# Spring Citizens speak out at hearing

## Tax rate hearing set for Sept. 6

Citizens bombarded city council members Tuesday night with complaints about taxes, city salaries, fire protection and recreational

About 250 citizens attended a public hearing on the 1985 budget, many of whom were critical of the council's proposal to raise property taxes by 15.74 percent from this year's effective rate.

After the hearing, councilmen agreed to have a public hearing on the proposed tax rate at 6:15 p.m. Sept. 6. Included in the budget proposal is a tax rate increase to 73 cents per \$100 valuation.

The current tax rate is 68 cents per \$100, but increased property values have lowered the effective tax rate — the rate needed to bring in the same amount of revenue as the year before — to 63 cents per \$100 valuation.

According to councilmen, the extra money is needed to restore fund balances, which the city has been living off instead of passing tax in creases in the past.

Councilmen voted 5-1 in favor of considering the tax increase and having a public hearing. Councilman Larry Miller voted against increasing taxes; Councilman Harold Hall, on a previously scheduled vacation, said he favored the tax increase in a letter to council members.

Member Gary Don Carey, who voted in favor of having a public hearing on the tax, said, however, that he opposes a property tax increase.

"I voted for another meeting on the tax increase," Carey said. "As far as a tax increase right now,

smaller in the Municipal Auditorium, where the meeting was moved for space. About 250 people attended the public hearing on the city's 1985 budget, which lasted two hours.

## City sewer, water rates to increase

**Staff Writer** Despite public protests against proposed increases in city water and sewer rates, city councilmen Tuesday night voted to go ahead with the increases.

The vote was taken after a public hearing on the 1985 budget, which drew about 250 people. The crowd spilled out into the hallway at the council chambers, forcing the council to move the hearing to the Municipal Auditorium.

Of the six councilmen present at the meeting, Larry Miller was the only one to oppose the rate increases. Councilman Harold Hall, on a vacation with his wife, stated in a letter to council members that he favored the increases.

Under the proposal, the basic water rate, now \$5.75, would jump to \$9. Every additional 1,000 gallons of water would cost \$1.53,

up from \$1.25. The basic sewer rate would remain stable at \$4.25, but the cost of every additional 1,000 gallons of sewage would increase from 68 cents to 80 cents in the proposal. The rates would not take effect until Oct. 1, the beginning of the city's fiscal year.

During the public hearing preceding the water rate vote, Miller said he opposed the higher rates. However, he said he understood the reasoning behind it.

"I'm not for a tax increase or a water increase. In the late '60s and 7.0s, had the councils ever replaced streets, repaired water lines ... we county held the line. The college is . wouldn't be in this state. There was no preventative maintenance at the time," Miller said in response

## Weinberger praised for weapon cut

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger won wide congressional praise for scuttling the Army's troubled Sgt. York air defense gun, a costly weapon that worked no better than the system it was designed to replace.

The decision to cancel the gun means the Army will have to go back to the drawing board to come up with a weapon to defend its infantry troops against aerial attack. The service already has missiles and highspeed guns for that purpose, but says a bety ter system is needed. 'The system didn't work well enough."

Weinberger told a Pentagon news conference Tuesday. "That's the simple fact." Weinberger said today that "canceling this particular system doesn't give us the

protection we need. What we have to do now is develop as rapidly as we can an effective system.

Interviewed on the NBC "Today" show, he said "the Soviets have developed an increasing helicopter capability to stand off there and fire lethal fire into troops in combat at some distance from them, and we need a system that can destroy those helicopters."

'The adage about Weinberger is that he's never seen a weapons system he didn't like, but he's now shown that given the right circumstances, he's not against canceling a program. It's a very important and dramatic decision," said Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind.

It is rare for the Pentagon to kill a

weapon after production has begun. Eight years ago, President Carter halted the B-1 bomber program, but only four prototypes had been built and production wasn't started. President Reagan resurrected the

Although Congress is in recess, legislators quickly praised Weinberger's decision and said it would help him as he tries to defend Reagan administration defense budget requests before an increasingly reluctant Congress.

