ALLENS GO TO DEATH IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

GOVERNOR DEFEATS PLAN TO STAY COURSE OF LAW IN CLAUDE'S CASE.

EXCITEMENT WAS TENSE

Father Falters at Crucial Moment, but Son Pays Penalty with Re-markable Nerve.

Richmond, Va.—Mumbling a prayer and crying half audibly that he was ready to go, Floyd Allen, a lawless product of the Virginia mountains, whose refusal to accept a short prisers of the programment of th Hillsville one year ago, limped to the death chair in the state penitentiary Friday eleven minutes ahead of Claude vanson Allen, his son.

The sentence of the court, held up for six hours while desperate and dra-matic efforts were being made to save the condemned men by eleventh-hour appeals to the lieutenant governor, was speedily ordered to proceed when Gov. Mann hastened back to Virginia, enough to take charge of a sit-n which was exciting to a degree. The prison superintendent, acting entirely within the law, agreed to defer the execution, giving Attorney General Williams an opportunty meanwhile to pass upon the consti-tutional right of Lieut, Gov. Ellyson

But the young son of Gov. Mann eached his father in Philadelphia by elephone less than an hour after the delay has been ordered and clock the governor was again on irginia soll.

The jury, which under the law is required to witness the executions, assembled outside the penitentiary shortly before 1 o'clock. The program as originally announced was carried out without change. While two ministers, who have been unfaltering in their loyalty to the condemned men, were telling them good-bye, the prison su-perintendent stepped into the corri-dor which separated the cells of father and son and read the death war-

Floyd Allen, still limping from the wounds he received in the Hillsville courthouse battle, said the last tearful farewell to his boy and went with the prison guards to the death chamber. 



FEDERALS DRIVEN FROM TOWN

The rebels captured some time ago when federal ammuni-tion was exhausted and in turn lost it for the same reason.


