### 'Blood Wedding' one-act play presents public performance



Under the A-PLUS Act:

\* All states would have the option of establishing a 5-year Performance Agreement with the Secretary of Education.

\* States could consolidate funds from a few or all of the federal education programs and redirect them to innovative programs created at the state level.

\* In exchange for this flexibility, participating states would be required to meet their state performance objectives for improving student academic achievement and demonstrate a narrowing of achievement gaps.

\* If a state fails to improve academic achievement, its Performance Agreement would be revoked and it would revert back to the NCLB system.

\* Accountability and student achievement would remain a high priority with A-PLUS, but unlike NCLB, A-PLUS allows states to use a variety of innovative accountability programs.

\* Transparency would be ensured by requiring states to submit annual reports on student progress to parents and taxpayers.

BY T. LEON TALLEY, Sixth Street Church of Christ There are at least six different aspects of God's sovereignty. I want to identify three of them in this article.

There is God's Creative Sovereignty. This means that God is the Lord of creation, the source of all things. God brought the world into being and He guides His creation toward a meaningful end. God's creativity is not the result of chance or randomness. His creativity holds promise and purpose according to God's intentions.

Then, there is Moral Sovereignty. God's authority over creation is grounded in His essential nature which is moral. God is to be obeyed not simply because He is mighty, but because He is righteous. Asaph said, "The Heavens proclaim his righteousness, for God Himself is judge", (Psalms 50:6). God judges His creation on the basis of His profound moral character. He is both the source of all creation and the source of all goodness.

There is also His Transcendent Sovereignty. God's sovereignty is transcendent, beyond our comprehension. "Isaiah saw the Lord seated on a throne, high and exalted, and the train of his robe filled the temple", (Isaiah 6:1).

God is separate from His creation and He works in ways that human beings don't understand. His transcendence is closely related to His Holiness and His surpassing moral purity.

full week in March has been desigtion Week. On March 16, President George W. Bush signed a proclamation that will designate March 18-24 as National Poison Prevention Week for 2007. The week gives poison educators an opportunity to remind the public of the dangers of unintentional poisonings and demonstrate ways in which homes and communities can become "Poison Safe".

This year the Texas Panhandle Poison Center, which serves residents within the 71 counties that comprise Texas Public Health Regions I and II, is focusing on "Prevent Poisonings-Clean Out Your Medicine Cabinet' as its theme for National Poison Prevention Week.

Poison control centers nationwide receive more than one million calls annually regarding poison exposures involving children five years and younger and about 30 children younger than five years old die each year from unintentional poisonings. Most of these poisonings are from products commonly found in the home: personal care products, including baby oil and mouthwash containing ethanol; household cleaners, including drain openers and oven cleaners; over-thecounter pain relievers, including ibuprofen, acetaminophen, aspirin and cough and cold medicines; hydrocarbons, such as lamp oil and furniture polish; and adult-strength vitamins and supplements containing iron.

Ronica Farrar, who has been the educator for TPPC since 2000, says unused and old medicines are a common source for poisonings and should be cleaned out at least once a year. "Out of all of the calls that we get, the ones that involve exposure to medicines can be the most frightening," Farrar said. "Just one tablet or capsule of some medications can be extremely dangerous if it is taken by a child or by an adult

**PUBLIC NOTICE** BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENT** SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 12, 2007

**PROPOSITION 1** (SJR 13)

SJR 13 would amend the Constitution to authorize the legislature to adjust the public school ad valorem tax or tax rates for taxpayers who are aged 65 or older, or are disabled, and who are owners of an exempted homestead. The amendment would thereby allow the legislature to provide tax relief to such elderly or disabled taxpayers who did not receive tax relief as a result of the school tax rate reduction passed in the 79th Legislature, 3rd called session.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for public school purposes on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect any reduction in the rate of those taxes for the 2006 and 2007 tax years."