This gives Weinberger tremendous credibility on Capitol Hill," said Sen. Warren Rudman, R-N.H., by telephone from his home. Rudman, a frequent critic of the Sgt. York, said, "It certainly was the right

Rep. Denny Smith, R-Ore., the weapon's chief critic in the House, called Weinberger's decision "a gutsy move" and said it "sends a strong signal to contractors to clean up their act.

A frequent Weinberger critic, Sen. David Pryor, D-Ark., said by telephone from Jonesboro, Ark., that "I must say I am pleasantly surprised. I did not ever think I would see the day when Weinberger would turn thumbs down on a weapon when it's been around so long. It was a turkey.'

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, another critic, said, "I think it shows Weinberger has gotten some wisdom and shows that when we cut down the budget, the Pen-

## Joining football team is local girl's dream

A former snuff dipper and current weight lifter is fighting all barriers to make a personal dream come true.

The dream is an obsession to participate in the American men's game of football.

"I decided to give up snuff because it might lead to lip cancer, and I wouldn't be able to play football," said 18-year-old Lisa Swinney, who will be a senior at Big Spring High School

She's aware of her obsession. "Football is an obsession with me. I even sleep with a football at night. It's hard to let go of it," Swinney said.

She wouldn't mind the tackling, grunts or injury risk the game offers.

'My dream is to be able to

play football so that any girl could play football in Texas or anywhere they wanted," she Swinney asked Big Spring

Steer head football coach Quinn Eudy last November if she could work out with the boys' offseason spring training program that consisted of weightlifting and road training. Eudy told her no.

She inquired again about participating in April spring training drills, and Eudy again said

Eudy acted in accordance with University Interscholastic League rules that prohibit girls from participating in boys' tackle football. The UIL rules govern all Texas high school sport activities, and infractions lead to ineligibility in UIL competition.

UIL athletic director Bill Farney said that under the nondiscrimination clause of the UIL constitution, girls are eligible to compete in boys sports provided no girls teams have been established in that particular sport.

Football is the lone exception. and the rule is explicit, said Farney. Women cannot participate with men in contact sports, the UIL constitution

"Football has been ruled out according to the agencies and courts because it is a contact sport," Farney said. "Schools could be legally responsible for injuries. To subject a girl to that situation would place her in a high risk injury situation.'

Swinney said she had hoped for a tryout as outside linebacker or running back.



"I like getting tackled. Once I'm down, I get mad and want to hit harder," she said.

She said her parents have objected to her desire for a tryout with the Steers. 'They just won't support it,"

Swinney said.

Her training the last two years has consisted of three to four hours daily lifting weights and up to a mile of running. A friend guided her through some tackling drills last winter, she said.

She has no special player she idolizes; it's the sport that enchants her, she said.

If her plans for a tryout with the Steers continue to be thwarted, Swinney said she will continue plans to write a book about football from a woman's

point of view. The book, Swinney said, would cover such things as coaches' duties and an overall look at football from a woman's perspective.

## Loeffler lashes out at Gov. White

ABILENE (AP) - Republican gubernatorial candidate Tom Loeffler blasted Gov. Mark White, saying the state is often being led by public opinion polls and photo opportunities.
"I do not see the leadership in the

governor's office necessary and capable of directing our state through this critical period," Loeffler said at an Abilene press conference Tuesday.

"Texas today has too much governorship by photo opportunity, too much leadership by public opinion polls. Texans demand a governor of substance, not of imagery, the congressman from Kerr County said.

Loeffler formally announced his plans to run for governor last week, but he has been campaigning since

So far his only GOP opponent is former Gov. Bill Clements, although former congressman and ex-Democrat Kent Hance is expected to announce his candidacy.

Loeffler has he would run a positive campaign. But while being positive" toward his GOP opponents, he has criticized Governor Mark White's administration.

The figure is a reduction from the current \$5 million.

Despite cutting seven teachers and four aides from the staff and other budget cutting measures, a tax increase will be needed to pay for new requirements of House Bill 72, said Doyle: The board will hold a public hear-



She won an Emmy award for an appearance on the TV show "Taxi" in 1979.


