W. Texans OK N-waste rules

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau AUSTIN - West and South Texas lawmakers, all hoping to keep low-level radioactive waste out of their backyards, are close to agreement on a bill that could determine where the toxic material is stored in the future.

The bill directs the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority to give preference to state-owned lands for a disposal

Sponsored by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, and Sen. John Traeger, D-Sequin, the bill also prohibits locating a lowlevel radioactive waste site within 20 miles upstream of a watersupply reservoir.
If adopted, the bill would remove

from consideration a South Texas site in McMullen County that was once the first choice for a disposal site. The measure was introduced after the waste disposal agency announced plans to place the facility near the Nueces River watershed, which supplies water to more than 500,000 South Texans.

Fearing the disposal site would be located in their area, West Texas senators have blocked passage of the bill since it won approval in the House on March 12.

But Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, said Friday that amendments are being drafted that should remove objections that he, Sen. Bill Sims, D.San Angelo, and Rep. Larry Don Shaw, D-Big Spr-

ing, have with the bill.
"I think we have just about obtained an agreement that is a true

compromise," Montford said Montford said he wanted stringent protections added before he could support the measure.

"I do not want a lessening of standards just to get it out of one portion of the state and put it in West Texas. I don't want anything to hurt or limit the chances of our getting the proposed supercollider, superconducter," Montford said.

West Texas is one of several areas under consideration by the Department of Energy for a proposed \$2 billion underground facility to be used in research of particles smaller than atoms

Changes supported by Montford, Sims and Shaw include

History repeats

Replica of Stanton convent planned for childrens' shelter

Staff Writer TANTON - A replica of a Catholic monastery built here in 1881 is being proposed as a home for abus-

An historic building, once part of a complex built by German Carmelite

monks in 1881 and later used as a convent, had been proposed for renovation and was being considered as a potential site for the children's home.

Dennis Kotacek, Midland businessman Dale Martin and Vaughn Hidalgo was seeking to purchase the building and 1.8 acres of land where the old convent sits. The building and acreage is owned by businessman Pete Pelletier of Carlsbad, N.M.

Kotacek said the asking price by Pelletier for the building and land was between \$50,000 and \$60,000. His group offered to purchase the property for \$25,000, he said.

"We have totally dropped interest in pur-chasing the convent," Kotasek said Friday. "The price was not reasonable for the property.

Pellitier in a telephone interview from

A group spearheaded by Stanton resident Carlsbad Saturday morning said he had me briefly with Kotacek Thursday afternoon. He said his asking price for the property is \$65,000, which included mineral rights and a water well located on the property.

Pelletier said the Kotacek-Martin-Hidalgo group has been the only party to have shown interest in purchasing the property.

The group has obtained 15.4 acres adjacent to the convent to build a replica of the old convent and former complex, Kotasek said. The institution included an adobe brick church, St. Joseph's convent, a girl's dormitory, boy's dormitory, laundry, barns and recreational buildings when it was first constructed.

Police later returned to the scene and found Darrow. He was taken to the hospital from the

Bargain barracks for sale Wooden air base buildings still prove their mettle

Slice 'em up, jack 'em up and move out. It's been the usual procedure after people buy government buildings in Big Spring. The General Services Administration in Fort

Worth is now accepting bids for five buildings located on the west side of the Federal Prison Camp. The unoccupied, two-story wood frame barracks once housed Webb Air Force Base recruits. Many

barracks that were auctioned have been converted into apartments

Randall Merrill of Big Spring purchased air base barracks in 1983. He paid Jack Bennett to remove the structures and locate them on West Highway 80. The buildings were converted into the West Highway 80 Apartments.

Bennett said the job took a little over a year to

complete and required nine trips. We never had any trouble with the move because

the buildings were so long," Bennett said. Bennett said Merrill paid about \$500 to \$600 for a barracks building. Bennett charged about \$1,500 a trip. A crew of five to six men removed the barracks from their original foundations and traveled out the Airpark entrance to West Highway 80.

The hardest part of the move, Bennett said, was removing and disposing the concrete foundations, a requirement of the federal agency.

You have trouble watching out for telephone lines. You've got to find ways to detour around them," Bennett said.

Mrs. Charles Hood of Big Spring, whose husband has been in the house moving business the last 23 years, said that building movers need to obtain moving permits from the city and state highway depart-

ment in order to travel on roads.

Additional clearance, Hood said, must be obtained from all major utilities and railroad companies, if

the move requires driving over tracks. "A no-no with us is putting a man on the roof to raise (electric power) wires during the move." Hood

Buildings are removed from their original sites, Hood said, by first knocking holes in the foundation. House jacks are used to raise the building so skids can be placed underneath. Skids are steel beams that carry the building.

