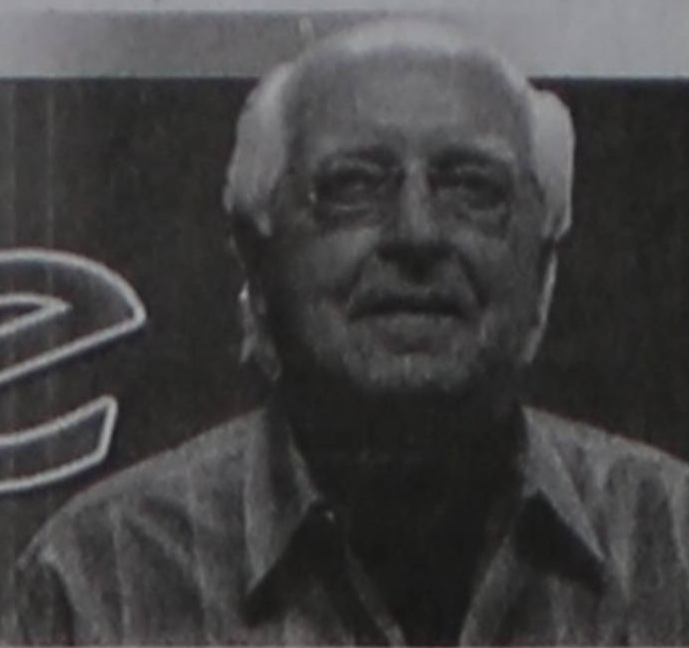
We then visited Niagara Falls on the Lake, a very quaint village of shops and eateries. We ate lunch there and enjoyed our free time.

If name recognition in Texas counts, then Sam Houston, the Democratic candidate for Attorney General, should win in a runaway. As should Quannah Parker running for Place 4 Judge in the Texas Court of

Criminal Appeals. He is the Libertarian candidate.

Chanderakantha Courtney is a Green Party candidate for Texas Lieutenant Governor along with Leticia Van de Putte, a Democrat.

Then we have Greg and Wendy who want to be Governor of Texas. Wendy wore pink tennis shoes and filibustered for 13 hours for abortion (or against it. I forget and too tired to Google.) 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UIL proposed rule changes

The University Interscholastic League Legislative Council met Sunday and Monday to make decisions on proposed rule changes in UIL academics, athletics, music and policy.

The Legislative Council approved proposals to create pilot contests in robotics, copy editing, conference 1A marching band, and computer science for A+ Academics.

In academics, the council voted to place on a referendum ballot a proposal to allow schools in conferences 1A and 2A to utilize students enrolled in grade 8 for One-Act Play. An amendment to eliminate the speaker at the state level for the Feature Writing Contest was also approved by the council.

In athletics, an amendment to create a pilot program providing home field advantage

to the higher seed in the first round of the 2015 6A football playoffs was unanimously approved by the council. The 32-member rule making body also voted to increase the number of teams advancing to the playoffs from each district from three to four for all conference 2A varsity team sports.

A proposal to create a separate championship for Conference 1A volleyball for the 2015-2016 school year was approved. The current alignment will be utilized with 2A and 1A school grouped together for district play. Conference 2A schools would then be divided into a separate playoff bracket and 1A schools would be divided into a separate playoff bracket.

In music, a proposal to create a state mariachi con-

test pilot was approved by the council. An amendment to modify the formula used to determine the number of bands advancing from area to state in UIL Marching Band was also passed by the council to account for bands that qualify to compete at area marching band contest but opt not to do so.

In other action, the council passed a proposed committee structure and process for implementation of the review and rewrite of the UIL Constitution and Contest Rules, as required by the Sunset Commission.

The Commissioner of Education must approve amendments passed by the UIL Legislative Council before they may take effect. If approved by the Commissioner of Education, these rules will take effect on August 1, 2015.

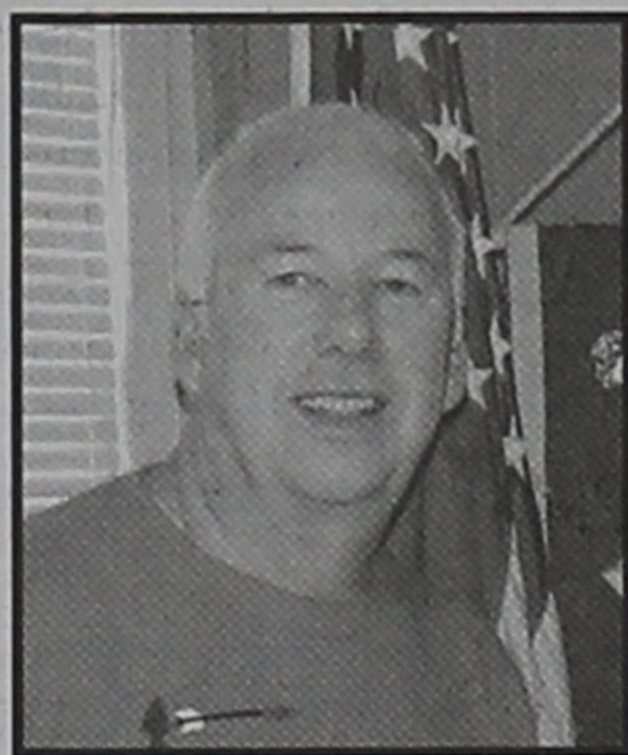

How to Handwash?