### Fires derail service

NEW YORK - Suspicious fires in four junked railroad cars spewed smoke through Grand Central Terminal today, cutting off commuter rail service used by 60,000 people at the height of the morning rush.

Dense clouds of black smoke poured into the air from ventilation ducts at the normally bustling station and along Park Avenue, which sits atop the tunnels leading out of the station. Emergency equipment jammed the streets and midtown Manhattan traffic was badly congested.

More than 40 people, including 12 firefighters, were treated at Grand Central and 29 were sent to hospitals, said Emergency Medical Services spokesman Louis Cafiero. Most suffered smoke inhalation or heat exhaustion.

In addition, 17 people who suffered smoke inhalation on a train in a tunnel leading out of Grand Central were taken off the train at a station some 80 blocks north of the terminal. he said. One firefighter suffered a back

## Freedom march

### Rioters demand release of black leader

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) - Thousands of anti-apartheid demonstrators of all races defied the law today by mounting marches to demand freedom for Nelson Mandela, the imprisoned black leader of the banned African National Congress.

Police firing tear gas and rubber bullets stopped one of the processions, and riot policemen armed with rubber whips and truncheons disbanded another before it could start.

But a third march from the mostly white University of Cape Town was under way toward President P.W. Botha's official residence early in the afternoon, residents said.

The residents said about 1,000 people of all races were singing freedom songs and marching, but it was not clear whether police knew about it or if Botha was

At 10 a.m. (3 a.m. CDT) police broke up a planned march from the mixed-race suburb of Athlone to Pollsmoor Prison, where Mandela is serving a life term following his conviction on charges of plotting

One man screaming "Allah akhbar," Arabic for "God is great," was seen being hauled away from the clash that developed moments before the scheduled start of the march.

Some of South Africa's Moslems, classified as Asians under the government's racial separation laws, speak and read Arabic.

### Agency head fired

BONN, West Germany - Chancellor Helmut Kohl will fire the head of West Germany's intelligence agency as a result of the country's spy scandal, high-ranking government sources said today.

The sources, speaking on condition they not be identified, told The Associated Press that Kohl informed Heribert Hellenbroich, the intelligence agency chief, of his decision during a meeting this morning.

Hellenbroich has been in charge of the agency for less than a month. He was formerly in charge of Bonn's counter-espionage service, where Hans Joachim Tiedge worked as a section chief in charge of counter-spy activities against East Germany.

Tiedge defected to East Germany last week, and since then reports of a series of personal problems have surfaced.

Kohl also faces growing pressure to fire the interior minister because of Tiedge's defection

Opposition Social Democratic leader Hans-Jochen Vogel on Tuesday demanded the resignation of Interior Minister Friedrich Zimmermann, saying: "If a disaster of this scope happens you have to take responsibility and resign.

### Terrorists arrested

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador -Authorities have arrested three men they suspect of being part of the leftist terror squad that sprayed a cafe with gunfire, killing 13 people, including six Americans, President Jose Napoleon Duarte said. A fourth suspect was wounded in the June 19

attack and died in a hospital, Duarte said Tuesday at a news conference.

He said security forces still were hunting seven other suspects, five of whom have been identified.

A statement issued at the news conference identified all 11 suspects as members of the Central American Revolutionary Worker's Party, which claimed responsibility for the

## Dad accused of murder wants his life to return to normal

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — A father spared a prison sentence for killing a martial arts instructor accused of kidnapping and sexually assaulting his son says he just wants his life to return to normal.

"I want to thank my family and my friends in Baton Rouge who supported me," Leon Gary Plauche, 39, said after he was sentenced Tuesday to five years of supervised probation, during which he is to undergo treatment for substance abuse and perform 300 hours of community service work.

"I would just like to get on with my life," he said. Plauche pleaded no contest on May 16 to manslaughter in the death of Jeffrey Doucet, 25, who was shot in the head in the Baton Rouge airport March 16, 1984.

The shooting, filmed by a television crew, occured as police escorted Doucet in handcuffs after returning from California where FBI agents had arrested him on a charge of kidnapping Plauche's 11-year-old son.

