# Company plans \$3 million grain/rail elevator project

Blocking the railroad crossing on County Road 17.

That was the primary topic at a town hall meeting Monday evening in the junior high cafeteria attended by about 70 local producers and businessmen. The meeting was hosted by officials from J. D. Heiskell & Co., a Californiabased company whose chairman Scot Hillman said was the fourth largest U. S. feed manufacturer.

Mr. Hillman's great grandfather founded the company in 1886. He is the fourth generation to operate the company.

Heiskell & Co. recently leased the former West Friona Grain elevators from the current owner, CHS, Inc. The company hopes to build a 7,700 foot straight rail line to accommodate 100-car trains of distillers grain to be unloaded at the elevators. The operation would temporarily block the County Road 17 railroad crossing, a popular route for many producers in the southern part of the county.


The town hall meeting was called by Heiskell to introduce their company to local farmers and to explain their plan for operations at the elevator. Heiskell's Southwest General Manager Dick Holland, based in Portales, New Mexico, said that the Friona facility is their only Texas location. They chose Friona and the CHS, Inc. facility because of its location in the center of a growing dairy and beef cattle industry.

Holland said the company became interested in Friona because of the Friona Economic Development Corporation's participation in the World Ag Expo which is held in Tulare, California. Tulare is the location of Heiskell's headquarters.

FEDC president Bill Stovell and Chamber exec Chris Alexander have participated in the World Ag Expo the last few years as part of High Ground of Texas, an economic development group from the Panhandle, organized to attract businesses to the area.

The company has locations in six states, California, New Mexico, Nebraska, Colorado, Idaho, and now Texas. Holland said they are currently leasing the facility from CHS, Inc. but discussions were being held for Heiskell to purchase the facility.

Heiskell officials met with Parmer County commissioners in January seeking approval to block the crossing while unloading grain cars. Commissioners agreed to allow Heiskell to block the **Town hall meeting**

crossing for up to 2-hours when the train arrives and up to 4-hours when the train cars leave. Dick Holland told the audience they felt the crossing would be blocked for only about 30-minutes during each operation.

The 7,700 foot rail line would accommodate a 100-car train which measures 7,200 feet. Plans call for Heiskell to pull 50-cars onto the west side of CR17, unhook the cars, and leave 50 cars on the east side of the crossing, leaving access to the CR17 crossing open. The last 50 cars would be moved 10 at a time for unloading. Officials said it would take 24 hours to unload the 100 cars and they assured the producers they would do everything possible to minimize the inconvenience.

The distillers grain, a corn by-product, would then be trucked out from the elevators to dairy and feedyard customers for use in cattle feed. At its peak, Holland said, they would be sending 400 truckloads a week out of the elevators. They plan to start with one train per month but the goal, Holland said, is to unload four cars per month, one a week. He also said that their research showed this area could use 17 trains per month to fulfill area requirements for feed.

When completed J. D. Heiskell & Co.'s construction cost will be \$3 million, and the business would bring 12 new jobs and a \$750,000 annual payroll to Friona, Holland said. This does not include reciprocal benefits such as truck fuel, food, and other money spent locally by people supporting the business. Parmer County tax appraiser Curby Brantley said the \$3 million facility would add \$53,000 in new taxes for the county.

Holland emphasized that Heiskell did not ask for any type of tax abatement to locate here. "We are big boys and we will pay our taxes," he said. The facility now pays \$6,000 in county

Another concern of blocking the crossing was access by fire and EMS emergency personnel. Holland said the company plans to notify emergency personnel in advance of a train arrival. An alternate route was described as over the Highway 214 bridge and along the railroad road to CR17.

Holland and others assured those present that they would "break" a train in the event a producer had an important need to move equipment across the CR17 track. Heiskell officials will meet with county commissioners again on March 26 to formalize an agreement and begin construction.

#### Spring forward as Daylight Savings Time begins Sun.

Daylight Savings Time arrives earlier and stays longer beginning this year. A total of one month has been added to the longer hours. Daylight Savings Time now starts three weeks earlier and ends one week later than in the past.

This Sunday, March 11, at 2 a.m. all clocks will Spring Forward one hour. At 2 a.m. Sunday November 4, we will Fall Back.

According to the Old Farmer's Almanac, Daylight Saving Time first began in 1918 during World War I to allow more evening light and save fuel for the war effort. It was also in 1918 that Congress passed the Standard Time Act establishing the U.S. time zones. Don't forget to set all your clocks and watches ahead one hour Saturday night.

