

Sunshine week.....

Each year the American Society of Newspaper Editors encourages newspapers and other media to remind readers about the importance of protecting public access to government information and meetings. In other words, open meet-

It is called Sunshine Week and this year is being observed this week, March 11-17. Why does it matter? Open records and open government meetings allow you the citizen to know what is going on in the governments that are supported by your tax dollars.

If not for open government laws officials might prefer to keep us all in the dark about what they are doing and how they are spending our money. A newspaper like this one can only keep the public informed if it has access to government records and decisions.

The Constitution requires local, state, and national governments to be accountable to the people. That's you. And me. We are a strong nation because of open government and the press that reports it. Keeping information "out in the sunlight" where we can see it is the object of Sunshine Week.

It is a pity that more citizens do not attend the local council and board meetings to see what is going on and to "keep our elected officials honest." Maybe we could turn some of the sunshine on the public to see if they are really concerned. We hope they are.

Bird's-eye views at PPHM

An exhibition of more than 60 views of Texas cities ranging from local communities like Amarillo, Childress, Clarendon, and Quannah, to distant cities like Austin, Wichita Falls, Texarkana and El Paso comes to the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's Foran Gallery March 17 through June 10, 2007.

Between 1871 and 1914 the artists drew the images by hand, canvassing the town and sketching individual buildings from the predetermined direction and converting them to the desired aerial perspective. The artist might spend several days in the smaller towns and weeks in the larger ones.

These highly detailed and oversized lithographic prints, created by the artists as if seen from high above, came to be known as "bird's-eye views". Eleven different artists drew and registration can be done at www.casa5K.org or by calling Rita published at least 67 bird's-eye views of Texas cities. They had to act as traveling salesmen, securing funding to cover their costs before the views could be drawn and then printed. 

Jesus' human bones didn't go to heaven

After all the hype about the Discovery Channel's "Lost Tomb of Jesus", which aired on March 4, a couple of facts are clear. First, nothing conclusive was proven by the documentary. Second, many Christians cannot think clearly about the issues presented in the documentary. Take the resurrection. If we accept Jesus' resurrection as a fact, does that mean Jesus' human bones went to heaven? According to the Reverend Edward G. Palmer, the answer is a resounding NO!

Reverend Palmer said, "I see the mythology that Apostle Paul predicted would come. It was apparent in Ted Koppel's show analyzing the 'Lost Tomb of Jesus' that aired immediately after the documentary. One professor stated that if the documentary were true, it destroyed the basis of the Christian faith, which is the resurrection. Really? How so? Did Jesus take his human flesh and bones to heaven in his resurrection body? The thought is sheer nonsense."

"Nothing in the 'Lost Tomb' documentary should shake any Christian's faith. The Bible teaches Jesus was made a human [man] just like the rest of us; that he died a human death on the cross; and, that he appeared later in a body that clearly transcended the capabilities of a human body. Do human bones ascend to heaven? No, and neither did the human bones of Jesus. If the documentary is true, it is a statistically significant

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENT** SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 12, 2007

PROPOSITION 1 (SJR 13)

SJR 13 would amend the Constitution to authorize the legislature to adjust the public school ad valorem tax or tax rates for taxpayers who are aged 65 or older, or are disabled, and who are owners of an exempted homestead. The amendment would thereby allow the legislature to provide tax relief to such elderly or disabled taxpayers who did not receive tax relief as a result of the school tax rate reduction passed in the 79th Legislature, 3rd called session.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for public school purposes on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect any reduction in the rate of those taxes for the 2006 and 2007 tax years."