Judge Frank Saia, calling the shooting a tragedy and saying that imprisonment would serve no useful purpose, suspended a sentence of seven years at hard labor. The maximum sentence would have been

21 years in jail. Saia said therapists who have worked with Plauche said that prison would do little to rehabilitate him. "In fact, prison life might have a devastating effect on him and everything that has been accomplished during the past year and a half,"

Plauche was originally indicted on a second-degree murder charge but bargained with prosecutors to plead no contest to manslaughter.

"The victim is from a good family and the defendant is from a good family," Saia said. "In this case, if there is anything that is unusual, it is because both sides are victims. Both sides suffered.' Doucet's mother, Elia Doucet, broke into sobs as

the sentence was read and was supported by family members as they left the standing-room-only "They didn't even let me know that my son had

been killed. I found out when I saw my son killed on television...," said Mrs. Doucet, her voice trailing

Roland Doucet, a brother, made the unusual move of addressing the court before sentencing.

"I believe thou shalt not kill and society says thou shall not kill," he told the court. "I believe that Jeffrey believed that.'

"That man took his life from him," Doucet said, pointing at Plauche. Afterwards, Doucet called the sentence an

"I don't believe justice was done," he said. "It's

just going to show people that if you have political connections you can get away with murder on national TV in Baton Rouge.

The sentence was in line with psychological reports filed in court Monday, and with motions by defense attorney Anthony Marabella, who asked Saia not to imprison Plauche.

'There is virtually no risk that (he) will commit another crime, nor will incarceration serve any useful purpose nor will a probationary sentence deprecate the seriousness of the crime," Marabella

Two psychological reports included detailed accounts given by both Plauche and the son.

Dr. James L. Brabham reported that the son described how Doucet, the boy's martial arts in-structor, had sexually abused him for months prior to the kidnapping. The boy was abducted Feb. 19, 1984, and was

rescued by authorities in California Feb. 29, more than two weeks before the shooting. The boy suffered from bad dreams after the inci-

dent, but he has progressed well and the prognosis for a normal life appears to be good, Brabham wrote. Dr. Edward P. Uzee examined the father and con-

cluded Plauche could not tell the difference between right and wrong when he shot Doucet.

"Gary's sense of right and wrong became a mirror image of what is right and wrong according to law and society, but Gary believed he would be failing in his duty — that he would be wrong if he did not carry out his God-given mission to kill Jeffrey Doucet."

## **Budget hearing** dealt in ironies

Tuesday night's public hearing on the city budget was a study in irony. It was also an exercise in frustration for many citizens who voiced opposition to rising taxes and fees. People, finding no object for their anger, lashed out blindly, and in some cases maliciously.

Councilmen should be applauded for their willingness to listen to their constituents. And, ultimately, the productive approach by the citizens will be to support those they elected to

Councilmen listened to the people, 150 strong, in a hot, ill-lit auditorium, owned by the city of Big Spring but allowed to decay into a deplorable state. The reason? No one has been willing to commit tax money to restore the stately structure. The recent impetus for renovation has come from private donations, not public funds.

Most citizens took turns railing against tax oppression, bitter that a hefty tax increase is planned. But some came to plead special consideration. Firefighters who spoke out could see no rationale for reducing their manpower. The message was clear: cut, but don't cut my program.

City Manager Don Davis was peppered with cries of "fire 'em, fire 'em' when citizen Danny Heckler, who does as his name implies, ferreted out the fact that Davis makes \$50,000 a year for his efforts. Yet no one sees a need to call to task the four Howard County commissioners - whose combined incomes for part-time work total about \$100,000 a year.

Citizens fumed about lack of leadership even as they roasted those we elected to lead us.

It was indeed a night of ironies, made deeper by the fact that there's next to nothing which can be cut from the city budget. Manpower is being reduced. Salaries are frozen. The only "frill" is a plan to extend to all city employees the newly won benefits of firefighters. And, in the final irony, it was a public vote of the people that gave these benefits to the firemen in the

The public hearing was needed. It allowed complaints that needed to be aired. And in the final analysis the tax rate proposal may be adjusted. We have several days before a deci-

When it is made, however, we hope the mandate voters gave councilmen will not be brutalized in a headlong rush that may be pennywise and pound foolish.