"They're not hard to move," Hood said.

The three main buildings formed a quadrangle that faced south toward Stanton, or Marienfeld, as it was called then. The property purchased by the organization sits across the street from St. Joseph's Catholic Church

"We are in the process of finalizing the purchase of the land," Kotasek said Friday morning. "We have some funding at this point. We will try to secure grants (both state and federal).'

Kotasek said the material and labor needed to construct the complex will be donated by individuals who "see the project as a worthwhile endeavor.

Kotasek did not say when construction of the complex would

The group also includes other Midland-Odessa businessmen, Kotacek said, who will be incorporated into a non-profit organization. 'We will be sanctioned as a

Texas corporation," Kotacek said. We will comply with state and federal codes if we go that route." The charter for the corporation is

being drawn up for a non-profit organization, he said. The home itself will be run by a steering committee and also a board of directors.

This will be a "voluntary home" Kotasek said. He said any individual placed there will be done by a guardian or parent.

'We won't turn down anyone," he said. "It will be home for people of any religion. It will be run nonsectarian. The board will select a person to to the individual to run the home. Preferably, it will be a man of the cloth."



Old convent building has modern neighbors

House on the hill

Convent's past hidden by run-down appearance

STANTON - Its gothic architectural design and rich Catholic history go unnoticed. Residents here just call the dilapidated building "the house on the

This historic landmark, which sits across the street from St. Joseph's Catholic Church, was the product of three Catholic priests who came to the area in 1881.

Only the run-down convent now stands where a complex consisting of a adobe church, a convent, a boy's dormitory, a girl's dormitory, laundry, barns, windmills, recreational buildings cisterns and other out-buildings once sat.

The building, constructed in the late 1880s, has served as an inspiration for a group of area citizens. A group headed by Stanton resident Dennis Kotacek, Midland businessman Dale Martin and Vaughn Hidalgo plan to construct a replica of the convent and complex as it looked in its heyday.

The group hopes to use the complex as a home for abused children. However, the project is still in the planning stages, Kotacek said. The group plans to build the complex on some property adjacent to the The history of Stanton actually began with the ar-

rival of three monks, P.A. Peters, Albert Wagner and William Fuhrwerk, and two other men, Anton Keber and Adam Konz, as early as 1880. In 1880, John Konz, a German immigrant from Kansas, was told by a Texas and Pacific railroad

agent of the vast land available in West Texas. Konz was in search of location to build a Catholic colony in Texas. Stanton was that location.

The five men in 1881 changed the name of the settlement from Grelton to Marienfeld, meaning "Field of Mary" in honor of the Virgin Mary.

The first building erected on the land was a house for the priests. Construction of the church began shortly thereafter. In 1882, the Carmelite priests began construction of a two-story monastery. Additions were later made to the monastery and the

The construction of an adobe church (St. Joseph's Catholic Church) began in 1885. The walls of the church were 4 feet thick and were veneered with red brick, according to historical account of the

The monastery was used as a theological center for many years, with priests pursuing their studies there. In 1887, a parochial school was constructed and the Sisters of Divine Providence from San Antonio were placed in charge.

The decline of the Catholic influence began when families began to abandon their homes after the drought of 1886-1887. Because of a growing Protestant element, the name of the town was changed from Marienfeld to Stanton.

A group of nuns, Sisters of Mercy, took over the complex in 1894. The nuns arrived from St. Mary's Hospital in San Francisco. The school was reopened in 1896. Sixteen students attended classes there the

The Carmelite priests disbanded and sold the property to the sisters in 1897. The monastery became the Convent of Our Lady of Mercy. More additions were made during the sisters' occupation of the

Pupils who attended the Catholic school came from Big Spring, Midland, Odessa, Lubbock, El Paso, Plainview, Slaton, Arizona and New Mexico. Enrollment numbered 110 in 1904

A tornado struck Stanton June 11, 1938, wiping out the academy. The twister destroyed the laundry, barns, windmills and several smaller structures. The rainstorm that followed soaked the girl's

The sisters decided to abandon the institution. The property was later sold and has been privately owned since then. The property and convent is for sale by

Beirut shelling kills 9

BEIRUT, Lebanon - Hours of shelling killed nine people and wounded 48 Saturday in mostly residential areas of Beirut, followed by sporadic rifle and grenade exchanges bet-ween Christian and Moslem fighters in the capital's center.