WASH HANDS WHEN VISIBLY SOILED! OTHERWISE, USE HANDRUB

Duration of the entire procedure: 40-60 seconds

- Wet hands with water;
- Apply enough soap to cover all hand surfaces;
- Rub hands palm to palm;
- Right palm over left dorsum with interlaced fingers and vice versa;
- Palm to palm with fingers interlaced;
- Backs of fingers to opposing palms with fingers interlocked;
- Rotational rubbing of left thumb clasped in right palm and vice versa;
- Rotational rubbing, backwards and forwards with clasped fingers of right hand in left palm and vice versa;
- Rinse hands with water;
- Dry hands thoroughly with a single use towel;
- Use towel to turn off faucet;
- Your hands are now safe.

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Protect yourself with proper hand washing

Parmer Medical Center plans to bring you a series of short articles to help everyone protect themselves from the spread of respiratory infections and viruses such as the flu, colds, strep throat and Ebola. This week we will be focusing on hand washing. Clean hands are the single most important factor in preventing the spread of infections and viruses such as

tions and viruses. You have probably observed individuals just run their hands under the water, dry their hands and consider themselves done. This will not protect anyone from the spread of illnesses. In order for hand washing to be truly effective in the spread of illnesses, it needs to be done correctly. Hands should be wet down with water and enough soap applied to cover all hand surfaces. All surfaces of the hand should them be rubbed together for at least 20 seconds, rinsed with water, dried with a single use towel and the water turned off with the towel. The entire process should take a minimum of 40 to 60 seconds. It is important to scrub in between your fingers, wash both thumbs and your fingertips, as well as, both top and palms of your hands. Please look at the diagrams located (above) to see the proper hand washing techniques endorsed by the World Health Organization.

If everyone in your household uses proper hand washing techniques and gets their flu shot, you have taken great strides to prevent the spread of illness and keeping your household healthy.

The annual enrollment period for Medicare Advantage Plans is October 15 through December 7.

If you enroll in a Medicare Advantage Plan you will no longer be enrolled in traditional Medicare, and your doctor and other providers may not be in-network for this plan. As a result, you may not be able to use — or it may cost you more to use — your local providers.

The Texas Department of Insurance cautions consumers to consider carefully before making any changes to their Medicare coverage. While Medicare Advantage Plans may be a good deal for some people, they are not right for everyone.

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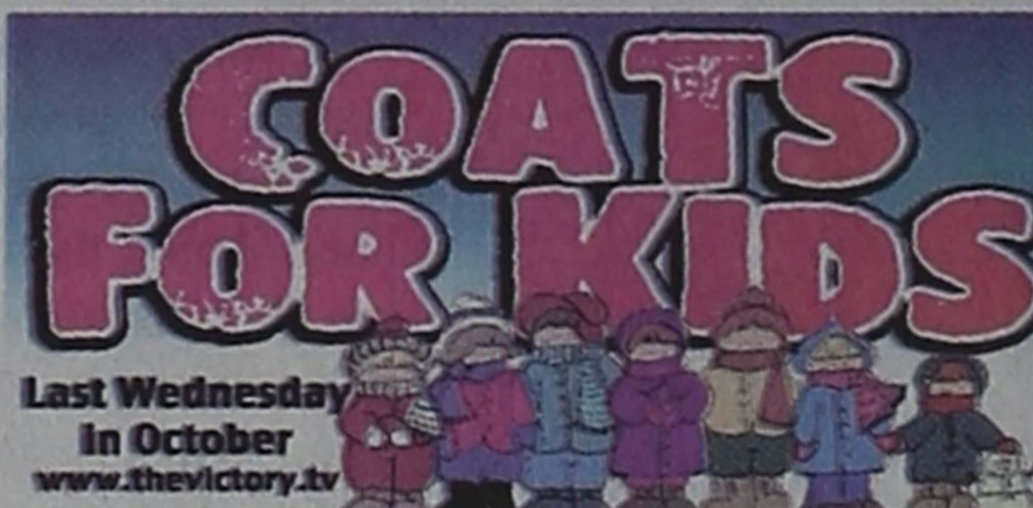
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