## Ag graduate school evades procurement rules

WASHINGTON - In Washington, it's hard to come up with a scam that someone hasn't already thought up. But the inventive administrators of the Graduate School of the U.S. Department of Agriculture managed to do it.

For the past three years, this obscure institution has been providing services and personnel for various agencies and charging commissions to do it. If you worked for a government agency that needed extra personnel, computers or furniture and you wanted to avoid the cumbersome procurement channels, the thoughtful folks at the Graduate School were usually willing to help.

It was an ingenious bit of flim-flammery that deserves at least an Honorable Mention in our Hall of

We first broke the story two weeks ago with a report that two Washington-area Army installations spent \$235,000 over a two-year period on equipment - including a microwave oven, a bar stool, slide projectors and an exercise machine - through "interagency agreements" with the Graduate School. The purchases were disguised as "educational services" to bypass the regular procurement process

A few days later, the Agriculture Department's inspector general reported that the Graduate School had acted as a "pass-through contractor" to purchase supplies and equipment and to hire employees wanted by client agencies. The Graduate School collected commissions of up to 30 percent, which were concealed as "overhead fees."

The school, which offers adult-education courses, receives no appropriations and is supposed to subsist on tuition fees. But with a \$30 milion contract income, its annual budget soared from \$4.9 million in 1980 to \$23 million in 1985. There was so much money coming in, said one insider, that the school "couldn't handle it" and began to have billing and accounting

It will be a few months before the scandal runs its course. One Graduate School official, Director Edmund Fulker, has resigned under pressure, and a federal grand jury is looking into the operation. Other investigations may be in the offing.

Our reporter Kenneth Reid has learned that a federal grand jury probe of the Army's contracts with the school has already snared one individual who pleaded guilty to filing fraudulent claims. "There's a lot more to come," said a source in the U.S. Attorney's office in Alexandria, Va.

The inspector general at the Agency for International Development also is auditing the \$11 million in contracts his agency signed with the Graduate

School. In one case, an AID official requested that a particular individual be hired by the school and assigned to a foreign aid project. "We would like to have him report for work on or about Sept. 8," the official wrote in a letter to the school's head of international programs on Aug. 22, 1983.

Federal regulations flatly forbid agencies to designate who is to be hired on contract jobs. By using "inter-agency agreements" with an entity that is not a federal agency, the foreign aid officials were able to circumvent the rules.

The Graduate School's former business manager, Kenneth Dickerson, repeatedly warned his supervisors that the deals they were making with other government agencies were not on the up-and-up.

In a Dec. 16, 1982, letter to Fulker, for example, Dickerson questioned expenditures made for an Army educational center at Fort Belvoir, Va. "I suspect a good many of the purchases do not simply comply with federal procurement regulations," he

Footnote: Fulker said his school had actually 'saved the government money," not the other way around. The overhead fees were legitimate, he said, and often necessary because the agencies he dealt

with took so long to pay.

### Weapon. Rollback election possible Continued from page 1-A

City council members have proposed a 15.74 percent increase in property taxes from the effective tax rate, making it possible for residents to go through a tax rollback procedure.

The proposal, which would increase taxes to 73 cents per \$100 valuation, is a five-cent increase

over the current rate of 68 cents. However, because total appraised property values in the city increased, a tax rate of 63 cents per \$100 would bring in the same amount of revenue as last year.

Residents upset about the proposed increase, assuming it is approved by the council, would have 90 days to gather signatures of 10 percent of the

city's registered voters on a rollback petition.

The petition would have to be certified by the city secretary. If certified, the city would be required to hold an election on the rollback question.

Taxes could only be rolled back to the current rate, 68 cents

Former city councilman Jack Watkins went further. "If you pass a tax increase at 73 cents, the taxpayers will have a rollback election. ... I'm not trying to intimidate you but I'm telling you the facts,' he said.