Rival militiamen loosed mortar, rocket and tank artillery barrages along the three-mile Green Line that splits Beirut into Christian and Moslem sectors.

Germans protest SS

NESSELWANG, West Germany - Police fired water cannons and tear gas Saturday at rioters who screamed "Nazis out!" and hurled rocks, firecrackers paint and eggs at a hotel where veterans of the Nazi SS were holding a reunion.

A thousand policemen in full riot gear ringed the Hotel Krone where the former SS troops were meeting and fought street battles with up to 400 demonstrators for over half an hour in this Bavarian Alpine resort.

Pope pleads for unity

DEN BOSCH, Netherlands - Pope John Paul II opened his controversial visit to the Netherlands Saturday by telling liberalminded Dutch Roman Catholics not to stray from orthodoxy and to accept the conservative bishops he has appointed.

But he also made an impassioned plea for church unity, saying he is grieved by discord between Dutch progressives and

Soccer fire

40 die, 149 injured as flames sweep stadium

BRADFORD, England (AP) -Millions of television viewers watched a fire sweep through a wooden grandstand holding 3,000 fans at a soccer stadium in northern England Saturday, killing 40 people and injuring 149, according to officials.

John Domaille, assistant police chief of West Yorkshire, told a news conference in this northern England town, "We believe that there are 40 people who have lost their lives in

He said at least 149 people were injured and were being treated at three hospitals.

The television audience saw panic-stricken fans, some with their clothes ablaze, flee from the structure. Others in the stands tried to beat out the flames with their coats and jackets.

The assistant chief fire officer, Peter Kneale, said the blaze was fanned by a strong breeze and was "a very rapid spreading fire." He said it started in the north end of the stands and engulfed the whole structure in smoke and flames in four minutes.

Officials said there were 10,000 people in the Valley Parade Ground stadium, but only 3,000 were in the main grandstand when the fire broke out just before halftime in the Third Division match between Bradford City and Lincoln City. The scoreless game was abandoned.

The Bradford coach, Terry Yorath, suffered cuts on his face trying to help fans flee the grandstands.

Sikh terrorists kill 79 in wave of bomb attacks

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - A wave of bomb attacks blamed on Sikh terrorists killed 79 people in 24 hours in buses, trains, parks and slums in northern India, leading to police raids on Sikh temples Saturday and more than

It was one of the bloodiest 24-hour periods in India's 38 years of independence. Police said most of the victims were Hindus.

Sikh militants are seeking an independent homeland in the Punjab, or at the least more autonomy for the 13 million-member sect. The victims were killed when bombs, most of them concealed in old transistor radios, exploded in New Delhi and in neighboring states of north India. Authorities blamed Sikh terrorists. Police

quoted witnesses in some cases as saying Sikhs had planted bomb-packed radios on buses, then escaped.

Army soldiers rode in trucks through the capital in a show of strength to prevent an anti-Sikh backlash. Police searched scores of Sikh temples for terrorists.

It was the first time security forces had

entered a Sikh shrine in the Indian capital. In keeping with Indian tradition, police generally do not go into a place of worship.

Home Minister S. B. Chavan, said in an address to the nation on television and radio that 'consequences will be grim" if "senseless killing of innocent persons did not stop

"The government will not hesitate to take sternest measures to restore peace and to maintain law and order," Chavan said.

IRS NOTICES (Know What You're Paying)

The Internal Revenue Service sends out numerous tax deficiency notices which are incorrect. Don't pay additional amounts on your income tax return unless you are satisfied

IRS offices are staffed with ordinary people that make ordinary mistakes. Add to that a computer that can make ordinary computer mistakes and you have the ingredients for improperly mailed notices. Because these notices come from a Federal agency, the average person gives them more credibility than they may deserve.

The Internal Revenue Service is attempting to match certain documents to your social security number and your tax return. If you receive interest, dividends, rents, royalties, or any number of other types of income, you will probably be issued a "1099" information slip identifying the earnings. If the IRS can't readily locate that information on your tax return, they may send you a deficiency notice even though that income may be included somewhere in your tax return.

Don't assume that you owe additional taxes to the IRS just because they send you a statement. Because of the possibilities of both mechanical and human error, it's worth checking to make sure you owe the amount requested.

If you have paid someone to prepare your tax return, give them a copy of "all" correspondence you receive from the Internal Revenue Service, even those which do not request additional taxes. Your tax return preparer needs a full track record of all aspects of your tax return if he's to do an adequate job of representing you. Most IRS notices require a response within a specified number of days; therefore, all correspondence should be given to your accountant as soon as

Business wrath is over-reaction

Sidewalks, it seems sensible to assume, are for walking, not

Yet downtown business owners are spitting mad over the city's effort to enforce a law against parking on those walkways.