This week Scot Hillman, the CEO and great grandson of the founder was in Friona to shake a few hands and meet with local producers about Heiskell's plans for the elevator west of town. The story with details is on the front page.

During the town hall meeting Monday, Dick Holland, Southwest Manager for Heiskell, told producers that if Friona decided it didn't want the company here they would go somewhere else. He did not say it in a threatening way, it was just a statement of fact in answer to a question. Mr. Holland did a good job of addressing some tough questions.

J. D. Heiskell & Co wants to be here and are willing to spend around \$3 million to prove it. Yes, closing the County Road 17 crossing a few times a month will be an inconvenience to many area farmers and producers.

If there is one thing we learn to do around here in the country it is cope with a few inconveniences. This is train and tractor country. A land of county roads and semi-trucks, bull haulers, and grain trucks. A rock chip on the windshield is a big inconvenience.

We have beef cattle and dairy cattle. A lot of them and more coming. They need feed at a decent price so everybody can make a profit and boost the area economy while we can. Heiskell says they want to do that and be good neighbors. As Mr. Holland said, "I can stand here and talk all night but we will have to prove our integrity by our actions."





#### Child predator gets 95 years

A convicted East Texas felon arrested by Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott's Cyber Crimes Unit was sentenced to 95 years in state prison after a Gregg county jury returned a guilty verdict on one count of attempted aggravated sexual assault of a child. Joe Alan Cook, 46, of Longview, was formally sentenced on Thursday in 124th Judicial District Court for using the Internet to solicit a child for sex.

The punishment was enhanced because of Cook's two prior Illinois felony convictions for burglary and home invasion. It is the longest prison sentence ever handed down to an online predator arrested by the Cyber Crimes Unit.

"Texans will not tolerate criminals who prey upon our children," Attorney General Abbott said. "So desperate to meet and sexually assault a child that he arrived on a bicycle, this offender shows the true danger posed by these sexual predators. We are grateful to Gregg County District Attorney Bill Jennings for his assistance with this case. East Texans can rest assured that we put this predator behind bars for a very long time."

Attorney General Abbott added: "Thanks to our dedicated Cyber Crimes Unit investigators and Assistant Attorney General Grant Sparks, Texas is a safer place for our children."

Cyber Crimes Unit investigators and Longview Police Department officers arrested Cook in February 2006 after he rode his bicycle to meet someone he believed to be a 13-year-old child he had splicited over the Internet for sex. When he arrived, Cook discovered the "child" was an undercover Cyber Crimes Unit investigator who had posed as an underage girl.

Protecting children is one of Attorney General Abbott's top priorities. His Cyber Crimes and Fugitive units have arrested more than 500 sexual predators since he took office in December 2002. The Fugitive Unit locates convicted child sex offenders who have violated the terms of their parole and could be stalking children.




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
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# Retinal Detachments

It has been a normal workday for Mary. During a meeting, through, she'd begun noticing spots and flashes of light before her eyes. Alarmed as she was, she went to see her eye doctor who promptly found a small tear in the retina. Luckily for Mary, prompt treatment was able to save her vision.

Although rare, a detached retina is a sign that something has interfered with the adhesion between the back of the eye, or retina, and it's base. Often,

the cause is not known. High nearsightedness, eye trauma, eye disease, or severe eye infection, can place you at a greater risk.

A retinal detachment is serious and will usually get worse. Treatment is normally surgical; the goal is to reattach the retina. This is sometimes done by burning the tear or even by freezing it. A laser is sometimes used, along with other techniques.

> We range in elevation from 3,800 Missouri. The area was isolated and unsettled early on but may have been part of the area explored by the Jose Mares Expedition when they were searching for a shorter route from Sante Fe to San Antonio in 1787. Apaches were probably the original inhabitants until the arrival of the Kiowas and the Comanches in 1700. These Indians of the Plains lived here until the Red River War in 1874 when they were defeated and removed to Indian Territory.

Parmer County was carved out of the Bexar District in 1876, but no settlement occurred until 1882. In January 1882 the Capitol Syndicate was hired to build a state capitol building in exchange for over 3 million acres in the Panhandle creating one of the world's largest cattle ranches, the famous XIT Ranch. From a population of 7 in 1890 to 34 in 1900, most of the actual settlement occurred after the XIT was sold in 1904. 150,000 acres of the XIT was in Parmer County. Cattle have always hugely outnumbered people in our county from 13,675 in 1900 to the 100,000