Richard Gibbons drew loud applause as the first of many speakers to propose making the golf course and tennis courts selfsustaining enterprises. "Why does the city continue to subsidize the golf course and tennis courts? ... It needs to be a 'bare bones' budget."

The golf course will bring in about \$100,000 this year, but still will be \$80,000 in the hole, city officials said. Councilman Russ McEwen defended the \$50,000 price tag for completing the sprinkler system out of revenue-sharing funds. "If we improve it, it will draw more players," he said.

The softball complex and golf course drew support from Steve Frazer of the Big Spring Softball Commission and Chris Christopher, Fiberflex chief ex-

ecutive officer.

Frazer, representing 800 people who signed a petition for construction of a new softball complex, said tournaments at good fields brought in many out-of-town players, most whom spent \$75 a day in town.

Christopher, like Councilman Johnny Rutherford, said the recreational complexes were necessary "quality-of-life" items to draw industry to town.

Councilmen drew particularly heavy heat from former and current firefighters, who criticized the city's plan to close Central and reduce fire department personnel by two people through demotions and attrition. Residents of the city's west end

of town asked the council to delay closing Central until they open a new fire station on the west, perhaps at an old building at the Big Spring Airpark,

"You need to give some protection before you pull the rug away," said a businessman. "If it takes you seven minutes to get to my business, I lose \$200,000. ... People

who live there can't afford to live anywhere else. If they lose their home, they lose everything.'

According to McEwen, council members have considered opening a new station at the airpark in another year. The department's response times will not be changed, he said.

Firemen, including members of the city's union, asked the council not to demote two lieutenants, but to keep them as floating employees at that rank. The city already is paying higher classification pay nearly every shift, and this would help to avoid that, said union president John Branham.

The firemen also claim they would run the same amount of equipment as they run with Central Fire Station open. Equipment, they say, determines the number of employees, not stationhouses.

McEwen said the proposal will save the city \$50,000. He also said eight employees from other departments are being cut through attrition.

Watkins, who was on the council in the '70s, shot back, saying the council then had fired the city administration and made up a 256,000 deficit in one year. "If you raise the water and sewer



Surgery may prevent full stroke

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Will you kindly tell me what is involved with an endarterectomy? My elderly mother had a mild stroke (3 on a scale of 10) and tests showed that the left internal carotid artery is 50 percent blocked. We had a poststroke visit with her internist, who is also a cardiologist. He is a very conservative doctor, but he has suggested that we investigate the procedure so that an educated decision can be made. Mother is in remarkably good health. Her blood pressure is under control. — Mrs.

From what you tell me, I guess your decision will have been made by the time you read this and that you've been able to weigh all the pluses and minuses involved in such a decision. But let me use your letter to talk about this very

An endarterectomy is an operation where an artery is opened and cleared of obstructing fatty debris that is clinging to its walls. You mentioned cartoid arteries, the ones in the neck that bring blood to the brain. Their importance is obvious. If they can be kept cleared, the chances of stroke are much less. Endarterectomies are also done elsewhere in the body — in the legs, for example, to improve circulation there when blockage threatens mobility.

So you can see it is a very

available. So why isn't it done for everyone with arterial buildups? One reason is the one you hint at. You mention (another part of your note) that your mother is 90. Not everyone that age is a suitable surgical risk. And second, for many there are non-surgical alternatives to prevent strokes.

Your doctor was wise in setting forth the alternatives and suggesting that you seek a second opinion and fuller information on which to base a decision.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My aunt, who is 27, is suffering from costochondritis of the rib cartilage. Doctors tell her there is no medical cure. She has been given an electric device to ease the pain, but it hasn't helped that much. They told her that the disease goes away by itself. Is this true? Can you tell me more about this disease, what causes it, and can it be cured? -

It seems I'm always having to write the line that begins, "The cause of this illness is not known..." It must be as frustrating to readers as it is to me, and it must shake a lot of faith in medicine as a

> **CHUCK ROAST** IN WINE

1 4 lb. chuck roast, cut 11/2 inches thick

1 tsp. grated lemon peel 1/2 cup white wine







PETALUMA, Calif. (AP) - To come with flavoring, Beyries said most chefs prefer the pure version

escargot company is on the move, and owners Mike Beyries and Tracy Brash hope more palates appreciate their product.