We think some of them protest too much.

To their credit, Big Spring's public servants have gone the extra mile to be conciliatory. We don't believe the city is trying to harass anyone in its efforts to enforce the law.

Sidewalk parking is against the law for good reason — it's dangerous to allow parking on a pedestrian walkway. The city of Midland is \$1 million poorer for failing to enforce the law against obstacles in the city right-of-way. And, if the downtown is to be rejuvenated as a high traffic area, it's logical that we should make room for pedestrian shoppers.

By the same token, merchants are right to point out those historical instances where sidewalk parking has gone on "forever." It's also true that street alterations which took place after businesses were established have contributed to the problem. The city has expressed willingness to help accommodate those businesses which have legitimate complaints.

But to expect that sidewalk parking should be a matter of course, and to imply that businesses are being forced to fight for their "rights" is far from fair. The city is charged with the responsibility of enforcing its ordinances. If we begin to let the laws "slide," where do we eventually find ourselves?

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: Do you think there is any way I can help my son, who is in his teens and is living with my ex-husband? DAER MRS. G.N.: I don't know divorce, of course, but your letter points out one of its most tragic aspects: what it can do to children. Recently I read an article by a sociologist who claims that divorce has no long term effect on the children - but my mail every week proves otherwise.

The first and most important thing you can do for your son is to pray for him. I gather from what little contact with your son; you have, therefore, little opportunity to influence him directly. But God can work even when the situation sounds impossible. "Call to me and

I will answer you" (Jeremiah 33:3). Pray that your son will realize the dead-end road he is one, and pray that God will make him realize that he needs Christ in his

tact with him and let him know of your love and concern. Write or call him as you have opportunity. Let him know you think of him frequently, and that you want him to avoid the mistakes many others make in life. Most of all, share with him that Christ loves him and wants to guide him if he will turn to him. This may not seem to bear fruit at first, but as the years go by it will be important to him.

Springtime for Hitler

By KEITH BRISCOE Forty years ago on the banks of the Elbe River, American and Soviet soldiers embraced, kissed and toasted the demise of the Third Reich with shots of vodka and shouts of camaraderie.

Last week, some of these same men reunited in Germany. American and Soviet veterans embraced again, reliving the sweet moment of victory.

What a pity, then, that at the same time, their leaders were demeaning the great friendship of World War II with shallow sermons of antagonistic nationalism.

On the 40th anniversary of VE Day, Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev proclaimed, with only passing reference to America, that the USSR had saved the world from evil imperialism

And President Reagan, who prefers to consecrate Nazi cemeteries, didn't even mention Soviet participation in the war when he addressed the European Parliament that day.

It's like saying one player won a doubles tennis match.

The truth is the USSR did defeat the Germans. But the U.S. engineered the Allied victory over the Axis Powers.

The German Army had been whipped before the first GI landed on Normandy. Enduring horrendous losses, the Red Army had mastered the master race in battle by late 1943.

The American Army (and let's not forget the British Com-monwealth troops) performed brilliantly in Europe, and shortened the war considerably. But give credit where it's due. Destruction of the Third Reich was a Soviet

But that's only half the story. The USSR would have been very hardpressed early in the war without American material aid. And the U.S. had a second war to fight in the Pacific against the Japanese.

The point — and all veterans know it well — is that victory 40 years ago in history's greatest war was assured by American and Soviet cooperation. We appreciated that friendship in the spring of 1945, and we should have renewed that fruitful alliance in April 1985.

For Reagan and Gorbachev, however, the Elbe River is too wide

special session will be necessary to finish the job. That is not an unheard of situation, since there have been five special sessions since

The key dangling issue is the state budget for the next two fiscal years. Without it, state government would come to a screeching halt next Sept. 1. Of course, that won't be allowed to happen. The economic impact of throwing 180,000 state employees out of work at the same time would be devastating.

The Legislature will pass a budget. The only question is whether it will be done by May 27 or im a special session.

The legislators received some good news last week when Comptroller Bob Bullock gave official notice that his earlier state revenue projections for the coming two years have not changed. Those projections weren't full of good news in the first place, but the current budget plans are designed around them, and it was expected that any changes by the comptroller would be bad news.

Another optimistic sign was the quick acceptance by the House last week of the Senate's version of a tuition increase at state colleges and universities.