Two million snails slither through two greenhouses in Petaluma every year en route to restaurants and gourmet food stores in 26 states. The snails are packed in water in 7 1/2-ounce cans retailing for \$6-\$7, including a mini-

While Beyries and Brash are serious about their 2-year-old business, they're not above joking. Beyries insists his little mollusks have great intelligence and are

Holding one in the palm of his hand, he orders it to "Stay! Sit! Play Dead!" The little critter

'You have got to have a sense of humor to be in the snail business,' Beyries said. His background as a professional stand-up comic on the club circuit in Los Angeles has definitely come in handy.

Beyries, however, was teaching at San Francisco State University when Brash suggested starting an escargot company. Brash had been trying to do a story on a Santa Rosa man raising snails commercially, but found he had moved to Texas, leaving behind a book on raising snails.



## McEnroe nips Israeli

NEW YORK (AP) - It would have ranked as one of the greatest upsets in the history of tennis - at the U.S. Open or anywhere else. Instead, John McEnroe's victory over Shlomo Glickstein will be just a footnote, a step on the road to a match with Boris Becker.

Glickstein, Israel's finest tennis player but ranked only 175th in the world heading into this \$3 million tournament at the National Tennis Center, took McEnroe to the limit. Tuesday. But after squandering four match points, McEnroe, the defending champion, top seed and top-ranked player in the world, survived to play again with a breathtaking 6-1, 6-7, 2-6, 6-3, 7-6 victory, winning the decisive tie-

Becker, the 17-year-old Wimbledon champion from West Germany, shrugged off his own center-court jitters earlier and swept past Peter Doohan of Australia 6-4, 6-1, 6-2.

Today, the defending women's champion, No. 2-seed Martina Navratilova, was to begin play against Pascale Paradis of France, No. 1 women's seed Chris Evert son of Australia, No. 2 men's seed Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia was scheduled to play Jay Lapidus and barest of margins in a grinding 3 Jimmy Connors, the No. 4 seed, hours, 51 minutes, raised one arm

After Becker walked off the court to applause, McEnroe walked on to cheers. The fans were his, and they were appropriately appreciative as he serve and volleyed Glickstein into submission in the first set.

But as McEnroe's game began to desert him, the crowd in the halffilled, 20,000-seat stadium shifted to Glickstein, subtly at first, then dramatically as he repeatedly scored with a succession of passing shots or lobs to the baseline over the charging McEnroe. They cheered each of Glickstein's winning points, groaned at every loser, booed at close calls that went against the 27-year-old Israeli.

Then, slowly, McEnroe began to reassert himself, and with his gallantry, his support in the stands began to re-emerge until the cheer-ing was loud and lusty no matter who won a point.

McEnroe was winning the points he needed to survive, the mark of a champion. And finally, after Glickstein had fought off four match points in the fifth-set tiebreaker, McEnroe blistered a Lloyd was to face Janine Thomp- cross-court backhand that the lunging Glickstein netted.

'It was an amazingly bad game. I couldn't have done it worse if I'd tried. It was unbelievable how he jerked me around. I've never been so happy to win a first-round match. ... I went five sets in the first round a couple of years back and wound up losing (to Bill Scanlon) in the round of 16. I hope that isn't going to happen again.

Glickstein, who had won only two sets in three previous matches against McEnreoe, said that when he saw who he'd be going against in the opening round, "I thought it was the worst draw ever.'

league this year," New York Giants Coach Bill Parcells said Tuesday after announcing that Jennings had been waived. "I think he was a great player at his position. He's one of the best who ever

In other player moves Tuesday, the Dallas Cowboys traded veteran linebacker Anthony Dickerson to Buffalo for an undisclosed draft choice. Dickerson, a starter the last two seasons, was traded after the strong preseason performances of linebackers Jeff Rohrer and rookie Jesse Penn.