The entire legislative plan for avoiding a tax increase this year is based on passage of three

revenue-producing pieces of legislation. The tuition hike is one. Higher state fees and an agreement to hold down the state contribution to the teacher retirement fund are the other

A conference committee is trying to work out differences in the House and Senate versions of a fee bill, and the teacher retirement fund bill has cleared the Senate and is awaiting House action. No major problems are expected here.

But other dangers lurk around the edges of the Capitol.

One is the proposed final settlement of the long-standing lawsuit by inmates against the prison system. Reportedly, it has been accepted by prison officials and top legislative leaders, but Gov. Mark White requested more time to study it. He has reason to be cautious.

Both the suit and the settlement pose dangers for the state budget and White. The restrictions on inmate populations proposed under the settlement could force either costly prison improvements or a rapid-release program that could create bad publicity as White faces re-election next year.

We'll have to wait and see how that all works out. In fact, nothing about the legislative session can be known for certain until the gavels mark the final adjournment on May 27.

That day, by the way, is Memorial Day. If everything does fall into place and the lawmakers head for home with all their work behind them, it truly will be cause for a holiday celebration.


Judge blocks extradition

Delinquent parents netted in Mother's Day roundup

"Mother's Day roundup" of divorced parents accused of failing to make court-ordered child support payments netted 14 parents, Harris County deputy constables said.

When they learned they were being sought Friday morning, another nine fathers showed up in court voluntarily and signed papers agreeing to pay the amounts ordered, said Anne Wheeler, spokeswoman for the attorney general's child support division in Houston.

Altogether, 62 people were named in writs of attachment — legal papers requiring them to respond in family district court to allegations that they failed to support children living with ex-spouses or relatives after divorce.

None of those detained ended up in jail, authorities said. Instead,



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

about organ donations at the Big Spring Health Fair May 18 at the Big Spring Mall.

According to the organ bank, emphasis today is on cardiac transplantation. Every year, 343 people out of 100,000 die from some type of heart disease.

In the United States, over 792,000 people die

each year from cardiac disease. A heart transplant cannot help every person with heart disease, but it can save the lives of

Heart transplant candidates are patients who have failed to respond to all other medical surgical treatments. Life expectancy is generally one to three months without a heart

The same applies to patients with advanced liver disease. There is no alternative to transplant surgery, which is most effective

His major problem on the trip so far has been getting bicycle tires. Because his bicycle is Frenchmade, wheel sizes are in metric measures, and he is unable to purchase the tires in the United States.

His parents, he said, have mailed tires to all the French consulates he will visit on his journeys.

His parents also were concerned about him on the journey, he said. 'My parents are afraid for me when I start. Now they are better. I write them and they write me

through the French consulates."

Mexico, he said, was surprising because of the extreme poverty "There are lots of poor. But sometimes they are more sympathetique. They have little but they give what they have. A plate of beans - for them it is important. But they give me some.

'All the Mexicans I met, they want to come here by the river. They think they can find a job. When I went (from Mexico into Laredo), no problem. No river for me," he said, pantomiming swimming motions.

After he finishes his trip, he plans to show slides and talk about his travels at his school. He also is considering another trip, next time to China and Canada

Enrolling in the Registered Nursing program at Howard College, Williams studied down the hall

from where her mother was teaching. "Even with Mother being a nurse, I was füst completely ignorant of the language and terminology," she said.

Harris was not happy about her daughter becoming a nurse until she saw how enthusiastic Williams was with the school work. "I think I was more worried about her state board than she was," said Harris.

Is this jogger pushing things?

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a your running pace. 58-year-old jogger — three and a half miles every other day in about 30 minutes. I've been jogging for about 12 years. My maximum pulse rate gets to 154-168. I am not on any medication. Am I overdoing it? - H.M.

I have no argument with your running distances and your times, but I want to run up a warning flag with regard your reported exercise heart (pulse) rates. Do you mean that your pulse stays above 150 beats per minute for most of your. half hour of running? That sounds like you're pushing a bit.

Even well-conditioned athletes maintain an exercise pulse of only 90 percent of their age-predicted maximum achievable rate. The maximum for someone your age is between 160 and 170. And 90 percent of that would be somewhere between 140 and 150. And even that is strenuous work. But you're doing even more. You are using your absolute maximum achievable rate or close to that.

No one does much good by stress-ing the heart beyond 85 percent of his maximal rate. In fact, if you raise the rate by only 20 beats beyond the resting rate you can get a pretty good aerobic workout.

I don't know if you are in the super shape that permits you to exert yourself to the levels you mention. I would feel safer in advising you to find out for sure with an office-supervised stress test. The doctor will be able to tell if you are taxing your heart too much. Until you do that I advise you to slow



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