The Houston Oilers obtained former NCAA champion kicking specialist Tony Zendejas from the Washington Redskins for a conditional draft choice in 1987. Houston also waived seven players, including third-string quarterback Brian Ransom and veteran runn-

ng back Arthur Whittington Youngblood surrendered to back problems by retiring from the Los Angeles Rams, while McKenzie, a sparkplug on the Buffalo Bills' 'Electric Company' offensive line, was dropped by Seattle.

"I've had to make some tough decisions in my life, but none as tough as this one," said Youngblood, a 14-year starter for

the Rams who holds the team record with 202 consecutive games played. "Football has been my life for as long as I can remember, but it's too important to me to go on if I can't continue to play as I once

The 6-foot-5, 245-pound Youngblood, whose iron-man streak ended late last year because of a herniated disc, was an All-Pro performer six times and played in seven Pro Bowls.

McKenzie was cut by the Seahawks along with defensive end Mike Fanning, center John Hill and defensive end Mark Bell. All NFL teams had to cut their

rosters to 50 men by Tuesday and 45 next week before the regular season starts: The Los Angeles Raiders releas-

ed Reggie Kinlaw and Odis McKinney, both prominent veterans of two Super Bowl games.

Kinlaw, a seventh-year nose tackle from Oklahoma, was one of the heroes of the Raiders' 38-9 victory in Super Bowl XVIII when he was credited with helping nullify Washington's vaunted ground

He was also a major factor in the Raiders' 27-10 victory over Philadelphia three years earlier in Super Bowl XV. McKinney, a backup safety often used as a fifth defensive back on passing downs, came to the Raiders in an offseason trade in 1980.

The Detroit Lions cut eight players, among them 1978 Outland Trophy winner Greg Roberts, an offensive lineman, and veteran

linebacker Steve Doig. Roberts spent five seasons with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and one with the Oklahoma Outlaws of the USFL.

The Green Bay Packers cut veteran defensive back Estes Hood, wide receiver Ron Cassidy and 6-foot-9 offensive tackle Dale Markham, a three-year starter with the USFL's Oakland franchise.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers waived defensive back Fred Acorn, wide receiver Carl Williams and placekicker Obed Ariri. Ariri, who set team records for points and field goals last year, was beaten out by Donald Igwebuike, a childhood friend of Ariri's who followed him to Clemson University as a soccer player.

The Buffalo Bills cut defensive end Leroy Howell, safety James Perryman, former New York Jets. wide receiver Bobby Jones and linebackers Andre Young and Blanchard Montgomery.

The St. Louis Cardinals cut former University of Missouri star Curtland Thomas, the team's leading wide receiver in training

The Cincinnati Bengals signed veteran defensive end Ross Browner, a six-year starter, to a new contract and put seven players on waivers, including two veterans, linebacker Guy Frazier and guard Gary Smith.

Cleveland waived veteran linebacker Dick Ambrose, who

came to the Browns as a 12th-round draft choice from Virginia in 1975. He was a mainstay on the Browns' defense until he suffered a broken ankle in 1983, an injury that still plagued him in training camp.

The Indianapolis Colts waived seven players, including nine-year veteran tackle Ted Petersen, fouryear pro linebacker Gary Padjen and rookie fullback Mark Brooks of Notre Dame.

Dave Finzer, who had a punt of 87 yards for Chicago last season, was among 10 players cut by the Bears. Other veterans waived were second-year running back Donald Jordan, second-year offensive tackle Tom Andrews and secondyear wide receiver Jack Cameron.

Denver waived defensive end Walt Boyer, placed running back Rick Parros on injured reserve and signed free agent quarterback Scott Stankavage.

Free safety Rick Sanford, a firstround draft choice in 1979 who lost his starting job early last season, was among six players cut by New England.

The Atlanta Falcons reduced their roster to 50 by cutting seven players, including veteran running back Lynn Cain. Cain, whose 2,313 vards is fourth-best in Falcon history, started much of his first four seasons but was a reserve the last two years.

Linebacker Vernon Maxwell and veteran safety John Turner were cut by the San Diego Chargers.
